



1. Special Session -- What Passed: Four appropriation bills introduced by the Governor during the 1979 regular session to fund FY 79 salary and benefits increase costs of negotiated agreements under the Public Employment Relations Act for the following state bargaining units:

2. Special Session -- What Did Not Pass:

- Bills amending state personnel and public employees collective bargaining laws;
- Bills authorizing and appropriating for FY 79/FY 80 salary and benefits increases for (a) "non-covered" employees of executive, judicial, legislative branches and University of Alaska, and (b) employees whose salary levels are recommended by the Alaska Salary Commission, and per diem and allowance increases and trips to home districts for legislators;
- Appropriations for FY 79/FY 80 salary and benefits increases for Inland Boatmen's Union;

--Appropriations for FY 80 salary/benefits increases for Supervisory, Labor Trades & Crafts, General Government, Public Safety, Confidential, Marine Engineers, Masters/Mates & Pilots, and Alaska Skill Center teachers' bargaining units. (No FY 79 appropriation was required for Skill Center.)

--Appropriation for FY 79 salary and benefits increase for University of Alaska research employees (added by House in HCS CSB 3).

3. 1979 Regular Session Background: During the 1979 regular session, the Governor introduced (in the House) five appropriation bills and one authorization bill relating to FY 79 salary/benefits increases for various employee groups:

--Seven Collective Bargaining Units - Supervisory (HB 93); Labor Trades & Crafts (HB 367); General Government, Public Safety, Confidential (HB 368); Marine Engineers, Masters/Mates & Pilots (HB 385) -- all appropriation bills; no authorization legislation required.

--Non-Covered Employees - Executive, Judicial, and Legislative branches, and the University of Alaska (HB 381 appropriation bill, CSHB 220am authorization bill). *

The House State Affairs Committee introduced a resolution (HCR 2) setting out the Alaska State Salary Commission recommendations. The House passed the aforementioned bills/resolution which were transmitted to the Senate and referred to Senate Finance where no action was taken during the regular session. HCR 2 died in Senate Finance for not having passed the Legislature during the session in which it was introduced.

The Governor also transmitted to the Legislature three Governor's budget amendments to cover FY 80 salary/benefits increases to carry through into FY 80 the FY 79 increases already introduced. The amendments also included FY 80 funds for costs relating to employees covered by HCR 2. (Note: When HCR 2 passed the House, a fiscal note accompanied the resolution; the Governor's budget amendment duplicated the fiscal note.) These amendments were not considered by the Free Conference Committee on the Budget, and therefore expired.

The First Session of the Eleventh State Legislature adjourned not having passed any salary and benefits increases for FY 79 or FY 80. On July 19, 1979, the Governor called a Special Session to convene August 6, 1979 to consider salary/benefits increases and amendments to state personnel and public employees collective bargaining laws.

* University of Alaska salary increases for non-covered U of A employees do not require authorization measures; however, CSHB 220(am) contains language relating to the pay distribution plan for U of A salary increases.

4. 1979 Special Session:

- (a) Governor: Because the Governor's six salary/benefits increase bills passed the House during the 1979 regular session and were "alive" in Senate Finance, the Governor introduced only two corresponding bills in each house during the Special Session:

HB 504/SB 290, appropriating for FY 80 salary/benefits increases for the 7 bargaining units and non-covered employees mentioned in the preceding section, FY 79/80 funds for Alaska Salary Commission recommendation employees, Inland Boatmen's Union (contract negotiations not completed until after regular session adjournment), and FY 80 funds for Skill Center teachers (removed from the Governor's FY 80 budget by the Legislature during the 1979 regular session in order to be considered with other salary increases).

HB 505/SB 291, amending the state personnel and public employees collective bargaining laws.

The Governor did not introduce any vehicle to authorize salary/benefits increases for Salary Commission recommendation employees (to replace expired vehicle, HCR 2).

- (b) House: The House chose not to act on HB 505, the collective bargaining law amendments; the bill remains in the House State Affairs Committee.

