1. Sec. ~~269~~ amends Chapter 90, SLA81, Sec 55 by extending the lapse date of an appropriation for Northwest Coal Investigations from June 30, 1982 to June 30, 1983. Because the budget was appropriated so late last year, field investigations could not be fully concluded during the summer of 1981. This change will allow DNR to continue field work through the current summer field season.

2. Sec. ~~270~~ amends Chapter 82, SLA81, Sec.. 29 by extending the lapse date for land disposal survey funds contained in HB 31 from June 30, 1982 to June 30, 1983. Land disposal surveys are a seasonal activity and cross two fiscal years, therefore, land survey funds have historically been placed in the capital budget. In FY 82, however, these funds appeared as part of the fiscal note to HB 31. The funds were labelled "capital" in HB 31, but Budget and Management has determined that fiscal notes cannot commingle operating and capital funds. Approval of this amendment simply re-confirms original legislative intent.

3. Sec. ~~270~~ amends Chapter 82, SLA 81, Sec. 28 by extending the lapse date for Historic Resource Management funds from June 30, 1982 to June 30, 1983. These funds were contained in the FY 82 Operating Budget. Extending the lapse date on this appropriation would carry over into FY 83 approximately \$140.0 of otherwise lapsing funds. This extension will allow the Department to receive approximately \$250.0 in federal funds which will not be available if this change is not approved.

4. Sec. ~~252~~ appropriates \$1,000.0 to DNR for cadastral land survey for the purpose of land disposals. DNR's original survey budget was \$8,800.0, was subsequently reduced to \$5,000.0, and finally, was reduced to \$4,000.0. In order to absorb budget cuts of this magnitude, DNR reduced subdivision and homesite acreage (which averages \$400 per acre in survey costs) while maintaining remote and agricultural acreage (which averages \$10 - \$15 per acre in survey costs) at their original levels. The result was that subdivision and

homesite acreage was cut from 12,000 acres to 4,000 acres. The addition of \$1,000.0 in survey funds will add 2,000-2,500 acres of subdivisions and homesites to the FY 84 disposal plan.

This is written testimony on SB 643, sections 247 and 248, 247 was requested by the Governor's Office, Division of Budget and Management.

Section 247 electrical power generation on the north slope for the railbelt. Section 248, the all Alaska gasline to tidewater.

Starting with Sec. 247, electrical generation on the north slope for the railbelt:

(1) Electrical power for the Matanuska-Susitna, Anchorage and Kenai Boroughs can be generated and delivered cheaper from Cook Inlet gas even if the North Slope Gas were to be given away. I don't see that there would be much dispute about that.

2) That just leaves the Fairbanks area. Power could be generated from coal for less than the cost of the powerline from the north slope to Fairbanks.

3) Alaska is already committed to the Anchorage Fairbanks intertie so why not use it; generate power from cheap Cook Inlet Gas and wheel it to Fairbanks on the intertie.

Questions have been raised as to the long term availability of gas in Cook Inlet. When the Pacific Lighting LNG project looked like it might be constructed, Pacific Lighting started exploring for gas; their wildcat success ratio was 50 percent. The national average is one in ten. Exploration in Cook Inlet has always been for oil. Gas was found a a poor second prize. Pacific Lighting group has been the only one to look for gas as gas. It has been extremely successful; however, their LNG project never got off the ground and further exploration has been discontinued.

Stanford Research Institute did a study of the Cook Inlet Gas potential and concluded there was at least twice as much gas as had been found. Only one-third of the proven reserves of seven trillion cubic feet is under contract. Those who own the gas won't contract for sale of the gas because actual use and payment is so far away.

Phillips Petroleum is up against some lease obligations and is required to either drill, lease or loose it. Phillips believes the chances

are good that they will hit a giant field in Cook Inlet in the next year or so.

Last, there is simply no way that power from the slope can compete with power generated locally, Fairbanks, or from Cook Inlet. It would be substantially cheaper than any other kind of power.

