RE: SB 6 and HB 70; special appropriation to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for the purchase of public safety and public works equipment for the cities of Craig and Klawock.

Last year, the Legislature passed an appropriation identical to this year's request, but they were vetoed by Gov. Hammond. The reason the governor gave for the veto was that funds were available from other sources.

However, the communities of Craig and Klawock have not been able to find those funds; or the funds available are match funds for which the communities do not have the resources to match with state or federal dollars.

This capital equipment was one of the few items requested from the two communities to their local legislators last year, and they remain the only items requested this year, either in the supplemental budget or for FY '80.

The communities need this equipment, which will be used for landfill disposal and to replace antiquated fire fighting equipment. We respectfully request that the appropriation be granted.

SUBJECT SB 6 Special appropriation to the Dept. of Community and Regional Affairs for the purchase of public safety and public works equipment for the cities of Craig and Klawock.

The requested monies were approved by the legislature in the free conference committee budget last year, but were vetoed by the Governor. The reason given for veto was that there were other sources of funds for similar projects, however, the communities in question have not received the equipment they need.

Other communities which received funds for similar equipment last year:

1. Galena	building	\$ 5,000

The city of Craig is a first class city with a population of 587, a three (3%) per-cent ^{SALES} property tax. The revenue is used for city administration and the school district. The property tax is 13 Mils. The city would use the crawler tractor for solid waste disposal and for road maintenance.

The city of Klawock is a first class city with a population of 323, a two per-cent (2%) sales tax, and no property tax. Klawock is one of the poorest villeges in the district and the people can ill-afford a property tax due to the lack of employment opportunities. Revenue sharing accounts for any city income. At present, the city is using a 1939 Fire Truck and a bell and telephone alarm system. The back hoe would be used on a required federally funded sewer project and for solid waste disposal.

Neither of these cities have a good source of income and the equipment is desperly needed to provide for the health and safety of the people.

10 CHAPTER 96. TECHNICAL SERVICES CONTRACT FUND.

11 Sec. 45.96.010. TECHNICAL SERVICES CONTRACT FUND. There is
12 created within the department the technical services contract fund. The
13 fund may be used only for the award of contracts to technical services
14 organizations as provided in this chapter.

15 Sec. 45.96.020. TECHNICAL SERVICES CONTRACT AWARDS. (a) Techni-
16 cal services contracts may be awarded to qualified technical service
17 organizations that provide technical services to small businesses with-
18 out charge.

19 (b) In awarding technical services contracts the committee shall
20 consider

21 (1) the likelihood that small business development will be
22 enhanced and employment opportunities expanded in areas of the state
23 with high rates of unemployment;

24 (2) the past performance of the technical services organiza-
25 tion seeking the award in providing technical services to small busines-
26 ses;

27 (3) the relative cost of delivering technical services to the
28 small businesses proposed to be served;

29 (4) the capability of the technical services organization to

1 successfully provide technical services under the contract.

2 (c) The commissioner of commerce and economic development may
3 award a provisional technical services contract, subject to ratification
4 by the committee, if

5 (1) a quorum of the technical services review committee
6 cannot be convened within 30 days after the submittal to the committee
7 of a technical services contract for its approval; and

8 (2) after making findings of fact, he determines that award
9 of the contract would be in the best interests of the state.

10 (d) Five per cent of the amount of each technical services con-
11 tract award shall be used to perform an independent evaluation of the
12 technical services organization's performance under the contract and the
13 impact of the technical services upon the small business served. The
14 technical services organization shall select a person to perform the
15 evaluation from a list of at least 10 qualified persons published by the
16 department. The evaluation shall consider, but need not be limited to,
17 (1) the number of jobs created as a result of the technical services;
18 (2) any resulting expansion of small business opportunities; (3) any
19 related success in acquiring financing experienced by recipients of the
20 technical services; and (4) government policies beneficial and adverse
21 to the operation of the small business. Before March 1 of each year the
22 department shall submit to the legislature a report of the results of
23 the evaluations performed during the previous year.

24 Sec. 45.96.030. TECHNICAL SERVICES REVIEW COMMITTEE. (a) The
25 technical services review committee is composed of the commissioner of
26 commerce and economic development, the commissioner of revenue, and the

CSSB 436

CSSB 436, introduced by Senator Kerttula on behalf of the Alaska Municipal League modifies AS 46.03.030 in three ways. AS 46.03.030 authorizes the Department of Environmental Conservation to administer a grants program for the construction of municipal water and sewerage projects. The proposed changes will affect the grants program as follows:

- 1) AS 46.03.030(b), as amended will increase the State's grant percentage from 50% to 75% of eligible costs not financed by the federal government for both water and sewerage projects. However, it also limits State and federal participation to a maximum of 87.5%. The following table shows examples of the present and proposed level of State grant funding at various levels of federal participation.

The primary beneficiary of this change will be projects such as water and sewer service extensions to new subdivisions where federal funding

is generally not available. There is no change in the rest of this section regarding the determination of eligible costs by the federal agency or with the plan review requirement.

- 2) AS 46.03.030(d), is amended to more clearly identify costs eligible for construction grant assistance. The only exclusions to eligibility are the financing charges for obtaining the local share of project costs, land and right-of-way acquisition and costs related to maintenance rather than construction.

- 3) AS 46.03.030(e) adds a new section authorizing the Department to award grants for solid waste facilities in addition to water and sewerage projects. State solid waste grants would be funded at 50 percent of eligible costs except when the project incorporates some element of resource recovery. When resource recovery is contemplated the State grant may be increased to 60 percent of eligible costs. This provision will encourage the recovery and reuse of many resources previously discarded, including the use of waste heat from the incineration of garbage. The conservation of energy resources is of particular importance to rural, arctic areas of the State.



The original cost of The Alaska Hospital and Medical Center, Inc. (per the balance sheet) for all equipment and the building was \$33,075,975. This was about three and a half years, or 42 months ago. Our builder confirms that as a rule of thumb, construction costs have gone up about 1% per month. Therefore, today's replacement cost would be $1.42 \times \$33,075,975$ or \$46,970,000. Equipment costs have exceeded 1% per month due to technological advances, so this figure is conservative.

In committee Senator Hackney, as subcommittee chairman, recommended the resulting amendments to the bill. The first section was reduced to a level of \$650,000 which, when combined with the appropriation request* for the loan program, constitutes full funding of the loan program. That is, \$8.1 million, \$7.5 requested plus \$.65 of this bill.

The two-year funding (Section 2) was simply felt to be impossible during this time of tight money. Also, the potentially early adjournment helps negate the need for forward funding.
