SUBJECT: SB 200

This bill would provide an exemption from the Fisheries Business Tax for those fishermen who catch and freeze salmon aboard the catching vessel. This provision is being proposed to exempt a group of trollers who have installed freezing equipment on their vessels in order to maximize the quality of their salmon by freezing it immediately after it is caught.

The proposed legislation will cause some potentially serious administrative problems in that if one of the exempted fishermen sells his catch to a buyer who is not a licensed processor, then the buyer will be liable for the tax. Under the current law, a buyer is not liable for the tax unless he performs some processing function. Thus, if a buyer acquires salmon from an exempted fisherman, we will have to attempt to keep track of these buyers to insure that the tax is paid. Since the only record we have of a buyer is a business license, if one was obtained, and the name and business description may not identify him as a buyer at all, we will have very little information available to use as we attempt to insure that the tax is paid on these transactions. It is impossible to estimate to potential revenue loss which might result from these transactions since we do not know the dollar volume of sales which an excluded fisherman might make to a buyer.

Dear Senators Dankworth and Bennett:

Please revise Senate Bill 203 to include two amendments. The first amendment would provide FY 80 funding for overexpenditures for personal services. These overexpenditures occurred because of the following:

- (1) A position upgrade from a Range 8 to a Range 14 was unbudgeted,
- (2) Shift differentials were unbudgeted,
- (3) Overtime and temporary employees were unbudgeted.

The second amendment would provide \$10,000 for the APBC for FY 81. This request is necessary to cover the cost of equipment ordered by the APBC for a satellite TV demonstration project in support of the satellite tape delay center. Because of accounting errors APBC ordered equipment in excess of authorization. APBC has cancelled the purchase of \$26,496 of this equipment but will still exceed authorization by \$4275. Also, there will be additional costs for freight and cancellation changes. Funding this request will provide sufficient funds to cover these expenditures.

It is clear that both of these amendments reflect poor management on the part of the APBC, which the Commission is aware of. The Commission is taking steps, including personnel changes, to prevent such occurrences in the future.





Mr. Porcaro of APBC has forwarded to me your request for a written explanation of the "specific impact on our station (KHNS) if our supplemental grant is not approved by the Legislature for the amount requested."

Our supplemental request of \$19,300.00, made October 10, 1980 to the APBC is based on one-third of the difference between our FY 81 Operating request and our actual grant. Because KHNS was under construction at the beginning of the fiscal year (July, 1980) and did not begin broadcasting operations until October 4, KHNS could have withstood a one-quarter cut in its operating budget grant. In fact, KHNS suffered a two-fifths cut. The impact has been felt in two ways:

(1) KHNS adjusted its Federal grant accounts to pay for Management salaries through December 31, 1980 (allowed), but with the resultant loss of option to purchase some desirable production equipment such as stereo cartridge machines, a cartridge machine for the newsroom, and audition turntable, a fifth Scully Reel-to-reel tape recorder which was highly recommended by the Federal administrators of our grant.

(2) KHNS has not been able to budget a fifth full-time employee necessary for CPB qualification and smoother operations/development of our station. At present we operate with a Manager, a Program Director and a Production Director on salary. Our full-time News Reporter receives \$6.16 per hour, and two part-time announcers earn the Alaska minimum wage. We have one CETA employee. We employ two engineers on call-out contract at \$12.00/hour, far below the prevailing rates. KHNS has twelve scheduled, reliable volunteers.

If KHNS were not to receive any supplemental funds, the status described in (2) above would continue.

If KHNS were to receive any supplemental funds, they would be budgeted to employ a Development Director and a News Reporter in Skagway, and to more

fairly compensate our current staff.

Our October 10, 1980 request for supplemental funds allocated \$18,010 to salaries and benefits, and \$1,290 to general office overhead. Any funds granted as a supplement to our Operating grant will be allocated in this way, and the amount of the supplemental grant will determine whether or not any currently-held monies will be re-allocated for office equipment purchases (we need a copier, a desk, two office chairs, a check protector and a typewriter), and miscellaneous production equipment we are currently doing without.

Although all stations budgets were cut after the Governor's veto, Raven Radio was hit particularly hard with a cut of 75,200.00, half of our operating budget. If Raven is to meet its potential and go on the air as a community service to Sitka, we simply must have some of that money restored. Cut were; salaries, office furniture, records, raw tape, and other essentials for a station starting up. Raven Radio has the potential of going on the air as the best prepared station in Alaska Public Broadcasting. If we have some of the money restored we can do listener surveys, membership identification and awareness work. This will enable us to sign on with programming which is well planned to meet community needs, and put on the air in time periods and using formats which will insure the largest listenership. Granting this money to Raven Radio now will assure a more efficient and effective service when we get on the air. It will enable us to plan to better be able to use state resources in the future.

