



8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 * Section 1. PURPOSE. The year 1984 will mark the 25th Anniversary of
10 Alaskan statehood. The same year will also be the bicentennial of the first
11 permanent Russian settlement in Alaska established by Gregory Shelikof at
12 Kodiak and the centennial of the passage of the Alaska Organic Act. These
13 historical anniversaries, especially the commemoration of Alaska's first
14 quarter century as a member of the United States, combine to present Alaska
15 with a unique opportunity to both celebrate and inform others about our
16 history and our unique and diverse cultures. A coordinated planned effort
17 culminating in 1984 will improve the general understanding of Alaska and
18 foster a sense of unity and community among all Alaskans. A statewide
19 celebration will provide a vehicle to increase Alaska tourism and develop
20 new markets and products for the renewable and nonrenewable resources of
21 Alaska. The celebration, together with pre-celebration publicity and activi-
22 ties, will focus positive national and international attention on Alaska and
23 its increasing role and position in the Pacific Rim. The creation of an
24 Alaska Silver Anniversary Commission is important to the realization of
25 these goals.

26 * Sec. 2. ALASKA SILVER ANNIVERSARY COMMISSION. (a) There is estab-
27 lished in the Department of Commerce and Economic Development an Alaska
28 Silver Anniversary Commission.

29 (b) The commission consists of seven members appointed by the governor.

1 Two of the members shall be state officials and the remaining five public
2 members shall be residents representing the various areas of the state. The
3 appointments shall be made within 30 days after the effective date of this
4 Act. Members of the commission serve during its existence unless removed by
5 the governor. A vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the governor.
6 The governor shall appoint a chairman from the membership of the commission.
7 A majority of the commission constitutes a quorum for the transaction of
8 business of the commission.

9 (c) Members of the commission serve without compensation but are
10 entitled to per diem and travel allowances authorized for boards and commis-
11 sions under AS 39.20.180.

12 (d) The commission shall meet at the call of the chairman of the
13 commission, at the request of a majority of the members of the commission,
14 and at regularly scheduled times as determined by a majority of the members
15 of the commission. The commission shall meet at least six times a year.
16 The first meeting of the commission shall be within 60 days of the effective
17 date of this Act.

18 * Sec. 3. DUTIES OF THE COMMISSION. The commission shall .

19 (1) solicit proposals from throughout the state for celebrating
20 the silver anniversary of the state, including plans for local, regional,
21 and statewide projects, activities, and facilities together with data con-
22 cerning the costs and benefits of those proposals;

23 (2) develop a statewide silver anniversary master plan which is
24 coordinated with existing and proposed local activities, projects, and
25 facilities throughout the state and which includes a statewide schedule of
26 statewide activities, financial data concerning the costs and benefits of
27 the activities, projects and facilities, and publicity and marketing sugges-
28 tions;

29 (3) submit the proposed silver anniversary master plan to the

1 Second Session of the Twelfth Legislature;

2 (4) involve citizens around the state in the planning process as
3 well as participating in the actual celebration activities;

4 (5) provide a positive opportunity for citizens of Alaska to work
5 together on a project of statewide importance;

6 (6) promote the participation of Pacific Rim nations and other
7 interested countries in the celebration;

8 (7) submit a final report and accounting of the activity of the
9 commission to be presented to the governor and the Second Session of the
10 Thirteenth Legislature;

11 (8) employ an executive director who serves at the pleasure of
12 the commission and is in the partially exempt service under AS 39.25.120;

13 (9) prescribe the duties of the executive director of the commis-
14 sion and fix his compensation.

15 * Sec. 4. POWERS OF THE COMMISSION. The commission may

16 (1) enter into contracts necessary to accomplish the duties of
17 the commission;

18 (2) receive and dispose of gifts and donations;

19 (3) appoint special committees, which may include persons not
20 members of the commission to assist the commission;

21 (4) conduct a community educational program to explain the goals
22 and purpose of the commission to the people of the state;

23 (5) provide information concerning the celebration of the Alaska
24 silver anniversary to people outside the state;

25 (6) coordinate the efforts of local communities interested in
26 participating in the celebration of the Alaska silver anniversary.

27 * Sec. 5. DEFINITION. In this Act "commission" means the Alaska Silver
28 Anniversary Commission.

29 * Sec. 6. TERMINATION. All powers granted by this Act terminate on

1 December 31, 1984 or when the duties established by this Act are accomp-
2 lished, whichever occurs first.

3 * Sec. 7. This Act takes effect July 1, 1981.

11 Sec. 43.23.065. EXEMPTION OF PERMANENT FUND DIVIDENDS. Fifty
12 percent of the annual permanent fund dividend payable to an individual
13 is exempt from levy, execution, garnishment, attachment, or any other
14 remedy for the collection of debt. This exemption applies to an
15 eligible individual's permanent fund dividend both before and after
16 payment is made to the individual. An [NO] exemption is not available
17 under this section for permanent fund dividends taken to satisfy (1)
18 child support obligations required by court order or decision of the
19 child support enforcement agency under AS 47.23.140 - 47.23.220: (2) a
20 debt owed by an eligible individual to an agency of the state, unless
21 the debt is contested and an appeal is pending, or the time limit for
22 filing an appeal has not expired. A child support obligation under
23 (1) of this section has priority over a debt owed to an agency of the
24 state, and a permanent fund dividend may not be taken to satisfy a
25 debt under (2) of this section until any portion of the dividend
26 necessary to satisfy a child support obligation has been taken.

