MEMORANDUM

Subject: SB 450

In all other states, communities do own airports and deal directly with the Federal Aviation Administration. In fact, the FAA is set up to work with communities rather than states.

There are really three basic questions that need answering in the State, Anchorage and Fairbanks airports.

- 1) Should local government or state government own, operate and benefit (suffer) from the community airport?
- 2) What is an equitable arrangement between the State, Anchorage and Fairbanks for transfer?
- 3) What are the financial results for the affected municipalities?

This latter question is the most thorny. Anchorage is a money maker which, of course, is the reason that the municipality wants it. Fairbanks is an iffy situation that has potential. The potential may be enhanced in the hands of local government, especially in light of past DOT/PF attitudes towards Fairbanks.

Research to determine the feasibility of community-owned airports should include the following:

1. Legal implications - FAA, liability, Federal, State and municipal statutes toward current lease holders, etc.
2. Financial implications - expenditures and revenues by airport.
3. History of capital improvement programs and the need for more in the near future.
4. Institutional implications - current staffing disposition and change in organization.
5. Other implications - how are other airports in the community affected? Comparison with other states' experience.

Anyone faced with researching this particular question would need to do the following tasks for each airport:

1. Inventory of facilities, including condition

and capacity.

(Some of this has just been completed by the State)

2. Review of past and current financial results and position.
3. Review of operational, financial and capital expenditures policies.
4. Review of current and historic traffic by type and source.
5. Review of tariff and concession structures.
6. Traffic forecasts and capacity requirements to accomodate forecasted traffic.
7. Capital investment requirements.
8. Revenue forecasts with current tariff structure and with alternative structure.
9. Forecast of profit/loss and balance sheets.
10. Cost of acquisition of airport facilities, i.e. does the borough or whoever pay the state for the airports?
11. Return on municipal investments in the airport.
12. Review of laws, institutions' and agencies' experience in other areas, staffing sources and requirements.
13. Consolidation of this information in a concise report.

Two conclusions should be drawn from the final document.

1. Whether or not the communities of Anchorage and Fairbanks should take over the airports. (It could be that Anchorage should and Fairbanks shouldn't, but both perspectives need to be examined.)

2. A recommended structure to administer the airports assuming that local ownership is viable. This could be in the form of a port authority-borough owned; etc.

Re: SB 451, SB 452 relating to sports facilities

Intent - The basic reason for these bills is to allow development of area-wide sports and recreation capabilities. There is a demonstrated need for covered facilities large enough for football games, and able to be adapted to tennis, track, basketball, soccer, and assorted other participant and spectator sports.

Other statutes of a similar nature are on the books. The drawback to the main one, 43.18.400, is that it would provide only up to 50% of the total funding of the facility. Also, it leaves management and administration up to the municipality. Under SB 451 an advisory council is formed. It is anticipated that this mechanism will enable the area-wide concept to be realized, without the problems inherent with a municipality doing the administration, i.e. a borough putting its own preferences above those of a city within the borough, or groups not associated with the municipality.

Although the original concept involved appropriations to individual municipalities, the bill became one of the proverbial Christmas Trees. In order to forestall further add-ons, the concept of using judicial districts was adopted. Two or three facilities within one district are still possible, if the municipalities get together and pool the funds.

It is anticipated that the following amounts will cover the cost of an air-dome of the size necessary in the listed municipalities.

Fairbanks	-----	\$12,000,000.
Anchorage	-----	18,000,000.
Southeast	-----	6,000,000.
Northwestern	-----	6,000,000.

(All facilities except Anchorage and Fairbanks would use approximately the same size basis)

As stated in SB 451, the facility council would be responsible for managerial aspects of the facility, including hiring the manager. It is envisioned that the director would be "on-board" at least six months before completion of the project. The councils would prepare the budget for the coming year, for presentation to the legislature as backup for the 50% operating and maintenance cost grants from the state for the first five years. (Note: the wording limiting the state share of operating and maintenance costs to five years was left out of the bill. It will need to be added. It is anticipated that the state will not be involved after the five year initial period.)

The Local Government Assistance BRU assists communities in attaining or sustaining viable units of local government according to established criteria. Particular emphasis is given to communities having local governments that are organized under state law with population less than 2,000. Components include Training and Development, State Assessor, Local Boundary Commission (Administration), Revenue Sharing (Administration) and Coastal Energy Impact Program.

The Training and Development Component provides local government officials with an opportunity to learn or improve skills needed to administer local government. Offices in Juneau, Anchorage, Nome and Bethel provide individual technical assistance for specific needs. Included in this program is the administration of Rural Development Assistance grants which, in FY 80, was in the Community and Rural Development BRU.

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The Local Boundary Commission component reviews and makes recommendations on requests for changes to or establishment of municipal boundaries. The intent is to ensure that the proposed changes will facilitate improvements in municipal services. This program also administers a grant program which makes grants of up to \$25,000 for newly incorporated municipalities or those assuming special new powers such as police and fire protection.

The Community Legal Assistance Component provides grants to local governments for the purpose of bolstering their legal capabilities by enabling them to purchase appropriate resources to resolve legal issues. These grants may not exceed \$20,000.

The Revenue Sharing Administration Component provides the personnel and expertise required to determine eligibility of municipalities to receive revenue sharing grants as well as determine their program allocation.