We also need money to restore cuts in our budget for building modification, desks, and office equipment. Doing the work right in the first place on the building will save us in the future. Having the office tools to do the job will help us in our planning. Attached is a line for line itemization and justification of our supplemental request.

We also need to modify the heating system in the building, If we do not get this portion of the supplemental, we will have to do expensive retrofitting of our studios after they are built, and will have a lot of trouble with stray R.F. in our audio.

The Department of Education respectfully requests a reduction of \$210.0 General Fund authorization in Local Formula - REAA component of Financial Support - Districts BRU. The Department further requests \$210.0 General Fund authorization for Seward Skill Center Administration.

Entitlement calculations for Local Formula - REAA were made for the remainder of FY81 showing an excess of funds for that component.

This request for \$210.0 General Fund authorization for the Skill Center is to supplant a shortfall in interagency receipts from Community and Regional Affairs. This shortfall is a result of low enrollment of CETA students during the first quarter of FY81 and projected low enrollment for the remainder of the year. Without this General Fund authorization, Skill Center programs will be reduced and no new activities will be added. The reduced enrollment affects programs throughout the Skill Center and is not concentrated in any one program or cluster of related programs.

Local Formula - REAA component was repealed in SLA 1980 Chapter 26 effective 7-1-81 and incorporated into the Supplemental Equilization Aid, a component of Foundation Program Component BRU.

Skill Center's FY82 Budget Request includes a fund source change from interagency receipts to General Fund (form 5A page 843).

The first addition is necessary to provide the required language for the state museum to pay for a security system which has already been installed. The second addition would appropriate an additional \$60,000 for the Alaska Public Broadcasting Commission to cover unbudgeted expenses incurred during FY 81. Among these unbudgeted expenses were: (1) additional personal services required for a temporary person to fill in while the permanent person was on medical leave, (2) legal expenses for a FCC ruling concerning the use of the satellite system for political users, (3) increased travel by Commission members and Rural Alaska Television Network (RATNET) members. The third addition would appropriate \$20,000 for the State Board of Education to provide funding for increased travel. The need for increased travel is a result of the Board's involvement in a variety of special issues and the increased use of subcommittees.



As part of a large scale installation of a security system in various state capital complex buildings the security system at the State Museum was upgraded. This upgrading was necessary because of the inadequacy of the former system and the number of false alarms generated. Jim Eastman, Building Security Division, Alaska State Troopers, put together the multi-building security plan.

The State Museum planned to use capital funds from SLA 78, Chapter 113. However, following discussions, memorandums and RSA, it was determined that this was inappropriate because of the legislative language. However, the economy scale still indicated it would be desirable to do the work all at one time, so the Legislative Affairs Agency proceeded with the installation in the Museum as well as the other buildings. This was done with the understanding that legislation would be submitted to provide a change in language for the capital appropriation to the State Museum.

This memorandum is to request that such wording be included with the Appropriation's request for such changes. The funds available to the State Museum are from Chapter 113, SLA 78, Account Code: 05-17-9-116. I am including a copy of the RSA that had been prepared but which was not implemented. The State Board of Education respectfully submits the following information in support of a request for a FY 81 supplemental appropriation in the amount of \$20,000 in object code 200-Travel.

The State Board of Education is the head of the Department of Education under AS 14.07.075 and is responsible for the overall policy direction of the Department. It is through regular meetings, subcommittees, task force and advisory commissions that the Board conducts its operating functions. Efforts to fulfill our responsibility as head of the Department has necessitated more frequent meetings of the Board. Involvement in major issues, such as special education fundings, educational policy development and departmental reorganization has caused the Board to increase its use of subcommittees.

The State Board has an opportunity to meet with a large number of local district board members semi-annually, at the Alaska Association of School Boards and the National School Board Association annual conferences in November and April.

One Board member is currently serving on the National Association of State Board of Education Governmental Affairs Committee which meets three times a year, normally on the East Coast.

The Board president is automatically a commissioner of the Education Commission of the State which meets annually, he also is on their policy committee which meets three times a year.

We also have the National Association of State Board of Education



Western Region's annual meeting that normally calls for two Board members' participation for adequate coverage. Department of Education respectfully submits the following information for an FY 81 Supplemental appropriation for Alaska Public Broadcasting Commission Administration.