Sec. 249 the all Alaska gasline to tidewater, Valdez or COok Inlet? To do what? Ship gas as gas or a product? Cook Inlet is a better choice for a terminal and was supported by FERC, it doesn't make any real difference anyway. You're talking about gas at \$16 per mcf at the end of the pipeline and at the inlet to the liquification plant or the chemical plant. \$16 is equal to residual oil at \$100 a barrel, oil at \$140 a barrel, or coal at \$240 a ton, about ten times the real price of coal. Even if Alaskans could ultimately get all the subsidy etc. of the Alcan gasline, plus a terminal site in the south '48 you are talking about years of delay.

Assuming you know almost all of the problems with the gasline proposals, here is the guts of the basic reason why no gasline from Alaska will ever work. Alaska gas will deliver at more than \$30 per mcf to the south '48, even if Alaska went to McMillian's zero well head value, no Alaska severance taxes and forbearance on the pipeline profits, the price of gas could not be driven below \$25 per mcf.

The average interstate price of gas will probably be \$5 per mcf by that time. Alaska gas will cost five to six times as much. In the south '48 you will be able to buy all gas you want for \$8 which is equal to coal at \$130 a ton ~~at \$50~~ or oil at \$70. In short, you will be able to buy three times as much or more south '48 gas for the same rule in price base as you can Alaska gas.

There is serious question if the gas distribution companies will be able to sell to gas to commercial and industrial customers at \$5, that is coal at \$80 a ton, and large consumers of gas are bailing out at \$3 gas.

Now, if you were a gas distributor you're going to buy the most gas you can for the dollars spent; Alaska's gas is simply not saleable. The south '48 gas distributors are simply not going to waste whatever "roll-in" price base they may have on Alaska's gas, thus, the studies are simply not warranted.

Shutin gas supply has reached an estimated 15,000 wells and 12 trillion cubic feet of reserves in Alberta due to slumping export markets, declining domestic demands, and successful exploration in recent years.

Surplus of Canadian crude presents another problem

The campaign to win a created exports for gas is near the top of the list of Canadian industry concerns and efforts this year. But there also is a problem with the Canadian crude oil market.

Spare productive capacity last month reached about 100,000 b/d—250,000 b/d in Alberta and 50,000 b/d in Saskatchewan—compared with an average shut-in volume of about 18,000 b/d of light and heavy crude during 1979-81.

Alberta's Petroleum Marketing Commission estimates that spare capacity will drop sharply this month because of completion of refinery turnarounds and reduced purchases of imports. The commission figures that spare productive capacity will drop to 70,000 b/d in Alberta alone.

The federal government re-

sponded to requests from the industry and producing provinces with steps to improve sales of heavy oil.

It also asked Canadian refiners not to buy crude oil on the spot market, where imports are cheaper than domestic oil when the government's import compensation program is taken into account. The country normally imports 400,000 b/d.

The oil surplus problem is relatively new. Industry blames a combination of declining domestic demand and Ottawa's import compensation program.

Federal action, Federal Energy Minister Marc Lalonde told senior executives of 10 major oil companies to pare import contracts to minimum levels and not to buy spot crude at the expense of western Canadian oil. He also announced a num-

ber of other steps, including a \$24/bbl reduction in the heavy oil export charge.

In addition, the National Energy Board will examine heavy oil export applications for terms of as long as 1 year instead of on a quarterly basis if exports are surplus to domestic requirements. NEB also will consider exchanges of light western crude, in addition to heavy oil swaps now used.

The board will review its system for allocating light crude into eastern Canada to create more incentives for eastern refiners to use domestic supplies where possible. And NEB will study whether light Saskatchewan sour crude can be made available for export.

Lalonde said if these steps are not effective the government will consider a reduction in the oil import compensation

payment which it makes to importers to cover the difference between Canada's generally lower domestic prices and world prices.

