### III. ANALYSIS

Only Section 1 of SB 125 effects the Department of Community and Regional Affairs and is, therefore, the only section addressed in this fiscal note.

Section 1 of this bill would make a supplemental appropriation of \$4.6 million to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for the State Revenue Sharing program. This additional amount, which represents a 12.1% increase in the grant funding for this program, does not directly cause a great deal more expense. Some additional computer time would have to be purchased, and some additional printing and mailing costs would be incurred to handle the supplemental payments. These costs would total only about five hundred dollars.

However, other problems have been encountered in implementing the State Revenue Sharing revisions found in Chapter 155, SLA 1980. The start up administrative costs for this "new" program have been greater than originally anticipated. This is reflected in added costs for:

- 1) Computer time, to input data and run printouts, that was not required under the old program;
- 2) Long distance telephone expenses incurred to answer questions regarding the new program, and to address misconceptions and misunderstandings resulting from the new Revenue Sharing law;
- 3) New word processing and computer equipment needed to meet the increased work load resulting from this program; and
- 4) Professional fees and services to program computers to handle the new program that can only be feasibly handled in a computerized mode.

The other major factor contributing to the increased costs was the addition of Native village governments (Sec. 29.89.050) as eligible recipients of State Revenue Sharing Funds. This addition increased our number of clients by over one-third. The original idea of making Native village governments eligible for State Revenue Sharing was proposed in SB 565. This Department prepared a fiscal note for that bill, which included additional administrative costs of 77.5 to implement this concept, but when the Native village government provisions were added to the Revenue Sharing bill late last session the fiscal note was not included. The cost of serving these new entities are reflected in higher costs for:

- 1) Long distance telephone costs to assist eligible villages;
- 2) Addition printing costs for applications and regulations;
- 3) Additional postage to mail applications and payments;
- 4) Additional travel to assist Native village governments in preparing applications; and
- 5) Other miscellaneous costs that reflect the simple fact that the more communities are now eligible to participate in this program.

After six months of experience we have a better understanding of what is needed to administer this program. The following reflects additional funding that will be needed to adequately administer the State Revenue Sharing Program.

Position Paper

Senate Bill 125

The Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS) supports Senate Bill 125 which proposes a supplemental appropriation to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for programs which provide state assistance to municipalities under Title 29 of the Alaska Statutes. Of the most concern to DHSS is the program available under AS 29.90.020 which provides payment to a municipality or other hospital sponsor for 25% of the total project cost of hospital construction. Hospital construction has been approved by DHSS and begun with the expectation of 25% reimbursement of the total project cost under AS 29.90.020.

Due to the complexity of the formulas for some of the programs of state assistance, no one is sure that the proposed supplement of \$4,600,000 is sufficient to cover the shortfall for the subject programs. It is, however, possible to determine the shortfall in the program for hospital construction. Current recipients of hospital construction assistance under AS 29.90.020 are two facilities in Anchorage, one in Fairbanks, and one in Ketchikan. The hospital construction assistance for these municipalities last year are as follows:

According to information provided by staff of the Department of Community and Regional Affairs the total shortfall for state hospital construction assistance which should be provided through a supplement appropriation is \$1,027,220. In the interest of continuity and the completion of hospital construction projects already authorized the department recommends support of Senate Bill 125.



With the supplemental appropriation of \$18,400,000 to the several accounts collectively managed by the Department of Community and Regional Affairs by \* Sec. 1 of this bill, I am told that sufficient money is added to amounts appropriated by the 1980 Legislature to assure all recipients of their full share to which entitled by law during FY 1981. Native village governments would be receiving, under AS 29.89.050, the full \$25,000 to which each is entitled.

Assuming this is true, the addition of the \$780,000 by \* Sec. 3 of the bill suggests two conclusions:

(1) The "miscellaneous services account", AS 29.-89.080, to which an appropriation for miscellaneous municipal purposes would normally be made, is "over-appropriated" by \$780,000. AS 29.95.010(b) directs that any "surplus" amounts pour over into the tax equalization account, AS 29.88.035, for distribution to municipalities. Under this interpretation, municipalities -- but not unincorporated Native villages -- would share an additional \$780,000.

