BRU(S): BUSINESS LOANS

The Business Loans BRU provides Alaskan businesses and residents with long term, low interest financing which is usually not available from private lending institutions. Specific loan programs include:

Small Business Loans These loans are generally too risky or too small to interest private lending institutions.

Commercial Fishing Loans provide commercial fishermen with capital for purchase or upgrade of vessels needed to remain competitive. Due to high risk and unpredictable fish seasons, local banks have been reluctant to make these loans.

Tourism Loans provide capital for the expansion of tourist facilities.

Fisheries Enhancement Loans provide long-term, low interest loans for hatchery planning and construction, in support of private ownership of hatcheries by qualified nonprofit corporations.

Child Care Facilities Loans provide financing for the development of licensed child care facilities which helps stabilize that portion of the work force dependent on these services.

Water Resources Loans provide funds for hydroelectric and water supply projects. With the exception of certain previously conceived projects, this program has been replaced by the Power Project Loan Fund.

Historical Districts The intent of these loans is to foster an awareness of the need to preserve our historical past.

Residential Care Facilities provides residential care facilities with financing needed for renovation or equipment needed to comply with licensing standards. Loans are often not available from private lending institutions.

Alternative Technology and Power Resource Loans This loan fund assists in the development of energy production utilizing sources other than fossil fuel.

The Division has decentralized its operations with the opening of offices in Anchorage and Fairbanks. As a result, the number of applicants has doubled. This outreach effort will continue in FY 81.

SMALL-SCALE FISHERIES LOANS

1. Amend SB 476 "Loans for Upgrading Fish Holds" to provide for expeditious handling of all small-scale fisheries loans (Kerttula's bill now provides for those wanting to upgrade their fish holds).
2. The changes in this bill are part of a larger attempt to help people obtain small-scale fisheries loans. This will help people all over the state, not only those involved in developing fisheries such as herring, but also halibut skiff fishermen, and handtrollers in Southeast. We also want to make fishermen aware of what loan programs are available to them, and how to go about obtaining a loan.
3. David Hoffman is compiling information on numbers of people who have applied for this type of loan through banks, and is working on the fiscal impact of this legislation (how many people want how much money).
4. This small-scale fisheries loan program ties in directly with the recommendations of the Salmon Quality Control Study Group, chaired by Sen. Kerttula. That group calls for quick handling of small-scale loans for upgrading boats to help ensure a high-quality product.
5. Gov. Hammond suspended the 25% required bank participation on loans between \$50,000 and \$500,000 until May 15, when he expects the Legislature to come up with a comprehensive loan package. This has caused even more people to apply for loans.
6. Reps. Anderson, Gardiner, and Meekins are working on delineating all the available fisheries loan programs. We are interested in a "clearinghouse idea" for fisheries loans, with some group such as BSFA taking charge of disseminating information. ANF is developing such a comprehensive program for herring.

Recommendations of the State Range Planning Committee

In FY 1980 the Game Division received a legislative appropriation of \$15,000 to establish a State Range Planning Committee consisting of representatives from most major communities within the State. This committee, with directions from Game Division's Hunter Safety Coordinator, was to assess the needs for shooting facilities in cities and towns throughout Alaska and to make recommendations regarding acquisition and development of appropriate shooting facilities. The committee's findings and recommendations are as follows:

The third meeting of the State Range Planning Committee was held December 20, 1979 in Anchorage. The purpose of the meeting was to determine cost of designating, acquiring, and developing indoor and outdoor shooting facilities.

In most communities of the state the Range committee agreed to allot up to \$2500 and technical assistance to all the smaller villages and communities desiring to designate new or formalize existing shooting areas. Also, this money could be used to develop portable indoor shooting items that could be used for student training.

The committee determined that a transportable 80' x 30' predesigned building would be adequate to meet the needs of most communities for indoor shooting facilities. These would have 5 shooting points for smallbore shooting only and are estimated to cost \$300,000 each.

The need for shooting facilities both indoor and outdoor was examined and cost determined for each community of the State with a population over 1,000 people. The cost figures for each community and the total cost are presented in Appendix B.

The committee's actions so far has identified 14 existing outdoor ranges and 12 indoor ranges located in 25 major communities and 116 small communities and villages. Some of these facilities are unusable or unavailable to the general public. The committee's recommendation to offer technical and financial assistance applies to about 155 communities and includes nearly 200 individual development projects.

The State Manpower Services Council has long been in favor of legislation that would provide for a residential hiring preference for state construction projects. Dear Mr. President:

Under the authority of Art. III, sec. 18 of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill which would establish an Alaska Job Tax Credit Program to promote resident employment. The bill would implement over a two-year period a tax credit program to encourage employers to hire persons who qualify as "certified individuals": those who have been residents for a minimum of one year and who are either chronically unemployed or economically disadvantaged. In order to qualify as chronically unemployed, a resident must have been unemployed for a minimum of nine months of the twelve months immediately preceding his application for certification. An economically disadvantaged resident is a person whose income for the twelve months preceding the application falls below a certain percentage of Bureau of Labor Statistics' "lower living standard income level" as adjusted for Alaska.

The credit program would begin January 1, 1981 and expire December 31, 1982. The individual for whom a credit is claimed by an employer must work a minimum of 30 days for that employer and must be re-certified if he subsequently accepts employment with any employer wishing to file for the tax credit provided in the chapter. The eligibility of any certified individual in the program extends for twelve months.

The program is designed to be administered by an Alaska Job Tax Credits section in the Department of Labor. The bill establishes methods of application and also considers the disqualification of an individual who intentionally falsifies information on his application.

An Alaska Job Tax Credit would not be able to exceed the total tax liability of the employer. Nor would the employer be permitted to take as a business deduction the amount of credit allowed under the new chapter.
