SUBJECT: Discussion with Chancellor Harrison Relating  
to HB 365

I reviewed with Chancellor Harrison the impact on potential summer courses if this bill was delayed or diverted into the capital budget process. He indicated that UAA did not plan an extensive summer program, especially in these science programs, due to budgetary limitations - staffing, not equipment. He would review the summer schedule with the Dean and call me.

We also discussed the offer from Dr. Olds of Alaska Pacific University for use of the APU lab facilities. Harrison indicated that Dr. Olds had suggested a student exchange where APU could use the gym and swimming pool facilities and UAA students would use the labs and the tennis courts. Chancellor Harrison's response was to decline the arrangement. He indicated to me that it conflicted with his movement for "institutional identity." While he was in the process of separating facility usage with ACC, he was not going to instigate usage with another unit outside the system.



Dear Senator Sackett:

Two bills are presently moving through the House that have a major impact on the Anchorage campus of UofA. HB 365 combines the library budgets from all segments of the UofA System into one bill. The funding of libraries on the various campuses has been a source of considerable controversy in the past. The Anchorage campus has a seriously underdeveloped library to serve the 4,500 full-time equivalent students who attend classes here. We on the Anchorage campus have, in the past, lobbied for support for our library equal to that provided for the library on the Fairbanks campus. We see HB 365 as a significant improvement over previous methods of library funding. Here, for the first time, the funding for the UofA libraries around the state is given on the same page of the one document. It is our hope that this bill will introduce a more regionally equitable procedure for funding libraries. HB 365, as presently drafted, gives more book and periodical funding to the Fairbanks campus than to the Anchorage campus, but it also gives Anchorage more library equipment and film funding so that the libraries of the two major campuses have rough overall parity in funding. I believe that it is a fair and reasonable bill.

HB 233 provides science laboratory equipment for the Anchorage campus. Presently our students are unable to engage in many standard laboratory experiences because of the shortages. It is my opinion that the two greatest needs on the Anchorage campus as perceived by both faculty and students are books for the library and equipment for the science labs. Both of these areas require improvement for us to be able to serve well those students who are presently enrolled. I urge your support for both of these measures.

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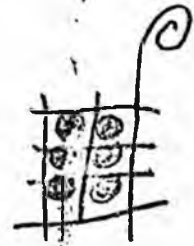

The four and one-half percent was included in the FY 79 budget, but the effect of compounding was not. This FY supplemental includes the four percent increase effective July 1, 1978, plus the compounding effect of that increase on the four and one-half percent increase effective January 1, 1979.

This contract has been negotiated in good faith, and I urge you to enact this measure promptly.

Local 71 signed the agreement April 1977, for years 1977, 78 & 79, we have not had any reopeners, as other units have. We received




