Fish & Game Position Paper

HB 697

The Department of Fish and Game currently has 712 permanent seasonal positions that were created in response to Alaska Statute 39.25.195. These seasonal positions range in time from two weeks to ten months each year. The regulations required us to create seasonal positions because our activities are both planned and reoccurring each year. For positions that last more than four months in a year, the seasonal system has produced some positive benefits for Fish and Game. For these longer term positions, a higher percentage of the incumbents return in succeeding years providing us with trained, knowledgeable employees. However, these benefits are unfortunately overshadowed by the problems we encounter with the system on those positions that last less than 120 days. The difficulties occur in two major areas: cost and local hire.

First the cost.

Attachment No. 1 outlines the salary plus benefit costs for 712 seasonal positions. 56% or 399 of these 712 positions are employed for less than 120 days a year. These 399 positions represent a salary cost of 2.4 million dollars to which you must add \$656,000 for benefits as permanent seasonals. These same 399 positions would need only \$185,000 as non permanents—a difference of \$471,000. Keep in mind these employees are on our payroll for two weeks to four months per year.

That is only part of the cost. To that you must add the cost of recruiting these people. We did a survey of those positions hired out of our Anchorage Regional office for just the Division of Commercial Fisheries.

In 1979, prior to the passage of the non permanent hire law, we spent \$3,900 on telegrams and long distance phone calls, during April, May and

June, to hire 175 temporary employees. In 1980, after the non permanent hire law, to hire these same 175 employees we spent \$14,600 on telegrams and long distance phone calls--a difference of \$10,000. In 1981 our \$14,000 in long distance calls and telegrams only got us 40 employees. The total cost for telegrams and long distance phone calls for recruiting in 1981 was \$28,000.

The third cost associated with these seasonal employees is another recruiting cost--manpower. Commercial Fisheries estimates it took about 50 man days in 1979 to recruit 175 seasonals. In 1980 it took 217 man days to recruit 175 seasonals. In 1981 the personnel doing the recruiting were more organized, more knowledgeable about the new regulations and more efficient and it still took in excess of one man day of effort to hire each seasonal employee. When we hit the peak recruiting months of April, May and June in Anchorage, everyone from a range 8 clerk typist to range 20 management biologists recruit seasonal personnel. At an average salary of \$12 per hour plus benefits, 217 man days represents a cost of \$25,000. Even at this we haven't begun to measure the cost of lost productivity in their regular jobs.

Another area of particular concern to the Department is the ability to hire local residents. In the past, if one of the Fisheries Divisions needed some basic biological information in a rural area, they sought someone in the area who understood the local fishery to gather the data. Now, when that need arises, the Divisions must go to a register and hire from the top five. In most cases they hire someone from an entirely different area. This is compounded by some rural residents who don't want to bother with the

bureaucracy so don't bother to get on registers or, during the one month in the year when the register is open, doesn't think he will want to work for us in six months so again doesn't get on the register.

Those are the major problems but, in addition, there are the little ones:

- Comm Fish tries to get this seasonal hiring organized early and on May 1 offers John Smith a Fish Tech II job for two months beginning on June 1. John says, "I'll be there." On May 27, Sport Fish offers John Smith a Fish Tech III job for three months beginning June 1 and John Smith accepts. Comm Fish then finds themselves with an expired register and no employee to begin work in 4 days. An emergency hire is only good for 30 days so, if you hire that way, you will have to replace the person mid stream. It will take a week to get a new register, another week to work it and, if you are successful, there is only a two week delay which probably means some data is lost forever.

- College students who want summer jobs have to be on the registers when we go through our big recruiting effort in April and May. Individuals have told us they have received in excess of 100 telegrams from Fish and Game. Each one must be responded to or their name will be removed from the register.

In summary, Fish and Game supports permanent seasonal positions for jobs that last more than 120 days per year. However, we believe the Department could operate more efficiently, less expensively, to greater satisfaction of all parties and to the benefit of State if AS 39.25.195 applied only to positions in excess of 120 days.

Subject: HB 699--Student Housing, UAA

As you can see, the CSHB 699 for the original HB 699 has changed in a significant way. This was due mostly to the owners of the Careage House asking for a much larger selling price than was expected, and a reevaluation of refurbishing and renovation costs. A final report of operating cost was also submitted to me through the Chancellor of UA-Anchorage, and this too made the purchase of the Careage House for student housing in the Anchorage area very inefficient.

The Chancellor suggested that the purchase of this facility be dropped, but that the appropriations be continued so that the \$2,200,000 requested be used for a more permanent structure. Thus, the details of this appropriation will be for the following:

- 1) \$1,500,000 for architecture and engineering design of a \$15,000,000 housing facility for approximately 400 fulltime students.
- 2) \$200,000 for land clearing and site preparation.
- 3) \$500,000 for drainage, sewerage, and water lines, and road to areas for construction.