What Alberta wants. Alberta, which accounts for about 86% of Canada's production of 1.4 million b/d of crude and condensate, says it is not impressed by federal actions to alleviate the oil marketing problem. It will press for a permanent solution to what it sees as a continuing problem. Wayne Minion, chairman of Alberta's Petroleum Marketing Commission, said the province will seek a number of changes, including:

- Elimination of the oil import compensation program because "if there were no compensation program, I have no doubt that every barrel of oil that Alberta produces could be sold."

- Approval for light crude exports to the U.S. Canada has not exported light crude since

1979. Minion says if federal policies prevent light crude from being sold in Canada, there is no reason why it should not be exported.

- A program which restricts imports into eastern Canada and guarantees markets for Canadian crude.

Alberta charges that the federal compensation program which allows refiners to buy spot oil and some heavy crudes at lower than domestic prices is a main cause of the current surplus.

Ottawa denies this and says a major cause is the decline in domestic demand for petroleum products.

Oil industry spokesmen believe the federal program will be of some benefit, particularly to heavy oil producers.

Ian Smythe, executive director of the Canadian Petroleum Association, said the federal moves are positive and appear to offer a framework for improvement if administrators im-

plement the program within a reasonable time. The proposal to consider longer terms for heavy oil export licenses is seen as one of the most significant parts of the federal package.

Canada exports about half of its heavy oil production because Canadian refiners cannot process it, but exports of this category of oil have declined by more than 25,000 b/d.

Import compensation. Most industry spokesmen say there will be no significant improvement in the marketing outlook for light crude until the federal government amends its oil import compensation program.

Ottawa pays a flat rate subsidy to importers based on international prices, regardless of the grade of crude involved.

Recently, the net compensation paid on imported crude was about \$11.15/bbl. Mexican heavy crude selling at about \$33/bbl could be bought for \$9/bbl less than competitive Canadian crude.

Shut-in gas supply has reached an estimated 15,000 wells and 12 trillion cu ft of reserves in Alberta due to slumping export markets, declining domestic demand, and successful exploration in recent years.

Gas reserves increased 4% in 1981 to 70.5 trillion cu ft despite a 32% decline in the number of gas wells drilled.

Total consumption during 1981, including exports, was 1.8 trillion cu ft. U.S. buyers are taking only about 65% of authorized export volumes because of resistance to Canadian prices, weak demand, and increases in U.S. domestic supplies.

Canada's gas surplus problem has been building for several years because additions to reserves have far outstripped declining demand in softening markets.

The industry sees exports as the key to solving the gas surplus problem. A major effort is under way by industry and the Alberta government to persuade the federal government and its regulatory agency, the National Energy Board (NEB), to open the gates to additional gas sales to the U.S.

In a ruling last September which stunned the industry and producing provinces, NEB agreed that Alberta has 12 trillion cu ft of shut-in gas but said Canada has no additional gas available for export on the basis of its present formulas for calculating sur-

pluses. The formulas take into account future domestic needs and volumes under contract for export.

Alberta Premier Peter Lougheed said he intends to make proposals and hold discussions with the federal government on a new gas market strategy aimed at increasing exports.

Lougheed said there must be a thorough examination of the price and contract conditions for the sale of Canadian natural gas to the U.S.

Discussions will be initiated with all parties involved to develop contracts, including pricing provisions, which will meet the interests of buyers, sellers, and regulatory authorities in both countries," he said.

The Alberta premier said the present federal policy of a single gas export price "ignores the fact that the competitive price for Canadian natural gas is much different in different regions of the U.S."

Alberta is aiming its negotiating guns directly at current federal policies, particularly a Canadian export price of \$4.94 U.S./Mcf. By comparison, the average wellhead price in the U.S. was only \$2.26/Mcf last December, the latest month for which full data are available.

Industry campaign. Meanwhile, the industry is campaigning hard to persuade NEB to change its methods of calculating surpluses and its rules governing delivery arrangements to

U.S. customers.

