Protection techniques, commonly referred to as law enforcement, include highway and roving patrol as a visual deterrent to crime, investigation of crime and subsequent apprehension of criminals, and aiding crime victims in distress. Search and rescue missions are also carried out by this BRU.

The Governor's FY 81 budget requests general funds to continue a 5-man traffic enforcement team which has proven very successful in preventing traffic fatalities in the Anchorage area. This team has been federally funded as an experimental project. Some reductions in other highway and urban patrol are made as funds are shifted to increasing the rural native constable program in conjunction with participation by Native Corporations.

This program includes the following BRU's: Detachments and CIB, and AST Director's Office.

The primary purpose of this program is to protect lives and property by active intervention to prevent and deter crime. The Detachments and CIB BRU comprises the bulk of the State manpower (State troopers, investigators, and support staff) devoted to this purpose. Statewide, the troopers are organized into 2 zones, 7 detachments, 52 posts and a Central Investigation Bureau. They are responsible for protection within 98% of Alaska's land area. Protection techniques, commonly referred to as law enforcement, include highway and roving patrol as a visual deterrent to crime, investigation of crime and subsequent apprehension of criminals, and aiding crime victims in distress. Search and rescue missions are also carried out by this BRU.

The Governor's FY 81 budget requests general funds to continue a 5-man traffic enforcement team which has proven very successful in preventing traffic fatalities in the Anchorage area. This team has been federally funded as an experimental project. Some reductions in other highway and urban patrol are made as funds are shifted to increasing the rural native constable program in conjunction with participation by Native Corporations.

Some of the primary functions of the division are: to maintain records; to disseminate information and provide counseling to members of the various retirement systems regarding programs, retirement, social security, health and life insurance programs and the deferred compensation plan; to analyze and recommend statutory changes to the legislature for all benefit programs in order to remain competitive with those programs offered by other employers; to testify before the legislature on proposed legislation affecting the various benefit programs; and to ensure that correct benefit payments or refunds are made to employees or beneficiaries in a timely manner. The FY 81 request includes funding to administer the State Supplemental Benefits Program, which replaced the Federal Social Security program on January 1, 1980.
