The Social Services DRU is directed toward the goals of (a) achieving and maintaining economic self-support to prevent, reduce or eliminate dependency; (b) achieving or maintaining self-sufficiency including reducing or preventing dependency; (c) preventing or remedying neglect, abuse of exploitation of children and adults unable to protect their own interest, or preserving, rehabilitating or reuniting families; (d) preventing or reducing inappropriate institutional care by providing for community-based care, home-based care or other forms of less intensive care; (e) securing referral or admission for institutional care, when other forms of care are not appropriate, or providing services to individuals in institutions. The Division of Social Services is increasing its emphasis on preventing or remedying neglect, abuse or exploitation of children and adults unable to protect themselves and on preserving, rehabilitating or reuniting families so that they may act in, and protect their own best interests. The Division has made a commitment to provide services in the least restrictive setting possible so that the greatest degree of individual independence may be ensured.

The Social Services staff members provide social services directly to Alaskans in need of help. Staff activities include: determining individual need for social services; making a realistic plan with the client to achieve one or more goals; direct provision, or arrangement for the provision of planned services; follow-up to ascertain the clients' progress and the effectiveness of the services provided; and development of resources including the recruitment and study of foster homes, adoptive homes and day care facilities for use by social service clients.

The four primary services rendered clients by the Division of Social Services are: Information and Referral, Individual and Family Counseling, Child Protection and Adult Protection. Support resources that are essential to the work of the Social Services staff (and are budgeted in the Program Services DRU) include foster care, institutional care, day care, homemaker services, youth services support and adult supportive services.

The FY 81 budget recommendation includes \$47,800 to fund a Court Coordinator in the Southcentral Region who would oversee preparation of materials for presentation in court, train social workers in court procedures and assist the Division of Social Services in developing legal policy. The proposed Southcentral Region budget also includes \$66,100 of additional funding to provide expanded evaluation of client needs for adult protection, arrangements for service, ongoing counseling, placement and discharge planning, and licensure of adult residential care facilities. It is recommended that the Northwestern Region funding be increased by \$20,900 to purchase legal services to support children's court procedures and to reduce the amount of time between temporary custody hearings and final case disposition.

III. ANALYSIS (Continuation)

Coordinator for the homemaker-home health aide service would be responsible for:

- the development and maintenance of program policy
- coordination of homemaker-home health aide service with other services and programs
- establishing and maintaining standard of service
- technical assistance
- preparation of program requirements, contract preparation, contract monitoring and program evaluation
- collection analysis and interpretation of statistical data.

At the present time the responsibility for the management of the homemaker contract is being shared by several staff. The addition of a home health aide component would result in the need for a single central office position to establish standards of service, work with the contractor to develop a uniform referral system, record keeping system and establish monitoring guidelines.

Clerk Typist III

The additional work resulting from the new program component would double the present authorization level thus resulting in twice the paper flow, therefore, a clerk typist is needed.

RE: SB 324: "An Act amending the formula for property tax equivalency payments for senior citizens; and providing for an effective date."

This is to request that you bring up SB 324 for consideration by the Senate Finance Committee. It is my understanding that this bill has been assigned to you for action. The bill effectively doubles payment to program recipients - approximately 1,050 older Alaskans - and removes the \$375 limit on each payment. It is a straightforward bill with a small fiscal impact: @ \$158,000. It was introduced by the Interim Committee on Services to the Elderly and is well supported by seniors around the state. It is the goal of the Office on Aging to improve the physical, emotional, and social well-being; the economic independence and the longevity of older Alaskans.

The Office on Aging is essentially the State's aging program's broker. Using federal and state matching funds, it contracts with senior citizen and community service groups for the provision of meals, transportation and other support services for the State's elderly (60 years or older) residents. The major programs operated by the Office on Aging include:

Social Services: Grants are awarded to community public and private non-profit organizations to provide any of an extensive variety of services for older Alaskans to enable them to live independently. Priority services are Access Services (transportation, escort, information and referral, outreach), In-Home Services, and Legal Services.

