

EXECUTIVE OPERATIONS

The Executive Office of the Governor provides liaison between the State and federal agencies, the legislative, judicial and executive branches of State government, and coordinates the Governor's policies among State agencies to provide effective responses to the needs of people. Staff activities directed toward achievement of these objectives include research and analysis of issues, preparation and monitoring of proposed legislation, and operation of branch offices in various Alaskan cities and Washington D.C. A fiscal section within the Executive Office provides administrative support functions for all of the agencies within the Office of the Governor. The Special Projects Office is included in the FY 81 Executive Office BRU. This office coordinates the activities of the Alaska Fisheries Council and the Alaska Agricultural Action Group in development and implementation of such special projects as the Delta Junction Barley Project.

The Operating Contingency Fund is available for the Governor's use to meet unexpected and immediate financial demands which are unforeseen at the time of budget preparation. The Executive Mansion is the official residence of the Governor and his family. The Governor entertains many visitors at both public and private affairs, and occasionally hosts overnight guests on official business. The Regulatory Reform Office is a new BRU for FY 81. Its purpose is to simplify regulations affecting the public in all State agencies.

The Lieutenant Governor, with the assistance of his administrative and support staffs, performs the duties prescribed by law and delegated by the Governor. Statutory responsibilities include: authentication of laws, supplements, and replacement pamphlets for the Alaska Statutes; assuring proper use of the State Seal; administration of the state election laws; presiding over the organization of the first regular session of the legislature; filing the original and enrolled copies of all acts and resolutions and all executive orders having the effect of law; orders and supervises incorporation elections; serves as chairman of the Alaska Historical Commission; appoints Notaries Public; and administers the Administrative Procedure Act. In addition to those statutory responsibilities, the lieutenant governor and his staff are becoming increasingly involved, through delegation by the Governor, in the formulation and implementation of executive policy, planning and public involvement.

EXECUTIVE OPERATIONS

The Executive Office of the Governor provides liaison between the State and federal agencies, the legislative, judicial and executive branches of State government, and coordinates the Governor's policies among State agencies to provide effective responses to the needs of people. Staff activities directed toward achievement of these objectives include research and analysis of issues, preparation and monitoring of proposed legislation, and operation of branch offices in various Alaskan cities and Washington D.C. A fiscal section within the Executive Office provides administrative support functions for all of the agencies within the Office of the Governor. The Special Projects Office is included in the FY 81 Executive Office BRU. This office coordinates the activities of the Alaska Fisheries Council and the Alaska Agricultural Action Group in development and implementation of such special projects as the Delta Junction Barley Project.

The Operating Contingency Fund is available for the Governor's use to meet unexpected and immediate financial demands which are unforeseen at the time of budget preparation. The Executive Mansion is the official residence of the Governor and his family. The Governor entertains many visitors at both public and private affairs, and occasionally hosts overnight guests on official business. The Regulatory Reform Office is a new BRU for FY 81. Its purpose is to simplify regulations affecting the public in all State agencies.

The Lieutenant Governor, with the assistance of his administrative and support staffs, performs the duties prescribed by law and delegated by the Governor. Statutory responsibilities include: authentication of laws, supplements, and replacement pamphlets for the Alaska Statutes; assuring proper use of the State Seal; administration of the state election laws; presiding over the organization of the first regular session of the legislature; filing the original and enrolled copies of all acts and resolutions and all executive orders having the effect of law; orders and supervises incorporation elections; serves as chairman of the Alaska Historical Commission; appoints Notaries Public; and administers the Administrative Procedure Act. In addition to those statutory responsibilities, the lieutenant governor and his staff are becoming increasingly involved, through delegation by the Governor, in the formulation and implementation of executive policy, planning and public involvement.

The Department of Transportation and Public Facilities requests a Delete/add supplemental adjustment for Chapter 80/79. The request results in a net zero adjustment. The project to be deleted is the Runway Lighting and Navigational Aids project for which \$460,000 was appropriated.

It is understood by the Department that the navigational lighting that was to be provided for the 23 stated airports was strobe lighting. The use of strobe lights to identify or furnish light for airport navigation is strongly discouraged by the FAA. This is due to the strobe lights causing temporary loss of night vision by pilots. According to regulations, when a grant is signed to receive ADAP funding for an airport, we agree that any improvements to that airport within the next 20 years will meet with FAA approval and be in accordance with the master plan for that airport. If improvements are made that the FAA does not concur in, we are required to pay back a prorated part of the original grant. Therefore, if the state persists in installing strobe lighting systems which have been discouraged by FAA, we may be faced with repaying some ADAP funding. That plus the state's liability in case of an accident due to temporary blindness caused by strobe lights appear to make it appropriate to delete this project.

We wish to request the project Noorvik Airport Lighting be added to Chapter 80/79 and funded for \$460,000. The Department's Research and Development Section has developed an alternate power system for lighting airports and would like to implement and demonstrate the power system at the airport in Noorvik. The project will install a power system and runway lights and provide for testing of the system as well as monitoring the maintenance cost, effectiveness, and pilot and public response.

Installation of the power system, provision of runway lights, navigational aids and monitoring the results after implementation are estimated to cost \$460,000.

The cost is broken down as follows:

\$250,000 Prototype design, construction, installation engineering support, and systems monitoring of the prototype power system.

\$150,000 Design and construction of an FAA approved edge lighting system, threshold markers, rotating beacon, and lighted wind cone at Noorvik

\$ 40,000 Maintenance and operation of the prototype installation for one year at Noorvik including snow removal. (These costs have not been budgeted by Maintenance and Operation)

\$ 20,000 Project administration, data collection and analysis by Research personnel

However, many projects that could be economically feasible, when compared to life cycle costs of conventional fossil-fuel generation, cannot be financed. Excess capacity of the projects, which cannot be sold to other utilities for lack of a transmission grid, provides insufficient revenues to retire revenue bonds. To overcome this difficulty and to assure project development, the Authority seeks State assistance in the form of subordinated loans and guarantees of revenue bonds.

The Authority has been allocated \$4,760,000 in the FY 81 capital budget to investigate the feasibility of renewable sources of energy, particularly hydroelectric power, in several regions of the State. The most significant feasibility study is for the Upper Susitna River which was funded at \$8,178,000 in FY 80 and \$3,335,000 in FY 81. In addition, it is recommended that a subordinate loan of \$18,000,000 be funded for the Swan Lake project near Ketchikan.
