

The Senate committee substitute for CSSSHB 17 (relating to the Older Alaskans Commission) was prepared at the request of the Senate Finance Committee on May 26th after it was "read across" that morning.

When the bill came to us for drafting, we discovered an elementary drafting error in the material submitted. I called the committee staff and asked for permission to rectify the error and was informed that the bill was to be prepared without correction. We did so.

I am writing to explain the basic problem with the bill. AS 47.65.060(1) is amended so that the "office of the aging" is defined to mean "The Older Alaskans Commission". This amendment is clearly for the purpose of reassigning the responsibility for the older Alaskan service programs to the commission. But to define an "office" to be a "commission" is a confusing, ungrammatical and incorrect way to accomplish the desired result. You cannot turn an "office" into a "commission" just by saying it is so. 1/ It would be better

(and in accord with the Legislature's Drafting Manual 2/) to simply amend AS 47.65 to substitute the commission for the office on aging throughout. A definition of "commission" would be supplied and the definition of "office on aging" repealed. With the equipment and computer programs now available to us it is a relatively simple matter to produce a correct bill in a short period of time. I hope we will have that opportunity before this bill is on the calendar.

10 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

11 * Section 1. FINDINGS, PURPOSE, AND INTENT. (a) The legislature finds
12 that the changing pace of modern life, economic inflation, the infirmities
13 of advancing years, and alterations in the traditions and values of family
14 life have combined to place many older Alaskans in an unenviable position of
15 poverty and dependency that endangers their health, well-being, and safety.
16 In keeping with the inherent dignity and respect due the individual in our
17 society, older Alaskans are entitled to secure equal opportunity to the full
18 enjoyment of

19 (1) an adequate income in accordance with a decent standard of
20 living;

21 (2) sound physical and mental health, without regard to economic
22 status or condition;

23 (3) suitable housing, selected, designed, and located with refer-
24 ence to the special needs and concerns of older Alaskans at reasonable cost;

25 (4) full restorative health services for those older Alaskans in
26 need of institutional care;

27 (5) opportunity for employment without discrimination based on an
28 individual's age;

29 (6) pursuit of meaningful activity within a wide range of civic,

1 cultural, and recreational opportunities;

2 (7) efficient, coordinated in-home care and readily available
3 community social assistance;

4 (8) the benefit of knowledge gained from research which can sus-
5 tain and improve the health and happiness of older Alaskans; and

6 (9) independence and the fullest exercise of individual initia-
7 tive on the part of older Alaskans in the planning and management of their
8 lives.

9 (b) It is the purpose of this Act to assure that the years remaining
10 to people over the age of 60 are years of good health, honor, and dignity by

11 (1) providing a full range of social services, health services,
12 employment services, and educational opportunities to older Alaskans;

13 (2) giving special attention to the needs of older Alaskans in
14 the planning and delivery of state and local programs;

15 (3) improving the delivery of all public services essential to
16 the lives of older Alaskans; and

17 (4) requiring that the planning and provision of programs of
18 benefit to older Alaskans will be undertaken with the participation, knowl-
19 edge, advice, and comments of people served.

20 (c) It is the intent of this Act to exclude the Alaska Pioneers' Homes
21 and the longevity bonus program from the provisions of this Act, and to
22 exempt the Alaska Pioneers' Homes and the longevity bonus program from the
23 scope of the authority and responsibility of the Older Alaskans Commission.

24 * Sec. 2. AS 44.21 is amended by adding new sections to read:

25 ARTICLE 4. OLDER ALASKANS COMMISSION.

26 Sec. 44.21.200. OLDER ALASKANS COMMISSION. (a) The Older
27 Alaskans Commission is established in the Department of Administration.
28 The members of the commission include

29 (1) the commissioner of the Department of Administration or

his designee;

(2) the commissioner of the Department of Community and Regional Affairs or his designee;

(3) the commissioner of the Department of Health and Social Services or his designee;

(4) the chairman of the Pioneers' Homes Advisory Board appointed under AS 44.21.100 - 44.21.130; and

(5) seven Alaskans selected on the basis of their knowledge and demonstrated interest in the concerns of older Alaskans, appointed by the governor in accordance with (b) of this section.

(b) After requesting from senior citizens organizations the names of persons who are qualified for and interested in serving on the commission, the governor shall appoint the members of the commission under (a)(5) of this section. Appointments shall be made by the governor to assure representation of low-income persons and minorities, and representation from rural and urban areas of the state, and to secure statewide geographical representation on the commission. At least six of the persons appointed by the governor shall be 60 years of age or older. At least two of these persons shall be 65 years of age or older. Each member appointed by the governor shall be a resident of the state.

