As you may have heard, we had a fire which totally destroyed the school building at Allakaket on January 25th.

We are contacting the Governor's Office trying to obtain some emergency money to put in temporary classrooms.

We had already planned to build a high school building there and with the insurance money from the claim we will be able to add an elementary section on to this building. The problem arises, in that, it will be approximately one year before it is ready for occupancy. For a month or so we could probably make do with some empty buildings around town. However, they would not work at all for a year's period. We've asked for approximately \$180,000 so that we could fly lumber in and hire a crew to build three separate buildings of approximately 24' x 40' to use as classrooms over the interim period. We feel we could start working as early as the end of March on these buildings as the temperature has been fairly warm. The runway, as you are aware, is too short to fly any modular or portable type structures in.



Our initial request, when we wrote to you about the fire in Allakaket, was that we would need about \$180,000. However, since th : time we have been able to better review our resources there and feel that we can get by quite adequately with two separate buildings which will cost approximately \$60,000 each for us to construct.

We are working with the Department of Education as well as with Sue Greene to try to come up with the money so that we can get started on these projects as soon as the warm weather hits again.

We are not opposed to getting the money on some sort of a loan as we understand the insurance company is probably going to end up settling at a fairly fair amount. If we do settle for enough money on the insurance claim we would have no objections to having this \$120,000 taken out of that as long as there was enough left for us to construct our elementary school in conjunction with the new high school building. The problem is, of course, we do not want to wait for a long drawn out claim settlement from the insurance company. But, this is a new approach we would find very acceptable if the money was around so that we could pay it back later under the above conditions.

Again, any help or advise would be appreciated.

## MEMORANDUM

The request for an appropriation of \$75,000.00 to be added to Senate Bill 128 is to allow sufficient funds for the engineering firm doing the basic feasibility on a gas liquids line to also include the revision necessary for the construction of a pure gas line or a combination liquids and methane line for the State's Royalty Gas from Prudhoe to Tidewater - the approximate cost of the additional work would be between \$25 and \$35,000.00.

Also it would be desirable and beneficial to have studied the in-state value of utilization of the State's Royalty Gas in such areas as domestic fuels needs, electrical generation, small scale petro-chemical activity, etc. This study would require approximately \$40 to \$50,000.00.

I trust the above will be of assistance to you.

SUBJECT: Agricultural Policy Task Force Budget

The Agricultural Policy Task Force is composed of persons who were busy but very knowledgeable about U.S. agriculture. Because these individuals could not spend a concentrated period of time in learning about and contributing to Alaskan agriculture, they were chosen with the agreement that they would put a few days a year over several years and then come to conclusions. The Task Force is composed of persons with knowledge and experience in national and international agriculture as well as Alaskan agriculture. The past sessions have been spent in gaining information on all phases of Alaskan agriculture.

The group was authorized by SCR 77. No experts have been hired by this committee as it possesses its own expertise. Approximately one half of the cost of the meetings to date have been borne by the members themselves and interested parties.

We lapsed about 50 per cent of our previous budgets. Fiscal year 79 was a bare bones operation with only \$10,000 budgeted of which nothing remains.

The Agricultural Policy Task Force will complete its charge this year. I respectfully request \$10,000 for FY 80 to complete the program.

For an Act entitled: "An Act making supplemental appropriations to the Departments of Education, Labor, Health and Social Services, University of Alaska and Legislative Agencies; and providing for an effective date."

Dear Representative Meekins and Senator Hohman:

This letter is a follow-up to our meeting of Saturday, February 17 regarding the University of Alaska, Anchorage "Great Alaskan Shoot-Out Basketball Tournament." As pointed out at the meeting, the "Great Alaskan Shoot-Out" was held last Thanksgiving Week-end and included a field of eight teams, a number of which were nationally ranked. The tournament proved to be a remarkable success over a three-day period, attracting approximately 12,000 fans to watch the highest caliber of basketball in the country. Operating on approximately an \$85,000 budget, we sustained a loss of approximately \$17,000.