The House Finance Committee reported out three bills during the Special Session, two of which passed the House -- HCS CSSB 182 and HCS CSSB 143. CSSB 182 was referred to House State Affairs during the 1979 regular session. The bill essentially abolished the Salary Commission. Rather than pass a new House Bill* to replace HCR 2 (to resurrect the Salary Commission recommendations), the House chose to use CSSB 182 as a vehicle. A Senate bill could expedite session action and adjournment as the bill would only require Senate concurrence, not a Senate Committee referral process or three readings. Thus, House State Affairs waived referral of CSSB 182; the bill was referred to Finance where it was "gutted". The House Finance Committee Substitute for CSSB 182 used salary levels of HCR 2 but also provided for an annual COLA increase (with a 1984 sunset clause) equal to the percentage increase in the Anchorage Consumer Price Index. HCS CSSB 182 also raised the annual legislative allowance from \$4,320 (HCR 2) to \$5,000.

* House Finance originally introduced HB 506 during Special Session to cover Salary Commission recommendations; HB 506 differed from HCS CSSB 182 in that HB 506 provided a COLA Increase equal to only 80% of the Anchorage CPI percentage increase. HB 506 inadvertently omitted reference to legislative allowances. After HB 506 was reported out of Finance, the House decided to use a Senate vehicle instead (HCS CSSB 182). HB 506 action ceased, and the bill remains in House Rules.

The House Finance Committee, again wanting to use a Senate bill to expedite passage, held in committee the Governor's appropriation bill, HB 504. Instead, the Committee "gutted" CSSB 143 (referred to Finance during the 1979 regular session) and prepared a Committee Substitute which contained all of the appropriations in HB 504, but added \$276,000 for University of Alaska research employees' FY 79 salary increases, and added funds in Section 10 to provide for the annual legislative allowance increase (\$4,320 to \$5,000) and to allow for a COLA increase of an additional 3% (funds in Section 10 originally provided for a 7% estimated increase based on the Anchorage Consumer Price Index; it was thought that a 10% increase was more reasonable).

The House passed HCS CSSB 182 and HCS CSSB 143; the bills were transmitted to the Senate for concurrence. HB 506 remains in House Rules, HB 505 in House State Affairs, and HB 504 in House Finance.

- (c) Senate: SB 291, the Governor's bill amending state personnel and public employees collective bargaining laws, was referred to Senate Labor & Management. No action was taken on SB 291, and the bill remains in Committee.

SB 290, the Governor's appropriation bill (identical to HB 504) was referred to Senate Finance. At this point, Senate Finance had seven bills to consider during the Special Session -- six referred during the 1979 regular session, and SB 290. The Committee reported out only those appropriation bills (which ultimately passed the Legislature) providing FY 79 salary and benefits increases for collective bargaining units introduced during the regular session. The Committee voiced intent to fund FY 79 Inland Boatmen's Union increases during the 1980 legislative session. (FY 79 funding for IBU could not be achieved without amending one of the House bills, thus requiring House action; by this time, the House had adjourned sine die.)

The Senate passed the four bills reported out of Senate Finance -- HB 93, HB 367, HB 368, and HB 385. SB 291 remains in Senate Labor & Management, SB 290, HB 381 and CSHB 220am in Senate Finance, and HCS CSSB 143 and HCS CSSB 182 in Senate Rules.

The Senate adjourned sine die.

- HB 504 Governor's appropriation bill for FY 80 costs of increases, additional FY 79 costs -- FY 80 costs cover bargaining unit employees, non-covered employees, and Salary Commission recommendation employees. (In House Finance; HCS CSSB 143 used as appropriation vehicle instead.) (HB 504 identical to SB 290.)
- HB 505 Collective Bargaining amendments (In House State Affairs) (Identical to SB 291)
- HB 506 House Finance bill to set out Salary Commission recommendations (In House Rules; HCS CSSB .82 used as vehicle instead.)
- HCR 2 House State Affairs resolution setting out Salary Commission recommendations; (Passed House during 1979 regular session; referred to Senate Finance; died in Committee)
- HCS CSSB 143 House Committee Substitute (by Finance) to cover all FY 79 and FY 80 appropriations introduced by Governor in HB 504 and to increase annual legislative allowances from \$4,320 (HCR 2) to \$5,000, and to provide for additional COLA increases for Salary Commission recommendation employees, and \$270,000 for FY 79 salary increases for U of A research employees. (Passed House; in Senate Rules)
- HCS CSSB 182 House Committee Substitute (by Finance) to set out Salary Commission recommendations, increase legislative allowances, allow COLA Increase equal to percentage increase of Anchorage CPI with 1984 sunset clause. (passed House; in Senate Rules).
- SB 290 Governor's appropriation bill (identical to HB 504) (In Senate Finance)
- SB 291 Collective Bargaining amendments (identical to HB 505) (In Senate Labor & Management)

