6 For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to employment services and the crea-
7 tion of employment opportunities in the state."

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 * Section 1. AS 23.15 is amended by adding new sections to read:

10 ARTICLE 6. ALASKA STATE SUPPLEMENTAL EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING.

11 Sec. 23.15.700. ALASKA STATE SUPPLEMENTAL EMPLOYMENT AND TRAINING
12 PROGRAM. (a) The Alaska state supplemental employment and training
13 program is established, consisting of programs initiated by the Depart-
14 ment of Labor and the Department of Community and Regional Affairs to
15 coordinate employment and training activities to meet the needs of
16 employers for a skilled work force and to assist in the continuation of
17 economic growth in the state while assuring that Alaskans are hired for
18 jobs created by that economic growth.

19 (b) When feasible, contracts shall be entered into with organiza-
20 tions which have previously provided employment and training services
21 in the state to implement the Alaska state supplemental employment and
22 training program.

23 Sec. 23.15.710. FUNCTIONS OF THE PROGRAM. (a) The Alaska state
24 supplemental employment and training program shall consist of the
25 following programs:

26 (1) an occupational demand and supply survey performed by
27 the Department of Labor to gather and correlate data relating to the
28 demand in the state for occupational skills by type and skill level
29 including characteristics of the existing work force and the potential

1 work force and the levels and characteristics of unemployment in the
2 state;

3 (2) a basic labor exchange operated by the Department of
4 Labor which will identify qualified, job-ready individuals and match
5 these individuals with existing job openings which have been identified
6 by employers and which will also identify and assist individuals who do
7 not match existing job openings; the labor exchange shall provide

8 (A) identification and referral of individuals who
9 cannot be placed in available jobs to work-site training or
10 internship programs;

11 (B) employment counseling to improve employability;

12 (C) a mechanism for referral of individuals to federal
13 and state support programs for the unemployed or underemployed;

14 (D) a mechanism for financial assistance necessary to
15 relocate Alaska residents hired by Alaska employers, and

16 (E) collection and dissemination of statewide labor and
17 job market information;

18 (3) a work-site training program administered by the Depart-
19 ment of Community and Regional Affairs to provide structured, progres-
20 sive, job-specific training for eligible new employees and upgrade
21 training for employees whose advancement is limited by obsolete or
22 inadequate skills;

23 (4) youth programs under the Department of Community and
24 Regional Affairs and the Department of Labor to provide guidance,
25 assistance, and training to young people who are entering or will be
26 entering the job market; the youth programs shall include internship
27 programs, in-school employment counselors, and vocational explorational
28 programs; and

29 (5) an evaluation system established by the Department of

1 Community and Regional Affairs and the Department of Labor to provide
2 current information for evaluation of their respective training and
3 employment programs measured by the degree that program participants
4 benefit from the programs, and for management and financing decisions
5 relating to these programs.

6 (b) To implement the programs set out in (a) of this section, the
7 Department of Labor and the Department of Community and Regional
8 Affairs may

9 (1) enter into agreements with or contract on a competitive
10 basis with employers to establish training programs and to reimburse
11 employers for allowable costs of training eligible individuals through
12 work-site training programs;

13 (2) enter into agreements with or contract on a competitive
14 basis with other state and federal agencies and educational institu-
15 tions and other organizations and entities to identify and develop
16 further training and employment opportunities compatible with the
17 supplemental employment and training program;

18 (3) develop and issue regulations relating to the establish-
19 ment and administration of the programs described in (a) of this
20 section.

21 Sec. 23.15.720. WORK-SITE TRAINING. (a) The Department of Com-
22 munity and Regional Affairs shall implement work-site training programs
23 through contracts and agreements with employers to provide career-
24 oriented apprenticeship and on-the-job training to eligible individuals
25 supplemented as necessary by classroom instruction.

26 (b) The Department of Community and Regional Affairs shall reim-
27 burse employers participating in a work-site training program for the
28 additional costs incurred by the employer in providing for work-site
29 training and appropriate classroom instruction for eligible new em-

1 employees and individuals eligible for upgrade training.

