ON
CS FOR HOUSE BILL NO. 125

"An Act relating to grants for day care centers and multipurpose youth centers; and providing for an effective date."

This bill would provide grants administered by the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for constructing, rennovating, equipping and operating day care centers and mulitipurpose youth centers. The Department supports the expansion of multipurpose youth centers and child day care centers into communities where no facilities exist.

For the committees information there are 86 child day care centers in the state with a capacity of 3,823. These centers are limited in location to 26 Alaskan communities. The child care revolving loan fund administered by the Department of Commerce and Economic Development of \$30,000 per facility is often not sufficient to establish a new facility in a community and in addition, the income for a new facility may not be sufficient to allow the facility to make the loan payments. The number of multipurpose youth centers in the state is unknown.

The Division of Social Services within the Department administers a youth services program. The Department contracts with local non-profit agencies to provide preventative youth services in their community. Preventive youth services consist of local programs to provide:

Prevention Services - Services which address a problem before it becomes necessary to have direct intervention by the state such as

1. Parenting skills training
2. Community education to heighten the awareness of youth problems and alternative solutions to those problems.

Early Intervention - Crisis resolution and a range of supportive family and youth services such as


1. Individual/group/family counseling
2. Supportive services which focus on strengthening youth roles in the family and community

The Division of Social Services contracted with eight local agencies to provide youth services programs at a cost of \$127,200 in FY 1980. Four other local agencies received funding from the legislature and were administered through the Division's youth services program.

The Department does not view the assignment of responsibility for administering the grants to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs as a conflict with the Department's youth services program.

The Department supports the bill.

RECOMMENDATIONS

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR STATE FUNDED YOUTH SERVICES

1. COMMUNITY PARTICIPATION SHOULD BE ENSURED IN PLANNING YOUTH SERVICES

If youth services are to survive in a community and ultimately receive major portions of their support from the community, they must provide meaningful participation for community members. They should not allow single segments of the population to dominate their planning. Youth themselves must be actively sought out and brought into planning; they require special training and assistance to do so, and should not be expected to participate without support.

2. YOUTH SERVICE PROGRAMS SHOULD BE EVALUATED PERIODICALLY BY THE POPULATION THEY SEEK TO SERVE.

Effective services will be valued by those who receive them. Youth can give valuable feedback to program staff on the effectiveness of their work. Too often, human service programs discount the opinions of their clients or participants, seeking feedback from within their own organization alone or only from other professionals.

3. STATE FUNDING OF YOUTH SERVICES SHOULD BE FLEXIBLE ENOUGH TO PROVIDE FOR DIFFERING NEEDS AND PLANS OF DIFFERENT COMMUNITIES.

State guidelines should not be so inflexible as to preclude communities from applying for funds for a program appropriate to their needs. Many programs currently apply for funds for programming which is not what they want to do but the funds are the only available source of money to do anything.

4. LOCAL SERVICE PROVIDERS SHOULD PROVIDE ONGOING EVALUATION OF THEIR OWN PERFORMANCE TO THEIR COMMUNITY AND TO THE FUNDING SOURCE, AND SHOULD BE INVITED TO PROVIDE EVALUATION OF THE FUNDING SOURCE'S PERFORMANCE IN ASSISTING THEM.

If the community program and the funding source are to be partners in preventing problems among the community's youth, they must evaluate one another's performance in order to plan effectively for the future. The funding source can make or break a program. If the funding source is consistently six or eight weeks late in payment on the contract, a program will be in a constant state of crisis, unable to plan because they cannot be assured of being able to commit funds.

5. FUNDING SOURCE PAYMENTS TO COMMUNITY PROGRAMS SHOULD BE TIMELY.

Non-profit programs should not have to borrow money from banks to keep their doors open when the state computer eats contract payments. One youth program lost most of its grant in 1978 because the funding source sent the money too late for the program to spend the money in compliance with its contract clauses and timetables. They received the money and had to send it back or violate their contract.

6. ADEQUATE PERSONNEL SHOULD BE PROVIDED IN STATE DIVISIONS TO MONITOR AND ASSIST CONTRACT PROGRAMS.

In 1979, the Division of Social Services handled 8 appropriations under the Youth Services Line Item and around 20 special appropriation contracts. They were provided no increase in staff positions to handle this additional work. Division personnel had no funding to visit and monitor funded programs.

RECOMMENDATIONS FOR ASSISTANCE TO PREVENTION PROGRAMS

1. PREVENTION SHOULD BE A PRIMARY GOAL OF STATE SOCIAL SERVICES PLANNING.

Prevention services are less expensive and more humane than services to only those families have demonstrated severe problems. Incarceration and residential treatment are expensive; one day in McLaughlin cost \$94 in 1978. The entire budget of most youth programs is less than the cost of a few community youth in placement.

2. THE STATE SHOULD PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TO COMMUNITIES IN DEVELOPING PREVENTION SERVICES.

Few communities have the resources to fight the obstacles to development of alternative services for their young people. Every attempt to provide skills, training and funding should be made by the state to assist communities which wish to develop local prevention services.