The federal government said last September when it signed a new energy agreement with Alberta that "subject to overriding national interests" it would approve more gas exports if the NEB changed its present estimates and declared a surplus.

NEB recently completed hearings at which it heard almost universal requests from industry to reexamine its present methods of calculating surpluses and to permit additional exports.

The board is expected to reply in July. It will then deal with 16 pending applications for new export approvals or changes to existing export permits involving more than 10 trillion cu ft of gas.

Producers believe that NEB will change its rules to permit added exports. But how much the board will be prepared to ease its present restrictions is a multibillion dollar guess.

Deliverability test. TransCanada Pipelines Ltd., Canada's largest gas buyer and transmission company, spoke for much of the industry when it criticized the deliverability test currently used by the NEB to calculate surpluses.

In its brief to the NEB hearings, TransCanada said, "The current deliverability test, in effect, incorporates demand as a moving picture while assessing supply as a snapshot. It

thereby discounts completely the results of future exploration/development efforts by an industry investing \$13 billion/year in such efforts."

The main target of the industry is the current deliverability test used by the NEB to calculate surpluses which resulted in its conclusion last year that Canada has no surplus for export.

Industry contends that the test is far too conservative and does not recognize "trend" gas, or deliverability from expected reserves additions. In this test, NEB considers only the deliverability of existing gas wells and those which can now be connected to pipelines on the basis of present economics.

The board also assumes that domestic consumption will continue to increase and that U.S. buyers will take all volumes under contract.

In fact, U.S. buyers have been taking considerably less than the maximum volumes in recent years, and domestic demand has been sluggish.

During the NEB hearings, a number of intervenors asked the NEB to scrap its current deliverability test.

They said the board should base its conclusions on a future deliverability test which looks 10 years ahead and considers trend gas and a simple reserves test. The reserves test estimates domestic demand for 25 years ahead on the basis of present levels of consumption as well as presently autho-

rized exports.

Other intervenors such as TransCanada proposed changes in the current deliverability test to include trend gas based on projections of recent levels of reserve additions of about 3.5 trillion cu ft/year.

TransCanada suggested that the NEB could use the formula with a safety factor that reserve additions would drop by 10%/year for the first 5 years, then remain steady. The company said this formula would allow an exportable surplus of 6.5 trillion cu ft under the current deliverability test based on reserves at the end of 1981.

TransCanada also said the NEB should not base its calculations on the assumption that U.S. customers will take maximum authorized export volumes but on forecasts of what they are likely to take.

Don Armstrong, a McGill University economist and witness for TransCanada, pointed out when NEB said there was no exportable surplus in 1981, there were surpluses under the current deliverability test projected through 1981-84 and a small deficiency of about 100 billion cu ft in 1985.

Petro-Canada proposal. One of the most controversial proposals to deal with the gas surplus was made at the NEB hearings by Petro-Canada, Canada's national oil company.

Petro-Canada said U.S. buyers who

are not taking their full contract volumes should lose the right to purchase some of these volumes in later years.

Under present averaging provisions, a U.S. customer which does not take its full authorized volumes has the right to take the gas later.

Petro-Canada proposed that a customer who has a contract to take 1 billion cfd but has taken an average of only 800 MMcfd in a previous 3 year period would have its authorized export volume in the following year cut to the level of its average take in the previous 3 years.

Petro-Canada also suggested an alternative that U.S. customers still be allowed to take gas in later years provided it was paid for now, or "prepaid."

A number of other intervenors opposed the Petro-Canada proposal and said the current averaging system works well over a period of time. Alberta & Southern Gas Ltd. said that during a period of 20 years its major customer, Pacific Gas & Electric Co. has taken 96.6% of full contract volumes.

"The total volume of gas exported by Alberta & Southern to date is higher than it would have been otherwise, and the price obtained for that incremental gas was higher than if it had been exported on schedule," Alberta & Southern said.