Thank you for the committee's consideration of this bill.

Position Paper
House Bill 700

"An act making a special appropriation for payment as a grant to the Fairbanks North Star Borough for Fairbanks Memorial Hospital expansion and improvement; and providing for an effective date."

House Bill 700 and Senate Bill 691 make special appropriations of \$20,000,000 in the form of a grant to the Fairbanks North Star Borough for expansion and improvement of the Fairbanks Memorial Hospital. The Department of Health and Social Services has received an application for a certificate of need from Fairbanks Memorial Hospital (submitted 1-18-82) which proposes remodeling of portions of the existing facility and a 107,607 square foot addition at a projected cost of \$20,000,087. The proposed addition is to include five floors, two of which are shelled-in space for future use. Approximately \$3,000,000 of the total projected cost is attributed to the shelled-in space.

The certificate of need review, which is expected to be completed by mid-April, 1982, will address the following aspects of the proposed project which are pertinent to a consideration of state financial assistance:

- the need for additional acute care beds in the Fairbanks Memorial Hospital service area;
- the relationship of the project to other health care providers in the area;
- the anticipated impact of the project on hospital operating costs, revenues, and patient charges;
- the financial feasibility of the project;
- the cost-effectiveness of constructing shelled-in space for future use

In the certificate of need application Fairbanks Memorial Hospital has considered several alternative financing methods ranging from total State funding by means of a grant to total self-financing by means of tax-exempt bonding. The application states the facility's desired financing method as follows:

The Hospital Foundation is currently looking towards financing the new addition by applying to the State of Alaska for a 50% grant for the cost of the new addition. This grant would exclude the third and fourth floors for future expansion. The Foundation is requesting that the State of Alaska fund the third and fourth floors or \$3.1 million at 100%. The remaining 50% of the addition would be bonded through the Alaska Medical Facilities Authority using the mechanisms which are currently in place.*

* Fairbanks Memorial Hospital Certificate of Need Application, January 1982, page 104.

Other possible funding sources for hospital and nursing home construction are limited. Under AS 29.90 municipalities or other hospital or health facilities sponsors may receive reimbursement for up to 25% of total project costs. This partial reimbursement is available only to those facilities which have successfully secured financing and have completed a health facility construction project. Most rural facilities do not have the capacity for debt required for securing financing.

Under AS 18.26 medical facilities may apply to the Alaska Medical Facility Authority for State backing relative to the sale of tax-exempt bonds for the purpose of financing medical facility construction. One project has been financed through this program to date -- a 1978 Fairbanks Memorial Hospital expansion project in the amount of approximately \$12 million. Alaska Hospital and Medical Center, Anchorage, is presently working with the Authority to determine the viability of this funding approach for refinancing that facility and the acquisition of the adjacent professional office building.

One determination which the Authority must make before bonds may be issued under this statute is that the lease or operator agreement for the medical facility being financed by that issue is at least sufficient to meet all obligations in connection with the lease or operator agreement, including all costs necessary to service the bonds. This prerequisite essentially disallows use of the program by rural facilities, most of which do not have more than a minimal capability to service bonds.

The Department is conducting an inventory and condition survey of rural Alaskan hospitals and nursing homes to determine physical condition and functional adequacy and to identify means for upgrading facilities and correcting deficiencies. The inventory was focused on rural facilities because of the Department's awareness of insufficient tax bases in the smaller communities to correct recurring problems identified through the Department's regular licensing and certification processes and architectural reviews. Fairbanks Memorial Hospital, in one of the state's more urban settings, was not included in this inventory.

Attached is the Supplemental Housing Development Fund status chart for the FY'82, appropriation of \$12,351,400.

The additional funding required to complete all projects with existing HUD funding commitments is approximately \$6 million (see attached FY'83 list - projects with existing HUD funding). These projects are expected to be bid during the Summer-Fall 1982 seasons. Some of the projects will be going to bid before June 30, 1982 resulting in a shortfall of \$2,500,000. HUD has indicated that the projects could go to bid if there is an adequate FY'83 appropriation available July 1, 1982 and the DCRA issues a letter of intent to commit grant awards upon availability of funds.

Also attached is a list of applications for HUD funding which are now being processed by the HUD office. No federal funding has been committed to the project on the list due to the unavailability of HUD funding at this date. HUD expects to receive an Alaska allocation of 600 to 700 units of which 73% are expected to require additional funding from the requested FY'83 appropriation to the Supplemental Housing Development Fund as follows:
