SUBJECT: Bristol Bay Regional Development Council Meeting

On November 14, 1978, within a couple of weeks, there will be a Bristol Bay Regional Development Council meeting to be held in the village of Togiak. This meeting in Togiak was requested by Moses Kritz, Council member from Togiak, and was endorsed by the Council members at their last meeting.

I have already informed the Mayor of Togiak, Mr. David Nanalook, of the upcoming meeting, and he was highly pleased that the Council will visit his city.

At the meeting in Togiak, we hope to discuss the work program I am responsible for, and perhaps the Council shall recommend other projects for me to work on this coming year.

It will be the first time the Council has ever met in Togiak to conduct business, and I'm sure the Council will be interested in inspecting the new village affairs office building recently constructed within the village. The building is soon to be complete, and cost \$254,000.

I'm also sure that the Council members would like to visit the community of Togiak, and discuss some of the problems the community is experiencing.

On the next day, November 15, 1978, the Council Members will be meeting in Dillingham with the Executive Committee members of the Bristol Bay Native Association. At this meeting, we hope to have a representative from the Bristol Bay Borough and the City of Dillingham to discuss the economics of fisheries in Bristol Bay. It will be a short informal discussion which hopefully will provide for some recommendations to the growing herring fishery located at the Togiak/Kulukak Bay area. We also hope to discuss potential projects which would accommodate the expected high salmon returns of 1980.

I might add that Mr. Val Angasan, EDA Planner with the Bristol Bay Native Association will also be holding an OEDP Committee meeting on November 15, 1978. The OEDP Committee is primarily made up of the Executive Committee of the Bristol Bay Native Association, yet I'm sure they are extremely concerned about the economy of Bristol Bay.

We will also be inviting Nels Anderson to sit in at the November 15, 1978 meeting. He has been highly concerned about the 1980 salmon fishery in Bristol Bay, and I'm sure he will be interested in what all the participating people have to say about fisheries in Bristol Bay.

Dear Governor Hammond:

As you well know, the salmon fishery is practically the only source of income for Bristol Bay residents. We are highly dependent on the effective and accurate management of this resource for our livelihood. For this reason our local management offices must have adequate funding.

We are requesting that \$110,000 be put into capital budget for sonar equipment for the Nushagak fishery. This is not the first request that has been budgeted but other requests have been cut. Sonar equipment is something we desperately need in order to have an idea of the status of our fishery.

Herring is a growing fishery in the Bay and sure needs to be managed adequately. During the past season, it was managed by our salmon managers without any additional funds. This can not continue as it will result in poor management for both the salmon and herring.

It is imperative that the administration of the State of Alaska secure adequate funding for accurate and effective management of these two natural resources.

SUBJECT: FISHERIES BIOLOGIST FOR BRISTOL BAY

In our continuing efforts to bring research and management closer to the areas served, it is imperative that the field workers on projects be stationed in the area where research is being conducted. The Arctic Char Predation project is an example of having personnel stationed in the area served.

The predation suppression program must be managed from Bristol Bay since the project needs year round attention. Moving personnel out of the area does not serve any useful purpose other than impede research at considerable non-productive cost.

Predation suppression, utilizing non-lethal methods, is a program that other areas could adopt as a model for saving salmon smolt as they migrate from their spawning streams.

The need to station Bristol Bay research personnel in Anchorage doesn't make sense. Data for computer analysis can be transmitted telephonically. Furthermore, the Bristol Bay area manager is currently understaffed.

There is a critical need to address the predation suppression program as well as the proposed Togiak herring fishery.

The Togiak herring commercial fishery is not researched to determine safe harvest quotas. Additional biological information must be acquired before major damage is done to the herring stock in Bristol Bay.

I believe that additional staff is needed and there is sufficient work for staff research in Bristol Bay.

