RE: Community Schools

A number of bills were introduced this year relating to the Community Schools Program, each with a different approach toward extension of the program.

After three days of committee hearings and numerous work sessions, the HESS Committee recognized that the different approaches to the issue could not readily be resolved, even though all involved -- the Administration, the HESS Committee, and Community Schools' representatives - generally agreed the program should be continued.

As an interim solution, that is, in order to sustain the program until it can be thoroughly examined, the following suggestions were adopted and are incorporated in this Letter of Intent:

1. The Community Schools Program should be continued as it presently operates through the end of FY '80;
2. No program or individual school should receive less funding in FY '80 than it received in FY '79;
3. The Committee emphasizes that state funding should be utilized within the community and not for extraneous and unnecessary travel;
4. The Committee, at the suggestion of Rep. Duncan, respectfully requests the Budget and Audit Committee to ask for a performance audit on the Community Schools' Program to ascertain whether the program is following the guidelines set forth in law;
5. The Committee will address the Community Schools Program early in the Second Session of the Eleventh Legislature utilizing the results of the audit and interim research to determine the best method under which the program should continue.

The Committee reaffirms its support of the Community Schools' Program but recognizes that changes may be necessary.

* Section 1. AS 14.36.030 is amended to read:

Sec. 14.36.030. GRANTS. A district operating an approved community school program may receive a first-year grant up to one-half of one per cent of its public school foundation support, a second-year grant of up to one per cent of that support, a third-year grant of up to one and one-half per cent of that support, and a [FOURTH-YEAR] grant for the fourth and subsequent years of up to two per cent of that support. The support provided shall be in the proportion that the number of schools in each district that are operated as community schools is to the total number of schools in the district.

Russ -- the State Affairs Committee passed out HB 396 with several changes. First of all we made the appropriation not for a two year period but for a single year, in recognition of the fact that most of these projects will not be under construction in a single year anyway. There are however compelling reasons why several of the items in the former second year category should be handled immediately -- most specifically the riprap construction at English Bay airport where the ocean is eroding away the current landing strip. Additionally you will notice that three new items appear in the legislation: the Nome Beltz road; an appropriation for survey of a secondary road route in Ketchikan Gateway Borough; and funds for a comprehensive transportation plan for the Kenai Peninsula Borough. Backup material from representatives Fuller, Gardiner, and Malone, respectively, is attached. In regards to the Kenai Peninsula transportation plan it should be especially noted that federal monies are anticipated in the amount of \$125,000 in addition to the \$155,000 authorized from the state general fund. If you have any further questions let me know or contact any of these three affected legislators.

NOME-BELTZ ROAD

I.

The Teller Road services the Nome-Beltz Junior-Senior High School. It runs from Nome to Beltz School a distance of _____ miles.

This stretch of road has been a constant source of problems and concern to the Nome School District for some years. The width of the road has never seemed adequate for the heavy trucks and school buses that travel it. It is the most traveled road in this part of Alaska.

In the Fall of 1977, a committee of some 15 members from the community did a study of school district facilities and needs for the future. Out of that work came a recommendation that the Nome-Beltz facility be increasingly utilized with more faculty and students assigned to that location. This brought under consideration the condition of the road from town to the Nome-Beltz facility. It was recommended by that group that efforts be commenced to bring state attention to the road and to accomplish the necessary re-building and repair.

Subsequent to the citizen committee's recommendations, the Nome School Board, on January 10, 1978, passed the following motion, "That the Board formally request the Dept. of Transportation to widen the Teller Road from Nome to Nome Beltz High School to accomodate potential growth in that area." A few weeks later, the Northwest Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors passed a resolution requesting that attention be given to the road. Other efforts have been made by various groups and individuals from time to time. Enough attention has been given to this problem by the community that it would be recognized by the Dept. of Transportation and others at the State level that the local community has placed a high priority on this project.

The most recent development which has affected School District programs and the transportation of students to the facility is the reduction of the legal speed limit. The reduced speed limit of 30 miles per hour has caused severe complications throughout the District in regards to the student transportation program. A great many problems have developed with the scheduling and extensive efforts have been made to reduce the conflicts in the transportation program. At this point, students are having to leave their homes earlier to catch the bus; and still it seems buses continue to arrive at the school late.

The greatest concern of all the people in the District is the safety of their children. Traveling on this hazardous road places the most precious resource in danger, the lives of our children.