Personnel Services - 100 \$10,000
Emergency part-time substitute, overtime for programming of Satellite Delay Center and overtime for Secretarial and Accounting duties.

Travel and Moving - 200 \$25,000
There has been an increase in the number of Commissioner meetings, RAINET meetings, Long Range Planning meetings, and Budget Review Committee meetings. In addition, an audit of all APBC programmed station accounts must be accomplished this year and APBC Engineer will be required to travel to various stations this year. This increase in travel along with inflationary travel costs necessitates an increase in our APBC travel authorization.

Contractual Services - 300 \$25,000
Inflationary labor costs have been the major problem in APBC's increased contractual costs. Legal costs incurred for Satellite TV project special opinion, re: political broadcasts relating to FCC Rules 312(2)(7). *S.L.C.*

If this supplemental is not approved, the expected impact would probably be that APBC would have to curtail the Satellite Delay Center TV operation within the near future. The commission would be unable to hold any future long range planning, RAINET or budget review meetings during the remainder of FY 81.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a supplemental appropriation for the Department of Education.

Section 1 appropriates an amount to repay a loan of \$3,570,127 which the Postsecondary Education Commission borrowed from the Student Loan Marketing Association. In RPL 8146, both the Legislative Budget and Audit Committee and I approved this loan. Interest is accruing at the rate of \$9,000 a week, so I strongly urge your immediate passage of this bill.

Section 2 appropriates an amount necessary to implement AS 43.18.100, state aid for retirement of school construction debt. Payments under that statute are based on audited expenditures of the second prior year. Due to large increases in expenditures in Fairbanks, Kenai, and Kodiak, and to an approximate \$5 million in interest and principal payments by the North Slope Borough, of which the Department of Education had not been notified by the time of its initial calculations, the entitlement of local districts for FY 81 exceeds the currently appropriated amount by \$9,800,000.

Section 3 appropriates \$4,500,000 for the revised foundation program computations for FY 81.

As you will recall, the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education ran short of student loan funds this past fall. In order to provide full funding for this program, we borrowed over \$3 million from the Student Loan Marketing Association. We have funded all eligible loan applicants now and have funds sufficient to carry us through the fiscal year.

We must now seek a supplemental budget appropriation to repay these borrowed funds. The total amount of our needed supplemental is \$3,570,127 consisting of:

\$3,327,127	Principal borrowed
108,000	Oct. - Dec. 31 interest
<u>135,000</u>	Jan. 1 - Mar. 31 interest
\$3,570,127	

If the loan is repaid prior to March 31, there will be savings (of approximately \$9,000 per week). Similarly, if the loan is extended beyond March 31, the cost will escalate proportionately.



Department of Education respectfully submits the following information for an FY 81 Supplemental appropriation of \$4,500.0 for Foundation Program Components.

The Department has received the local district reports and prepared the revised foundation program computations for FY 81. This report establishes the floor level for all districts for the fiscal year in terms of Foundation Support. The attached "Revised Report Recapitulations" indicates that a minimum of \$2,217.0 will be required in supplemental funds for local district support. In addition, the Department has excluded 35 units from these calculations due to insufficient information to support the claims. We anticipate that an additional \$1,750.0 will be required if these units are supported in the final computations at year-end. We also request, an additional \$500.0 to provide for changes in final reports as local districts refine their records for year-end closing. Please note that this \$500.0 would provide for a minimal increase of 10-12 units above the approximately 6,950 units claimed on this report.

If these supplemental funds are not provided, the statutes require the Commissioner to prorate available funds across the board to all districts.

Dear Senator Dankworth:

This letter is in regard to Senate Bill 203 for supplemental funding for debt retirement and the Foundation Support Program.

Attached is a copy of our FY 81 entitlement for State Aid for Retirement of School Construction Debt. You will note that it was prorated at 78.8167%. The Anchorage School District total entitlement was \$11,446,809. The pro rata amount is \$9,021,997; the shortfall is \$2,424,812. Last year legislation was passed allowing 100% for retirement of school construction debt. At the time it was passed, the Department of Education notified the Governor's office of this shortfall and that supplemental funds would be forthcoming in the new year.

Most of the school districts and boroughs were probably not aware that there were insufficient funds to meet their expenses. In the case of bonds, this amount is set and you can't cut back; it has to be paid. This is one of the reasons why the passage of SB 203 is so important to the local school districts.