(c) The persons appointed under (a)(5) of this section serve overlapping four-year terms. A member may be reappointed, but no member appointed under (a)(5) of this section may serve more than two consecutive terms or eight consecutive years, whichever is longer.

(d) If a person appointed under (a)(5) of this section fails to attend three consecutive meetings of the commission, a majority of the members of the commission shall request the governor to terminate the membership of the member and to fill the vacancy.

1 (e) A vacancy in the membership of persons appointed under (a)(5)
2 of this section shall be filled by appointment by the governor. The
3 person appointed shall serve for the unexpired portion of the term.

4 Sec. 44.21.210. MEETINGS. (a) The commission shall meet at the
5 call of the chairman, at the request of a majority of the members, or
6 at a regularly scheduled time as determined by a majority of the mem-
7 bers. The commission shall meet at least six times each year.

8 (b) The members of the commission listed in AS 44.21.200(a)(1) -
9 (4) may not vote on matters before the commission. A majority of the
10 members of the commission listed in AS 44.21.200(a)(5) constitutes a
11 quorum for conducting business and exercising the powers of the commis-
12 sion.

13 (c) The commission shall elect one of its members as chairman,
14 and may select other officers it considers necessary.

15 Sec. 44.21.220. COMPENSATION. Members of the commission receive
16 no compensation for their services, but are entitled to per diem and
17 travel allowances authorized by law for other boards and commissions
18 under AS 39.20.180.

19 Sec. 44.21.230. POWERS, DUTIES AND LIMITATIONS. (a) The commis-
20 sion shall

21 (1) formulate a comprehensive statewide plan which identi-
22 fies the concerns and needs of older Alaskans and, with reference to
23 the plan adopted, prepare and submit to the governor and legislature an
24 annual analysis and evaluation of the services which are provided to
25 older Alaskans;

26 (2) make recommendations directly to the governor and legis-
27 lature with respect to legislation, regulations, and appropriations for
28 programs or services which benefit older Alaskans;

29 (3) encourage and aid the development of municipal commis-

1 sions serving older Alaskans and community-oriented programs and ser-
2 vices for the benefit of older Alaskans:

3 (4) employ an executive director who serves at the pleasure
4 of the commission;

5 (5) help older Alaskans lead dignified, independent, and
6 useful lives; and

7 (6) request and receive reports and audits from state
8 agencies and local institutions concerned with the conditions and needs
9 of older Alaskans;

10 (7) administer federal programs as provided under the Older
11 Americans Act, P.L. 89-73, as amended; and

12 (8) administer state programs as provided under AS 47.65.-
13 010 - 47.65.060.

14 (b) To accomplish its duties, the commission may

15 (1) review, evaluate and comment upon state programs con-
16 cerned with the problems and the needs of older Alaskans;

17 (2) collect facts and statistics, and make studies of condi-
18 tions and problems pertaining to the employment, health, financial
19 security, social welfare, and other concerns which bear upon the well-
20 being of older Alaskans;

21 (3) provide information about public programs which would be
22 of interest or benefit to older Alaskans;

23 (4) appoint special committees, which may include persons
24 who are not members of the commission, to complete necessary studies;

25 (5) promote community education efforts regarding the prob-
26 lems and concerns of older Alaskans;

27 (6) contract for necessary services;

28 (7) consult and cooperate with persons, organizations, and
29 groups interested in or concerned with programs of assistance to older

Alaskans;

(8) advocate improved programs of benefit to older Alaskans;
and

(9) set standards for levels of services for older Alaskans for programs administered by the commission.

(c) The commission may not investigate, review, or undertake any responsibility for the longevity bonus program (AS 47.45.010 - 47.45.-170) or the Alaska Pioneers' Homes (AS 47.25.010 - 47.25.110).

Sec. 44.21.240. DEFINITIONS. In AS 44.21.200 - 44.21.240, "commission" means the Older Alaskans Commission.

* Sec. 3. AS 39.25.120 is amended by adding a new paragraph to read:

(19) the executive director, but not other staff, of the Older Alaskans Commission located in the Department of Administration.

* Sec. 4. AS 44.66.010(a) is amended by adding a new paragraph to read:

(10) Older Alaskans Commission (AS 44.21.200) -- June 30, 1985.

* Sec. 5. AS 47.65.040 is amended to read:

Sec. 47.65.040. REQUIRED CONTRIBUTION BY SPONSOR. A sponsor receiving a grant under this chapter shall contribute to the total cost of the program or project. The contribution may be in cash or in-kind services. The amount of the sponsor's required contribution is determined by the application of the formula (average per capita full and true value of all property in the municipality or community in which the project or program takes place/average per capita full and true value of all property in the state) x contribution percentage to the estimated total program or project cost as determined by the office on aging at the time of approval of a grant application. However, the amount of the sponsor's contribution may not amount to more than 10 percent of the total program or project cost. For purposes of this

subsection.

