DATE: June 2, 1981

I understand that the work draft on SB 26, from which your committee is working, contains only \$45 million for the Solomon Gulch project. The cost of that project is \$68 million, but the amount was reduced in this draft on the assumption that an arrangement with REA could be worked out similar in principle to defeasance of bonds.

There is no assurance at all that such an agreement can be reached with REA. Construction of Solomon Gulch will be completed later this year, and full funding of this project is needed to permit the consumers in that area to benefit from the Energy Program for Alaska.

Vern

After SB 26 had been reported out of the House Resources Committee, I became aware of the great potential benefits to rural Alaska that can be provided by using Organic Rankine Cycle systems for generating electricity. This technology will make it possible to use low temperature geothermal resources or local fuels such as coal, wood or peat.

We need to try this technology in Bush Alaska. It will take \$5 million to purchase, do the applications engineering, and install two ORC systems using two different frame sizes and two different heat sources.

I understand that Rep. Adams has prepared an amendment to add \$5 million to SB 26 for this program, and I hope you will support this amendment.

The committee substitute requested is enclosed.

The first change requested is varied slightly. It asked that each member of the commission "represent each judicial district in the state". Literally, this meant that each member of the commission should not have parochial interests but should be concerned with the interests of the state at large. While this is a reasonable goal, I assumed from the location of the proposed change that your goal was rather that the commission "include members selected from each judicial district of the state".

I have amended sec. 41.37.060(a) as the committee requested.

The goal of the committee as to sec. 60(b) was less obvious. It appears that it was the intent of the committee that members of the commission be eligible for "expenses, travel, and per diem prescribed for state boards and commissions". Note that if it is the intent of the committee to grant "expenses" in addition to "per diem", then the committee should be more explicit because the phrase that conditions the "travel expenses and per diem", "prescribed for state boards and commissions" ties the commission into AS 39.-20.180. This section does not authorize reimbursement of "expenses" as a category apart from "per diem".

Accordingly, I have made no changes in sec. 60(b).

Sec. 41.37.080(a) presented some technical problems, a large portion of which were carried forward from my earlier preparation of SSSB 36. I have deleted the references to "additions to federal land in the state". There is, of course, no new federal land in the state, only (existing) federal land in the state under new management regimes. And consistent with these changes, there is no point to using the concept of "additions" to the federal management areas; I assume that the committee does not intend that the commission should be limited to comment on areas within the recent revisions to federal management areas.

The committee proposed an amendment to add a subsec. (d) to sec. 41.37.090 regarding the advice of other advisory groups and individuals in the state. It seemed to fit better as a new subsec. (d) under sec. 80 and, slightly revised, that is where the section is located.

Similarly, subsec. (b) of proposed new sec. 41.37.110 seemed to fit better as a new subsec. (g) of sec. 80.

I have added the remaining portion of the section as sec. 110.

MEMORANDUM

SB 36 is intended to aid the citizens of Alaska who are impacted by the 31 newly created federally managed areas in the state, by creating a Citizens Advisory Commission which will keep an eye on activities relating to those federal areas from an Alaskan point of view. The Commission will thoroughly review any and all regulations, management plans or policy statements which will affect the use of Alaskan lands, and make comments to the respective federal agency. It is hoped that the Commission, while having no official standing in federal law, will be considered by the agencies it deals with as a body which gives due consideration and deliberation to each side of the issues which it will address. (In fact, federal agencies have indicated an interest in working with such a Commission. It will also work with the federal Committee mandated by recent d-2 legislation.)

The need for the Commission is evident. On many occasions, federal land management agencies (including National Park Service, National Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management and Fish and Wildlife Service) have overstepped their legislative mandate and have imposed great hardships on persons living in areas which they manage. Some of the areas of Alaska which already feel they have received short shrift in some instances are Skagway, Glacier Bay and Glenallen.

In the aura of cooperation which exists now with Secretary Watt and the Department of Interior, the timing is critical for getting the Commission started. President Reagan has placed a moratorium on all regulations which were pending when he took office. However, that action does not remove the potential for implementing the 70-odd page of interim regulations dealing with Alaskan lands that were placed in the Federal Register on January 19.

The effectiveness of the Commission will depend not only on the selection of the Commission, but also will depend on the manner in which it conducts itself. However, that it can be effective is evidenced in a similar committee created in Minnesota.

In Minnesota, similar legislation was passed in 1975, five years after Voyager's National Park was created. Management plans for the area were already far along, and in those management plans, use of the park through traditional means of access such as snowmachines, powerboats and float planes was denied. During the years which intervened between the establishment of the Park and the establishment of the Voyager's Park Citizens' Advisory Committee, ill feelings were bred between park users and park managers. However, since 1975, the committee has been able to establish lines of communication with the federal management agencies, to help the Minnesota citizens become more knowledgeable about the operations and potential uses for the park, and to impact some NPS decisions. The committee has been able to defuse some bitter rivalries and hostile actions. The committee has earned the respect of people on both sides of the management issue.