**Passed the 1979 Special Session of the Alaska State Legislature.*

Pursuant to the authority vested in me by Section 9 of Article II of the Constitution of the State of Alaska, I call the Eleventh Legislature of the State of Alaska into special session at Juneau at 10:00 a.m. on August 6, 1979, to consider the following subjects:

* (1) HB 93: A bill for an Act entitled: "An Act making a supplemental appropriation to the Office of the Governor, for supervisory bargaining unit contract; and providing for an effective date."

* (2) HB 367: A bill for an Act entitled: "An Act making a supplemental appropriation to the Office of the Governor for labor, trades, and crafts employees' negotiated salaries; and providing for an effective date."

* (3) HB 368: A bill for an Act entitled: "An Act making supplemental appropriations to the Office of the Governor for general government, public safety, and confidential employees' salaries; and providing for an effective date."

(4) HB 381: A bill for an Act entitled: "An Act making supplemental appropriations to cover salary increases for state employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement; and providing for an effective date."


* (5) HB 385: A bill for an Act entitled: "An Act making supplemental appropriations to the Governor's Office, for salary and benefit increases for marine engineers and masters, mates and pilots; and providing for an effective date."

(6) Supplemental appropriations to the Office of the Governor to pay additional costs of salaries and benefits for the 1979 and 1980 fiscal years.

(7) The compensation of all officers and employees not covered by collective bargaining. Some are included under CSHB 220 am. Others were included under HCR 2, which died at the end of the first session. CSHB 220 am, which has already passed the House can be used as a vehicle for this subject.

(8) Amendments to the state personnel and public employees collective bargaining laws relating the effective date of monetary terms of collective bargaining agreements; to the approval of the monetary terms for agreements for more than one year; to the exclusion of certain classes of employees from the coverage of agreements; to the exclusion of certain subjects from the coverage of agreements; and to the exclusion of covered employees from certain provisions of the personnel laws.

Per Ken Cates in the Division of Personnel, the following estimates are provided.

Increased salary estimates are based on a 3.5% increase effective January 1, and another 3.5% increase effective July 1st. The estimates are as follows:

For the remaining 6 months in FY 79 the estimated cost is \$528,500. The costs during FY 80 are estimated at \$2,150,900. These figures are exclusive of added costs for benefits. Health insurance costs are set out below.

Health insurance increases are based on the November month-end-run of supervisory employees which shows 867 permanent and probationary presently employed. The increased premium is \$16.75 per month per employee. The effective date of the increased coverage is January 1, 1979. Consequently, the additional funds needed for FY 79 are \$87,134. The estimated costs for FY 80 would be about \$175,000.





SUBJECT: Supervisory Contract Costs

Per Ken Cates in the Division of Personnel, the following estimates are provided.

Increased salary estimates are based on a 3.5% increase effective January 1, and another 3.5% increase effective July 1st. The estimates are as follows:

For the remaining 6 months in FY 79 the estimated cost is \$528,500. The costs during FY 80 are estimated at \$2,150,900. These figures are exclusive of added costs for benefits. Health insurance costs are set out below.

Health insurance increases are based on the November month-end-run of supervisory employees which shows 867 permanent and probationary presently employed. The increased premium is \$16.75 per month per employee. The effective date of the increased coverage is January 1, 1979. Consequently, the additional funds needed for FY 79 are \$87,134. The estimated costs for FY 80 would be about \$175,000.



The Supervisors Bargaining Unit negotiated a new contract effective January 1, 1979. The contract covers the period January 1, 1979 through December 31, 1979.

The major provisions of the contract are: A 3.5% cost-of-living adjustment effective January 1, 1979; a 3.5% cost-of-living adjustment computed on the salary schedule as adjusted January 1, 1979 to be effective July 1, 1979; an increase in health insurance benefits of \$16.75 per month in FY79 (this cost increases to \$20.10 in FY80) commensurate with that negotiated by the General Government Bargaining Unit; and a drycleaning allowance of \$25.00 per month for uniformed supervisory employees.

This contract was negotiated with and agreed to by the Supervisory Bargaining Unit in compliance with President Carter's voluntary wage and price guidelines.
