12 \* Sec. 2. The unexpended and unobligated part of the appropriation made  
13 in sec. 1 of this Act lapses into the general fund June 30, 1983.

14 \* Sec. 3. This Act takes effect immediately in accordance with AS 01.-  
15 10.070(c).

AFFIDAVIT

Our name is Carolyn Burg and we are a citizen of the State of Alaska, a resident of the City of Juneau for approximately 29 years and a citizen of the United States. 14th Art. U.S. Const.; 5th Art, U.S. Const.

We were not able to be at the hearing before the Senate Finance Committee this morning when Senator H. E. Bankworth introduced House Bill No. 708 and asked for individual recommendations on this bill appropriating \$810,700 for the New Capital Site Planning Commission for the work of this Commission. This was by the Rules Committee by Request of the Governor).

We disagree. This is the State of Alaska "taxing" the federal government, as this Capital is under true territorial law. Article 3, Section 2, Clause 1. We disagree with the Eleventh Amendment to the U.S. Constitution putting Alaska under "sovereign immunity". It is not immune to illegal acts affecting the private property of the Nation. Art IV, Sec. 7. Article XI, Sec. 7 Alaska State Constitution; 14th Amendment, 5th Amendment, 6th, 7th & 9th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution

Juneau's tax dollars are in the general fund and the permanent fund, and we claim full faith and credit of public acts, records and judicial proceedings of every other state. Art. 4, Sec. 1. This Article is in conflict with the Eleventh Amendment granting "sovereign immunity" to the State of Alaska. (United States Constitution) Article 4, Sec. 2 Clause 1. U.S. Constitution. Article 4, Sec. 3, Clause 2, U.S. Const.

We would like a hearing on this in a competent court with a ruling thereon, and we would like everything we say to be judicially noticed.

