22 great honor not only for the Juneau-Douglas Little Theatre but also for the
23 entire State of Alaska; and

24 WHEREAS the production of "The Sea Horse" is representative of Alaska

Juneau-Douglas Little Theater's participation in Spectrum '81, an International Theater Showcase in Villach, Austria.

Background

Once every two years the Alaska State Community Theater Association holds a statewide drama festival in Haines, Alaska. In April of 1979 the Juneau-Douglas Little Theater was represented at the festival by it's production of "The Sea Horse". The play won the state competition and represented Alaska at the Americal Community Theater Association (ACTA) Region IX Festival of American Community Theaters (FACT) in Richland, Washington. Region IX consists of Alaska, Oregon, and Washington, however Oregon did not participate in the Region IX festival. "The Sea Horse" won this festival and represented Region IX at the National FACT held in Memphis, Tennessee in July. There were twelve groups which participated in the National FACT and "The Sea Horse" won third place.

In July of 1980, I attended a board meeting of the Americal Community Theater Association in Pasedena, California. While there I was contacted by Professor Mort Clark who is the United States representative to the International Amature Theater Association (IATA) and was informed that "The Sea Horse" was eligible to be nominated as the United States entry at an international festival. Then in October of 1980 I received a letter from Professor Clark stating that he had nominated "The Sea Horse" to represent the United States at Spectrum '81 in Villach, Austria and that I would be receiving a letter from Dr. Susanne Eder confirming that we had been invited. In January, I received a letter from Dr. Hilde Weinberger in Vienna, whom Professor Clark had contacted, asking if we would be interested in performing at the Internationale Jugendtheatretage in Vienna the week following the festival in Villach. Again, we would be the only group representing the United States.

About the Festivals

Spectrum '81 is an international theater showcase held in Villach, Austria every two years. Participation in the festival is 80% professional and by invitation only. After talking with Herr Alfred Meschnigg, festival chairman, I learned that "The Sea Horse" is the only nonprofessional group coming to the festival. There will be fifteen countries represented and the types

of theater represented range from plays to mime to pantomime and to dance. There will be approximately twenty productions presented in six days. "The Sea Horse" has been invited to do two performances during the week. The dates of the festival are June 21st to 27th and the festival will be paying room and board for the group during the week of the festival.

The Internationale Jugenthertratage is a festival for young people held in Vienna every two years. The dates of the festival are June 21st to July 4th, however groups are only required to be at the festival for four days during that period. Participants not only perform their shows but are also exposed to various workshops during their stay at the festival. Eight countries, including the United States, participate.

About Our Preparations to Attend the Festival

A committee has been established to raise funds locally and it is anticipated that they will raise between \$4,000 and \$5,000, which will not be enough to take the production to Austria. Airfares alone will be \$11,000. We have "shopped" around for the least expensive transportation and methodology in getting sets, properties, and people to Villach. We have already had one fund raising event in conjunction with the Juneau Arts Council. We have contacted Alaska Airlines regarding cost of transporting the set to Villach versus sending two people to Villach to construct the set there. We are also working with the Austrian Office of Tourism in Los Angeles for transportation and housing while in Austria. Private companies are also being contacted regarding grant possibilities.

15 recommendations for conducting a future constitutional convention; and

16 WHEREAS, during 1982, the voters of Alaska will be asked to vote again
17 on the question "Shall there be a Constitutional Convention?", making the
18 work of the joint committee on the constitutional convention timely and

Fiscal Note Explanation for SCR 9:

Personal Services:

Personal services include one administrative assistant, one researcher and one secretary. At present, all positions will work out of a Juneau Office.

It must be noted that, should the legislature decide on full time staff, one of more of these positions could be eliminated from the committee's budget.

Staff work will include administration of the committee and committee work, coordination of projects, committee publicity and information, constitutional convention site survey and report, planning committee meetings, independent work on "occasional papers", solicitation of papers from the general public, and arranging for committee functions. Work on brochure narrative and arranging for the publication and distribution of both the Citizen's Guide and the brochure.

Contractual:

Last year the Legislative Council approved the funding of several projects which had been requested by the Constitutional Convention Committee. However, due to the fact that the committee was formed almost three months late and that all interim funds lapsed into the Council budget at the beginning of the 12th legislature, these projects were not completed. They are included in the FY '82 budget and are:

1. Statewide Survey on Constitutional Questions and questions relating to a constitutional convention.
2. Illustration of a brochure on the constitution and explaining the function of a constitutional convention.

