FEDERAL MANAGEMENT AREAS IN ALASKA."

DATE: APRIL 6, 1981

CSSB 36 is intended to aid the citizens of Alaska who are impacted by the management of federal land in the state by creating a Citizens' Advisory Commission. The Commission will thoroughly review any regulations, management plans or policy statements which will affect the use of federal land in Alaska and make comments to the appropriate federal agency. It is hoped that the Commission, while having no official standing in federal law, will be considered by the agencies it works with as a body which gives due consideration and deliberation to each side of the issues it addresses. (In fact, federal agencies have indicated an interest in working with such a Commission. It will also work with the Alaska Land Use Council which was established under the Alaska Lands Act.)

The need for the Commission is evident. On many occasions, federal land management agencies (including the National Park Service, National Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management and Fish and Wildlife Service) have overstepped their legislative mandate and by doing so, have imposed great hardships on persons living in areas which they manage. Some of the areas of Alaska which already feel they have received short shrift in some instances are Skagway, Glacier Bay and Glenallen.

In the aura of cooperation which exists now with Secretary Watt and the Department of the Interior, the timing is critical for getting the Commission started. President Reagan has placed a moratorium on all regulations which were pending when he took office. However, that action does not remove the potential for implementing the 70-odd pages of interim regulations dealing with Alaskan lands that were placed in the Federal Register on January 19. The effectiveness of the Commission will depend not only on the selection of the Commission, but also will depend on the manner in which it conducts itself. However, that it can be effective is evidenced by a similar committee created in Minnesota.

In Minnesota, similar legislation was passed in 1975, five years after Voyager's National Park was created. Management plans for the area were already far along, and in those management plans, use of the park by snowmachines, powerboats and float planes for access was denied. During the years which intervened between the establishment of the Park and the establishment of the Voyager's Park Citizens' Advisory Committee, ill feelings arose between park users and park managers. However, since 1975 the committee has been able to establish lines of communication with the federal management agencies, help the Minnesota citizens become more knowledgeable about the operations and potential uses of the park and impact some National Park Service decisions. The committee has been able to defuse some bitter feelings and hostile actions. The committee has earned the respect of both the users and managers of the park.

SECTIONAL ANALYSIS

Section 1.

Sec. 41.37.010 establishes the Citizens' Advisory Commission on federal areas in Alaska. The Commission is a temporary advisory agency of the executive branch. It is charged with considering the views of the citizens of the state in its deliberations.

Sec. 41.37.020 deals with the membership and officers of the Commission. The Commission shall be comprised of 16 members. Eight shall be appointed by the Governor, four by the Speaker of the House of Representatives (2 legislators and 2 citizens). The Commission will elect its own officers.

Sec. 41.37.030 states that the members of the Commission shall be selected from each judicial district of the state. The purpose of this section is to help insure that all of the land users of the state have a voice on the Commission and to avoid the Commission becoming a spokesperson for any one particular interest or geographic area.

Sec. 41.37.040 establishes the length of the terms of service for the commissioners. Commissioners appointed by the Governor will serve for four years. Commissioners appointed by the Legislature will serve for two years. Legislators appointed to the Commission will serve for the length of their legislative terms.

Sec. 41.37.050 provides that a commissioner can be removed from office for cause or for missing three consecutive Commission meetings.

Sec. 41.37.060 states that a legislator or employee of the state or municipality who serve as commissioner shall not suffer loss of compensation. This section also provides for per diem and travel expenses to be paid.

Sec. 41.37.070 allows the Commission to hire staff and contract for outside services.

Sec. 41.37.080 establishes the duties of the Commission. These duties include the consideration of public policy concerns of the state, municipalities and citizens of the state as they relate to or result from federal management of land in Alaska. The Commission can make recommendations to an agency of the state or federal government after it considers public policy. This section also requires the Commission to submit an annual report to the Governor and Legislature.

Sec. 41.37.090 allows the Commission to establish advisory groups. The membership of each advisory group must broadly represent the individuals affected by the management of federal lands.

Sec. 41.37.100 gives the Commission the authority to request the Attorney General to file suit if the Commission determines that the federal land manager is acting in violation of the law, intent of the law or the best interests of the state. The Attorney General will decide on whether to initiate the suit in accordance with AS 44.23.020.