- WHEREAS, The herring fishery located at the Togiak/Kulukak Bay area of Bristol Bay has grown substantially over the last two years, and
- WHEREAS, The herring fishery is expected to receive substantial growth in the future, and
- WHEREAS, Such a growth affects the amount of harvests local gillnet herring fishermen can obtain, since the purse seining operations have grown substantially over the last two years, and
- WHEREAS, A purse seine vessel can harvest up to 50 tons of herring, as compared to a gillnet vessel which can only harvest up to 8 tons per set, and
- WHEREAS, The gillnet herring fishermen cannot compete with the purse seine herring fishermen in the fishery, and
- WHEREAS, The majority of the commercial fishermen participating in the fishery consists of gillnet herring fishermen, and
- WHEREAS, The herring fishery of the area is beginning to attract a greater number of local fishermen who will participate as gillnet herring fishermen since the investment can run as high as \$25,000.00 to convert their salmon gillnet vessels into purse seine operations, and
- WHEREAS, The establishment of a quota for gillnet caught herring in the fishery will attract marketing capabilities for gillnetters since many of the gillnetters lacked a market in the fishery of the last two years since processors are more receptive to purchase purse seine caught herring, which produce a more valuable herring catch, as well as, a greater volume of herring, and
- WHEREAS, Most of the revenue created in the fishery is being received by fishermen outside of the region, and it should be the position of the Board of Fish to provide some benefit to the local economy, and
- NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Fish provides for a quota for gillnet caught herring in the 1979 herring season of the Togiak/Kulukak Bay area, and that such a quota of 25% of the total harvests be reserved for gillnet fishermen.

species that could be brought into the area, such as reindeer, buffalo, cattle, etc.

#### HERRING FISHERY

During mid-May, I made a trip to Kulukak Bay to examine the herring fishery activity taking place in the area. On this trip I discovered that most local gillnetters were not participating to their potential in the fishery due to the lack of marketing outlets.

Earlier during my work, I had attempted to secure an idea of the marketing picture of the area, and notified potential processors of a number of local fishermen needing a market. Most processors involved with the fishery have secured their own fishermen from their respective areas, and therefore needed no other fishermen. Most processors were more interested in obtaining seine caught herring, as opposed to gillnet caught herring. With this in mind, there were a number of local fishermen geared up with seining operations, although the number was very few.

With the possible continuation of BBRDC, I have plans to work actively with the Community Enterprises Development Corporation (CEDC), to try and establish a marketing system for the local fishermen.

It might be interesting to note that the Alaska Board of Fisheries in their spring meeting decided to exclude the foreign vessels from taking herring in the area. I believe that the foreign vessels will be highly interested in providing for a market for local fishermen. A joint venture would have to be established between the foreign processors and the local fishermen, and approved by the Board of Fisheries.

I feel that a joint venture between the foreign processors and gillnet fishermen should be established, since the present purse seining operation in the area is pretty much wrapped up. A market is already available for the purse seiners with the American processors capitalizing on it. Future discussion on this aspect should be considered.

#### BOTTOM FISHERIES

Very little has been done with this project, since I've spent a lot of time with the formation of the aquaculture corporation, and putting its first meeting together. If and when the Council is funded, I will actively pursue this area more intensively.

I believe that the Bristol Bay area can become greatly involved with this type of fisheries by participating in it, as well as, providing on-shore facilities, especially with the herring fishery.

The village corporation of South Naknek, merged with other village corporations, is actively pursuing a bottom fisheries vessel which would do some fishing in the Bering Sea. Perhaps a message to the other village corporations in Bristol Bay may arouse other village corporations to do the same. I will attempt to convey this message. I understand that the vessel owned and operated by Calista, the kuskokwim based regional corpor-