Funds are being requested to follow through on two projects begun last year.

- (a) Printing and distribution of The Citizen's Guide to the Alaska Constitution. This publication was contracted last year and the author has advised the committee that the finished manuscript should be ready toward the end of July.
- (b) Printing and distribution of the Brochure on Constitutions and the holding of a constitutional convention. The text will be written by staff and the illustrations will be accomplished by a private contractor. The completed brochure should be ready during the month of September.

The final large contract, is a proposal developed by the League of Women Voters at the request of the Committee which would:

- (1) Inform the public of Alaska's constitutional history and present framework, explanation of how constitutional changes can be accomplished and acquainting the public with the upcoming ballot question; and
- (2) To receive from the public their comments, suggestions and questions relating to constitutional issues as they perceive them to be.

The League will perform a totally neutral role of informing and recording.

Article XIII, Section 3, provides, "If, during any ten-year period, a constitutional convention has not been held, the Lieutenant Governor shall place on the ballot for the next general election the question: 'shall there be a constitutional convention?' If a majority of the voters cast on the question are in the negative, the question need not be placed on the ballot until the end of the next ten-year period. If a majority of the votes cast on the question are in the affirmative, dele-

gates to the convention shall be chosen at the next statewide election, unless the legislature provides for the election of the delegates at a special election. The Lieutenant Governor shall issue the call for the convention. Unless other provisions have been made by law, the call shall conform as nearly as possible to the act calling the Alaska Constitutional Convention of 1955, including, but not limited to, number of members, districts, election and certification of delegates, and submission and ratification of revisions and ordinances. The appropriate provisions of the call shall be self-executing and shall constitute a first claim on the State Treasury."

In 1970, the voters, by a slim margin, approved a convention call; however, that referendum was voided by the Supreme Court because of improper wording of the question on the ballot. Voting on the issue again on November 7, 1972, the voters rejected the proposition. In accordance with the constitution, Alaska voters will be asked at the November 1982 general election whether or not a convention should be held.

CURRENT STATUS:

A conference held in Fairbanks in October 1976 to review the state constitution twenty years after it was written and first approved, concluded that a general revision was not needed,

although some issues were deemed to deserve further study and possible change. Most delegates to the original convention -- legislators and others who attended the conference -- felt that a new convention was not necessary and, if there were to be a convention, it would open the whole constitution to unnecessary tinkering and possible massive revision since Article XIII, Section 4, Powers, states, "Constitutional Conventions shall have plenary power to amend or revise the constitution, subject only to ratification by the people. No call for a constitutional convention shall limit these powers of the convention." (Emphasis added).

In general, most conferees concluded that the constitution was adequate for our own time and in the foreseeable future.

Although there has not been a convention since statehood, the constitution has been changed over the years. Approximately 250 resolutions to amend the constitution have been introduced in the legislature since the first session of the first legislature. Of those 250, 23 have passed both houses of the legislature and have been placed before the public. Sixteen of those have been ratified by the voters and have become part of the constitution. Generally, voters have supported changes recommended by the legislature.

Recently, certain issues have surfaced which supporters feel can only be solved through changes in the constitution at a constitutional convention. These issues have been introduced many times in the legislature but have not passed both houses. Supporters feel they would receive fairer consideration by non-partisan convention delegates. These issues include:

New issues have surfaced which supporters feel necessitate changes in the constitution. These issues include:

1. Right-to-live vs. abortion choice;
3. Capitol move;
4. Land distribution;
5. Limitations on taxes and expenditures.

Any of the abcve issues could bring about a convention oriented toward individual causes rather than one concerned with general governmental structure and constitutional integrity.

To:

1. Assure that the public will be given a chance to express their feelings on the above, and other issues, will be informed

on the pros and cons of calling a convention, and will be appraised of alternative methods of achieving the goals;

2. Provide a plan and develop material relating to the Alaska Constitution, Constitutional revision and a constitutional convention;

3. Insure successful and well planned convention should one be called.

The Joint Committee on the Constitutional Convention was formed during the interim period of 1979.

In 1979 the committee solicited work from various instate consultants relating to constitutional conventions, issues, proposed amendments, the calling of a constitutional convention.

In 1980, the Legislature felt that the work of the committee was important enough to continue the committee. During the 1980 interim, the committee decided to accomplish certain tasks. Unfortunately, the committee which was originally scheduled to begin its work in the month of June, was not even formed until August 29, 1980, three months late. Because of the delay, the committee was not able to accomplish all of the goals it had set for itself.