2 (c) Costs for which an employer may be reimbursed shall be speci-
3 fied by regulation, but may include

4 (1) costs incurred for training supervision, for maintaining
5 training records, for monitoring the progress of training and imple-
6 menting performance standards, for the additional costs of production
7 time allocated for training on the job, and for similar functions
8 essential to career work-site training programs; and

9 (2) costs for classroom instruction, entry level and career
10 work-site training, tuition, fees, and materials for instruction pro-
11 vided by an educational or instructional institution, instruction
12 provided by the employer, instructors, classroom space and facilities,
13 liability insurance, administrative support services and related costs.

14 (d) To be eligible to participate in a work-site training program
15 as a new employee, an individual must

16 (1) be a resident of the state;

17 (2) have been hired in a job requiring training;

18 (3) have been unemployed for at least 30 days before being
19 hired, or have been recently laid off due to cutback, lack of business,
20 completion of a project, or dissolution of operation by his previous
21 employer.

22 Sec. 23.15.730. YOUTH PROGRAMS. The Department of Labor and the
23 Department of Community and Regional Affairs shall develop youth pro-
24 grams to provide young people with improved access to employment guid-
25 ance and counseling and opportunities for exposure to and firsthand
26 knowledge of the type of work and working conditions involved in vari-
27 ous career choices. Youth programs will be tailored to meet the needs
28 of the participants in the geographic area served by the program.
29 Youth programs include the following:

1 (1) Internship programs: The Department of Community and
2 Regional Affairs shall design internship programs to provide the oppor-
3 tunity for individuals enrolled in postsecondary occupational prepara-
4 tion programs to be hired as full-time employees for a designated
5 period of time in jobs within fields for which they are training.
6 Eligible occupational preparation programs shall be specified by
7 regulation, but may include programs offered by public or private
8 vocational training institutions, colleges, universities, or other
9 organizations approved by regulation. To be eligible for employment as
10 an intern, an individual must be a state resident, but may be enrolled
11 in a program either inside or outside the state. An employer providing
12 employment for an intern under an internship program may be reimbursed
13 as provided by regulation for a percentage of the wages paid to the
14 intern or for allowable costs under AS 23.15.720(c)(1).

15 (2) Counseling programs: The Department of Labor shall
16 provide employment counselors to high schools to work with the staff of
17 a school to provide career employment guidance and counseling and job
18 placement services to students enrolled in the school. These counselors
19 are regular employees of the Department of Labor but work in coordina-
20 tion with the schools to provide counseling and placement services on a
21 regularly scheduled basis within the schools.

22 (3) Vocational exploration programs: The Department of
23 Community and Regional Affairs shall establish vocational exploration
24 programs to provide opportunities for students enrolled in high schools
25 to sample and explore career options. The department may enter into
26 cooperative agreements or contract with schools or public or private
27 agencies or organizations to implement vocational exploration programs.

28 Sec. 23.15.740. EVALUATION PROCEDURES. (a) The Department of
29 Community and Regional Affairs and the Department of Labor shall

1 develop procedures to gather and maintain information and performance
2 data for evaluation of programs established as components of the Alaska
3 state supplemental employment and training program. Guidelines and
4 evaluation standards shall be established as specific programs are
5 developed so that necessary information may be identified and reported
6 on a current basis.

7 (b) In establishing evaluation procedures and standards under
8 this section, emphasis shall be placed on measuring accomplishments of
9 the programs from the standpoint of the benefit to individuals and
10 employers in improving career skills and employment opportunities of
11 state residents and improving the quality of the work force available
12 to Alaska employers.

13 Sec. 23.15.750. DEFINITIONS. In AS 23.15.700 - 23.15.750,

14 (1) "career work-site training" means a program to pro-
15 gressively develop skills associated with a defined set of work pro-
16 cesses covered sequentially in the course of employment in an occupa-
17 tion, trade, or industry, supplemented by necessary classroom instruc-
18 tion; the training shall be consistent with a career pattern of advance-
19 ment, as measured by skill proficiency and the progression of earnings
20 and related benefits that is recognized with the occupation, trade, or
21 industry; career work-site training includes apprenticeship and on-the-
22 job training;