PROPOSAL FOR NUSHAGAK RIVER COUNTERS  
Alaska Department of Fish and Game

INTRODUCTION

Sockeye salmon passing through the Nushagak Fishing district enter several trunk spawning streams where they are enumerated by Alaska Department of Fish and Game biologists through aerial surveys and/or counting towers. The accurate and prompt enumeration of salmon escaping the commercial fisheries is essential for efficient management of the various stocks contributing to the Nushagak district salmon runs. At present the Department operates visual counting stations in all of the major salmon producing river systems in the Nushagak district except in the main Nushagak river. Accurate enumeration of the escapement into the main Nushagak River has posed a special problem in past years with muddy water frequently interfering with visual counting operations. In some years, poor counting conditions have prevented biologists from obtaining any reasonable estimate of escapement at the tower sites. Due to the problems encountered, the Department closed the main Nushagak River counting tower camp in 1977 and initiated a post season aerial survey project to assess the escapement. Obviously this escapement information does not provide the prompt in-season data that is required to effectively manage the stocks returning to that system.

Sockeye salmon returning to the Nuyakuk River, a tributary of the main Nushagak River, are counted visually at the tower site down stream of the outlet of the Tikchik lakes where water clarity is acceptable. Unfortunately due to the length of the migration route, up the main Nushagak River and Nuyakuk Rivers the sockeye salmon usually take up to 14 days to move from the fishing district up to the counting tower. This delay in escapement enumeration presents a problem in effective management of the stocks.

This situation could be greatly improved if early enumeration of all salmon entering the lower portion of the main Nushagak River could be accomplished. As stated earlier, visual counting techniques are not suitable.

Side scanning sonar now presents another option to visual enumeration of migrating salmon. The equipment recently developed by the Bendix Corporation while under contract to the Department of Fish and Game consists of a single acoustic transducer positioned in the river in a manner to allow a narrow sonar beam to scan across the channel. The acoustic echoes received by the transducer are processed by a shore based electronic control unit with salmon counts registered and printed at regular intervals. Side scanning sonar units are now in use in the Cook Inlet and Arctic-Yukon-Kuskokwim Rivers with good success where water conditions prevent visual counting.

## OBJECTIVES

This proposal requests two side scanning sonar units and one year project operational costs to initiate a sonar escapement enumeration project on the lower portion of the main Nushagak River. The primary objective of this project would be to obtain an accurate in-season estimate of the daily passage of salmon migrating up the main Nushagak River. Second, our objectives would be to obtain samples from the migrating salmon to access the age class composition and stock identity through scale pattern analysis techniques.

## PROJECT NARRATIVE

The Nushagak River sonar project will be the responsibility of the Bristol Bay research project leader, Division of Commercial Fisheries. One temporary fishery biologist I will act as crew leader over three temporary fishery technicians. Field supervision of the project will be shared by the research project leader and his assistant.

The funding requested in this proposal will allow the field operations to begin June 10 and continue through to late August. This time schedule should allow sufficient time for site location, camp set up and gear installation prior to any significant passage of migrating salmon. The August termination date should similarly provide enough time to enumerate the Nushagak River pink salmon stocks which follow the king and sockeye salmon runs.

Beach seining will be conducted concurrently with the sonar enumeration to provide scale samples for species composition, age class composition and stock separation. Seasonal total escapement data obtained from the sonar project will be compared to aerial survey escapement estimates flown after the season and visual counts recorded at the Nuyakuk River tower station. Depending on the site selected for the sonar enumeration, it may be possible on some occasions to directly compare sonar counts to visual counts when water conditions are suitable.

In addition to in-season applications, escapement data obtained from the project will be incorporated into the Bristol Bay catch and escapement data files and used with other data to evaluate optimum escapement levels for the salmon stock involved and to forecast future salmon runs.





PROPOSAL FOR NUSHAGAK RIVER COUNTERS  
Alaska Department of Fish and Game

INTRODUCTION

Sockeye salmon passing through the Nushagak Fishing district enter several trunk spawning streams where they are enumerated by Alaska Department of Fish and Game biologists through aerial surveys and/or counting towers. The accurate and prompt enumeration of salmon escaping the commercial fisheries is essential for efficient management of the various stocks contributing to the Nushagak district salmon runs. At present the Department operates visual counting stations in all of the major salmon producing river systems in the Nushagak district except in the main Nushagak river. Accurate enumeration of the escapement into the main Nushagak River has posed a special problem in past years with muddy water frequently interfering with visual counting operations. In some years, poor counting conditions have prevented biologists from obtaining any reasonable estimate of escapement at the tower sites. Due to the problems encountered, the Department closed the main Nushagak River counting tower camp in 1977 and initiated a post season aerial survey project to assess the escapement. Obviously this escapement information does not provide the prompt in-season data that is required to effectively manage the stocks returning to that system.