Rep. Freeman and I have requested that \$500,000 be added to the Legislative Budget for FY 80 for survey of a bypass highway route in Ketchikan Gateway Borough. The survey would be performed for a right-of-way corridor approximately 18.5 miles long, running through the forested bench lands east of the existing Tongass Highway route.

The "center-line" study will designate a right-of-way corridor, enabling borough planners and developers to plan and build subdivisions now and in the future, in such a way that when a long-proposed secondary highway route is funded and built, those developments already in place will meet with design and engineering requirements of the road right-of-way and not conflict with road routing. The centerline study will consist of route survey and engineering to determine the most appropriate right-of-way, based on geology, engineering, cost and environmental safeguards, under established state and federal requirements.

The MAP model can be of assistance in the formulation of permanent fund policy in this regard because it can be used to project "futures" under varying assumptions of general fund policy given a "neutral" permanent fund. The state model can be used for this purpose.

A related issue is what policy should be established with regard to disposition of interest from the permanent fund. It is important not only what uses should be made of permanent fund interest but to a certain extent, what should be the target interest rate considering the uses of the interest. That is, if the interest is not put to good use, there should be relatively little concern with a high interest rate.

The basic issue, however, is whether the interest should be returned to the general fund without strings, should remain in the permanent fund for some period, or should be distributed to Alaska individuals who, in a sense, become the owners of the permanent fund.

The implications of each alternative on the growth of the economy and its fiscal condition will be considerably different. Reinvestment in the fund would have minimum impact in the short run. Transfer to the general fund would result in increased expenditures on state and local government which would have a stimulating effect on the economy with the impetus on increase in public sector activity. Dear Mr. Speaker:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the establishment of a state climate program and a state climate center. This bill is consistent with the provisions of the National Climate Program Act, Public Law 95-367, under which the state may be eligible to receive up to a 50 percent grant to cover the costs of conducting climate-related studies and providing climate-related services.

The program begins with the preparation of a plan, updated on a biennial basis, for the acquisition and dissemination of climate-related data and information. The plan will include an assessment of the state's climate data and information needs, a basis for establishing priorities among these needs, and a program for orchestrating activities directed toward meeting these needs. A State Climate Planning Advisory Group, composed of members from organizations which provide climate-related information and data and from the public sector and organizations which use this information, will participate in preparing and updating the plan.

In order to implement the plan, the bill provides that the state climate center may be established within the University of Alaska's Arctic Environmental Information and Data Center. The center would operate and maintain a central repository for information and data relating to the weather and climate of Alaska, provide weather and climatological information and technical advisory services to climate information users, and cooperate with other state and federal agencies in order to satisfy the intergovernmental climate program participation requirements of the National Climate Program Act.

In addition, the center would be authorized to investigate the characteristics of Alaska's climate; research and assess the impact of climate fluctuations on the availability of solar, wind, and water resources; make available the results of all research undertaken by the center; contribute to the general education of the public on the climate of the state; and enter into cooperative arrangements with other organizations engaged in climate-related research.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the establishment of a state climate program and a state climate center. This bill is consistent with the provisions of the National Climate Program Act, Public Law 95-367, under which the state may be eligible to receive up to a 50 percent grant to cover the costs of conducting climate-related studies and providing climate-related services.

The program begins with the preparation of a plan, updated on a biennial basis, for the acquisition and dissemination of climate-related data and information. The plan will include an assessment of the state's climate data and information needs, a basis for establishing priorities among these needs, and a program for orchestrating activities directed toward meeting these needs. A State Climate Planning Advisory Group, composed of members from organizations which provide climate-related information and data and from the public sector and organizations which use this information, will participate in preparing and updating the plan.

In order to implement the plan, the bill provides that the state climate center may be established within the University of Alaska's Arctic Environmental Information and Data Center. The center would operate and maintain a central repository for information and data relating to the weather and climate of Alaska, provide weather and climatological information and technical advisory services to climate information users, and cooperate with other state and federal agencies in order to satisfy the intergovernmental climate program participation requirements of the National Climate Program Act.

In addition, the center would be authorized to investigate the characteristics of Alaska's climate; research and assess the impact of climate fluctuations on the availability of solar, wind, and water resources; make available the results of all research undertaken by the center; contribute to the general education of the public on the climate of the state; and enter into cooperative arrangements with other organizations engaged in climate-related research.
