AGENCY: LEGISLATURE

Operations of the Legislature and its staff are budgeted in two budget request units: Legislative Council; and Legislative Budget and Audit Committee. The Ombudsman BRU is also included in the Legislative and Elective Operations program.

The Legislative Council is the governing body appointed by the Legislature from its membership to oversee the activities of the Legislative Affairs Agency. The Legislative Affairs Agency provides all services essential to the Legislative branch and to the Legislative process except for the specialized functions which are assigned to the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee. The agency conducts examination and analysis of major subjects of Legislative concern, reviews regulations promulgated under the Administrative Procedure Act by administrative agencies to see if the legislative intent is being carried out, and provides the administrative services necessary to the operation of the Legislature. Operations of the Legislature itself are also budgeted in the BRU.

The Legislative Budget and Audit Committee is assigned the fiscal responsibility for the Legislature. The staffs of the Legislative Audit and Legislative Finance report to L B & A Committee. This Committee is a permanent interim Committee of the Legislature which has the responsibility for providing full-time technical assistance in accomplishing the fiscal analyses, budget review, and post-audit functions. It serves to provide legislative presence and involvement in State fiscal operations between legislative sessions.

The Office of the Ombudsman was established in 1975 to investigate citizen complaints pertaining to State agencies. The Ombudsman has authority to investigate administrative acts of agencies which he has reason to believe might be: 1) contrary to law; 2) unreasonable, unfair, oppressive, arbitrary, capricious, an abuse of discretion, or unnecessarily discriminatory even though in accordance with the law; 3) based on a mistake of fact; 4) based on improper or irrelevant grounds; 5) unsupported by an adequate statement of reasons; 6) performed in an inefficient or discourteous manner; or 7) otherwise erroneous. Efforts aimed at achieving these goals are directed through the institution of an informal and expeditious investigation process in which complaints are received from the public, quickly and thoroughly researched and investigated, determined justified or unjustified and the findings and recommendations reported to the agency and citizen involved. The Ombudsman may also report his findings and recommendations to the Governor, Legislature, a grand jury, and the public.

The Legislative Budgets were not made available for review by the Governor. The figures included as Governor's budget figures should not be considered recommended by the Governor. They are included for informational purposes.

14 confusion have created arbitrary and unreasonable limits to community growth,
15 agricultural, mineral, energy and recreational resource development; and

16 WHEREAS the western states were not admitted to the Union on an equal
17 footing with the original 13 states which retained a majority of their land
18 in state ownership; and

19 WHEREAS the State of Nevada has initiated a course of action leading to
20 a responsible legal challenge to federal land policies by enacting legisla-
21 tion which declares state ownership of certain federal land; and

22 WHEREAS the State of Alaska is in a similar position to the State of
23 Nevada, since, apart from Native-owned land, less than one third of one per-

Legal Services for the State are provided by the Department of Law's Civil Division. These services include: representing the State in all legal matters to which the State may be a party; rendering legal advice and opinions; drafting legislation for the Executive Branch of government and conducting legal reviews of all legislation passed by the Legislature on behalf of the Governor; drafting and reviewing regulations; and bringing, presenting, and defending all necessary actions in the name of the State for the collection of revenue.

In FY 80, the State's Anti-trust unit operations were funded through a federal grant on an experimental bases. The FY 81 budget continues the anti-trust program as a State-funded effort.

The representation of the State of Alaska before the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission is an ongoing effort of the Legal Services staff to assure the maximum revenues to the State by determining an equitable tariff for movement of oil through the Trans-Alaska Pipeline System. Phase II hearings began in FY 80 and will continue into FY 81. Phase II of the hearings will examine the costs claimed by the oil companies in construction of the pipeline. Additional funds are included in the FY 81 budget request to adequately represent the State on this issue.

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Naval Arctic Research Laboratory

The Naval Arctic Research Laboratory is owned by the Department of the Navy and operated by the University of Alaska under contract with the Office of Naval Research. Its mission is to provide all facilities, logistical support and services for accomplishing basic and applied research that contribute to successful Navy operations in the Arctic regions. Research activities include the fields of oceanography, underwater acoustics, atmospheric science, and aquatic and terrestrial biology.