23 (2) "entry level training" means instruction conducted in
24 the classroom, work site, or in any combination of these which is
25 short-term in nature and is either preparatory for employment or an
26 integral part of employment in an entry classification in a particular
27 occupation or industry, when this entry level training is directly
28 linked to a specific career work-site training program or when the
29 entry classification is the source of entry into a career work-site

1 training program;

2 (3) "resident" means a person who

3 (A) except for brief intervals, military service,
4 attendance at an educational or training institution, or for
5 absences for good cause, is physically present in the state for a
6 period of at least 30 days immediately before the time the status
7 is determined;

8 (B) maintains a place of residence in the state;

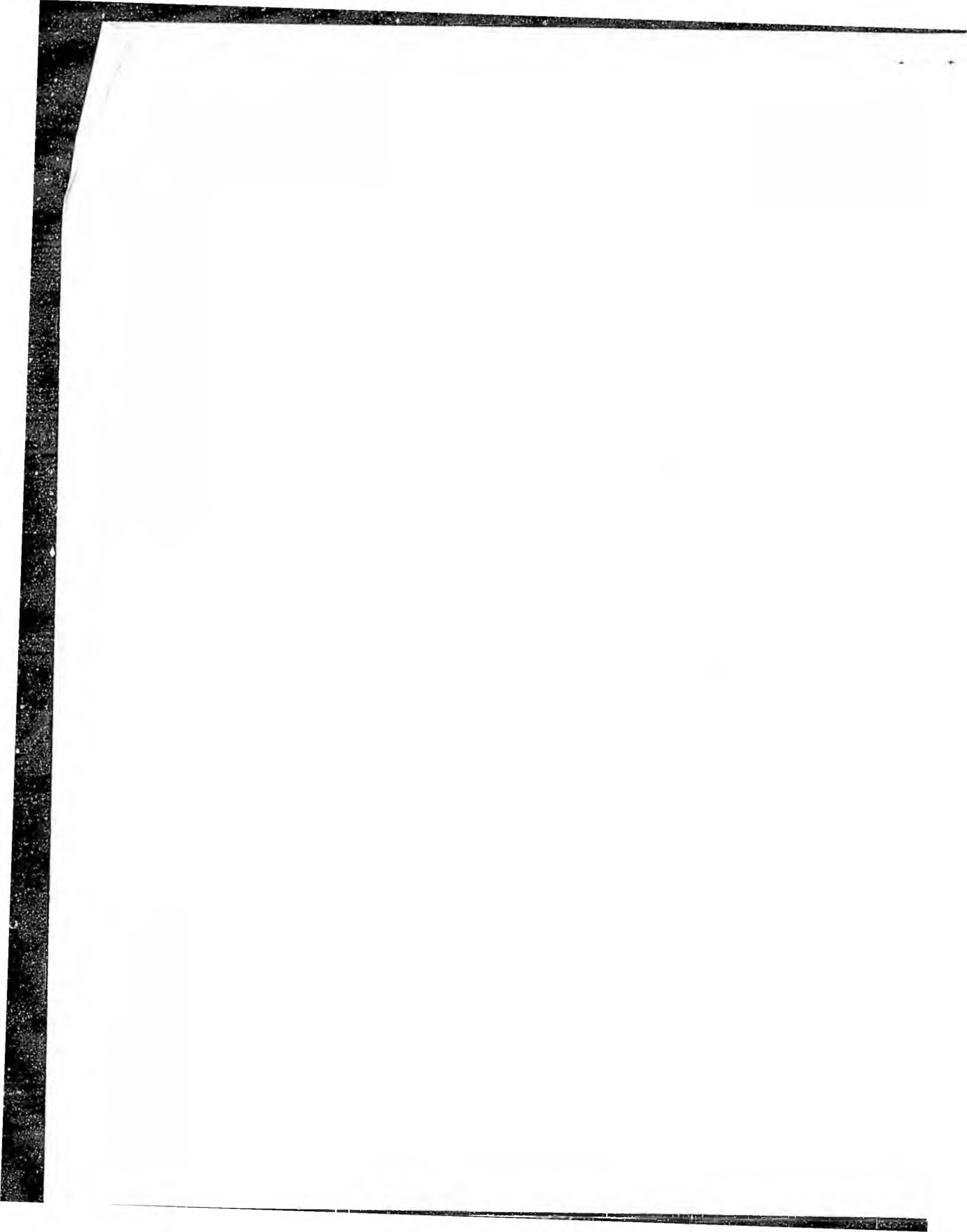
9 (C) has established a residency for voting purposes in
10 the state;

11 (D) has not, within the period of required residency,
12 claimed residency in another state; and

13 (E) shows by all attending circumstances that the
14 intent is to make Alaska a permanent residence.

