SUBJECT:

I completely support the Department of Natural Resources request for a supplemental appropriation to use Boeing Computer Services for their developmental efforts the remainder of fiscal year 1981.

The Anchorage and Juneau data centers are running in excess of 90% capacity. At the present time we cannot provide adequate support to a project the size of theirs and continue service to our production customers.

I will request a capital budget amendment to greatly enhance the capacities of both data centers, especially Anchorage, in FY 82. This request will include funding for three months of Boeing support so Natural Resources may continue their project while the Anchorage center is being expanded. At that time the work will be brought back to our data center and the Boeing contract cancelled.

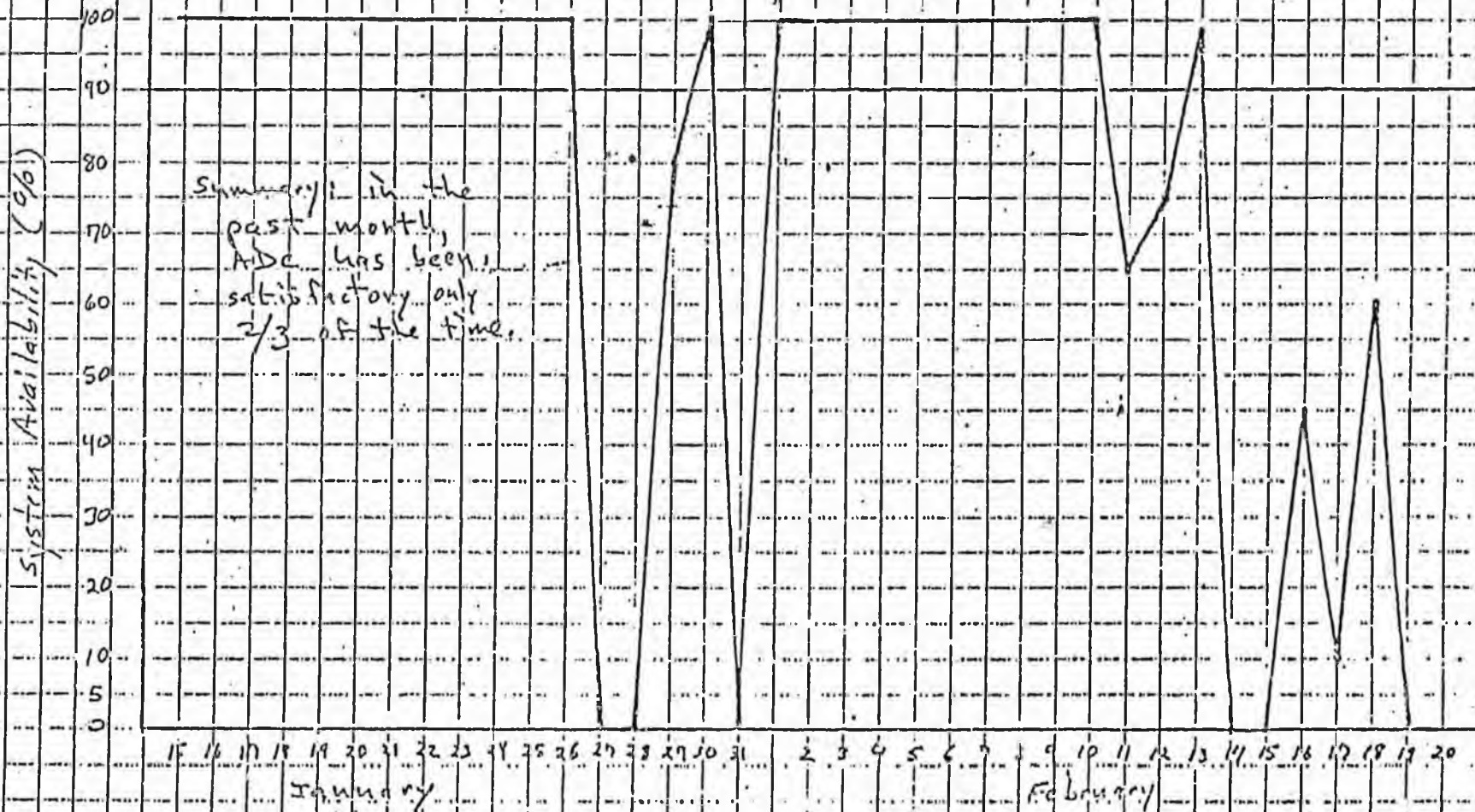

"An Act relating to the licensing of practitioners of naturopathic healing; and providing for an effective date."

The bill provides the licensing of naturopaths and defines qualifications necessary for licensure.

Definition

Naturopathy is defined as a system of treatment which emphasizes assistance to nature and includes the use of natural substances and physical means. Methods of treatment commonly include corrective nutrition, use of vitamins, minerals, enzymes and botanical preparations, counseling, hypnotherapy, massage, manipulation and other physical methods. There is apparently some controversy among naturopaths regarding the use of surgical methods.

Educational Background of Naturopaths

The National College of Naturopathic Medicine, with campuses in Portland, Oregon and Wichita, Kansas, is the only residential institution in the U.S. offering a curriculum in naturopathy. The course duration is four years. Admissions requirements include high school graduation and two years of college or university (there has been discussion with regard to expansion to three years). There is also a correspondence school of naturopathy in California. Graduates of this program would not be eligible for licensure in Alaska under the requirements contemplated in CS for S.B. 274.

