VERBATIM TRANSCRIPT
KEITH SPECKING ON SENATE BILL 132

March 9, 1979

SF-79 Tape No. 19, Side 2

Chairman:

Mr. Specking you have the floor.

Specking: Thank you Mr. Chairman. Mr. Chairman, I think the Senator's recognized background in fisheries management far exceeds mine. However, I would like to point out that we would have no problem with the proposed amendment except that we would like our legal people to examine the language more closely. I suspect that philosophically the Governor's view is that some form of severance of this valuable resource should be made available for wider distribution to all the citizens of Alaska. I think the Senator pointed out that we're spending somewhere in the neighborhood of--or requesting--or spending nearly \$30 million annually. The recovery from the present tax structure is minimal. Related to that, I would point out that the present system of taxation is a scattered system developed over a long period--much of it very old. The proposed tax increase would-- To the best of our calculations, the existing percentage rate on canned salmon is 4.45%. The system of taxing that is 3% of the average wholesale price for the canned product for a five-month period for five years.

The net effective rate is 4.45%. This would bring an increase of 1.55%. Crab is taxed at 2% of the raw value. This would be an increase of 4%. Clams at 1% for butter clams, 2% for razor clams, herring 1% of its value, etc. So that creates a very difficult situation. We have taxed freezer ships at 4%. This would be an increase of 2%. Cold storages at 1%. The whole situation of the processing industry has changed with relationship to the volume of the product processed since the time that these tax structures were created. The Senator pointed out the differences very well.

Included in your packet is a suggested distribution to boroughs and municipalities if the tax were enacted, compared against the present distribution of the raw fish tax.

I would like to suggest that where the wording on the front page says for fishery enhancement programs we are not talking about enhancement programs (inaudible portion of the tape) but rather that language might better be for fishery related development programs.

Chairman: Where are you talking about?

Specking: On the first page of the letter presented to you, Mr. Chairman.

Chairman: Of the amendment?

Specking: No, on the packet that was handed out by--

Hohman: The Department of Revenue letter?

Specking: Yes, the first page where we say fishery enhancement programs, we didn't mean to imply that these were fish hatcheries. Better language might be for fishery related development programs. And we would like to correct that language in the bill, so that it reflects that we're not talking about fish hatcheries per se.

On page 2, the language reads one-half the revenue shared with a borough or city of the first class shall be used for docks or other fishery enhancement projects, would like to change that to other fishery development related projects.

Chairman: Anything else?

Specking: I might tell you briefly that the capitalization of the fisheries and agriculture bank is very desirable. Members to that board have been appointed and they are working with the Department of Commerce and searching for an executive director. We hope to have that bank operative sometime within the next two months.

10 (1) funded and implemented several fisheries enhancement programs;
11 (2) funded and implemented fishery loan programs;
12 (3) increased its fishery protection and management program;
13 (4) funded and implemented a limited entry program; and
14 (5) embarked on a program of encouraging the development of a
15 bottom fishing industry.

16 * Sec. 2. PURPOSE. The purposes of this Act are to

17 (1) insure that the state is able to continue its efforts toward
18 overall fishery enhancement by raising additional revenue to pay for fishery
19 enhancement projects;

20 (2) make the imposition of the fishery tax more uniform among
21 fisheries businesses; and

22 (3) provide funding for the development of new fisheries.

23 * Sec. 3. AS 43.75 is amended by adding new sections to read:

24 Sec. 43.75.011. FISHERIES BUSINESS LICENSE. A person engaging or
25 attempting to engage in a fisheries business shall first apply for and
26 obtain a license as provided in AS 43.75.020.

27 Sec. 43.75.015. FISHERIES BUSINESS TAX. (a) A person engaged in
28 a fisheries business is liable for and shall pay a tax equal to six per
29 cent of the value of the fishery resource processed by his fisheries

1 business during the year.

2 (b) A person engaging or attempting to engage in a fisheries
3 business who actually and physically processes the fishery resource is
4 liable for and shall pay to the department the whole tax imposed by this
5 section. In determining this tax liability, the person may not deduct
6 from the value of the fishery resource processed the value of fishery
7 resources canned or processed for other fisheries businesses, but shall
8 include this as part of the value of the fishery resources canned or
9 processed.

