The fiscal impact is based on an estimate of 1,200 owner/operators that could apply for authority under amended statute. While an attempt would be made to simplify the application process, the fact remains that this legislation would effectively triple the number of motor carriers regulated by this Commission. Further, based on our experience with regulating contract carriers of bulk commodities, i. e., dump trucks, it is difficult to insure compliance with the law. Further these amendments imply that this Commission would set maximum/minimum tariffs, which is currently not being done.

In summation, the impact on the Commission staff is difficult to estimate. It is obvious that the workload for the tariff staff, enforcement staff, and support staff will at least double with the definite possibility of increased enforcement hearings to assure compliance, it also necessary to estimate the need for an additional hearing officer and assigned Assistant Attorney General. It is estimated that the cost of the program will continue at the same level through FY '84 and the future.

The additional positions recommended to carry out the work required would be as follows:

- 2 Tariff Specialists at Range 21
- 1 Administrative Support Technician at Range 12
- 6 Transportation Field Agents at Range 16 (4 of those positions in Anchorage; 1 in Fairbanks; 1 in Kenai/Soldotna)
- 2 Administrative Support Technician at Range 12 (1 of those positions in Anchorage; 1 in Fairbanks)
- 1 Hearing Officer at Range 24
- 1 Assistant Attorney General, based on interagency agreement with the Department of Law.

The effect of the proposed legislation is to narrow the width of the Haul Road Corridor to 2 miles from the present width of 10 miles. It is anticipated that in conjunction with the current public access to the Highway, the narrowing of the corridor will increase public land use adjacent to the corridor for hunting and fishing.

This increased public use will require two Fish and Wildlife Protection officers to be stationed at Five Mile and Coldfoot on the Highway.





SENATE BILL NO. 136

"An Act relating to the practice of optometry, and authorizing the use of ophthalmic drugs by optometrists."

This bill would permit the use of selected drugs by certain optometrists and as such would delete from the definition of optometry the restriction against the use of drugs. All of these are drugs which are instilled directly into the eye.

In addition to topical anaesthetics, drugs used in examining the human eye include:

Mydriatics - cause pupil to open;

Myotics - cause pupil to close down;

Cycloplegics - cause temporary paralysis of the muscles controlling the shape of the lens.

A majority of states now allow optometrists to use diagnostic topical drugs, either through specific enabling legislation or through the lack of specific prohibitions. The issue of the use of such drugs by optometrists has been controversial. In recent years certain states have given permission while it has been denied in other states. Those in favor of the use of drugs by optometrists argue that optometric services are more widely distributed than ophthalmologic services and that the optometrist serves as an entry point for primary eye care. The use of diagnostic drugs is said to expand the ability of the optometrist to recognize eye abnormalities and to increase medical referral for diagnosis and treatment. The optometric group also states that the drugs which are proposed rarely have adverse effects.

Those opposing permissive legislation argue that the use of drugs would not materially improve the capacity of optometrists to recognize abnormalities. Optometrists are not expected to diagnose diseases of the eye, and if a departure from normal is noted, the patient is expected to be referred to a physician for diagnosis. The concern on the part of the medical community is that the optometrists would be making diagnostic judgments which the physicians do not believe them qualified to make. Moreover, the medical community notes that adverse reactions, while admittedly rare for certain of the drugs, can have extremely serious consequences when they do occur. A higher rate of predisposition to a certain type of glaucoma in Alaska Natives is cited. Use of mydriatics could possibly precipitate an attack.

Limitations are placed on the use of certain drugs by the permissive legislation of some states. None are described in the proposed Alaska bill. In Oregon, for example, the Board of Optometry is empowered to designate the diagnostic pharmaceutical agents for topical use, but provides that the designation shall be with the advice and guidance of

the Board of Medical Examiners for the State of Oregon. Rhode Island permits the use of mydriatics, miotics and topical anaesthetics while Maine permits only the use of topical anaesthetics and mydriatics. A bill which has been considered in the Ohio legislature specifically prohibits use of pilocarpine (a drug which constricts the pupil), atropine and homatropine (drugs which dilate the pupil and temporarily paralyze accommodation of the lens) and 10% phenylephrine (a strong mydriatic).

Some states define the type of training in pharmacology which would be required before an optometrist would be permitted to use diagnostic drugs. SB 136 contains such provisions.

If the Legislature chooses to authorize use of certain drugs by optometrists, the Department of Health and Social Services suggests that definitions and restrictions similar to those in use in other states may be advisable, and that the professional opinion of the medical and optometric communities should be sought to insure the health and safety of the general public.

Remarks of David Rose on SB 137 before the Senate Committee on Community & Regional Affairs.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Committee:

I am Dave Rose, Executive Director of the Alaska Municipal Bond Bank Authority. As you know, the Bond Bank sells general obligation and revenue bonds on the national bond market (Wall Street) and uses the proceeds of the sales to purchase bonds of Alaskan cities which would not ordinarily be able to sell debt or would only be able to sell debt at unfairly high interest rates. The Bond Bank is rated "A" (and in one bond issue "AAA"); the interest rates generated by an "A" rating are passed along to lesser rated or unrated Alaskan cities.

Ordinarily, I would not appear before you to encourage passage of legislation authorizing the coming year's level of debt to be issued were it not for passage, last session, of amendatory legislation to the Bond Bank Act. Passage last June of SB 1 mandates that State agencies have their level

of bonding approved by law. SB 137 before you today seeks approval of issues amounting to \$20,000,000. The Bond Bank Board of Directors and myself support this legislation.

The Bond Bank has sufficient reserves to leverage this debt and no capital appropriation is being sought by the Bank this year. All operating expenses are from program receipts and no increase in operating budget is being sought as a result of this legislation. In short, there is no budgetary fiscal impact on either the capital or the operating budgets.

Last year the Bond Bank issued \$4,155,000 of revenue debt and \$19,800,000 of general obligation debt.

This year it expects to issue \$10,000,000 of revenue debt and \$21,000,000 of general obligation debt.

Next year it plans to issue \$20,000,000 in revenue debt and \$25,000,000 in general obligation debt.

I hope the Committee will support this legislation. Are there any questions?