Because of the strong support received from the community, the university, and the schools participating, we would like to continue the tournament as an annual affair. The prime attraction for major universities to participate is that these games do not count against their regular schedule.

In addition, the tournament has attracted the attention of Mr. Billy Packer and Mr. Al McGuire, two nationally recognized figures in TV and radio, with whom we are now negotiating to assist in conducting the tournament, primarily to attract nationwide TV and sponsorships.

Because of the previous year's loss, the need to make guarantees up to \$56,000, and our strong concern for financial accountability, we have felt it necessary to require that the community provide a minimum of \$25,000 in reserve prior to any commitment to hold the tournament in FY 80. Moreover, because of advance scheduling by major institutions, it is imperative for us to schedule the best teams at least two years in advance. Thus, the optimal solution would be to have a \$50,000 reserve which would cover FY 80 and FY 81. Then, as funds in excess of costs materialize, they would be funneled into this reserve, releasing the original funds.

We look forward to your recommendations on handling this needed reserve of \$25,000 for one year or \$50,000 for two years as soon as possible in order that we might follow through on our commitments for signing top teams.

Thank you very much for taking the time and effort to meet with us and assist us in insuring the continuance of the tournament.

This is to clarify our request for FY 79 supplemental funding. Projected deficits are as follows:

- . Personal Services (100) \$41,300  
Underbudgeted terminal leave due to unusually high terminal leave for two employees.
- . Travel (200) \$26,800  
Increase in per diem of \$5 per day for legislators not permanently residing in Juneau. Computation: 94 days (including round-trip travel) x 57 legislators x \$5 = \$26,790.
- . Contractual Services (300) \$87,500  
Annual Alaska statute revisions--Michie contract--actual costs over budgeted amount were in excess of \$25,000.

Unanticipated postal rate increase and a 60% rate increase in DHL pouching services - \$3,000.

Intra-state long distance telephone (FY 78 @\$37,500) with 87% rate increase--\$32,600- less inter-state telephone (FY 78 \$6,000) with 10% rate decrease - \$600 resulting in additional need of \$32,000.

Capitol renovation--creation of two new offices on first floor, partitions, walls, and carpeting as required - \$27,500.

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## HISTORY

The Studio Club was organized in 1969, by a group of interested people in the Anchorage community. They were judges, law enforcement officials, physicians, psychiatrist, and some from A.A. Its original concept was to provide a womans half-way house and the original location was on 14th avenue in the old Stoner Rooming House. It was incorporated in 1970 in the state of Alaska as a non-profit corporation. It functioned a short while as a womans half-way house but was soon revised to a co-educational facility. The first Director was Ruth Shugard. Mrs. Shugard stayed on as the Director of the program until the end of 1972, when she left the employ of the Studio Club. At that time, the Studio Club was moved from the 14th avenue location to the old Honor Farm at Point Warnsoff. Its total bed capacity was 7. In the beginning of 1973, Leonard Kugen was hired as the Director of the program. Under his direction, he returned the Studio Club to the city of Anchorage, to a location on 11th street and he increased the bed capacity to a total of 14.

In December of 1973, he was stricken with a near fatal illness and was taken to the hospital for surgery. The gentleman who was acting as his assistant was on vacation out of state. Henrietta Kugen was not employed and she was put on as a tempo-

other addictions.

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## PROGRAM

When the Studio Club program originally started, it was a half-way house only, a live-in facility for women who were coming out of A.P.I., or jails, or the street. They were trying to get sober, looking for work, and then to go out on their own. As stated before, they went educational and then moved from one facility to another. When Leonard Nugen came in as Director, they had no program per se, except that one counselor from the then Municipal program came in once a week to work with the clients. Leonard had had extensive experience working in the half-way house and treatment programs for alcoholism and went to his board and began to revamp the program. It has developed from a half-way house to a treatment program. The basic idea of the program is social re-integration with the community. The program consists of a total of from 18 to 23 meetings a week, in-house which must be attended by the clients. The clients must also attend 3 A.A. meetings a week outside of the Studio Club. Groups, of course, are held by staff namely Leonard and Henrietta. But groups are also help by agencies outside of the Studio Club, where staff come in and volunteer their time. The following are a list of people who come in and hold groups at the Studio Club:

rary director. Leonard was unable to work for three months and the Assistant Director did not return until the end of February. His employment was terminated by the board at that time, and when Leonard returned to work at the Studio Club, Henrietta stayed on and they have been Directors of the program ever since that time.