3 (A) a program or project in a municipality or community
4 having a population of 5,000 or less is 10 percent of the total

13 in a municipality or community for which no average per capita full and
14 true property value determination has been made,

15 (A) if the population of the municipality or community
16 is 750 or more, the office on aging shall request the state
17 assessor to compute the average per capita full and true property
18 value of that municipality or community and report it;

19 (B) if the population is less than 750, the office on
20 aging may substitute for the average per capita full and true
21 value of property in the municipality or community an amount equal
22 to the average per capita full and true value of property in the
23 smallest municipality for which that amount has been determined by
24 the state assessor;

25 (3) the required contribution rate of the sponsor may not
26 exceed the contribution percentage established in (1) of this section;

27 (4) the grant awarded by the office on aging may not exceed
28 the estimated total program or project cost as determined by the office
29 on aging less the contribution by the sponsor determined in accordance

with this section.

(1) "office on aging" means the Older Alaskans Commission established in the Department of Administration [OFFICE ESTABLISHED IN THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND SOCIAL SERVICES];

* Sec. 7. AS 47.65.060(4) is amended by adding a new subparagraph to read:

(C) an educational institution.

* Sec. 8. INITIAL MEMBERSHIP AND MEETING OF COMMISSION. (a) Of the seven public members first appointed by the governor to the Older Alaskans Commission under AS 44.21.200(a)(5),

(1) three shall serve a term of two years;

(2) two shall serve a term of three years;

(3) two shall serve a term of four years.

(b) In making appointments of the first public members of the Older Alaskans Commission under AS 44.21.200(a)(5), the governor shall designate an expiration date of the terms of members first appointed in accordance with (a) of this section.

(c) The governor shall determine the date and place of the first meeting of the Older Alaskans Commission; however, that meeting shall be held not later than 60 days after the effective date of this Act.

(1) the programs conducted under the Older Americans Act, P.L. 89-73, as amended, and the persons who administer those programs in the division of adult and aging services, Department of Health and Social Services;

(2) the programs conducted under AS 47.65.010 - 47.65.060, and

1 the persons who administer those programs in the division of adult and aging
2 services, Department of Health and Social Services; and

3 (3) the Governor's Advisory Committee on Aging.

4 * Sec. 10. CONTINUING RESPONSIBILITY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ADMINISTRATION.

5 This Act does not affect the responsibility of the Department of Adminis-
6 tration for the Alaska longevity bonus program (AS 47.45.010 - 47.45.170) or
7 the Alaska Pioneers' Homes (AS 47.25.010 - 47.25.110).

8 * Sec. 11. Sections 1- 8 and 10 of this Act take effect July 1, 1981.

9 * Sec. 12. Section 9 of this Act takes effect January 1, 1982.

This fiscal note supersedes previous fiscal notes dated March 10, 1981, March 23, 1981 and April 7, 1981, copies attached. The Senate Finance Committee revision of the bill would move the Office of Aging from the Department of Health and Social Services to the Department of Administration under the Older Alaskans Commission, effective January 1, 1982.

Funding in this fiscal note represents additional costs over and above those to be transferred from the Department of Health and Social Services with the Office on Aging.

This fiscal note includes necessary support staff for the Office of Aging staff and its programs, as well as support staff for the Commission. Positions needed on January 1, 1982, are an Accounting Technician II (R 14) and a Planner II (R 19), in addition to the 23 positions to be transferred to the Department of Administration comprising the Office of Aging. The Accounting Technician will be needed in the Division of Administrative Services, Department of Administration, to administer and monitor state and federal grant funds, and make required federal reports. The Planner II position is needed to assist the Commission in its planning, studies and grant coordination functions.

This brings the total number of new positions needed to five:

Executive Director (R 24) full year
 Accounting Clerk III (R 10) full year
 Clerk Typist/Secretary (R 8) full year
 Planner II (R 19) one-half year
 Accounting Technician II (R 14) one-half year

A description of duties and justification for each is included on the attached Forms 13.

Travel costs are based on meeting at least six times per year. Therefore, travel and per diem expense is included in above costing for an eleven member commission, plus the Executive Director, and the Clerk Typist for the purpose of recording the meetings. Travel expense is also included for the Planner to meet with senior groups and one trip to Washington, D.C. to coordinate federal grants.