15 * Sec. 2. AS 23.20.100 is amended by adding a new subsection to read:

16 (b) State money appropriated to the department to supplement or
17 enhance those services provided under provisions of the Wagner-Peyser
18 Act shall be expended through the established system of public employ-
19 ment offices. However, to improve service or avoid duplication, the
20 department may contract with other state agencies, municipalities, or
21 private or public nonprofit organizations for services financed by
22 state money to carry out the purposes of this section.

6 For an Act entitled: "An Act establishing a state training and employment
7 program; and providing for an effective date."

8 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

9 * Section 1. FINDINGS AND DECLARATION OF PURPOSE. The legislature
10 finds that private businesses and industries that have been organized
11 for profit making, especially those involved with resource development
12 and resource development support industries, would benefit from the
13 availability of skilled local workers capable of meeting labor market
14 demands, and that Alaska's citizens would benefit from employment and
15 training programs designed to meet those demands. It is the purpose
16 of this Act to establish a state training and employment program
17 designed to address Alaska's unique private sector labor demands and
18 the concomitant training and employment needs of Alaska's people.
19 The goals of the state training and employment program will be to
20 provide effective training experiences and necessary support services
21 designed to upgrade the work skills of residents already in the labor
22 force, as well as to enhance the employability of those Alaskans who
23 want to join the labor force but who lack vocational preparation or
24 face other barriers to employment.

25 * Sec. 2. AS 23.15 is amended by adding a new section to read:

26 ARTICLE 6. STATE TRAINING AND EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM.

27 Sec. 23.15.660. STATE TRAINING AND EMPLOYMENT PROGRAM.

28 (a) The state training and employment program is established
29 in the Department of Community and Regional Affairs.

1 (b) To administer the state training and employment program
2 the department may

3 (1) administer state money appropriated to the
4 state training and employment program;

5 (2) implement programs to promote

6 (A) the expansion of employment opportunities for
7 Alaskan residents in private for-profit businesses and
8 industries, through on-the-job and classroom training;

9 (B) the opportunity for career advancement
10 by providing training to upgrade the skills of residents
11 currently employed in private for-profit businesses and
12 industries;

13 (C) the expansion of employment and training
14 opportunities in the private nonprofit and public sectors,
15 especially in rural areas, through on-the-job and classroom
16 training;

17 (D) the opportunity for a youth to make realis-
18 tic career decisions by providing vocational exploration
19 experiences in the private for-profit sector;

20 (E) the removal of employment barriers by
21 providing special services or training on an as-needed basis;

22 (3) receive and evaluate training and employment
23 proposals from organizations providing or intending to provide
24 training or employment services in the state;

25 (4) contract with organizations with demonstrated
26 ability to provide effective training and employment services
27 in the state to operate training and employment programs subject
28 to the regulations adopted under this section;

29 (5) coordinate the program established under this

1 section with economic development activities and organized labor
2 efforts, and with related activities such as local and regional
3 socio-economic development planning, and with public assistance
4 programs administered by the state; and

5 (6) set priorities for delivery of services under
6 the state training and employment program among persons who are
7 unemployed or underemployed residents.

8 (c) The department may not operate specific projects
9 authorized under this section.

10 (d) The department may not allocate more than 25 percent
11 of the money appropriated for the state training and employment
12 program for employment and training services within the private
13 nonprofit and public sectors.

14 (e) At least 30 percent of the money appropriated for the
15 state training and employment program shall be allocated by the
16 department to municipalities with more than 100,000 people.

17 (f) At least 40 percent of the appropriated money shall
18 be made available to those federally recognized Native American
19 grantees who were operating in the state on January 1, 1981.
20 Disbursement of money to Native American grantees shall be on
21 the basis of competitive proposals.