Nutrition Services: Grants are awarded to community public and private non-profit organizations to provide nutritious meals on a daily basis to older Alaskans. While most of the meals are served in congregate settings, a significant proportion of them are delivered to the homes of those who are unable to come to congregate meal sites.

Community Service Employment for Older Americans: Grants are awarded to community public and private non-profit organizations to provide subsidized employment for low-income persons 55 years old or older who have poor employment prospects. Enrollees are employed in part-time positions and perform community service functions.

Training: The Office on Aging receives a small block of training funds which must be used to support "aging network" training activities, planned in accordance with Federally specified guidelines.

Advocacy Assistance: The Office on Aging receives funds for the Older Americans Advocacy Assistance Program which is designed to assist states in meeting the new Federal mandates to operate a statewide Long Term Care Ombudsman program and to serve as the State's effective and visible advocate for the elderly. Advocacy functions under this program include provision of both personal and issues advocacy on behalf of institutionalized and noninstitutionalized older Alaskans for the purpose of helping them receive the benefits and rights to which they are already entitled and supporting them in their efforts to secure additional benefits.

The Governor's FY 81 budget recommendation for the Office on Aging includes a new federally funded statistical Clerk position whose duties would include tabulating and reporting Senior Citizen Employment program statistics for use by Federal and State agencies. The recommendation also provides for an expansion of the Senior Citizen Employment Program.

BRU (S): SENIOR CITIZENS' TAX RELIEF

The purpose of the Senior Citizens' Tax Relief program is to reduce the pressure upon Alaskan senior citizens to relocate their residences due to property taxation.

There are four services for senior citizens in this BRU: real property tax exemptions, special water and sewer assessment exemptions, housing rental tax equivalency payments, and motor vehicle tax exemptions.

Senior citizens apply to their local municipal governments for property tax exemptions and deferment of special assessments. The municipality verifies qualifying criteria, computes the amount of exempt tax and/or deferment, and submits the applications as a reimbursement request to the State Assessor's Office. The applications are audited, processed, and approved for reimbursement by the State Assessor's Office.

Tax equivalency payments for renters are determined through a formula applying the local millage rate to the annual rent paid. Senior citizens apply directly to the State Assessor's Office where the forms are audited, applicant data verified, payment amounts computed, and applications approved for reimbursement. The equivalency payment granted to senior citizens is limited by law to \$375 per year.

The property tax exemption and renters equivalency payments are totally forgiven, while a special assessment deferment becomes a lien on the property which is due and payable when the property comes into the ownership of an ineligible taxpayer.

Enacted by the Tenth Legislature, the motor vehicle tax exemption reimburses a city or borough for the amount of each exemption granted eligible resident (age 65 or over) for motor vehicles subject to state registration with a limit of one such exempted vehicle per eligible resident.

The Department of Health and Social Services, Office on Aging supports the concept included in Senate Bill 325.

Our Office of Aging has found that there is a the need for senior housing. Seniors living on fixed income, from Old Age Assistance or a retirement program, cannot always afford to pay the current high cost of housing in many areas of Alaska. For example, a senior receiving the maximum monthly benefit under Old Age Assistance is eligible for \$413 a month. That \$413 must cover the costs of housing, fuel, food, transportation, clothing, and other necessities. Seniors report difficulties in making ends meet under such situation. Low cost housing program could serve to supplement their income.

Also, it may be appropriate for some of the housing dollars to be earmarked for residential care housing units as these could serve as an alternative to institutionalization in a nursing home. This could serve to provide care to seniors in the least restrictive setting possible and at a much lower cost.

Enclosed is information describing in detail the costs projected in our fiscal note for HCS CSSB 332 (Judiciary). It should be noted that the enclosure indicates \$5,000 for replacement equipment but that this has been increased to \$5,400 for the first year in which this funding would be needed (FY 82) to reflect the 7% inflation factor used throughout.