The Naval Arctic Research Laboratory (NARL) was initiated* by the Office of Naval Research (ONR) in 1947, and has steadily developed its technical capabilities for supporting research. From the beginning, a serious effort was made to integrate the research of physical and biological scientists in environmental studies. By 1960, operations were beginning on Arctic Research Laboratory Ice Station I (ARLIS-I), the first of many ice-island research stations. ARLIS-II, established in 1961, was occupied for four years until it drifted into the Greenland Sea and broke up near Iceland. Also in 1961, the U.S. Air Force turned over custody of Fletcher's Ice Island (T-3) to the NARL. (T3 is a thick section of glacier ice that has drifted in the Arctic Ocean for many years.) Several contractors have operated the laboratory for the Navy, the University of Alaska having served this function since 1954.

The NARL has been, and continues to be, the only research laboratory of its kind in the high Arctic. It has initiated and encouraged a wide range of research by attracting and supporting scientists whose field investigations in the arctic regime would otherwise have been too difficult and expensive to accomplish. The ONR has traditionally operated the laboratory as a national facility rather than serving Navy interests alone. A reasonable balance is maintained between mission-oriented and fundamental scientific re-

search. Research supported by the NARL has provided practical solutions to many problems.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION

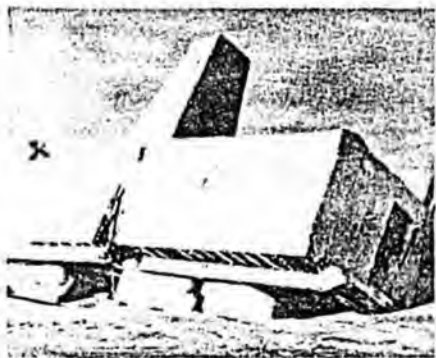
The NARL lies on the shore of the Arctic Ocean, a few miles southwest of Point Barrow and about 330 miles north of the Arctic Circle. The main laboratory comprises seven wings with quarters for 100 residents, 43 laboratory spaces, a lecture hall, and various specialized service rooms. Power is provided by four 750 kw gas-turbine plants. Other utilities include water treatment, gas, electric, and oil heating facilities, sewage and other waste disposal plants, and telephone and radio communication.

The NARL typically operates more than 30 field camps. They are spread across the North Slope from Anaktuvuk Pass in the central Brooks Range south of Barrow to Point Hope 350 miles southwest of Barrow and to Peter's Lake 300 miles to the east. The NARL has steadily shifted from the operation and maintenance of field camps with permanent buildings to annual sites supported with temporary structures. This is consistent with its policy of supporting ice research stations and providing flexible, cost-effective services. In order to support scientific investigations in diverse environments, the laboratory maintains a fleet of five aircraft, two ships (the *Alumiak* and *Natchik*), a variety of small boats, and wheel and track vehicles for over-snow

traverses.

Intergovernmental service support agreements are in effect with the U.S. Coast Guard, Aerospace Defense Command, Federal Aviation Administration, U.S. Public Health Service, National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, U.S. Geological Survey, Department of the Interior, and State and local agencies.

SELECTED ACTIVITIES

In early years the NARL chiefly provided a base for transient scientists, many of whom came during the summer months. An important development of recent years has been to encourage in-house research projects that continue throughout the year. The postdoctoral program has grown since its inception in 1976. During the past year, the NARL had two resident research associates working at the Animal Research Facility, one a visiting scientist from the University of Maryland, the other a research veterinarian. A new program related to the sea-ice environment and marginal ice zone has been added and is headed by a resident research associate in arctic oceanography.

Ice Islands

Last year Fletcher's Ice Island (T-3) broke loose and began to move south from its grounded position north of Ellesmere Island. It again attracted attention as a research platform for scientific projects. The Polar Research Laboratory (PRL) of Santa Barbara, California, established the so-called Manned/Unmanned Multipurpose Environmental Research Station

(MUMMERS) on T-3 when it was about 60 miles northwest of Prince Patrick Island, Canada. MUMMERS transmits oceanographic data directly to PRL in California via the NIMBUS satellite.

The westward drift of T-3 has brought it closer to Barrow and it is now within range of NARL aircraft. By May, 1979, it had reached 72°43'N latitude and 134°17'W longitude. Visits to T-3 by the NARL staff have been made in support of the scientific projects and to prepare for future occupation.