Section 2

Section 2 defines the length of the terms of service for the first Commission members.

Sections 3 and 4

These sections mandate that the Commission terminate on June 30, 1988 unless the Legislature amends this legislation to allow the Commission to function past this date.

SUBJECT: SB 37

SB 37 reduces the statutory authorization to sell revenue bonds to the amount previously authorized before the passage of Chapter 68, SLA 1979 (copy attached).

Chapter 69, SLA 1979 appropriated the \$8.5 million in increased bond authorization. It would probably be wise to repeal Chapter 69, SLA 1979 based on the following:

- (1) It appropriates the proceeds of the authorization rescinded/reduced in SB 37.
- (2) Through the effective date clause, Chapter 69 was linked to Chapter 68, thus establishing a joint fund or sale requirement.

Please prepare for the Governor's introduction the bills necessary to accomplish the following:

1. Reduce the authorization for issuance of International Airports Revenue Bonds by \$8,500,000. This authorization was originally made by Chapter 68, SLA 1979.
2. Amend Chapter 69, SLA 1979 so that the \$8,500,000 appropriation will be made from the International Airports Revenue Fund rather than the International Airports Construction Fund.

The net effect desired from these two changes is to provide a direct appropriation from the IARF as a substitute for the revenue bonds which have been authorized but never issued. The Department of Transportation and Public Facilities has indicated that an adequate balance is available in the IARF to accomplish this, and that the additional bond authorization is no longer required.

I have included for your review suggested wording to be included, assuming that two separate bills will be required.

It should be noted that DOT/PF has several contracts outstanding which are funded by the Chapter 69, SLA 1979 appropriation.

In 1979 the Legislature authorized \$8.5 million in improvements to the Fairbanks International Airport. To fund these projects, Chapter 69 SLA 79 authorized the expenditure of funds and Chapter 68 SLA 79 authorized the issue of International Airport Revenue Fund Bonds.

Because market conditions precluded issuing the bonds at the 10% interest limit established by law and because adequate funds are available in the IARF to cover the \$8.5 million needed for construction, the bond authorization is no longer needed.

The following amendments are required:

1. Amend AS 37.15.410 by deleting (\$43,325,000) and inserting \$34,825,000. This is the amount authorized prior to Chapter 68/SLA 79.
2. Amend Chapter 69 SLA 79 Sec. 1 to read "...There is appropriated from the International Airport Revenue Fund"
3. Amend Chapter 69 SLA 79 Sec. 2 to read "This act takes effect immediately in accordance with AS 01.10.070 c"

When adopting the Finance Committee Substitute, I urge you to include adequate funding for the Water Supply, Sewerage, and Solid Waste Facilities Fund administered by the Department of Environmental Conservation.

This program, which has operated successfully for many years, provides matching grants to municipalities for the construction of water supply, sewerage, and solid waste facilities. Because there is a local match, the state expenditure generates an increased amount of capital projects throughout the state. The facilities are maintained by the local governments and utility districts and do not require state operating assistance.

The Fund currently is out of money, and DEC has a backlog of requests of almost \$19 million. In order to meet the needs, at least \$50 million should be allocated in the bond package, with additional appropriations in the FY 83 & 84 capital budgets to cover shortages.

Dear Mr. President:

Under the authority of article III, section 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the Village Safe Water Act (AS 46.07). This bill would amend the Act to make clear that solid waste facilities may be constructed under the provisions of the Act. In ch. 97 SLA 1980, which authorized the issuance of bonds for projects under the Act, solid waste facilities were expressly included as items for which bond money could be spent. In an informal attorney general's opinion, the Department of Law concluded that this amended the Village Safe Water Act by implication to authorize those facilities under its provisions. This bill would make that amendment explicit in the statutes.

In addition, the bill would make washeterias and bathing facilities optional in projects constructed under the Act. Under existing law, every project constructed under the Act must include a washeteria and bathing facilities. In many villages, such facilities are not needed or desired. However, the statutes require that they be constructed anyway. This results in unnecessary and unwanted facilities being provided at significant cost to the program. This bill will make provision of washeterias and bathing facilities optional instead of mandatory and will enable the state to work more closely with village authorities in providing the facilities actually desired by village residents.