A. Assumptions

1. The PFD program is retained and there are no substantive changes to the current program.
2. Individual dividend payments over the next five years are as follows:

Dividend Year	84	85	86	87	88
Paid in FY	85	86	87	88	89
Dividend Amount	\$357	\$431	\$514	\$564	\$606

3. The average accounts receivable (a/r) attachment is estimated to amount to 84-88% of the value of an attached dividend. Currently 1982 PFD a/r attachments average approximately 44% of the value of dividends attached while 1983 PFD a/r attachments average approximately 48%. Accordingly, we could expect an increase of approximately 40% of each dividend attached.
4. The number of a/r attachments on PFD applications is likely to decrease 10% per year until FY '86 and then by 50% per year. This change will result largely from the lapsing of the 6 year statute of limitations on the repeal of income taxes in 1978. Under this scenario the number of attachments would likely be as follows:

B. Program Summary

The legislative intent added by the House Finance Committee will in certain cases, require a hearing officer to evaluate the effect of allowing the state to attach 100% of an eligible applicant's Permanent Fund Dividend to satisfy debts owed to the State. 

Dear Friends:

Enclosed is a summary of the Village Participation Conference held in Juneau March 30 through April 2nd. This conference is sponsored by the Bureau of Indian Affairs, Area Office, and RurAL CAP. The 68 delegates attending this conference were selected based on their residency in a Village and involvement in Village affairs. The VPC was structured with three major components:

- I. Guest speakers and Civics
- II. Delegates workshops
- III. Delegates presentation of their work plans

The guest speakers included John Schaeffer, President of NANA Corporation, who discussed the importance and realities of people solving their own problems. He outlined a program that places emphasis on individual and community values rather than money as the solution to all Village problems.

The Civics presentors provided information about laws pertaining to IRA councils, traditional councils and a historical perspective of aboriginal rights questions in Alaska. The Legislative Affairs office also discussed the process for making laws and State Elections explained reapportionment and Village Voter Registration. Alaska Legal Services talked with delegates about resolution preparation.

The Delegates had the opportunity to meet in Anchorage in early February to discuss their life in the Villages. During that workshop they identified the positive things about Village life and concerns they have. These concerns fall generally into five major categories: Education, Subsistence, Energy, Health and Safety, and Alcohol/Drug Abuse.

The entire second day of the Village Participation Conference, delegates worked in small groups discussing the issues and designing workplans. Delegates outlined within the workplan what Villages can do to solve each respective issue and what action the State may need to take.

The third day of the Conference provides a forum for the delegates to present their workplans to various State agency representatives and elected officials. This session also allows those attending to ask questions and exchange perspectives about the issue and the proposed solutions.

We appreciate your interest in this Conference and your continued support for the development of reasonable State plans and policies that affect people living in rural Alaska.



ALCOHOL/DRUG ABUSE WORKSHOP

STATEMENT OF THE ISSUE: The alcohol/drug abuse workshop committee recognizes that alcohol and drug abuse remains as Alaska's number one public health problem and that it continues to be rampant throughout the State. However, as a result of the work done over the years by concerned citizens throughout Alaska, the Legislature and the Governor of this State, we are now seeing a positive tone in the message that many of the delegates have brought to this conference.

Since the passage of legislation amending Title 4 of the Alaska Statutes in 1980 and 1981, local option elections have taken place in over 20 communities and dramatic decreases in alcohol-related crime and accidents have taken place. Other communities around the State are presently contemplating holding elections to exercise local determination on the issue of importation and sale of alcohol. We commend local initiatives to that end.

WORKSHOP STRUCTURE: (1) Review Anchorage Village Participation Workshop.
(2) Discuss additional issues. (3) Consolidation of recommendations.

WORKSHOP OVERVIEW: Commend Legislature and Governor for enacting workable, usable local option legislation. Support passage of HB 112 (SB 71): authorizes an advisory vote at the November general election on whether to raise the legal drinking age to 21. Support passage of HB 574 (HB 117, SB 117): shorten hours for sale of alcoholic beverages. Support funding of alcohol/drug programs as proposed in HB 666. Support passage of SB 833, requiring that individuals be licensed to buy alcoholic beverages.

POSITION PAPER

HOUSE BILL 574

"An Act relating to the hours of the day during which patrons may be present or alcohol sold or consumed on licensed premises".

The Department of Health and Social Services is highly supportive of a reduction in hours that licensed premises may legally be open.

Presently it is legal for licensed premises to sell alcohol twenty-four hours a day in Nevada and Louisiana. With the exception of these two states Alaska currently has more legal hours of sale than any of the remaining forty-seven states. Further limitation on hours of sale may result in some lowering of per capita consumption, alcohol related human and social costs, and some modification of attitude concerning the wide open acceptability of drinking in Alaska.

The City and Borough of Juneau, by local election, reduced licensed premise sales by fifteen hours per week in September, 1979. According to reports by police and social agencies alcohol related offenses such as OMVI, liquor law violations, minors consuming, disorderly conduct, and assault decreased when the earlier closing hours became effective.

Similar decreases are being reported in Anchorage where licensed premises hours recently were reduced.

The Office of Alcoholism and Drug Abuse would be pleased to provide additional information on this bill.