Three visits were made to the Soviet Ice Station, NP-22, using the NARL Twin Otter aircraft. The westward drift of this station carried it within range of NARL aircraft before the camp was abandoned several months later.

The bioacoustics program, begun in 1978, expanded its activities under the BLM/OCS-sponsored 'Project Whales' program (see later) which is managed from the NARL. The bioacoustics program uses acoustic instrumentation to study the behavior, migration, and dynamic processes associated with marine mammals, particularly whales, in an ice-covered sea. Two major field programs were carried out on the sea ice from bases located on Pingok and Narwhal Islands, which are small barrier islands in the Beaufort Sea. This program was conducted in cooperation with the Naval Ocean Systems Command, San Diego, California.

Animal Research Facility

The Animal Research Facility has always played an important part in research programs at the NARL. It provides a unique opportunity to study native species of northern Alaskan animals in a modern and well equipped laboratory. The scientific work is supported by the Biophysics Program Office of the Office of Naval Research. An important part of the research is concerned with comparative and physiological mechanisms of adaptation and acclimatization demonstrated by mammals under extreme arctic conditions. Specific studies include comparative metabolism, radio telemetry methods, blood chemistry and hematology, energy dynamics, thermoregulation and energy requirements, mechanisms for utilization and conservation, and the role of water and electrolyte

regulation in native species. The purpose of these studies is to determine how animals have adapted to the extreme conditions of the Arctic and to ultimately apply the knowledge gained in helping man to cope with the polar environment.

Most of the animals at the Animal Research Facility (ARF) were obtained originally near Barrow. Although they are maintained as laboratory specimens, every effort is made to provide them with comfortable, spacious and natural outside living enclosures. They have adjusted well and many species now propagate readily in captivity. As many as 60 wolves have been born and raised at the ARF. Complete clinical records are kept on larger animals. These files provide the incoming scientist with information on vital statistics, monthly weights, quarterly blood chemistry and hematological values, and a detailed history of the animal's previous role in research.

The Animal Research Facility consists of 22 buildings in five main building complexes located on 3.1 acres (1.3 hectares). There are 72 exterior cages for housing 116 animals of 12 different species. Large run areas exist for the arctic wolves and foxes. Five enclosed observation units, two of which directly overlook the run areas, are available for animal behavior studies. A staff of ten, including a full-time resi-

dent veterinarian, maintains the facility. In addition to both indoor and outdoor enclosures, the facility includes food preparation laboratories, provision for cage-washing, a clinical laboratory, an X-Ray unit, a surgery suite, and metabolic and telemetry laboratories. Ample laboratory and office space is available for both resident and visiting scientists.

Library

The primary purpose of the NARL library is to serve the research needs of visiting scientists and the NARL staff. The scientific collection is also used by non-local researchers via inter-library loan and direct mail requests. The only research library on the North Slope, it serves the reference needs of Barrow residents as well as Federal and Borough agencies. The collection consists of some 20,500 titles, including 10,000 reprints, 1,000 maps, 900 microfiche, and 200 periodical titles. Reports of scientific projects supported by the laboratory are contained in a special reprint file. There is a ready exchange with the main Rasmuson Library at Fairbanks (see page 97).

In addition to its regular holdings of books, journals, etc., the NARL library has an unusual collection of arctic and Alas-

kan material, including irreplaceable items such as original manuscripts, rare books, and one-of-a-kind reports or recorded tapes. Reports of scientific and ethnographic research from the earliest arctic and antarctic expeditions can also be found in the library.

Planning Conferences

The NARL conducts conferences to improve its service to prospective users of the laboratory and to help in planning for usage of the laboratory several months in advance. Two conferences per year give the NARL staff and ONR representatives opportunities to inform intending users about the laboratory, resolve any matters of Navy policy changes, and discuss concerns and problems that the user may have.

Research

Outer Continental Shelf Program: Studies of the Outer Continental Shelf (OCS) are funded by the Bureau of Land Management and managed by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). The OCS projects supported by the NARL have been concentrated in the Beaufort Sea coastal zone east of Point Barrow, and also to the west of Point Bar-

row in the Chukchi Sea. This year, the emphasis continues to be placed on programs carried out in the near-shore areas of barrier island lagoons of the Beaufort Sea.