LETTER OF INTENT

SENATE RESOURCES COMMITTEE

In passing out of committee SSSB 36, "An Act creating a citizen's advisory commission on federal management areas in Alaska," the Senate Resources Committee wishes to make its intent known on section 41.37.020.

It is the intent of the Committee that the commissioners should be Alaskans directly affected and impacted by the establishment, operation and management of federal land in Alaska. To achieve this objective and since many state commissioners will serve on the Alaska Land Use Council as established by PL 96-487, the Committee believes that the commissioners of the Citizen's Advisory Committee should not be state officials such as the commissioners of the various state departments or the departments's top staff.

It is the intent of the Committee that the Governor, Speaker of the House, and President of the Senate appoint non-governmental related persons to the maximum extent possible.

After my conversation with Judy Johnston and with you concerning apparent "technical problems" with the above bill, I have conferred with Robyn Halvorson and Jim Palmer of the Senate Resources Committee.

They both feel, as I do, that all procedures were handled correctly in the Senate Finance Committee. Jim Palmer was sure that what caused the confusion on the floor today was the appearance of the mysterious list of amendments from the Resources Committee and the statement that only the first two amendments had been included in the Senate Finance Committee Substitute. That was not true - all the Resources amendments had been included, but changes had been made in Legislative drafting by Richard Bradley, who attached a letter of explanation to the Senate Finance Committee Substitute. The confusion resulted by the fact that Bradley's letter of explanation was not attached to the "mysterious" list that appeared on the floor today.

Jim Palmer stated that there really is no problem, and as far as he knows at this point, no further changes are planned. If changes are going to be made in the Rules Committee, he will let us know.

Pursuant to my earlier memo to you on this date, Jim Palmer of the Resources Committee informed me that he had spoken with Senator Fahrenkamp on the above bill which was returned to the Rules Committee earlier today.

He stated that the Rules Committee has decided to make the following changes:

1. They will re-instate the original language in Amendment # 1 by the Resource Committee. Apparently they feel that the original intent of that amendment was not duly served when Richard Bradley changed the language for inclusion in the Senate Finance Committee Substitute. So, the language will be changed back to "The members of the commission shall represent each judicial district in the state.", as stated in the original Resource Committee Amendment # 1. "(b) The commission shall include members selected from each judicial district in the state." will be deleted.
2. They will re-instate all references to ". . . additions to federal land . . . ", wherever Richard Bradley deleted them because there is such a thing as new federal land when it is purchased as such by the federal government.

Jim Palmer added that these changes were minor, and would not have held the bill up. But since (via all this other confusion) it ended up back in Rules today, they decided to go ahead and make these minor changes.

SB 36 is intended to aid the citizens of Alaska who are impacted by the 31 newly created federally managed areas in the state, by creating a Citizens Advisory Commission which will keep an eye on activities relating to those federal areas from an Alaskan point of view. The Commission will thoroughly review any and all regulations, management plans or policy statements which will affect the use of Alaskan lands, and make comments to the respective federal agency. It is hoped that the Commission, while having no official standing in federal law, will be considered by the agencies it deals with as a body which gives due consideration and deliberation to each side of the issues which it will address. (In fact, federal agencies have indicated an interest in working with such a Commission. It will also work with the federal Committee mandated by recent d-2 legislation.)

The need for the Commission is evident. On many occasions, federal land management agencies (including National Park Service, National Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management and Fish and Wildlife Service) have overstepped their legislative mandate and have imposed great hardships on persons living in areas which they manage. Some of the areas of Alaska which already feel they have received short shrift in some instances are Skagway, Glacier Bay and Glenallen.

In the aura of cooperation which exists now with Secretary Watt and the Department of Interior, the timing is critical for getting the Commission started. President Reagan has placed a moratorium on all regulations which were pending when he took office. However, that action does not remove the potential for implementing the 70-odd page of interim regulations dealing with Alaskan lands that were placed in the Federal Register on January 19.

The effectiveness of the Commission will depend not only on the selection of the Commission, but also will depend on the manner in which it conducts itself. However, that it can be effective is evidenced in a similar committee created in Minnesota.

In Minnesota, similar legislation was passed in 1975, five years after Voyager's National Park was created. Management plans for the area were already far along, and in those management plans, use of the park through traditional means of access such as snowmachines, powerboats and float planes was denied. During the years which intervened between the establishment of the Park and the establishment of the Voyager's Park Citizens' Advisory Committee, ill feelings were bred between park users and park managers. However, since 1975, the committee has been able to establish lines of communication with the federal management agencies, to help the Minnesota citizens become more knowledgeable about the operations and potential uses for the park, and to impact some NPS decisions. The committee has been able to defuse some bitter rivalries and hostile actions. The committee has earned the respect of people on both sides of the management issue.