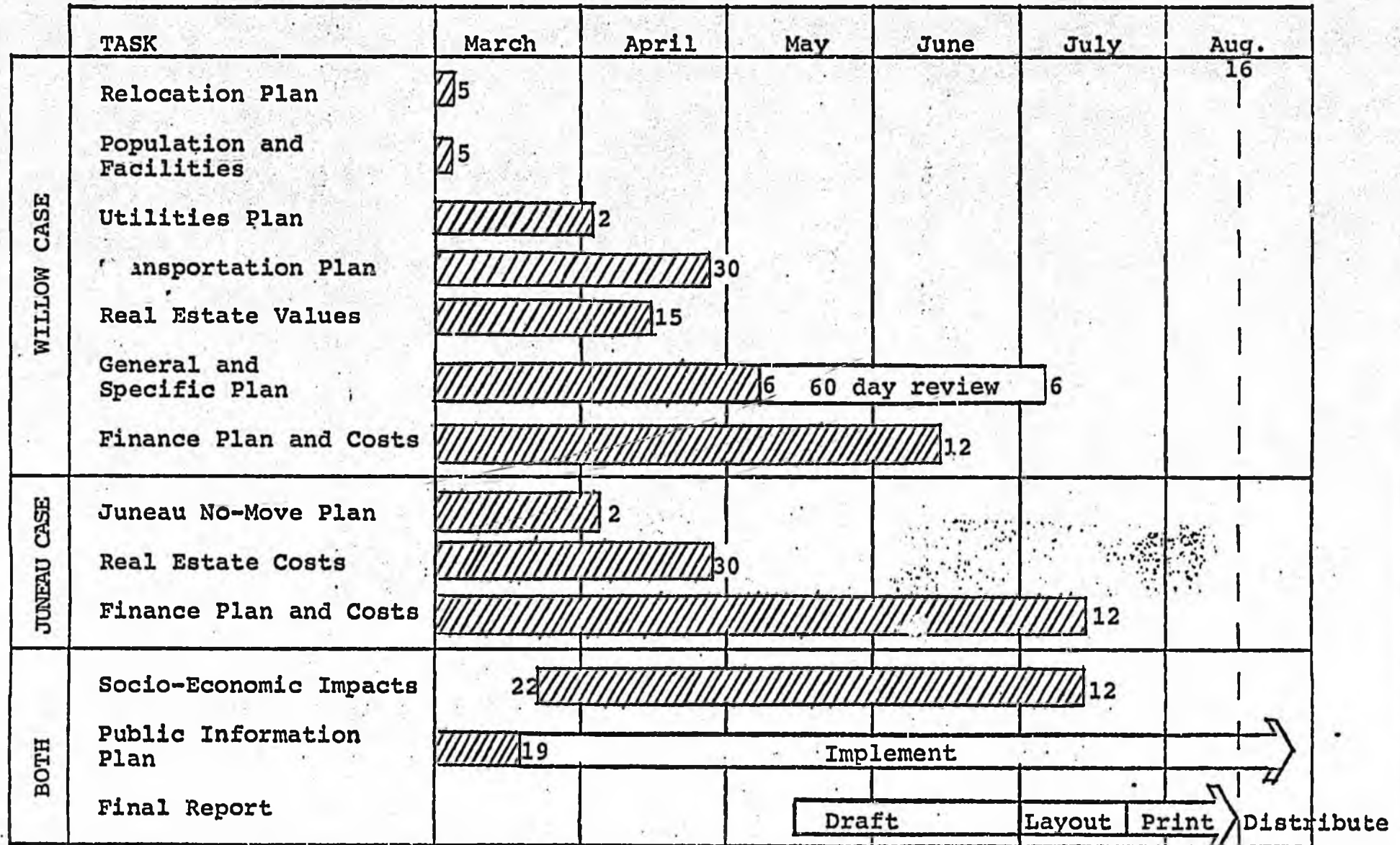

11 Site Planning Commission, and conditionally repealing  
12 laws relating to relocation of the state capital."

13 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

14 \* Section 1. AS 44.06.196 is repealed and reenacted to read:

15 Sec. 44.06.196. CAPITAL RELOCATION EXPENDITURES. (a) Except for  
16 money used for planning, design, studies, and field investigations in  
17 accordance with the provisions of AS 44.06.200 - 44.06.299, state money  
18 may be spent to relocate the state capital from its present location to  
19 the new capital site at Willow only after a majority of those voting on  
20 the proposition at the 1982 general election have approved a ballot  
21 proposition that includes the total cost to the state of providing for  
22 completion of relocation of a functional state capital at the new  
23 capital site at Willow as provided in this section.

24 (b) The ballot proposition prepared and submitted to the voters  
25 under this section shall also show:

26 (1) the amount of the total cost that it is estimated may be  
27 defrayed by the net proceeds from disposal of land in the new capital  
28 site at Willow;

29 (2) the estimated cost, through the relocation completion

1 date, of providing for new or expanded facilities in Juneau and else-  
2 where to accommodate estimated growth in state government if the capital  
3 is not relocated;

4 (3) an estimate of the number of central state employees who  
5 are reasonably expected to be relocated from Juneau and from other  
6 existing, named locations to the new capital site at Willow; the esti-  
7 mate prepared under this paragraph shall be prepared in a manner con-  
8 sistent with the methodology used by the commission in determining the  
9 estimate in its 1978 report of the number of central state employees  
10 who are reasonably expected to be relocated to the new capital site at  
11 Willow, and the estimate shall be supported by information obtained  
12 from each of the branches of government;

13 (4) an estimate of the population reasonably expected to  
14 reside at the new capital site at Willow on the relocation completion  
15 date; the estimate prepared under this paragraph shall be based on the  
16 number of central state employees who are reasonably expected to be  
17 relocated to the new capital site at Willow estimated under (3) of this  
18 subsection; and

19 (5) the estimated costs, through the relocation completion  
20 date, of

21 (A) capital improvements;

22 (B) relocation of personnel and equipment; and

23 (C) indemnification under AS 44.08.

24 (c) The sum of the following costs, as estimated by the commis-  
25 sion, shall be the total cost to the state that shall be included in  
26 the ballot proposition submitted to the voters under this section:

27 (1) the cost to the state as of the relocation completion  
28 date of the land development, capital improvements, equipment, and  
29 furnishings necessary to provide a functional state capital;

1 (2) the cost to the state as of the relocation completion  
2 date of relocating the central state employees and their dependents and  
3 household goods to the new capital site at Willow;

4 (3) the cost to the state as of the relocation completion  
5 date of moving offices, office equipment, and office contents suffi-  
6 cient to accommodate the central state employees at the new capital  
7 site at Willow;

8 (4) the cost to the state as of the relocation completion  
9 date of the indemnification requirements of AS 44.08;

10 (5) the cost to the state of the plans, designs, studies,  
11 and field tests for relocation of the capital through the relocation  
12 completion date;

13 (6) the cost to the state of the elements set out in the  
14 basic development plan described in (d) of this section, including  
15 payments deferred beyond the relocation completion date, to the extent  
16 those costs are related to relocation and are not otherwise provided  
17 for in items (1) - (5) of this subsection; and

18 (7) the cost to the state of financing the costs specified  
19 in this subsection.