22 (g) The department shall adopt regulations enabling it to

23 (1) carry out its duties under this section;

24 (2) administer the expenditure of money for contracts
25 authorized under this section through manpower planning councils,
26 when applicable.

27 * Section 3. This Act takes effect immediately in accordance with
28 AS 01.10.070(c).


DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION
POSITION PAPER
S.S. S.B. 320

The Department of Education supports this bill.

The department is involved in a number of activities that would be enhanced by the passage of this bill. The State Board of Education has identified improving inservice education as a high priority for FY 1982. The bill would provide the resources to enable the department to meet this goal. A statewide professional development steering committee, composed of representatives from teacher and administrator professional associations, institutions of higher education, regional resource centers, the school boards associations, and the department, has identified several crucial needs that will be addressed by this bill.

Most districts presently conduct inservice training programs, but thus far there has been very little coordination or long range planning. During the current year the department is working with a number of local school districts in the area of staff development. Our goal is for each of these districts to identify a person in the district who is responsible for staff development. These persons will then develop plans for implementing staff development in their districts. Most districts (approximately 35) have indicated that they are interested in being members of a consortium to work towards meeting this goal. This bill will serve as the catalyst for the development of comprehensive staff development programs in each school district.

Several educational research studies, particularly the Rand Study on the Effects of Educational Innovations, document the key role effective inservice training can play in improving district education programs. A review of educational research documents the effectiveness of certain inservice training practices, such as long range planning and involvement of participants in planning and implementing inservice programs. This bill will foster these effective inservice practices.

11 ARTICLE 8. STAFF DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM.

12 Sec. 14.20.652. STAFF DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM. A borough or city
13 school district or a regional educational attendance area may establish
14 a comprehensive staff development program. A staff development program
15 shall include orientation training for newly hired employees of the
16 district or attendance area and may include in-service training for all
17 employees of the district or attendance area.

18 Sec. 14.20.654. ESTABLISHMENT OF STAFF DEVELOPMENT PLANNING COMMIT-
19 TEES. (a) If a school board of a borough or city school district or a
20 regional educational attendance area establishes a staff development
21 program under AS 14.20.652, the school board shall also establish a
22 staff development planning committee.

23 (b) A majority of the members of the staff development planning
24 committee shall be classroom teachers employed by the district or atten-
25 dance area.

26 (c) If a staff development planning committee meeting is held
27 during the school day, an employee of the district or attendance area
28 who is a member of the committee shall be released from classroom or
29 other assigned duties to attend the meeting without penalty or loss of

2 Sec. 14.20.656. POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE STAFF DEVELOPMENT PLANNING
3 COMMITTEE. A staff development planning committee established by a
4 borough or city school district or regional educational attendance area
5 under AS 14.20.654 shall, under the direction of the school board, plan
6 and implement a comprehensive staff development program.

7 Sec. 14.20.658. APPROVAL OF PLANS BY DEPARTMENT. To apply for
8 state money under AS 14.20.660 a school board shall submit completed
9 plans for a staff development program to the department no later than
10 April 1 during the school term before the term covered by the plans.
11 The department shall approve or disapprove a staff development program
12 plan within 30 days after receiving it from a school board. A staff
13 development program plan may be amended, subject to department approval.
14 Only an approved program is eligible for state money under AS 14.20.660.

15 Sec. 14.20.660. STAFF DEVELOPMENT TRAINING. The department shall,
16 subject to the availability of money appropriated for that purpose, make
17 payments to a borough or city school district or a regional educational
18 attendance area to assist the district or attendance area to pay for the
19 cost of implementing an approved staff development program under AS 14.-
20 20.652 - 14.20.662. Assistance under this section shall be based on a
21 daily rate set by the department to be paid for each employee of a school
22 district or regional educational attendance area who participates in a
23 staff development program. A district or attendance area that has fewer
24 than 31 employees is eligible for a higher daily rate than that estab-
25 lished for a district or attendance area with more than 30 employees.

26 Sec. 14.20.662. REGULATIONS. The department shall adopt regula-
27 tions to implement the provisions of AS 14.20.652 - 14.20.662.