Utilities Swamped With Oil, Coal and Gas By Long-Term Contracts Struggle to Cope

Power companies are finding that long-term supply contracts have left them saddled with oil, coal and natural gas they don't need.

The problem reflects lagging demand for electricity and volatile energy prices.

Commonwealth Edison Co. in Chicago faces penalty fees of as much as \$88 million if it doesn't keep up its end of an oil-purchase contract. The utility also is spending millions to carry excess coal inventory.

In California, Southern California Edison Co. is being sued by Standard Oil Co. of California's Chevron USA unit for stopping oil deliveries. Pacific Gas & Electric Co. also has stopped buying oil it ordered.

In Canada, TransCanada Pipelines Ltd., controlled by Dome Petroleum Ltd., is offering \$1.32 billion (Canadian) to buy its way

out of long-term natural gas purchase agreements.

The problem worsens the predicament of utilities, many of which are struggling to hold down rates and build new plants. In the 1970s, power companies eagerly signed long-term agreements to insure supplies—often at the insistence of state regulatory commissions. Now the same commissions are challenging those contracts.

As a result, utilities are caught between demands of their regulators and suppliers. For some companies, the outcome is likely to be a spate of lawsuits and stingy rate increases.

"Many utilities grossly overestimated demand for electricity," says Alvin Kaufman, an economist at the Congressional Research Service in Washington, D.C. Growth in the nation's demand for electricity, which was 8.4% in 1972, shrank to 1% last year. "It's a poker game all the utilities play," Mr. Kaufman says.

But now the rules of the game will have to change, experts say. "Fuel procurement has to be keyed to the dramatic swings in fuel prices we've experienced in the last 10 years," says Michael V. Hasten, chairman of the Illinois Commerce Commission.

Rapid Price Changes

The price of imported oil has risen 10-fold since 1972 to about \$34 a barrel, while the price of natural gas jumped 14-fold to \$2.63 a thousand cubic feet. "Utility managers should get a very clear message they can't negotiate long-term contracts as if prices were stable," Mr. Hasten says.

Commonwealth Edison is having more trouble than most. Besides the possible \$88 million in oil-contract penalties, the company has been hit with three suits from western coal suppliers charging the utility with reneging on purchase orders. They are asking for \$62.1 million in damages.

The Illinois commission recently disclosed that Commonwealth has a 170-day supply of coal, nearly twice the amount considered sufficient, which may cost the company as much as \$37 million in inventory costs this year. The commission, meanwhile, has frozen the utility's fuel-adjustment formula, which normally allows it to pass along changes in fuel costs to consumers.

"A lot of consumer advocates say we should have seen the writing on the wall. That's nonsense," a Commonwealth spokesman says. When the oil contract was signed in 1972, the utility was projecting a 7.5% annual increase in electricity demand. That forecast has plunged to 2%-a-year growth. As a result, the company is desperately trying to stop burning oil, which costs \$35 to \$37 a barrel under the contract. That's 1.5 times its cost of natural gas, three times the cost of coal and 16 times the cost of nuclear fuel, Commonwealth says.

Wary Fuel Suppliers

Fuel suppliers are anxious about the utilities' commitment to long-term agreements. "No supplier is likely to enter into a fuel contract with a utility or make investments to fulfill the utility's requirements" if power companies can back out when it suits them, says Kenneth T. Derr, president of California Standard's Chevron USA unit.

Chevron spent more than \$300 million in the mid-1970s to modernize its Richmond, Calif., refinery and build a new refinery at El Segundo designed to supply low-sulfur oil to PG&E and to Southern California Edison. Now, Chevron is losing "many millions of dollars" because the utilities stopped taking oil last month, Chevron says in a suit against Southern California Edison.

In addition to damages, the suit asks a judge to establish the contract responsibilities of the two companies. Experts say this could challenge frequently used force majeure clauses, which excuse contract obligations if the company is affected by events beyond its control, such as war, weather or government intervention.