Current Status of Naturopathy in Alaska

Alaska currently has no statute providing for the licensure of naturopathic physicians. The Attorney General has held that, to the extent that naturopathy constitutes the practice of medicine as defined in the Alaska Statutes, any person practicing naturopathy would be required to be licensed by the State Board of Medical Examiners.

Position of the Department of Health and Social Services

The scientific basis of naturopathy has been questioned by the medical community. In a 1968 study, the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare stated that "naturopathic theory and practice are not based upon the body of basic knowledge related to health, disease and health care which has been widely accepted by the scientific community." This position has remained unaltered. The American Public Health Association has also expressed reservations.

Certain disease categories would not appear to be amenable to successful treatment through naturopathic methods. A few examples would include malignancies, diabetes in certain age groups or of certain degrees of severity, certain types of infectious diseases, etc. Protection of the public would

require that the public clearly understands the limitations of the naturopathic approach and that the practitioner be able to recognize those conditions in which his therapy would not be beneficial.

The Bill contains no reference to standards of practice to be expected.

This committee substitute has some additional restrictions over the original bill, however the Department recommends against the passage of Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 274.

Senate Bill No. 274

"An Act relating to the licensing of practitioners of naturopathic healing; and providing for an effective date."

The bill provides for the licensing of naturopaths and defines qualifications necessary for licensure.

Definition

Naturopathy is defined as a system of treatment which emphasizes assistance to nature and includes the use of natural substances and physical means. Methods of treatment commonly include corrective nutrition, use of vitamins, minerals, enzymes and botanical preparations, counseling, hypnotherapy, massage, manipulation and other physical methods. There is apparently some controversy among naturopaths regarding the use of surgical methods.

Educational Background of Naturopaths

The National College of Naturopathic Medicine with campuses in Portland, Oregon and Wichita, Kansas, is the only residential institution in the U.S. offering a curriculum in naturopathy. The course duration is four years. Admissions requirements include high school graduation and two years of college or university (there has been discussion with regard to expansion to three years). There is also a correspondence school of naturopathy in California. Graduates of this program would not be eligible for licensure in Alaska under the requirements contemplated in S.B. 274.

Current Status of Naturopathy in Alaska

Alaska currently has no statute providing for the licensure of naturopathic physicians. The Attorney General has held that, to the extent that naturopathy constitutes the practice of medicine as defined in the Alaska Statutes, any person practicing naturopathy would be required to be licensed by the State Board of Medical Examiners.

Position of the Department of Health and Social Services

The scientific basis of naturopathy has been questioned by the medical community. In a 1968 study, the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare stated that "naturopathic theory and practice are not based upon the body of basic knowledge related to health, disease and health care which has been widely accepted by the scientific community." This position has remained unaltered. The American Public Health Association has also expressed reservations.

Certain disease categories would not appear to be amenable to successful treatment through naturopathic methods. A few examples would include malignancies, diabetes in certain age groups or of certain degrees of severity, certain types of infectious diseases, etc. Protection of the public would

require that the public clearly understands the limitations of the naturopathic approach and that the practitioner be able to recognize those conditions in which his therapy would not be beneficial.

The Bill contains no reference to standards of practice to be expected.

The Department recommends against the passage of Senate Bill 274. If, however, the Legislature enacts the Bill, the Department would strongly recommend limiting the scope of practice by prohibiting surgery, use of x-ray, and obstetrical practice by naturopaths.

License sales are increasing approximately 4% each year (not including the King Salmon/Steelhead Trout Stamp). Assuming the License Officer is to receive his/her 5% commission plus \$1.00 for each license and tag sold (or \$50.00 per year, whichever is greater), I projected the 4% increase in license sales less the King Salmon Stamp. I also projected the gross sales at a 4% increase. I then computed the regular 5% commission on the projected gross for each fiscal year and then added to it (the commission) the projected license sales for a projected total cost per fiscal year.

The amount for FY82 is only half of the projected amount due to the recommendation that this bill not be implemented until January, 1982. The reason for this is that all licenses are sold on a calendar year basis from January 1 to December 31 and some vendors have already done the bulk of their business and would not receive the additional remuneration.

This bill would give the License Officers an approximate 10.7 total commission.

You have asked for a brief analysis of CSSB 276. This bill relates to the special mortgage loan purchase program (AS 18.56.098). The existing section, and the rest of AS 18.56 indicates a legislative intent to confine AHFC lending activities to residences within the state, but 18.56 contains no clear prohibition against lending activities for property located outside the state. To clarify the intent of AS 18.56.098, changes have been made in AS 18.56.098(a) to limit AHFC purchase of mortgage loans under the special mortgage loan purchase program to loans for residences located in the state.

After establishing a general prohibition for mortgage loan purchases for residences located outside the state, the bill makes a specific exemption in AS 18.56.098(g) for the purchase of loans made to members of the Alaska congressional delegation for housing in the Washington, D.C. area only if the delegation member is otherwise qualified to participate in the program. This is a very limited exception and does not include congressional aides or other persons wishing to finance out-of-state housing through AHFC. The exception also excludes a congressional delegation member who seeks financing assistance for a residence located more than 50 miles away from Washington, D.C., or who is not eligible for loan assistance, apart from the question of the location of the residence.