In 1976, the facility was moved to its present location, on 15th avenue and the capacity was increased to 40. The facility now has room for six women and 4 men.

We have a retired Doctor, Dr. O. Armstrong who is a resident of the Pioneer Home who comes in twice a week to check blood pressures and temperatures.

Dr. Louis Ayers comes in a minimum of once a week to make rounds and listen to people physical complaints.

We also utilize the service of RSVP for various retired people who wish to donate their time.

We also have a physician on call on a volunteer basis, whenever we need him if Dr. Ayers is not available.

All of these outside agencies and dedicated people work with the Studio Club on an open and helping basis. Working with the people towards their re-integration into a sober, productive society. We at the Studio Club are an integrated facility. In the fact that many times our clientele is over 50% Native, and of course as stated before, we are co-educational.

We do not believe that it is necessary for a Native to have his own program, for a Caucasian to have his own program, for a woman to have her own program, or for a man to have his own program, or for a Negro to have their own program. Our society does not divide into segments. We all must live together, and if we are going to re-integrate into our society, we must learn to do it together. Over the past years that Lee and I have been Directors of the program, we have learned that in our field of alcoholism we are all alike, regardless of our color or our sex.

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## FINANCIAL

Originally, way back in 1970, the Studio Club was funded with federal research money. After that it was picked up by the state of Alaska under the Office of Alcoholism and then thru the Municipality of Anchorage, and <sup>THOSE</sup> ~~these~~ monies also came to the Municipality from the office of Alcoholism. In 1976 the Municipality of Anchorage, getting all kinds of complaints about the drunks on fourth avenue and the ineffectiveness of the programs, withdrew all their monies from the program and stated that they would put them up for bid and they wanted a comprehensive alcoholism program. They came up with a beautiful concept on paper and they ask that everyone bid.

The Studio Club is a treatment facility. It is not a detoxification unit. It does not offer a complete comprehensive program, and our staff is not large enough nor is it geared to offer a complete comprehensive program.

We bid the program but our bid was passed aside because it was not a complete program. We appealed to the Anchorage Municipal Assembly because our program had received nothing but good things although we had not made our selves visible to the public. We had stayed in the background thinking that to help people was our goal and not to seek publicity. The Anchorage Assembly and indeed the health department agreed the Studio Club was a fine

program. It was developing into an even better program. Perhaps they had thrown the baby out with the bath water, but there was nothing they could do. They funded us thru October of 1976 at which time they withdrew our funds. We appealed to the Legislators and to the state and to the Office of Alcoholism. Again being told our program was fine, we were accountable, we had a good reputation, we produced results, but there just wasn't any monies for us. In 1977, Senator Sumner assisted us in receiving monies from the Social Service from the state of Alaska for Adult protective care. We operated under that contract until June 30 of 1978. The total amount of that contract was \$125,000.00. It was our understanding that we would be in the 1978-79 budget for the state of Alaska. But somehow or other we were overlooked and our funds were not forthcoming. The Anchorage Assembly, after finding out about our problem, allotted us \$40,000.00 and the Governor's contingency fund gave us \$30,000.00. These monies carried us to the middle of January. We are now operating on nothing, as we have explained before, we have employees that are training employees through CETA Title III, part with the Municipality of Anchorage and part-time employees through Title V, Older American through the state of Alaska. Were it not for these contracts, we would not be able to continue.

The Studio Club employs an outside accountant who takes care of all of our bookkeeping. We do not have our books or any of our accounting done in-house. We have always been accountable.