The major undertaking of the committee during the 1980 interim was to meet with recognized experts on constitutional conventions, revision and issues.. From those meetings came invaluable advice on conventions, preparation for, holding of and post convention work. Changes and issues relating to the Alaska constitution were also discussed.

The transcripts of those meetings have been edited and reproduced and have led to various "occasional papers" being developed by staff to outline various provisions of constitutional convention planning and revision.

The committee has engaged the services of a person to write "A Citizen's Guide to the Alaska Constitution", which will be useful to both people in government and the public at large even if the voters do not approve the calling of a convention. This guide will be published during the 1981 interim. It has begun the work of translating the Alaska constitution into the Yupik language in order that some 15 to 20 thousand people can read the constitution in their "first" language.

The committee is planning on distributing a pamphlet to explain the Alaska constitution, constitutional revision, and the functions of a constitutional convention and has entered into a contract with the League of Women Voters to provide materials

and conduct meetings with the public to discuss issues of revision, the constitution and or a constitutional convention.

THE FUTURE:

As mentioned earlier, in 1980 the committee began its work three months late. There are only twenty months before the people of the state must decide on the very important question of whether or not to call a convention. The committee feels that it is imperative that as much information on the constitution and a convention, as possible, should be distributed to the public prior to the vote and that preparation for a convention should continue in the event the electorate votes for calling a convention. Every person involved with constitutional revision and conventions the committee met with, stressed the importance of preparatory work.

In the event the people do not approve the calling of a convention, the materials gathered will undoubtedly be useful in the future. Prior to the work of the committee, no work had been done relating to preparation for a convention.

You have all received a brief outline of the plans for the committee separate from this memo, but I am including the proposed schedule in order to refresh your memory.

- review of the state's experience with the nonpermanent category of employees, with a particular concern for problems of local hire in rural areas;

- continued consideration of the membership in the exempt and partially exempt services;
- development of a proposed disciplinary system to guide state supervisors and to encourage fair and consistent discipline where necessary; and
- comprehensive revision of the State Personnel Rules to improve personnel practices.

The commission requests that its operation be extended for another year so that it may continue with these projects.



The portion of the centralized administrative services program discussed herein consists of the Personnel BRU and the Labor Relations BRU.

The Personnel BRU consists entirely of the Division of Personnel. The goals of the Division are to provide, in a timely manner qualified and available candidates for authorized positions, and to establish and maintain a harmonious employer-employee relationship. To achieve these goals, the Division is responsible for maintenance of the position classification plan, maintenance of a pay plan based on the classification plan, conducting competitive examinations for State positions, validating the examinations to comply with Federal Equal Employment Opportunity requirements, certifying eligibles to fill vacant positions, training State employees, and maintaining personnel records on current and former employees. Responsibilities also include investigating alleged violations of the State Personnel Act, and the Personnel Rules

The FY 82 budget includes funding to provide training and eliminate the backlog in application processing and employee classification work.

The Labor Relations BRU consists of the Division of Labor Relations. This new Division was established by a departmental reorganization in 1980. The Division of Labor Relations provides professional assistance to management by reviewing union proposals for impact, preparing state counterproposals, and participating as advisors and negotiators during bargaining sessions with employee unions. Responsibilities include uniform interpretation of labor contract provisions on behalf of management; investigating union contract provisions and fair labor practices; and representing the state in proceedings before the State Labor Relations Agency and in formal arbitration of employee grievances.





Dear Representative Gardiner:

I have your letter of March 6, 1981, concerning timber utilization at Point MacKenzie.

Enclosed you will find a copy of the settlement of the litigation agreed to by the State and the Sierra Club concerning that issue.

Also enclosed please find an estimate from the Department of Natural Resources of the amount of commercial spruce on each tract and the dollar value calculated at \$35/MBF (thousand board foot). Ted Smith states that \$20/MBF is a more reasonable figure for a total value of about \$50,000. If there is as much as 9 million board feet (9,000 MBF) the value would still be only \$180,000. The value of the birch firewood has been estimated at \$90,000.

Certainly, these figures are far less than the "millions" quoted by the media.

I am also enclosing statements from various individuals with knowledge and personal experience in the Point MacKenzie area. I believe you will find their statements of much value. I would especially commend to you the words of Glen Franklin, the Contracts Administrator for the Special Projects Office in Delta Junction. He has much experience in timber utilization in Canada's Peace River area and supervised the test clearing work at Point MacKenzie.

Thank you for your interest in this matter. We, too, are certainly desirous of the best feasible use of those timber resources.