With regard to our projected need for permanent full-time positions, several factors are involved. Practical considerations dictate that enforcement personnel cannot be hired on a seasonal basis or rotated for haul road duty, as case continuity is vital to an effective enforcement program.

Although the bill under consideration stipulates the highway would open to the general public only during the summer season, other (commercial) users will become accustomed to services provided seasonally and will expect them. Such services will include investigations, ambulance, towing and emergency services. Additionally, once the highway is opened, it will be necessary to provide surveillance year round to ensure compliance with general as well as seasonal use restrictions.

Thank you for the opportunity to express Departmental concerns on this issue.

III. ANALYSIS (See Fiscal Note Preparation Instructions, Section III)

Funds are not included to increase the level of maintenance. The increased traffic use by the general Alaskan public, as well as tourists, will likely cause a demand for an increased level of maintenance, especially for dust control. The increased level of service could cause an increase in costs from 10% to 15% in the maintenance budget (the total request for the North Slope Haul Road is approximately \$5 million).

Funds are not included for Section 19.40.076 since we are not now able to estimate costs for providing this service. This responsibility is more in line with the duties of the Department of Natural Resources.

Agencies other than the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities may also have costs impacts and these are not included in this fiscal note.

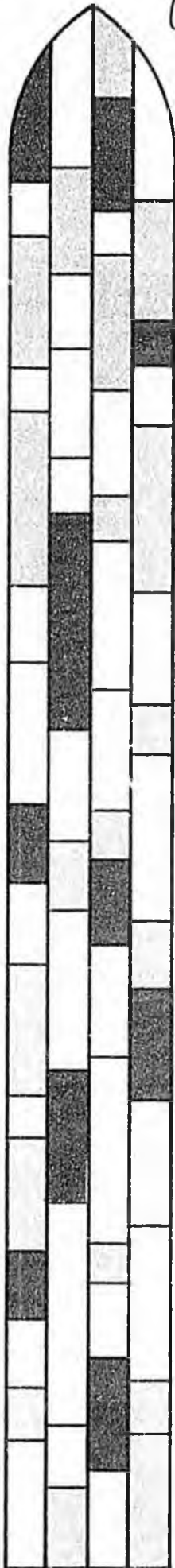

Your aide, Sue Lowell, has asked me to explain the background for SB 335. I have determined that AS 38.05.097 was enacted by section 11 of Ch. 182, SLA 1978. This provision exempted non-profit organizations from paying rent for the use of state land if the land is used for a youth encampment.

That section referred to organizations which were leasing state land under AS 38.05.050 - 38.05.105. The division of lands has determined that non-profit organizations which have leased land under the provisions of AS 38.05.315 are not entitled to this exemption even if the organization is using the land for a youth encampment. Apparently, some non-profit organizations leasing state land thought they were entitled to the exemption but were denied that treatment by the director of the division of lands. SB 335 was drafted to clearly provide that any non-profit organization that leases state land for a youth encampment is exempt from paying rent.

For your information, I offer my recommendations on the attached 4-8-80 memo from Reed Stoope, DNR, relating to SB 335:

Regarding Item (1) of the memo noting the section of SB 335, referring to "youth encampment", the following is suggested:

- 1) Youth encampment can also mean "day camp", and not only "overnight housing".
- 2) DNR's suggested language should not place such qualifications upon the word "encampment", as item (1) describes.
- 3) None of the language was included or specified in the original SB 159, CH. 182, SLA 1978, and should not be included within SB 335.
- 4) Although many non-profit organizations are involved with youth encampments, some of these organizations, such as churches, do run "day" camps only. Placing a 75% utilization capacity requirement on this type of encampment, along with an age requirement is very restrictive in nature. By reason, that many church, and other day camps, are utilized throughout the year, and not just during the months of July, August, and September, and often by young adults up to the ages of 21.
- 5) Therefore, the 75% utilization factor, and age factor, would not be applicable to those camps described in number (4) of this page.