20 (d) To estimate the costs under (c) of this section, the commis-  
21 sion shall prepare a basic development plan. The commission shall  
22 prepare the basic development plan by revising the detailed development  
23 plan and cost estimates prepared by the commission in its report of  
24 March 15, 1978, in accordance with the provisions of AS 44.06.235 and  
25 this section. In making its revision, the commission shall revise  
26 those assumptions in the detailed development plan, if any, that are  
27 shown by substantial evidence to be erroneous and shall use the average



POSITION PAPER: CSSSHB 709 (Student Loans)

The present committee substitute for HB709 allows for certain administrative changes to be made which are necessary for better enforcement of the program. It is the result of many hours of work by the House HESS Committee, ASSA, and the Postsecondary Education Commission.

The Alaska State Student Loan Program is the best in the country. It is established on the principle of equal access to financial aid for all Alaskans. The loan only covers necessities; entertainment and other non-essentials must be paid for out of the student's own pocket.

Lowering the maximum amount would hurt those who need it the most. It would not curb abuses of the program; that can only be done through more rigorous enforcement of the existing regulations. Cutting the ceiling would only make the bill a subject of controversy and possibly prevent the needed adjustments in the current version from being passed.

ASSA urges you to pass the Committee Substitute for HB 709 in its present form.

SUBJECT: HB 709 - Comparison of the Two Versions of the Student Loan Bill

Both the original bill and HESS committee substitute attempt to stiffen the requirement for obtaining a scholarship loan.

SSHB 709

CSSHB 709 (HESS)

Section 1. Decreases maximum undergraduate loan from \$6000 to \$4000

Not addressed

Section 2. Decreases maximum graduate loan from \$7000 to \$6000

Not addressed

Section 3. Requires the Post Secondary Commission to adopt regulations defining a full time student as at least 26 semester hours; "good standing" is defined as having at least a 2.0 GPA. These requirements may be waived for disadvantaged students with good cause. Students must submit proof of GPA and hours completed at end of each academic year.

Not addressed

Section 4. Decreases the number of years can receive an undergraduate and graduate loan from 5 years to 4 years each; currently can not exceed total of 8 years.

Section 1.

Continues 8 year maximum on total years can receive a loan; however reduces from 5 to 4 years can receive a loan for undergraduate and graduate study. Provides an exception to the 4 years if course of study is longer.

Section 5. Increases interest from 5 to 6%. Adds that interest begins to accrue when the borrower receives the money and continues until loan is repaid.

Section 2. Increases interest from 5 to 6%. Currently no interest incurred while a student is enrolled or in the military service.

Section 6. Requires that a student be physically present in the state at least 2 years immediately before applying. Deletes exception for military service.

Section 3. Residency exception for military service limited to first enlistment period of up to 4 years

Not addressed

Section 7. Adds requirement that applications must be filed by May 15th. Requires affidavits from at least 4 people attesting to applicant's residency.

Section 8. Repeals section providing for a dependent being eligible for a loan if his or her parent or guardian has lived in the state for 2 years.

Section 4. To be eligible, a borrower can not be delinquent or in default on another student loan.

Section 5. Sets up 3 application deadlines to coincide with differing academic years; also requires affidavits from 4 people.





SUBJECT: Brief Review of CS for HB 709. (HESS)

- 1.) The HESS substitute would change the maximum loan duration to four (4) years for both undergraduates and graduate students from the previous five (5) year duration. The one exception to the maximum of four years of study at either level, is in instances where the normal course of study, as outlined by the institution is longer (i.e., in the case of many architectural programs). The total loan limit remains the same for combined graduate and undergraduate eligibility at eight (8) years.
- 2.) Interest rates for both graduate and undergraduate loans would be raised from current five (5) percent to six (6) percent per annum.
- 3.) Loan repayment for those individuals with military deferments would be triggered after the first term of enlistment of up to four (4) years. The current law could exempt the loan recipient from repayment for an indefinite period if the individual chose to re-enlist or elect to make military service a career.
- 4.) New language is added to AS 14.40.765 which would effectively preclude a person, who is in default or delinquent on a previous scholarship loan, from obtaining another loan of the same type.
- 5.) A new section, AS 14.40.766, is added setting out three separate application deadlines during the calendar year for discrete semesters. The new section also requires applications from four people attesting that the applicant has been physically present in the State for at least two years immediately before the application filing or was in the military or an approved educational program.
- 6.) References in AS 14.40.767 (the section addressing loan grants based on point accumulations) related to the current May 15th application deadline are deleted.