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## RESULTS

We have included some copies of our Newsletter. We put out a Newsletter. It used to be once a month but it is not anymore. It comes out about every three months. In this Newsletter it gives all the referrals, where they came from, age groups, and sex, etc. In the last Newsletter, you will note that we have the follow-up results for 1974 and 1975. I am including the results for 1975. These are just being completed by our follow-up CETA employees and have not even ~~really~~ <sup>really</sup> been put in. <sup>shape.</sup> They will be in the next Newsletter but they aren't out yet. The results for 1976 are as follows:

We do not say that we have not made mistakes, but we have always been willing to rectify them and they have never been of any major nature. We haven't misappropriated any funds and we are not likely to. We appreciate any and all suggestions, advises, and help that is offered to us. 6

We find that our average client is 26 a month, that have no third party payments. This leaves 14 beds that are not paid for in the facility and we hope to pick up with other payments. Our cost is estimated at \$22.00 per day. As we have stated before, more and more of the people are coming from the courts and the courts are paying nothing to us for these efforts or for the time they are in the facility. The Native Association will only pay for room and board and they don't consider a rehabilitation or treatment center as anything that they want to pay room and board in. The Veterans Administration is at the present time opening their own facility although we are now receiving a few referrals from them but very few. We receive very few referrals from the Salvation Army. Most of our referrals are from the courts and from self referrals now. Our cost has increased but we believe that we offer one of the lowest rates in the state. If not the lowest rate. We produce results for the monies we are given. We work hard. We work long hours, but we care about our people. As has been stated before, we believe that EVERYONE DESERVES A CHANCE. We do not work with the constant repeater, but the person who is a revolving door. Once in a while the court will sentence these people to jail and we have very little choice but to take them.

The breakdown on this will be further in the Newsletter, but this is to give you some idea. It also should be noted that our program has grown as follows:

1974 - 57 clients

1975 - 241

1976 - 361

1977 - 495

1978 - ~~610~~ 843

We believe our success ratio is outstanding. They're real people. They are not imaginary. They're sober. They're working. They're caring for themselves and the families. We have not had a lot of money to make our program work. It certainly doesn't mean we would refuse service. We've had a great deal of community cooperation. We've had a great deal of people who have been through this program returning to help other people. We have cooperated with the most successful treatment known to alcoholism and other addicts, Alcoholics Anonymous, and will continue to do so. We hope that you will look at us favorably. We are not a sophisticated program. We have grown in understanding. Our program has improved. We have much to learn in the way of paperwork and record keeping. We're not speaking of financial records, but clients records. We are of course willing to learn. Our greatest downfall has been the fact that we have to deal more with people than we have with our paperwork. We are trying to correct this. We find that we are extending our program to the benefit of the Older American Act

and the State Office of Aging in the fact that we have a Geriatrics Counselor and he is working with the senior Citizens in our program who are numerous, and with the Pioneer Home and various elderly housing in the Anchorage area. Our program is extending to follow-up with the courts and to follow-up now with our own clients on a required basis, where it was not a requirement before. We admit we have many faults. We admit we have much to learn. We also admit that we do help people. Our program has some answers. It has demonstrated that it can be done. Alcoholism and other addictions can be arrested and treated successfully and economically. Our cost is not high compared with the results that we produce, and we do produce the results. We are successful. We are patting ourselves on the back, but we need more than words. We need more than praise. We need money to continue and we ask that you look at us favorably and help us to continue to successfully treat people, to successfully help people because EVERYONE DESERVES A CHANCE, even the Studio Club. This FY '79 supplemental budget request for the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation is in the amount of \$150,000.00. These monies would be for budget component 02 -Services to Clients, object code -700 Grants. These funds are the funds the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation expends in providing services for eligible handicapped individuals in the State of Alaska. The explanations for this request follows.

In preparing the FY '79 budget almost a year and a half ago, the Division of Vocational Rehabilitation followed the budget instructions of the six (6) percent allowable increase for most areas, with the exception of medical-related costs. In that area, the agency did request a twenty (20) percent increase and was granted this. At that time, we projected that about thirty-eight (38) percent of our case service expenditures were medical-related expenditures, and now our records indicate, based on the first three months, that we will expend forty-four (44) percent of our case service funds to medical services. Therefore, this has increased our expenditures greater than we had anticipated.

The Division of Vocational Rehabilitation receives from the Social Security Administration Trust Fund program (Title II) a minimal amount of funds, \$150,000, of which \$89,400 goes to services to clients. The remaining balance is applied to the salary of the counselor handling these specialized funds. Additionally, the Division receives \$125,000 of SSI (Supplemental Security Income, Title XVI) funds which is very similar to those of Title II listed above. Funds from both programs can only be used for individuals who not only meet the eligibility criteria for Vocational Rehabilitation but also the additional criteria laid down by Social Security Administration rules and regulations. The Alaska Division of Vocational Rehabilitation receives a minimum allotment as mentioned above or maximum depending on how you look at it based on a funding formula derived through the Rehabilitation Act and Social Security Administration. This agency in preparing its budget is unable to include a six (6) percent inflation factor as the maximum federal funds allowed have already been reached. This situation is having a direct impact on our case service funds because when these specialized funds run out and we can no longer serve individuals who would normally be eligible not only for Vocational Rehabilitation but for the utilization of specialized trust funds, we continue to serve those individuals under our regular section 110 case service funds. In other words, we are

forced to absorb the increase under the General Program, further depleting those funds. This current fiscal year we have already encumbered the entire \$89,400 of Title II funds in the first three (3) months of operation and it appears right now that we will be encumbering in the next month the remaining balance of the Title XVI funds. When these funds are gone these individuals are still being served by our regular section to services to client's funds. At the end of FY '78 there were 118 clients who were eligible for Social Security benefits under the Trust Fund program, but due to lack of these funds these individual clients were served from Section 110, General Program funds. This situation has impacted on our "Service to Client" funds very heavily.

Training is a large expenditure category in Vocational Rehabilitation as that is one of our major functions, and we have just been projecting increases of six (6) percent inflationary factors on this; we are now finding out that these expenditures have been rising much faster than has been indicated. Our most recent information for FY '79 indicates that our training costs are running thirty-two (32) percent ahead of last year. Costs for Vocational Rehabilitation training, for example, are those fees which we pay to vocational schools, private schools such as business colleges, beauty schools, barber colleges, etc. Additionally, we help finance some individuals to college as well as on-the-job training. On-the-job training is where we will arrange for a training situation and pay the trainer a fee that helps offset his time that it takes to train a handicapped individual in a specific job duty. Again, salaries, training fees have increased in the private sector at a much greater rate than the allowable inflationary factor.

The Rehabilitation Act of 1973 as amended in 1974, with program instructions coming out since its adaptation, specifies that Vocational Rehabilitation agencies will provide not only preliminary diagnostic services, but also comprehensive diagnostic services. Historically, Vocational Rehabilitation agencies have always provided preliminary diagnostic services to determine eligibility. Now, with the requirement of comprehensive diagnostic services which could include psychiatric, psychological, orthopedic, or any other speciality examination that may be required to determine eligibility and/or the rehab potential of an individual, our expenditures have increased drastically. The most recent information available for this first part of FY '79 indicates that our diagnostic services will increase approximately seventy-five (75) percent of those over the FY '77 planning year. In FY '78, we showed some increase, but not to the extent that is now surfacing. We are aware that, even though the Rehabilitation Act mentioned above was instigated back in 1975, it does take time for policies and regulations to be issued. The effect of this requirement of comprehensive diagnostic services is just now coming to light in our agency.

We have been addressing primarily three major areas of increased costs that were not anticipated on the base year of preparation of this budget. It should be brought to light at this time that we provide many other services to handicapped individuals. In fact, the services we provide

Administrative travel FY 80 includes funding for one trip to Anchorage from Juneau at two days for examination and is estimated to remain the same for subsequent years. Inflation is computed at 6% per year.

Personnel services are estimated to take approximately 10% of a Licensing Examiners time. There are other bills, i.e. HB4, which are estimated, if passed, to also require 10% of a licensing examiner's time. Necessary implementation of Sunset recommendations will make it difficult to absorb 10 or 20% of personnel time into current staffing allocations.