3. STATE FUNDING OF COMMUNITY ALTERNATIVE SERVICES FOR YOUTH SHOULD BE SUBSTANTIALLY INCREASED.

Only about 10% of Alaska communities have diversion, recreation or alternative programs for youth. Most communities have only a school, and schools are already beginning to resist the number of responsibilities for youth that the state, communities and the public attempt to lay at their door. Most communities do not have realistic access to a state social worker. Most prevention programs are in larger population centers. Rural youth suffer from a complete lack of recreation opportunities or other services.

4. STATE FUNDING PROCEDURES SHOULD BE CLARIFIED, STREAMLINED, AND MORE WIDELY ADVERTISED.

Many communities do not know how to access the limited amount of prevention dollars available to them. Contract advertising and processing procedures tend to exclude rather than include more applicants. A directory which lists all contract and grant sources relating to youth available from the state, with purposes, guidelines, timetables, and review procedures would make the process of funding application more accessible to more people. Most communities never even know where or when the money exists.

5. FUNDING CYCLES SHOULD LAST LONGER THAN 1 YEAR, WITH PROVISION FOR ANNUAL REVIEW AND ACCOUNTABILITY.

The assumption that one year is all that a program requires in order to establish adequate funding for its activities is not at all borne out by the experience of community programs across the state.

6. STATE DIVISIONS SHOULD COORDINATE THEIR SUPPORT OF PROGRAMS.

It is unclear to many communities which division in the state government has responsibility for a particular kind of service. Some are spread around several departments. Some kinds of services are not supported by any division. For example, a community attempting to find funds for a teen center might

seek assistance from three different divisions, none of which has clear responsibility to assist them.

7. CONTRACTING PROCEDURES SHOULD BE STANDARDIZED AMONG DIVISIONS.

Formats for contract and grant application vary from division to division and even from year to year within one division. Applicants frequently find these differences confusing and obscure, leading to omissions in applications which can disqualify the application.

8. RECREATION SHOULD BE IDENTIFIED AS A PREVENTION PRIORITY OF STATE SOCIAL SERVICES.

Ample evidence exists that recreation can be a prevention strategy with young people. Alaska communities have made it clear that they wish to provide recreation to their youth, but lack funding. Whichever division takes responsibility for recreation alternatives, it should cease to be a stepchild of state plans, and be stated as a priority.

9. FUNDING TO PREVENTION PROGRAMS SHOULD BE OF LONG TERM STATE PLANS FOR SERVICES.

Programs should be informed as to how the contractual services they provide fit into overall state plans. Changes in those plans should be communicated to the programs in the communities. Applicants for state funding contracts should know if monies are for the purpose of start-up assistance to programs, for on-going support, for local match of federal dollars, or other purposes. They should be informed as to how long the state is going to assist them. Most programs do not know anything about the state's plans for the funding for which they are applying, other than what they read in the requests for proposals.

10. STATE ASSISTANCE TO COMMUNITY-BASED PREVENTION PROGRAMS SHOULD EMPHASIZE PROGRAMMING, NOT CAPITOL IMPROVEMENTS.

The main resource not available to community programs is operating cash. Most communities have local physical resources in buildings that can be turned into program space. They lack continuing funding to maintain and staff such facilities. Programs surveyed reported that their biggest need was for funds for staff salaries.

"An Act relating to grants for day care centers and multipurpose youth centers; and providing for an effective date."

This bill would provide grants administered by the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for constructing, renovating, equipping and operating day care centers and multipurpose youth centers. The Department supports the expansion of multipurpose youth centers and child day care centers into communities where no facilities exist.

For the committee's information there are 86 child day care centers in the state with a capacity of 3,823. These centers are limited in location to 26 Alaskan communities. The child care revolving loan fund administered by the Department of Commerce and Economic Development of \$30,000 per facility is often not sufficient to establish a new facility in a community and in addition, the income for a new facility may not be sufficient to allow the facility to make the loan payments. The number of multipurpose youth centers in the state is unknown.

The Division of Social Services within the Department administers a youth services program. The Department contracts with local non-profit agencies to provide preventative youth services in their community. Preventive youth services consist of local programs to provide:

Prevention Services - Services which address a problem before it becomes necessary to have direct intervention by the state such as

1. Parenting skills training
2. Community education to heighten the awareness of youth problems and alternative solutions to those problems.

Early Intervention - Crisis resolution and a range of supportive family and youth services such as

1. Individual/group/family counseling
2. Supportive services which focus on strengthening youth roles in the family and community

The Division of Social Services contracted with eight local agencies to provide youth services programs at a cost of \$127,200 in FY 1980. Four other local agencies received funding from the legislature and were administered through the Division's youth services program.

The Department does not view the assignment of responsibility for administering the grants to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs as a conflict with the Department's youth services program, however, the Department requests the removal of the term "protective services" from the definition of multipurpose youth centers to avoid confusion on the part of service providers. Protective services must be administered by the Department under AS 47.10.

The Department supports the bill with the recommended change.