Last month, the California Public Utilities Commission ordered PG&E to stop buying \$40-a-barrel oil from Chevron to save consumers \$95 million a year. While the commission hasn't ordered Southern California Edison to stop, the utility insists it would have been faced with the same force majeure order as PG&E. "We saw the handwriting on the wall," a company spokesman says. "We're charged by the commission to have economical rates."

Ratepayer's Interests Cited

"Our responsibility is to the ratepayers, not to Chevron," says Leonard M. Grimes, one of five California commissioners. He adds, "the unfortunate thing about long-term contracts is they don't reflect current realities."

Current realities are catching up with natural gas pipelines, too. With the recession hurting demand, many companies are

struggling to meet minimum requirements of their contracts.

In Chicago, MidCon Corp.'s Natural Gas Pipeline of America unit expects to sell 60 billion to 90 billion cubic feet of natural gas to "off-system" customers this year, up from 40 billion cubic feet last year. "We make very little profit on that gas but it allows us to fulfill our contract with our suppliers," says George L. Morrow, president of the pipeline.

Houston-based Transcontinental Pipe Line Co. says it may lose 22% of its natural gas market if industrial customers continue to switch to low-grade oil. Yet the Transco Energy Co. unit still must pay for at least 90% of the natural gas it ordered, even if it takes less.

To solve the problem, Transcontinental wants to increase rates 7% to 8% for residential and commercial customers.

Flexibility in Contracts

It's uncertain how utilities will cope with such supply and demand problems. No one suggests abandoning long-term contracts for spot market purchases. But future contracts may have to be more flexible, enabling quick renegotiation of terms when prices or demands change. Utilities may have to pay extra if they want special loopholes in their agreements.

"I imagine these kinds of contract changes will become fairly standard," says Barry C. Good, a Morgan Stanley & Co. analyst. "The only way to survive when people start tearing up contracts is to uphold the contracts in court. Otherwise this country is going to be in a lot of trouble."

U.S. Panel Criticizes Antibacterial Agents In Some Oral Products

WASHINGTON — A government panel found that a number of antibacterial agents used in mouthwashes and other oral-hygiene products haven't been proved effective and suggested that their use be discontinued.

The panel's report, released by the Food and Drug Administration, didn't identify any of the products by name. However, the antibacterial ingredients evaluated in the report are used in a variety of widely sold products, including the nation's two leading mouthwashes, Listerine, produced by Warner-Lambert Co., and Scope, produced by Procter & Gamble Inc.

The FDA said that consumers currently pay about \$450 million a year for the products covered by the report. Sales for the entire oral-hygiene market total more than \$1.5 billion, according to industry estimates.

The review by the seven-member panel is part of a 10-year effort by the FDA to evaluate the effectiveness of non-prescription drug products. The agency won't take any action on the recommendations until after a 90-day period for public comments on the findings, which are expected to include extensive opposing arguments by makers of oral-hygiene products.

A Warner-Lambert spokesman said the company will submit evidence to the FDA to show that Listerine is effective against "bad breath microbes" in the mouth and against dental plaque, which also causes bad breath as well as gum inflammation.

The review panel decided against considering data on the effect of mouthwashes on dental plaque. William Gilbertson, the FDA official in charge of the review program, said the decision reflected the committee's belief that consumers don't understand the effects of plaque.

The panel stated mouthwashes without antibacterial agents would still be able to freshen the breath and taste of users because of the flavorings, essences and aromatics they contain. Their effect also is en-

Brief comments on the bill lead me to say that those portions that affect our District 14 are acceptable with the exception of one, that being section 25, sub item (4). Ouzinkie waste heat project. The original allocation based on \$700,000 was reduced to the cost of the project \$250,000 leaving a difference of \$450,000 that was diverted elsewhere. When I originally reviewed previous allocations for over funding I overlooked the allocations made to the Alaska Power Authority, or I would have responded earlier with suggestions to reallocate these funds.

