POSITION PAPER

Senate Bill No 338

"An Act establishing an asbestos health hazard program and providing for an effective date."

Senate Bill No. 338 provides for cooperative efforts between the Departments of Environmental Conservation, Education and Transportation and Public Facilities in locating, analyzing, evaluating, record keeping and eliminating hazards associated with asbestos. The asbestos was used in some building materials utilized in the construction of schools and public buildings in past years. With time the buildings wear and deteriorate exposing the asbestos fiber. The asbestos particles, being very small, tend to easily break away from the material and float lightly in the air, subject to inhalation by the inhabitants of the building. As the amount of asbestos inhaled increases the statistical probability of a higher rate of asbestosis is present.

This bill is designed to begin a program of minimizing the incidence of exposure to Alaskans.

The Department of Health and Social Services feels this bill is needed and supports its passage.

Senate Bill No. 339

"An Act making special appropriations for an asbestos health hazard program and providing for an effective date."

Senate Bill No. 339 is the funding mechanism for Senate Bill No. 338. The Bill provides funding for the inspection and sampling of substances suspected of having an asbestos content and funding for renovations where the substance creates a hazard.

We recommend SB 339 be amended to allow money to be expended for asbestos testing or assays. In reviewing the sum appropriated to the Department of Environmental Conservation and with knowledge testing or assays will be performed, it is recommended this sum (\$33,250) be reviewed to make certain it is adequate to perform the work assigned. This testing is expensive and to our knowledge no State Laboratory presently has the capability to perform this type of work. There will be high State start-up costs or the work will have to be contracted to a private firm.

The Department of Health and Social Services recommends the passage of this Bill.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting two bills relating to the financing of improvements at the Fairbanks International Airport.

One of the bills amends AS 37.25.410 by reducing the authorization for issuance of international airport revenue bonds by \$8,500,000. This exactly reverses the action taken by ch. 68, SLA 1979. Because market conditions precluded issuing the bonds at the 10 percent interest limit established by law, and because adequate funds are available in the International Airports Revenue Fund to cover the \$8.5 million needed for construction of the Fairbanks improvements, the bond authorization is no longer needed.

The other bill simply amends the relevant 1979 appropriation (ch. 69, SLA 1979) by changing the source of the \$8.5 million from the International Airports Construction Fund to the International Airports Revenue Fund.

SUBJECT: CSSSSB 344

Due to an error in my office, CSSSSB 344 left the HESS Committee without a letter of intent, which was to have been attached.

There was some concern in the Committee as to what might happen if a nonprofit organization receiving an appropriation under this bill were to stop performing the shelter functions. The text of the proposed letter of intent follows, and the Finance Committee may wish to use it if the bill is passed out.

It is the intent of the Committee that the money appropriated in this bill be used by the named nonprofit corporations to aid victims of domestic violence and sexual assault. The municipalities will be accepting money for the purpose of passing it on to the appropriate nonprofit organization. The nonprofit organization will then own, operate and maintain the shelter. If, in the future, an organization is no longer providing these services, the building owned by the organization at that time, and financed in whole or in part by this Act, will be sold. The proceeds of the sale shall be reimbursed to the State of Alaska for the amount of this grant. It is the intent of the Committee that the building be sold to the highest bidder.

"An Act making special appropriations to various municipalities for the construction and improvement of shelters for victims of domestic violence and sexual assault; and providing for an effective date."

The Department of Health and Social Services supports the concept of Senate Bill 344 which provides funding for building facilities for victims of domestic violence in communities where the Department has already been contracting for services.

It is suggested, however, that in the title the words "construction or purchase and improvement....", be added since in some communities that may be more appropriate. It is also not clear whether these funds could be used for land acquisition, furnishings and equipment for a new facility.

The Sponsor Substitute would add the Mat-Su Borough and Barrow to state supported facilities plus increase the cost of services in Kodiak.

The amount of the FY'82 grant application for Mat-Su which includes a safe home network not a shelter facility is \$111,297; therefore to staff a shelter would probably increase their request in FY'83, if not before, by at least another \$200,000 to cover costs including staff increases, furnishings and equipment.


Although Barrow has operated a shelter for two years, it has been funded by the North Slope Borough. The Department has received a grant application for assistance in funding the present shelter totaling \$141,000 for FY'82. How much a new facility would change the program cost for FY'83 is not known; in FY'82 the present rent is an "in-kind" donation. However the shelter Board of Directors wants assurance of ownership of a facility.

Kodiak has operated a Women's Resource Center including a safe home network for several years. Its FY'82 request is for \$180,700 to continue that program. If a shelter were built/purchased at least another \$200,000 would be needed for operating funds, including furnishings and equipment.

Consideration should be given to solving the problem of adding the responsibilities of planning, purchasing or building a facility, negotiating with municipalities or cities to program directors who are already overworked and overextended; this perhaps would mean one additional staff person per facility.