Since this bill does not only transfer existing programs from the Department of Health and Social Services, but also charges the Commission with new responsibilities, \$150.0 has been included for special studies. This is needed to adequately assess the needs of senior citizens and the ways in which the state can serve those needs.

An unknown amount of matching state funds may be required to obtain additional federal grants. However, the amount cannot be estimated at this time.

"An Act establishing an Older Alaskans Commission; and providing for an effective date."

The Departments of Administration, and Health and Social Services endorse the concept of a Commission to advise in planning and coordinating services for the elderly across all state departments to avoid duplication of services and to address gaps in programs and services. The services and programs operated by the State of Alaska cross divisional lines within departments and cross departmental jurisdictions. The establishment of such a commission would provide a focal point for:

1. creating needed linkages between operational programs/services regardless of jurisdiction;
2. serving as a vehicle for comprehensive long term planning;
3. addressing short term management issues such as providing recommendations regarding the allocation of yearly budget resources for programs affecting the elderly; and,
4. recommending policy and administrative improvements with respect to all public services affecting older Alaskans.

Although the establishment of a Commission is supported, the following is recommended:

1. amend Section 2 to delete Section 44.21.230. (a) (5) regarding the administration of federal funds;
2. amend Section 2 to delete Section 44.21.230. (b) (6) regarding application and acceptance of grants for programs;
3. delete Section 4, "Transfer of Program Responsibilities"

We do not support the transfer of the responsibilities for aging programs from the Division of Adult and Aging Services, Department of Health and Social Services, to the Older Alaskans Commission. We believe that removal of the aging programs and the staff responsible for these programs from the Department of Health and Social Services would:

1. fragment service delivery;
2. hinder the provision of a continuum of services to older Alaskans; and,
3. dilute the objectivity of the Commission if it were responsible for the daily administration of aging programs.

If an Older Alaskan Commission is established, however, it would be feasible to have a subcommittee of the Commission to serve in an advisory capacity to the aging programs of the Division of Adult and Aging Services. The Governor's Advisory Committee on Aging could continue in its role until the Commission is established and could be phased out following a transition period. This would eliminate duplicative functions.

In conclusion, if the bill is amended to delete the sections cited above, we would support its passage. The establishment of a Commission would enhance efforts to promote the independence of older Alaskans and would augment the efforts of the Department of Health and Social Services in the further development and implementation of a continuum of services to the elderly. In addition, an Older Alaskans Commission would contribute to the ongoing coordination efforts of the Departments of Administration, Community and Regional Affairs, and Health and Social Services.



"An Act establishing an Older Alaskans Commission; and providing for an effective date."

The Departments of Administration, and Health and Social Services endorse the concept of a Commission to advise in planning and coordinating services for the elderly across all state departments to avoid duplication of services and to address gaps in programs and services. The services and programs operated by the State of Alaska cross divisional lines within departments and cross departmental jurisdictions. The establishment of such a commission would provide a focal point for:

1. creating needed linkages between operational programs/services regardless of jurisdiction;
2. serving as a vehicle for comprehensive long term planning;
3. addressing short term management issues such as providing recommendations regarding the allocation of yearly budget resources for programs affecting the elderly; and,
4. recommending policy and administrative improvements with respect to all public services affecting older Alaskans.

Although the establishment of a Commission is supported, the following is recommended:

1. amend Section 2 to delete Section 44.21.230. (a) (5) regarding the administration of federal funds;
2. amend Section 2 to delete Section 44.21.230. (b) (6) regarding application and acceptance of grants for programs;
3. delete Section 4, "Transfer of Program Responsibilities"


We do not support the transfer of the responsibilities for aging programs from the Division of Adult and Aging Services, Department of Health and Social Services, to the Older Alaskans Commission. We believe that removal of the aging programs and the staff responsible for these programs from the Department of Health and Social Services would:

1. fragment service delivery;
2. hinder the provision of a continuum of services to older Alaskans; and,
3. dilute the objectivity of the Commission if it were responsible for the daily administration of aging programs.

If an Older Alaskan Commission is established, however, it would be feasible to have a subcommittee of the Commission to serve in an advisory capacity to the aging programs of the Division of Adult and Aging Services. The Governor's Advisory Committee on Aging could continue in its role until the Commission is established and could be phased out following a transition period. This would eliminate duplicative functions.

In conclusion, if the bill is amended to delete the sections cited above, we would support its passage. The establishment of a Commission would enhance efforts to promote the independence of older Alaskans and would augment the efforts of the Department of Health and Social Services in the further development and implementation of a continuum of services to the elderly. In addition, an Older Alaskans Commission would contribute to the ongoing coordination efforts of the Departments of Administration, Community and Regional Affairs, and Health and Social Services.