(2) The appropriation is invalid: it is not an appropriation made to the miscellaneous municipal service account, the source, by law, of allocations to unincorporated communities under AS 29.89.050, and direct

appropriations that do not pass through this account for the support for one group of recipients or another are not authorized.

Under either conclusion, the Native village governments should not expect to receive the additional \$780,000 as the amendment's sponsor intended.

For: "An Act making supplemental appropriations to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs and the Department of Revenue for programs which provide state financial assistance to municipalities and other recipients; and providing for an effective date."

The Department of Health and Social Services (DHSS) supports Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 125 which proposes a supplemental appropriation to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for programs which provide state assistance to municipalities under Title 29 of the Alaska Statutes. Of the most concern to DHSS is the program available under AS 29.90.020 which provides payment to a municipality or other hospital sponsor for 25% of the total project cost of hospital construction. Hospital construction has been approved by DHSS and begun with the expectation of 25% reimbursement of the total project cost under AS 29.90.020.

Due to the complexity of the formulas for some of the programs of state assistance, no one is sure that the proposed supplement of \$18,400,000 as shown in Section 1 of the Bill is the correct amount to cover the shortfall for the subject programs. It is, however, possible to determine the shortfall in the program for hospital construction. Current recipients of hospital construction assistance under AS 29.90.020 are two facilities in Anchorage, one in Fairbanks, and one in Ketchikan. The hospital construction assistance for these municipalities last year are as follows:

According to information provided by staff of the Department of Community and Regional Affairs the total shortfall for state hospital construction assistance which should be provided through a supplement appropriation is \$1,027,220. In the interest of continuity and the completion of hospital construction projects already authorized the department recommends support of Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 125.

I have read Mr. Chenoweth's memorandum to you on this subject and agree with his conclusions.

The constitutional problem could be substantially mitigated and the statutory problem eliminated if the appropriation were not through AS 29.89.050 but distributed equally to recipients of state aid under that section. If that is desired I would suggest the following language:

"Section 3. The sum of \$780,000 is appropriated from the general fund to the Department of Community and Regional Affairs for distribution in equal shares to each native village government entitled to state aid under AS 29.89.050."

This would not be free from constitutional question. An argument can be made that such a direct appropriation violates the prohibition against local or special acts if a general act can be made applicable contained in sec. 19, Article II of the constitution. It is my opinion that appropriations are by their very nature special acts; that there is no requirement that appropriations be pursuant to enabling substantive law and that the appropriation suggested would be constitutional.

If the committee adopts the language suggested by Berrier for distribution of additional funds to native village governments, each would receive about \$13,000 in supplemental funds, raising the FY 81 entitlement for each to about \$34,000. In order to correct the inequity between the native village governments and the small incorporated communities that would be created by that language, please consider the following additional amendments:

RE: FISCAL IMPACT OF CSSB 125

At the meeting of the House Finance committee, on March 24, 1981, you, and several members of the committee requested that this agency put together some information about the fiscal impact of a committee substitute for Senate Bill 125 and the committee substitute for House Bill 4. This information was to show impact on individual municipalities, and, also to show the results of those individual municipalities' intentions to reduce local taxes.

The attached chart shows the estimated residential property tax revenues generated by the taxing jurisdictions within the state. It is the computation of real property taxes used in the preparation of a fiscal note for House Bill 4. Additionally, the chart shows the reductions in those amounts resulting from some municipalities' following through with their intentions to reduce property taxes should Senate Bill 125 be adopted. That chart indicates residential property tax reductions of \$19,207,176 and sales tax reductions of \$4,410,778.

Only five communities have provided information which can be translated into dollar figure reductions as shown on the chart, however, we believe it is reasonable to assume that other municipalities would follow through with similar types of tax reductions if the bill were signed into law.

I hope this information is satisfactory for your needs.

Dear Mr. President:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill which would centralize collection of state claims in the Department of Revenue. This bill, based on Oregon law, provides for the Department of Revenue to withhold refunds and any other payments from the state and credit those payments to a debtor's account with a state agency.