28 * Sec. 2. Notwithstanding AS 14.20.658, a school board that applies for
29 state money under AS 14.20.660 to conduct a staff development program during

1 the school term beginning in 1983 shall submit a completed staff development

I'm writing this letter to support SB 320 for Staff Development Programs and Training.

The Alaska Adult Education Association represents membership in over 100 communities in Alaska, that provides free programs for Adults in Literacy, Life Coping Skills, and GED studies and testing.


The staff working in these programs are both professional and non-professional. All of the rural programs have local residents as staff. In most cases, these residents rely on in- and pre-service in Alaska, in their own communities or regions. Presently, degree programs in Adult Education is only offered at Kuskokwim Community College (AA) and Alaska Pacific University (MAT). We do not have a four-year program, or a good process for on the job college credits that lead to a degree.

Coordination for Adult Basic Education Training teacher is absolutely essential. Criteria for possible certification must be established mainly by Alaskans in the field. In put and development for in- and pre-service must be planned and implemented.

The Department of Education has just begun in this very important process. Our Post Secondary Education System must coordinate, communicate and meet some of those needs. Private non-profit educational staff development must participate in this process. In-service is so essential to this program because of the very nature of Adult Basic Education's responsibility to teach adults to cope with Social Change.

I support this bill. Please help us "get it altogether." Thank you.

MEMORANDUM OF SUPPORT

NEA-Alaska strongly supports and urges passage of SB 320.

The need for an ongoing, comprehensive in-service program for all certificated staff is essential in all school districts throughout the State. Further, such a program must constantly emphasize the currency of special needs along with the unique differences that make each school district distinctive.

There exists a special need for substantive in-service program and orientation for newly employed teachers, especially those who are in Alaska for the first time and, more importantly, for those who will be teaching in rural Alaska.

A major share of the planning and in-service program delivery should come from classroom teachers, the "practitioners", who are constantly involved in the total educational programs of the State and possess the knowledge and insights as to the special needs which are appropriate in keeping our total educational program current.

We respectfully suggest that the primary objective must be to provide greater program continuity while enhancing the total educational opportunity for all students within the State of Alaska.

We encourage that specific in-service programs be designed for delivery before the commencement of each school year and that members of boards of education be encouraged to participate in these sessions.

We at Sheldon Jackson College are highly interested in continuing the upgrading of teachers' competence, and we attempt to serve the schools in our attendance areas in whatever specialties the teachers feel a need to improve. Often times our effectiveness in the so called bush schools is just to go, listen and show them that someone cares. As we observe in schools, it sometimes seems that the current demands for accountability have resulted in a dependence on programmed type materials developed by large corporations which really produce little in the way of helping children grow and learn, to score on someone's standardized test which measures very little that our Alaska children need to know in order to prepare them for occupations, family living, or the reduction of the use of alcohol and violence. The procedures often regulated by board members in order to produce stability of program because of teacher turnover, might better be changed to help prevent teacher burnout, improvement of acceptance by Alaskans in villages and plain survival in the communities.

We will continue to support your efforts in promoting this bill because we believe that funds to help our teachers give our children the best education possible is essentially necessary.

I am writing this letter in support of Senate Bill 320. As director of the Alaska Special Education Inservice Training Center for the past two years, I have had extensive opportunity to work with teachers from around the state.

The purpose of the Training Center is to improve teacher skills in mainstreaming handicapped students. We train regular classroom teachers, special education teachers, aides and administrators in methods and procedures which facilitate the placement of handicapped students in regular classrooms.

During this two year period nearly 100 trainees have spent time in our Center here in the Kenai Peninsula Borough School District. These educators have come from the breadth and width of Alaska; Ketchikan to Point Hope, Fort Yukon to the Pribilof Islands. Through this contact we have opportunity to assess the needs of a variety of teachers.

This opportunity to work with teachers from around the state has enabled me to see first hand the high need for inservice training and staff development activities. In my experience districts which are able to plan these activities over a long period, having both long range goals and short term objectives, are the most successful in meeting the needs of their students and parents, teachers, and administrators. Planning and execution of long range staff development activities is becoming increasingly recognized in importance by all concerned.