Dear Mr. President:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18 of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to grants for northern technology. The grant program for northern technology was enacted in ch. 56 SLA 1979, assigning administrative responsibility to the Alaska Council on Science and Technology.

Section 1 of the attached bill merely increases the grant ceiling, from \$5,000 to \$7,500. After two years of administering this program, it is obvious that the original grant ceiling has been diminished due to inflation, increased shipping costs, and the technical assistance needed to insure success of these innovative projects. This has occurred even with the council not allowing applicants to charge for their own labor in proposals.

Further, there is no local, state, or federal grant program in this category that meets the monetary stipulation in the \$5,000 to \$7,500 range. Hence many good projects are left unfunded because they are over \$5,000, but do not qualify as a large scale project.

Section 2 of this bill redefines "northern technology." The council wishes to keep this program innovative and flexible -- tuned to the changing needs of society with the ability to respond to its needs in a speedy and timely fashion. Already, the council is identifying areas where small grants could be most helpful but are outside the purview of this or any other grant program. Two specific recent examples are in public safety (a smoke alarm best suited for the bush conditions) and medicine (the discovery of an Alaskan red algae which could be processed and used against herpes virus).

SB 54 - AN ACT RELATING TO THE ALASKA NATIONAL GUARD AND NAVAL MILITIA

Testimony
of
HENRY A. COMPTON
Recruiting and Retention Officer

Senate Bill 54 has three distinct parts. The first part, Sections 1 through 3, deals specifically with pay and protection for Alaska National Guard members when called to state duty at the call of the Governor. The first section says that everyone who is called to service to the state will receive pay and allowances as provided by the federal armed forces pay schedule. However, no individual will receive less than \$65 per day. It also includes a cost-of-living increase. Our current statute says a minimum of \$6 a day. It was passed soon after the earthquake in 1964 and has been overcome by inflation and other events. The \$65 minimum pay will affect only our lower rank enlisted members. Sergeants, enlisted grade five, and people lower than that currently receive less than \$65 per day. All other members of the guard under the federal pay standards would receive more than \$65. We look at it as simply a guarantee to our younger, lower rank enlisted members that they would not suffer a drastic financial hardship if the emergency to state service lasted any considerable length of time.

Section 2 says in writing that a guard member would be covered by the Workmen's Compensation Act while in duty to the state, and includes a provision that would cover them to and from their home.

This is unique in Workmen's Comp, but it is also unique in that guardsmen being called to state active duty would be on duty the minute they received the call from their higher command.

Section 3 deals with disability as opposed to death, and again deals with the Workmen's Comp section.

Section 4 is a definition of member which is all commissioned, warrant, or enlisted men and women in the guard or naval militia.

Section 5 proposes to restructure the re-enlistment bonus. Currently, enlisted guard members in Alaska receive the equivalent of 10 days of base pay each year for an extension or re-enlistment in the guard. What has happened over the years since this was enacted in 1972, we have a great many professional or career guardsmen who are in fact drawing this bonus today. People with 15, 20, 25 years of service who, because of the way it was originally written, receive 10 days of base pay annually. We propose to change that into a \$3,000 bonus payable for one six-year re-enlistment that would come during the decision-making years in a guardsman's career in the guard. That is through the twelfth year of service. At that time it would stop. We just don't feel we should continue to use the state's money to perpetuate a "careerist" in their job. It amounts now in some cases to merely a "spend it" that is given to them annually. We are making the payments in three \$1,000 increments each two years because we have no recoupment capability of state money, and we felt, let them earn the two years, then we'll pay them \$1,000. The \$1,000 is designed so that the individual will

also share the decision of how to spend the \$1,000 with the family. In the day before yesterday's paper, I read that of re-enlistment in the military forces, 90% is determined by family or friends of the service member. So, we wanted to encourage the family and friends of service members who may share in the \$1,000 to make the decision as to whether they re-enlist.