State agencies, under this bill, will submit a list of debtors having liquidated debts with the agency to the Department of Revenue which will determine whether those debtors are entitled to a tax refund or other payment. If it is determined that enough money is available for setoff, the claimant agency will notify the debtor of its intent to set off the debt and provide the debtor with an opportunity to request a hearing. After a hearing, or after the expiration of time for a hearing, the Department of Revenue will divert part or all of the payment to the agency, which in turn will credit the debtor's account in the amount of the setoff. This bill will provide an efficient method of collecting debts owed to the state.

The Statewide Collection Act which the Governor is introducing is similar to House Bill 869 from last year's session. Some changes have been made to that bill in order to strengthen its operation. In the first place, the Act requires that liquidated debts be turned over to the Department of Revenue for collection procedures unless certain exceptions delineated in section 2 exist. Secondly, the set-off procedure would be against any amount owed by the state to the debtor instead of just taxes and/or Permanent fund dividends. And third, the Department of Revenue would also have the authority to follow concurrent collection procedures under AS 09.

It appears from our research that accounts receivable of 3 1/2 to 4 million dollars might be subject to collection by the Department of Revenue under this bill. The bulk of these delinquent accounts is in the student loan program, although a certain amount of delinquency also exists in most of the other state loan programs. We will initiate the program with a modest core unit designed to implement all the responsibilities and functions assigned to us under this bill. The first year of experience will give us an opportunity to ascertain the precise workload that will be assigned to the Department of Revenue. It is possible that this group could be expanded horizontally in subsequent years if there is sufficient workload justification.

The Department of Revenue, through its experience with tax collection efforts, has developed expertise in the areas of skip-tracing, progressive collection efforts, and levy and seizure. With the elimination of individual income tax and the collection workload related to that, we are in a good position to pick up other collection efforts. Although this fiscal note identifies additional resources necessary to do this job, it should be pointed out that our FY '82 budget contemplates the deletion of some sixteen positions during FY '82. The operation of that budget and this fiscal note concurrently would result in our retaining some of those positions scheduled for deletion under the FY '82 budget proposal. Accordingly, the cost indicated below would merely be retractions of the deletion proposed for FY '82 rather than actual additions to the FY '81 continuation level (that is we would drop 16 positions and add back 4 with a net deletion of 12).

The cost associated with implementation of this bill would amount to \$152,200 for FY '82. This includes the salary and benefits for a Revenue Enforcement Officer III, 2 Tax Collection Specialists II's, (or Paralegal Assistants) and an Accounts Receivable Clerk. In addition, we would require \$5,000 in travel money for the Revenue Enforcement Officer to meet face to face with debtors in the extremely difficult collection cases. We would also need an enhancement of the existing accounts receivable system in order to accommodate the liquidated debts assigned to us. The basic design for that

system already exists and would need some minor modification to include these additional accounts. Detailed design and programming effort in order to get an up and running system which would accommodate the debts under this bill would cost an additional \$20,000, which is included in contractual services. I have also included \$5,000 for additional telephone costs and \$2,000 for postage. Additional commodities and equipment costs are also included in the fiscal note.

It is difficult to estimate at this time the potential results which could be achieved from this bill. Based on our past performance with the collection of taxes, a very difficult item to collect these days, I feel that the Enforcement Division is well situated to significantly improve the collection of delinquent accounts on a statewide basis. We will find that the amount collected will far exceed the cost involved. The first year of experience will give us a better handle on the cost/benefits as well as the potential workload for this unit.

6 For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to memorials to Alaskan veterans; and  
7 providing for an effective date."

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 \* Section 1. MEMORIAL TO ALASKAN VETERANS. (a) A memorial to Alaskan  
10 veterans shall be constructed by the Department of Transportation and Public  
11 Facilities. The memorial shall be located in Denali State Park on a site  
12 adjacent to the Parks Highway.

13 (b) The design of the memorial shall be chosen by a committee composed  
14 of the adjutant general of the state, two persons selected by the American  
15 Legion, and two persons selected by the Veterans of Foreign Wars. The  
16 adjutant general shall be chairman of the committee.

17 (c) The memorial shall be maintained by the division of parks, Depart-  
18 ment of Natural Resources.