10 Sec. 43.75.131. REFUND TO LOCAL GOVERNMENTS. (a) The department
11 shall pay to each borough, to each city of the first class, and to each
12 municipality unified under AS 29.68.240 - 29.68.440, an amount equal to
13 33 1/3 per cent of the amount of tax revenue collected in the municipal-
14 ity from taxes levied in this chapter. In the case of tax revenue
15 collected inside a city within a borough, the revenue to be shared shall
16 be divided equally between the city and the borough.

17 (b) One-half of the revenue shared with a borough or city of the
18 first class shall be used for docks or other fishery enhancement pro-
19 jects and those expenditures must be certified and reported to the
20 department annually no later than January 30.

21 Sec. 43.75.136. PAYMENTS TO COMMERCIAL FISHING AND AGRICULTURE
22 BANK. The legislature may appropriate 33 1/3 per cent of the amount of

25 capitalized as determined by the commissioner of commerce and economic

27 Sec. 43.75.140. DEFINITIONS. In this chapter





Testimony, received by the Committee, indicates the need for further investigation on the economic ramifications of this legislation, with particular emphasis on the development of bottom fisheries.



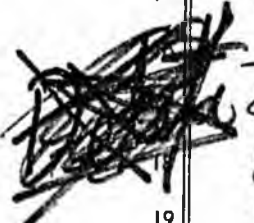

Dear Mr. President:

Under authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the plumbing code. The bill would do essentially two things. First, through sec. 1, it would conform Alaska's plumbing code (AS 18.60.705) with the most recent set of code standards (1976) adopted by the International Association of Plumbing and Mechanical Officials. Currently, the state's code is the set of standards adopted by that association in 1970. In making this change in AS 18.60.705, the bill would also incorporate certain stylistic changes in the manner in which the 1976 code standards are adopted which have been recommended by the Department of Law; i.e., rather than having a statute direct the department to adopt a particular code, the legislature should adopt the code itself. The present statute requires unnecessary steps if the department is to have no discretion in the matter anyway.

Secondly, the bill would authorize the Department of Labor to establish fees for plumbing inspections. These fees would provide a source of program receipts in addition to the permit fees authorized under AS 18.60.720, to offset more fully the department's costs of administering a plumbing code enforcement program.

I have reviewed the statutes, bylaws and regulations of the Alaska Industrial Development Authority concerning Senator Sumner's request pertaining to the utilization of the Authority to finance small businesses in the tax-exempt bond market. Nothing prohibits the Authority from utilizing its own funds to provide a guarantee or backstop to those applicants who may be unable to sell bonds on their own credit. Discussions with the board members revealed that this is one of the reasons for charging a 1% fee so that funds would be available to help applicants of this nature. I support SB 139, sponsored by Senator Ray, and would urge the committee to act positively on this bill. There is no State subsidy involved in the Authority and the more financings accomplished through the Authority, the more funds would be available for the purposes Senator Sumner envisions. Thank you for your time during January and last week on the above subject. After more opportunity for reflection, and after consulting with others, I would like to suggest some refinements in the original proposal I gave you, as follows:

1. AS 44.61.010(a)(5): In Line 3, add after "including facilities" the words: "For tourism or the tourist industry, for industrial parks, or for parking facilities, and".
2. AS 44.61.030(b): In the last sentence, add after "used or intended for use in" the words: "Tourism or the tourist industry, industrial parks, parking facilities or".
3. AS 44.61.220(5): Add after "intended for use in connection with air and water transportation" the words: "Or in connection with tourism or the tourist industry, industrial parks, or parking facilities".
4. AS 44.61.220(11): Add to end of section the words: "And also includes when used as a noun an installment sale agreement, financing agreement or loan agreement not involving real property".

REASONS FOR AMENDING THE LAW:

In the 1978 federal tax revisions, the Congress allowed the use of tax exempt financing to a limit of \$10 million on any industrial

bond project. There was, and remains after the 1978 amendments, unlimited tax exempt bond amounts for, among other things, convention or trade show facilities, parking facilities, and industrial parks.

Now that the Congress has raised the ceiling on tax exempt financings by industrial bonds, it seems particularly appropriate that the Legislature should expand the possible uses of this financing device under our Industrial Development Authority Act. This is particularly so in light of the fact that direct State funds for tourism loans and other such projects have now evaporated so that it is more important now than ever to obtain capital from outside Alaska. The amendments herein proposed will help attract otherwise unavailable construction money into the 49th State.