Sockeye salmon returning to the Nuyakuk River, a tributary of the main Nushagak River, are counted visually at the tower site down stream of the outlet of the Tikchik lakes where water clarity is acceptable. Unfortunately due to the length of the migration route, up the main Nushagak River and Nuyakuk Rivers the sockeye salmon usually take up to 14 days to move from the fishing district up to the counting tower. This delay in escapement enumeration presents a problem in effective management of the stocks.

This situation could be greatly improved if early enumeration of all salmon entering the lower portion of the main Nushagak River could be accomplished. As stated earlier, visual counting techniques are not suitable.

Side scanning sonar now presents another option to visual enumeration of migrating salmon. The equipment recently developed by the Bendix Corporation while under contract to the Department of Fish and Game consists of a single acoustic transducer positioned in the river in a manner to allow a narrow sonar beam to scan across the channel. The acoustic echoes received by the transducer are processed by a shore based electronic control unit with salmon counts registered and printed at regular intervals. Side scanning sonar units are now in use in the Cook Inlet and Arctic-Yukon-Kuskokwim Rivers with good success where water conditions prevent visual counting.

## OBJECTIVES

This proposal requests two side scanning sonar units and one year project operational costs to initiate a sonar escapement enumeration project on the lower portion of the main Nushagak River. The primary objective of this project would be to obtain an accurate in-season estimate of the daily passage of salmon migrating up the main Nushagak River. Second, our objectives would be to obtain samples from the migrating salmon to access the age class composition and stock identity through scale pattern analysis techniques.

## PROJECT NARRATIVE

The Nushagak River sonar project will be the responsibility of the Bristol Bay research project leader, Division of Commercial Fisheries. One temporary fishery biologist I will act as crew leader over three temporary fishery technicians. Field supervision of the project will be shared by the research project leader and his assistant.

The funding requested in this proposal will allow the field operations to begin June 10 and continue through to late August. This time schedule should allow sufficient time for site location, camp set up and gear installation prior to any significant passage of migrating salmon. The August termination date should similarly provide enough time to enumerate the Nushagak River pink salmon stocks which follow the king and sockeye salmon runs.

Beach seining will be conducted concurrently with the sonar enumeration to provide scale samples for species composition, age class composition and stock separation. Seasonal total escapement data obtained from the sonar project will be compared to aerial survey escapement estimates flown after the season and visual counts recorded at the Nuyakuk River tower station. Depending on the site selected for the sonar enumeration, it may be possible on some occasions to directly compare sonar counts to visual counts when water conditions are suitable.

In addition to in-season applications, escapement data obtained from the project will be incorporated into the Bristol Bay catch and escapement data files and used with other data to evaluate optimum escapement levels for the salmon stock involved and to forecast future salmon runs.

Dear Governor Hammond:

As you well know, the salmon fishery is practically the only source of income for Bristol Bay residents. We are highly dependent on the effective and accurate management of this resource for our livelihood. For this reason our local management offices must have adequate funding.

We are requesting that \$110,000 be put into capital budget for sonar equipment for the Nushagak fishery. This is not the first request that has been budgeted but other requests have been cut. Sonar equipment is something we desperately need in order to have an idea of the status of our fishery.

Herring is a growing fishery in the Bay and sure needs to be managed adequately. During the past season, it was managed by our salmon managers without any additional funds. This can not continue as it will result in poor management for both the salmon and herring.

It is imperative that the administration of the State of Alaska secure adequate funding for accurate and effective management of these two natural resources.