These positions are the minimum needed to perform the administrative functions of the program, considering the complexities of administering state and federal funds and coordination of all elderly programs within the State of Alaska.

Rationale for each new position shown above, and description of duties, is included on the attached Forms 13.

Travel costs are based on meeting at least six times per year. Therefore, travel and per diem expense is included in above costing for an eleven member commission, plus the Executive Director, and the Clerk Typist for the purpose of recording the meetings. Travel expense is also included for the Planner to meet with senior groups and one trip to Washington, D.C. to coordinate federal grants.

Funding in this fiscal note represents additional costs over and above those to be transferred from the Department of Health and Social Services with the Office on Aging.

Inflation is computed at 10% per year for years beyond FY 82. Inflation is included in all categories, except for one time purchases of equipment items. Items of equipment for years beyond FY 82 are for replacement of worn out office furnishings only.

An unknown amount of matching state funds may be required to obtain additional federal grants. However, the amount cannot be estimated at this time.

For those older Alaskans who have lived in the state for longer than 25 years, there is the Alaska Longevity Bonus. This is worth \$200 per month for about 8,000 persons.

There is the Property Tax Exemption for seniors who are homeowners, and a Renters' Rebate for seniors who rent. As of FY '80, the homeowner program served about 3,600 persons with an average benefit of \$556; the renters' program served about 1,050 persons with an average benefit of \$268. This latter program was increased last session.

There is a Senior Housing program which has assisted in the construction of about 300 units of congregate housing with, perhaps, another 150 units soon to come on line. There's a Special Assessments program and a Winterization program.

The Office on Aging channels almost \$6 million in Older Americans' Act monies into about two dozen local communities throughout the state for the benefit of older Alaskans. There is a Senior Community Employment Program which provides employment opportunities for about 91 persons over the age of 55.

There is \$1 million in grants for Older Alaskans Service program.

There is a Homemakers-Home Health Aide program which assists about 500 persons; Medicaid which primarily is spent on about 400 persons in nursing homes; and General Relief Medical, of which seven percent of the budget is spent on the elderly.

For retired state employees and teachers, there is a good pension program. The University of Alaska offers free tuition to older Alaskans. Fish and Game provides free and permanent hunting and fishing licenses. The Marine Highway system offers free travel on the ferries for older Alaskans.

All totalled, in FY '80 the state plans to spend \$57,917,156 for benefits and services for approximately 20,000 older Alaskans, half of whom are over the age of 65.

How is the money administered? Who makes the decisions affecting us older Alaskans? At present, we are in the hands of three or four different departments, half a dozen different divisions and at least 24 different program managers.

Why not a single agency - an Older Alaskans Commission to develop a coordinated, comprehensive plan to enhance all these programs? Why not take a step forward in kindness on behalf of the elderly who are frustrated by the fragmentation in the delivery of these services and the poor planning in the development of these benefits? Finding one's way around is exhausting.

And why not include on this commission informed, aggressive men and women over 60 and over 65 as knowledgeable advocates? Let older Alaskans monitor their own programs, not merely recommend.

Why not focus on quality care, standards and economical administration? All of us over 60 years of age have lived through the Great Depression and have learned how to cope. Who knows better than we, what we need?

Why not structure this Older Alaskans Commission to develop a community-based, home-centered network of services and benefits?

We need a better delivery system, greater employment opportunities and more biomedical research on the aging process.

The state has been a great help to us, but why not let us help ourselves?

In December of 1979, Dr. Arthur Fleming (who is in his 70's) of the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights, decried the image of men and women considered "on the shelf" at age 60. He explained that non-involvement in the community and marketplace leads to physical, mental and spiritual deterioration. He predicted that legislation soon will remove all age barriers to employment.

Take advantage of us. Use us. Allow us to help you.

A majority of the 20,000 older Alaskans request our legislators and our governor to grant us self determination and our civil rights by creating an Older Alaskans Commission.

I have in hand a copy of House Bill 17 presented by Senator Rodey and his man Kelly.

As currently written, H.B. 17 does not specifically exclude the Pioneer Homes nor the Longevity Bonus programs from the scope of their authority under the commission created by the bill. We want no QUESTION of legislative intent on this bill insofar as the Pioneer programs are concerned.

Questions could arise in the forth coming future as to the scope, meaning and the intent of the words CONTINUING RESPONSIBILITY, whether this was to exclude the older Alaskans commission from acting in an advisory capacity.

We do support the admendment which excludes the Pioneer Home and Longevity program from the jurisdiction responsibility as proposed sponsor substitute H.B. 17 and Longevity Bonus program AS47.45.