The Coastal Energy Impact Program is designed to assist those coastal communities, through federal grants from the U.S. Department of Commerce, who expect to be impacted by off-shore energy projects. Two positions will be federally funded in FY 81 to monitor existing grants and bond guarantees and to make future determinations on awarding bond guarantees from CEIP funds obligated to the Alaska Municipal Bond Bank.

Re: SB 451, SB 452 relating to sports facilities

Intent - The basic reason for these bills is to allow development of area-wide sports and recreation capabilities. There is a demonstrated need for covered facilities large enough for football games, and able to be adapted to tennis, track, basketball, soccer, and assorted other participant and spectator sports.

Other statutes of a similar nature are on the books. The drawback to the main one, 43.18.400, is that it would provide only up to 50% of the total funding of the facility. Also, it leaves management and administration up to the municipality. Under SB 451 an advisory council is formed. It is anticipated that this mechanism will enable the area-wide concept to be realized, without the problems inherent with a municipality doing the administration, i.e. a borough putting its own preferences above those of a city within the borough, or groups not associated with the municipality.

Although the original concept involved appropriations to individual municipalities, the bill became one of the proverbial Christmas Trees. In order to forstall further add-ons, the concept of using judicial districts was adopted. Two or three facilities within one district are still possible, if the municipalities get together and pool the funds.

It is anticipated that the following amounts will cover the cost of an air-dome of the size necessary in the listed municipalities.

Fairbanks	-----	\$12,000,000.
Anchorage	-----	18,000,000.
Southeast	-----	6,000,000.
Northwestern	-----	6,000,000.

(All facilities except Anchorage and Fairbanks would use approximately the same size basis)

As stated in SB 451, the facility council would be responsible for managerial aspects of the facility, including hiring the manager. It is envisioned that the director would be "on-board" at least six months before completion of the project. The councils would prepare the budget for the coming year, for presentation to the legislature as backup for the 50% operating and maintenance cost grants from the state for the first five years. (Note: the wording limiting the state share of operating and maintenance costs to five years was left out of the bill. It will need to be added. It is anticipated that the state will not be involved after the five year initial period.)

The Local Government Assistance BRU assists communities in attaining or sustaining viable units of local government according to established criteria. Particular emphasis is given to communities having local governments that are organized under state law with population less than 2,000. Components include Training and Development, State Assessor, Local Boundary Commission (Administration), Revenue Sharing (Administration) and Coastal Energy Impact Program.

The Training and Development Component provides local government officials with an opportunity to learn or improve skills needed to administer local government. Offices in Juneau, Anchorage, Homer and Bethel provide individual technical assistance for specific needs. Included in this program is the administration of Rural Development Assistance grants which, in FY 80, was in the Community and Rural Development BRU.

The State Assessor assists local government with procedures for determining local property taxes based on full and true value. This component also administers property relief programs, and researches economic data relating to property tax assessments and municipal financing.

The Local Boundary Commission component reviews and makes recommendations on requests for changes to or establishment of municipal boundaries. The intent is to ensure that the proposed changes will facilitate improvements in municipal services. This program also administers a grant program which makes grants of up to \$25,000 for newly incorporated municipalities or those assuming special new powers such as police and fire protection.

The Community Legal Assistance Component provides grants to local governments for the purpose of bolstering their legal capabilities by enabling them to purchase appropriate resources to resolve legal issues. These grants may not exceed \$20,000.

The Revenue Sharing Administration Component provides the personnel and expertise required to determine eligibility of municipalities to receive revenue sharing grants as well as determine their program allocation.

The Coastal Energy Impact Program is designed to assist those coastal communities, through federal grants from the U.S. Department of Commerce, who expect to be impacted by off-shore energy projects. Two positions will be federally funded in FY 81 to monitor existing grants and bond guarantees and to make future determinations on awarding bond guarantees from CEIP funds obligated to the Alaska Municipal Bond Bank.

Dear Senator Fahrenkamp:

A major priority of the Fairbanks North Star Borough is the economic revitalization of downtown Fairbanks. An important element of any revitalization plan will be beautification of the downtown area, including the Chena River, a long-overlooked community asset.

Last summer, the Fairbanks Downtown Association began work on creation of a park and beautification of the river banks in the area around the Cushman Street bridge. Working with the association, the borough has developed plans for the second phase of this project. Passage of Senate Bill 453, which would appropriate \$250,000 to the borough for this work, will enable implementation of the second phase this summer.

Cleanup of the river banks will be required, as many unsightly boulders, concrete slabs and other debris must be removed. Some bolstering of the banks is necessary, and city storm drains opening into the river must be repaired or replaced. Following this work, the banks will be landscaped, trees will be planted and benches will be installed.

Funding provided by SB 453 also will allow work to begin on the third phase of this project, which is development of major park facilities. These include a bike path along the river with rest areas equipped with benches and picnic tables; development of a small amphitheater near the river's edge for public performances by local artists and musicians; construction of pedestrian bridges across the river to promote foot traffic and accommodate bike travel across the river; and development of a small municipal marina for small boat traffic on the Chena.

Communities across the country have gained tremendous benefits by developing and utilizing existing assets. Your introduction and support of SB 453 is deeply appreciated and will facilitate the beautification of the Chena River so that it will become a major community drawing card.

Projects of this nature require extensive cooperation and coordination, and we will continue to work with the Fairbanks Downtown Association through all phases of this park development. If I can be of further assistance to you on this matter, please contact me at your convenience.