These shallow-water programs pose a difficult logistics problem. In order to provide support, the laboratory uses an 85-foot, all-aluminum light-weight warping tug, which has been extensively modified for oceanographic research through funds provided by NOAA. The ship houses five crew members and four scientists. Features of the *R/V Alumiak* include a spacious working deck, shallow draft (four feet), and space for two deck-mounted 7 x 12 foot all-weather modular laboratory units. Studies aboard the *Alumiak* have dealt with marine biology, littoral zone fisheries, physical oceanography, and observations of sea birds. The Marine Operations Department also operates a 40-foot vessel, the *Natchik*, to support oceano-

graphic programs.

Endangered Whales: The NARL is currently under contract with the Alaska office of the U.S. Department of the Interior's Bureau of Land Management (BLM) to conduct investigations designed to ascertain what impact the development of oil and gas fields on the outer continental shelf may have on the endangered species of whale.

The contract, now called 'Project Whales', was conceived and initiated during the summer of 1978 but grew out of several programs that had already been operating at the laboratory. The approach to the study is interdisciplinary and involves 35 scientists and the cooperation of several State universities and local and Federal agencies. The program involves scientific and laboratory investigations on the migration, feeding habits, ecology, and habitat of endangered species of whales in the proposed lease areas of the Beaufort Sea.

Other Projects: A total of 119 projects received support at the NARL during the year. Of these, 15 projects were sponsored by the Office of Naval Research and conducted at the NARL during the past year. They covered a broad range of subjects including atmospheric chemistry, oceanog-

raphy, physical processes in ice and snow, temperature regulation in a variety of arctic animals, and basic metabolism and physiology. Their emphasis was on oceanography, ice physics, and chemistry, environmental ecology, and the biology of flora and fauna.

The Barrow Community

The NARL works with its local community not only by offering employment at Barrow but by providing training and information services. A monthly newsletter (*NARL News*) is distributed. On-the-job training programs were initiated with support from the U.S. Department of Labor and the Alaska U.S. Federation of Natives' Comprehensive Employment Training Act (CETA). The primary purpose of the CETA program is to afford opportunities for community residents to gain experience through work in the various laboratories and departments. Community residents from the North Slope Borough worked this year in the Marine Operations Department, Science Equipment Shop, the Animal Research Facility, and the Business Office. Occasional career-oriented courses sponsored by DOLA/FN CETA are conducted at the NARL.

Operations/Maintenance Subcontract

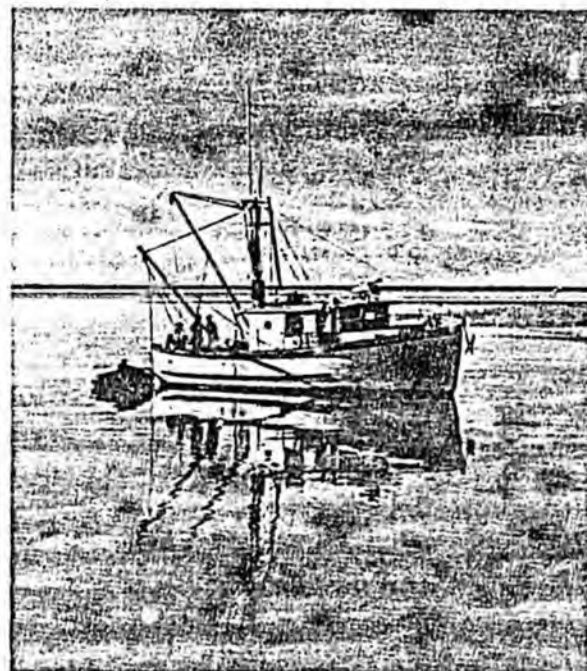
Arctic Services, Inc., a Service Division of International Telephone and Telegraph Corporation, provides essential support at the station. Their experience encompasses all phases of operations, maintenance, and support services for facility systems and care of assigned personnel. Presently, ITT Arctic Services, Inc., is furnishing these services for the Naval Arctic Research Laboratory, under contract with the prime contractor, the University of Alaska. ITT Arctic Services has tailored its organization to respond to the unique requirements of the arctic conditions which prevail at Barrow, Alaska.