It would be my suggestion that if an amendment could be made, a transfer of these funds could be made in the Finance Committee or in Free Conference Committee on this bill. I would suggest two projects that would benefit from the allocation of \$450,000. They are:

1. Kodiak Boat Harbor Development on Near Island
2. Erosion Control for Ouzinkie

I would prefer that number one be given higher priority as this is a project that is now in its construction stage and there are identifiable needs that are not going to be met with the present available funding.

The second project is presently under study by DOT/PF and is the result of a winter storm that hit Kodiak Island in January of 81. The preliminary costs have been roughly estimated to be about \$500,000. I have requested an update from DOT/PF. It is my understanding that the study will be complete by October of this year.

I have back-up material for number one and possible back-up for number two.

The other sections of this bill that pertain to Kodiak are acceptable and have my concurrence as being needed this year.

I have discussed this request with Senator Mulcahy and we agree to this change in the bill as it would reflect our concerns in the reallocation of those funds originally intended for district 14. This is not meant to be critical of the Senate Finance Committee's work on this bill, but rather an oversight on our part.

BENNETT: The next item we'll take up will be CS HB 643, '81 appropriations, reappropriate the Kasaan Dock, appropriate the Legislative Finance Division.

DANKWORTH: The, uh . . . does everybody have a copy of 643?
(Senator Dankworth was referring to his proposed work draft -
SCS CS HB 643 (Finance), dated May 10, 1982.)

STURGULEWSKI: Mr. Chairman, mine was just delivered about 15 minutes ago.

DANKWORTH: Oh, I thought you got one last night.

STURGULEWSKI: Well, it was after 9:00 when it was available, and I thought I'd wait till

DANKWORTH: Do you have a copy? Does everybody have a copy?

UNKNOWN MEMBER: Ya, give me a copy.

ELIASON: 643? Right.

DANKWORTH: The, uh . . . I would like to introduce Mr. Chairman, because of the, uh . . . the very nature of this type of bill and the length of it. If we could, I wanted to bring up the purpose of displaying it before the committee - 643 - and give everybody a day or two to digest it. And, see if there's any If there's anything in this bill that anybody in the committee would like to have a Senator come and testify to as to what's in there, and you know, have any questions on any section. I gave each person a sectional analysis. Basically of course what this is in the drafting of this bill - we spent some time in the drafting - is where legislators would like to reallocate things within their districts in past appropriations. Which they're subject to veto, and under the same conditions as anything else. There is no cost to this bill. It's a zero fiscal note. But, uh, people have, and I think that in my own judgement this is a healthy process. Sometimes we put things in that don't work out, and we would like to reallocate them within our district. So, I, in writing this bill, in drafting it, it's been about two months in the drafting and I'm going to leave this on the desk for, uh - at least through tomorrow so that everybody can But I'd be glad to have anybody that has any question on any section in this bill - I'll be glad to have the legislator here that will testify on that section. Uh, there is also a great deal of the hydroelectric that was originally in 608, of course is in here, and reallocation of the hydro bill. All of course involves Green Lake, is uh . . . and some additional infusion into Tye Lake and Bradley Lake. So, this fiscal note is zero, and I have a sectional and I broke out what each section does, so if there's any questions on it, uh, I'd be glad to - let me know and I'll have the legislator here.

STURGULEWSKI: Mr. Chairman?

BENNETT: Senator Sturgulewski.

STURGULEWSKI: This bill has not been available for purusal, so, you know, we're sort of starting from ground zero here. At least I am. I'd like to make a request through the chair if it has not been done, that we ask Legislative Finance to go through the check the technical part of it - in other words the "in and out". Would that be . . . has that been done Senator?

DANKWORTH: I can't answer that. Max isn't here at the moment. He's been working with Legislative Finance. I'm going to assume that, but I don't know the answer.

STURGULEWSKI: Mr. Chairman, I would appreciate that that, you know, the allocations so that, uh, because it's a very major bill. And I just would like to know I guess for my edification.