Senate Bill 320 and its House companion, H. B. 297, should help considerably in assisting school district personnel in being less reactive and more proactive in meeting the needs of their students and teachers. As you well know, the conditions of weather and geography virtually isolate village teachers from their central office staff and support for many of the winter months. Urban and suburban school districts are able to bring in support staff almost immediately to



help teachers meet specific problems. Such support networks are much more distant in many of our districts and thus the village staff must be able to obtain a wider degree of training in such areas of student assessment, student counseling, adaptation of instruction to meet the unique needs of handicapped students, and in working with parents and community members.



S.S. S.B. 320

The Department of Education supports this bill.

The department is involved in a number of activities that would be enhanced by the passage of this bill. The State Board of Education has identified improving inservice education as a high priority for FY 1982. The bill would provide the resources to enable the department to meet this goal. A statewide professional development steering committee, composed of representatives from teacher and administrator professional associations, institutions of higher education, regional resource centers, the school boards associations, and the department, has identified several crucial needs that will be addressed by this bill.

Most districts presently conduct inservice training programs, but thus far there has been very little coordination or long range planning. During the current year the department is working with a number of local school districts in the area of staff development. Our goal is for each of these districts to identify a person in the district who is responsible for staff development. These persons will then develop plans for implementing staff development in their districts. Most districts (approximately 35) have indicated that they are interested in being members of a consortium to work towards meeting this goal. This bill will serve as the catalyst for the development of comprehensive staff development programs in each school district.

Several educational research studies, particularly the Rand Study on the Effects of Educational Innovations, document the key role effective inservice training can play in improving district education programs. A review of educational research documents the effectiveness of certain inservice training practices, such as long range planning and involvement of participants in planning and implementing inservice programs. This bill will foster these effective inservice practices.



LIME VILLAGE

We have monitored wind data over a five (5) month period and determined that insufficient wind power exists to make a wind electrical system work at Lime Village. Speeds have only averaged 4.2 mph and 8 mph is the minimum needed.

We are now assessing the possibility of a photovoltaic system which would consist of roof panels and 12 volt batteries. Technically, there is no doubt about this system working, since it has been tried and proven in the state. It is a very simple system capable of charging storage batteries, to power C.B. radios, lights and other 12 volt VDC devices.

Thus the assessment consists of acquiring cost data on storage battery options (nickle-cadium versus lead acid) and the photovoltaic panels. There is a lead we are now pursuing that a discount price, or a grant may be obtained through the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE). We have also started some dialogue with industry to find out if photovoltaic systems have been used in larger refrigeration applications, because the village has expressed interest in powering a large community freezer. This freezer would have to be built during the next construction season. We are certain that the photovoltaic system alone could not hold the freezer temperature, and needs to have a supplemental source such as a small wind generator to capture gusts or diesel generator for periodic use. Initially freezing meats may require supplemental power as well.

Once all data is acquired and all costs have been calculated, recommendations will be made as to a future course of action for Lime Village. Since it is obvious our recommendations will be out of the realm of wind power, we would appreciate your thoughts on the best course of action for the village to take to fund this project. The appropriation states Lime Village Wind Power System thus limiting us to a wind generation system.

If this Legislative intent could be changed to subsistence power demonstration at Lime Village the proposed photovoltaic system could be charged to the present appropriation.

Section 11 of this Act proposes to amend the lapse date to June 30, 1982 on a \$400,000 appropriation to the Tanana Chiefs Conference for the hospital residential care program. The Department understands that this appropriation is actually for a portion of the funding for a larger \$2.5 million hospital renovation capital project which commenced during 1980. Typically, capital project appropriations are made available for the life of the project under the provision of A.S. 37.25.020, so that unexpended balances may be carried forward into subsequent fiscal years for as long as necessary until the project is completed.

It is our further understanding that revocation of the Indian Health Service use permit in August, 1980 interrupted construction for a year. Accordingly, due to the scope and complexity of this project, DHSS would support a modification to Section 11 language permitting this appropriation to be treated as a capital project appropriation to be recorded in a continuing account under provisions of A.S. 37.25.020 as if it had been originally appropriated under Section 286, Ch. 50, SIA 80. This amendment will then anticipate the kinds of delays that often accompany construction in rural Alaska.