EXECUTIVE OPERATIONS

The Council on Science and Technology was established in 1978 to review the research needs of state government, to issue and administer research grants and contracts, and to address stated legislative or administrative requests for research. The Alaska Council on Science and Technology's responsibilities cover the entire spectrum of state government: from universities, the state departments, to the legislative committees in that it is expected to assist each entry to fulfill its obligations to plan, conduct, or oversee research that is essential to the needs of Alaska. The Council is the only statutory group established which is able to serve as an interface between the public, the academic community, the state government and which is obligated to help policy makers by providing to them information and sources of scientific expertise. The seven person council is assisted by a staff of two. An increase in the Northern Technology Grants Program is requested in the FY 81 budget. The Office will be transferred to the Department of Administration from the Governor's Office by Executive Order, effective July 1, 1980.

"Requesting the Governor to propose social services programs and submit recommended budgets which exclude receipt of funds under Title XX of the Social Security Act."

This resolution calls for the elimination of federal funding, regulations and service eligibility limitations in Alaska. As the resolution states the Federal Title XX social services law and HEW regulations have the effect of limiting and restricting the appropriate delivery of services in Alaska. In FY 81, Alaska's social services budget will be approximately 20 million dollars. Only 4.6 million of that total will be Federal Title XX funds (in addition, there will be approximately \$280,100 in Federal Title XX training funds). Although federal funds are less than one-quarter (1/4) of the total expenditure, federal laws and regulations dominate the services planning and program design.

The Department supports this resolution in concept since its objective is to create a more appropriately designed social services program with reference to Alaska's unique geographical conditions, population, and service needs. Federal restrictions inappropriate to Alaska can be summarized as follows:

1. Title XX must be administered and supervised by a "single state agency" designated by the Governor. Under certain circumstances, it is more cost and program efficient to administer and supervise a social services program locally or regionally. However, federal regulations forbidding grants to localities or other agencies effectively results in preventing local administrative control of services. Since the majority of Alaskan localities are sparsely populated and have no taxing authority, their ability to meet complicated federal reporting requirements and eligibility determination criteria virtually prevents local administration.
2. The Title XX services program must be operated in every political subdivision of the State. Similarly there must be three (3) services offered to Social Security Supplemental Income recipients statewide.
3. One-half (1/2) of all federal money must be spent for services to clients who meet the eligibility requirements for AFDC, SSI or Medicaid. Low income individuals in Alaska are widely scattered geographically, and due to the high cost of living in Alaska, do not meet the federal income criteria for federal financial assistance programs. Regardless of an individual's need for services, such as homemaker service or child protective services, without regard to their income, the State agency must meet this restrictive regulation.

- 4. Title XX training funds may not be utilized to train social service providers not directly funded by Title XX. Local social service providers funded by State and other federal monies, such as from BIA, may not utilize this resource.

This resolution calls for state monies to replace at least 4.6 million in federal receipts (1981 figures). Other federal programs, however, are not jeopardized by State rejection of the Federal Title XX funds.

It should be noted that the resolution calls for the Department to submit a budget excluding federal funds for FY 82, rather than FY 81, and that Title XX planning for 1982 is now taking place and will be during the FY 82 operating year.

While the Department supports the concept of eliminating inappropriate federal restrictions from Alaska's social services program, we cannot recommend increases to State costs in providing its social services. An alternative is to continue the social services planning process now underway but examine the possible alternative uses of Federal Title XX funds. While Title XX funding and reporting requirements may not lend themselves to the existing service program of the Department of Health and Social Services, they may be more suited to the service delivery system of more specific programs or even of other departments. We have not explored these possibilities but suggest they should be examined prior to the state rejecting the Title XX allocation.

Title XX federal law does contain a provision for the redistribution of the unused portion of a state's allocation of Title XX funds. If Alaska does not submit a Title XX Plan or an intent to use the funds, they may be lost.

The Department recommends that rather than prepare a FY 82 budget with no Title XX funds, action be initiated to more thoroughly document existing barriers or administrative burdens created by Title XX and at the same time assist either the Division of Policy, Development and Planning or the Division of Budget and Management in the examination of alternate uses of the Federal Title XX funds. While the funds must be administered by a single state agency, that agency does not have to be the Department of Health and Social Services nor does DHSS, in our current understanding, have to be the sole user of Title XX funds.

We recommend inaction on Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 46, thus temporarily leaving Title XX responsibility and funding in the Department and requesting a study of alternative possibilities for Title XX.