Section 6 proposes to add state retired national guard members to a program we currently enjoy for tuition reimbursement. We now reimburse all active members of the guard who perform satisfactorily, up to 50% of the tuition and required fees that they pay to attend any vocational education or technical school within the state. We propose to add a few retired members to that. The feeling is that this would hopefully draw a few more people into the retirement category. That is, they would stay in the guard longer, it would be a retention factor initially, and then a relatively small reward (about \$125 for the average reimbursement amount) for probably 15 or 20 members. But it keeps faith with our retirees. It also continues to remind retirees that they have served and are being rewarded in a small way, and they become recruiters for friends and children.

The Fiscal Note I hope is clear to you. I hope you all have a copy of the Fiscal Note. One thing to point out in the Fiscal Note: because of the every-other-year pay provision of the re-enlistment bonus, we do have a high point in fiscal '84; it drops off; it goes up in '86; when you extend it out into the early 1990's, you will find that the overall costs of the re-enlistment bonus will drop considerably as the members who are currently drawing the 10 days of base pay annually either

retire or drop out of the guard. The overall costs of our program will be reduced until . . . I looked at an actuary in 1992 and, actually, the re-enlistment bonus program in 10 years from now will be less expensive than it is today.

SENATOR STURGULEWSKI - Colonel, I wonder if we could take a look at Section 1. This section indicates that the \$65 is a base, but I'm wondering, the way you have your cost of living adjustment based on the full percent increase of the increase of the consumer price index. That's pretty high. A lot of times you'll see labor contracts and other things coming in for a percentage of that because a lot of times those things, depending on the individual, are not actually transmitted into direct, say deterioration if you will, in cost of living. I was just wondering, have you done anything to project that out and see if in fact your base according to this exceeds what the equivalent grade might be on the federal level?

COMPTON - You mean by adding the 10% in four or five years?

STURGULEWSKI - Yes

COMPTON - Yes, and I looked also at another thing in the proposals that are currently in Congress for increases in the federal military pay. We know there's going to be a 5.23 in July, and habitually for the last four years the increases in October have been in excess of 10%. I think what's going to happen, Senator, is that the federal standard of pay and allowances will outstrip in the next four or five

years the cost of living raises to the \$65 minimum. I think we'll have fewer members that will have to have their pay allowance supplemented because their pay allowances on the federal scale will be high enough to satisfy the requirement. We have looked at other proposals to compensate the lower ranks. I personally served during the Watts Riots on state emergency active duty, and we had young men under my command that were drawing \$1.75 a day. It's a cumbersome thing to compensate everybody. However, what happens in an emergency situation are guardsmen who will serve for 24 hours a day and maybe have some cold C-rations who serve right along side contract labor persons in the case of a forest fire or a flood who will be earning \$15 to \$20 an hour and have steaks for dinner and this sort of thing. We've experienced . . . I personally have experienced it with highway patrolmen in California who were on full per diem and lived at the Holiday Inn while we slept on the street corner wrapped up in a sleeping bag. So, what we're trying to do is just say 'Hey young men and women, if you have to serve, we're going to make sure that your family doesn't suffer considerable financial hardship.'

SENATOR BENNETT - Any other questions of the Colonel? Do I hear a motion on the bill?

SENATOR SACKETT - Move and ask unanimous consent we put it out with individual recommendations.

III. ANALYSIS (See Fiscal Note Preparation Instructions, Section III)

Section 1 extends reimbursement of tuition to retired members. About 50 retired members would use this benefit. The average reimbursement is \$75.00 for active members. This will cost \$3,770 per year. Shown above as \$5,000 each year.

Sections 2-5 have no budget impact except in the event of a disaster. The per day cost per person would increase from \$45 to \$70.00 depending on the location. This funding is received from the Governor's Emergency Fund.

Section 7 will require expenditures of \$330.0 in FY 84, \$197.0 in FY 85, \$454.0 in FY 86 and \$303.0 in FY 87. Beginning FY 88, the expenditures will decrease each year as current (1980-81) members drawing the old bonus payment will begin to retire and leave the Guard for other reasons. As the older members retire or drop out, the new program will have completed paying 33 1/3% of the new members. Attached to this fiscal note is a break down of the payments to be paid FY 84-87.
