FISCAL NOTE ANALYSIS (Cont'd)

In his State of the Judiciary message, Chief Justice Burke pointed out a need for an additional two district court and two superior court judges. In the original version of HB 571, the Court System had asked for only one superior court judge and two district court judges, with the assumption that an additional superior court judge could be requested next year or at least in the near future. Since the State of the Judiciary message, the caseloads of the Anchorage Court System have continued to grow and this growth strongly supports the need for two district court and two superior court judges. If two district court and two superior court judges were authorized, the cost in fiscal year '85 would be approximately \$890,000.

The Court System takes no position regarding the Committee Substitute which increases the district court level by four additional judges.

Fiscal Note Analysis

The increase of three judges around the state during 1983 resulted in a manpower and cost drain to the Judicial Services Section that was neither anticipated nor funded.

The addition of four more judges, both civil and criminal, proposed in this legislation will cause a need to increase the number of Judicial Services personnel. The current ratio of officers available for servicing the courts in the Anchorage area is approximately one officer per judge. The added prisoner transportation and service of civil process and other court-required business would further reduce this ratio. Two commissioned State Troopers will be needed to transport prisoners and serve civil process papers necessary for the court to function. Additionally, the required legal paperwork flow involved in processing subpoenas, warrants and other administrative requirements result in a need for a Clerk-Typist III. Currently, Judicial Services is understaffed in clerical support which is impeding the unit's operation. No additional workload can be absorbed.

Without the additional positions requested in this fiscal note, passage of this bill would result in unacceptable delays in both Court services and prisoner movement.

The cost for the Troopers is based upon their entering the January, 1985 Academy. Costs after FY85 are estimated with a 6% inflation and with no equipment costs.

This bill would add new judges for Anchorage. According to the Alaska Court System, one superior court judge and two district court judges would be assigned to handle criminal matters. The reason for the additional judges is to process more criminal cases through the system in a more expeditious manner.

In order for the criminal justice system to get full use out of additional criminal judges, there must be additional prosecutors and public defenders available to be present and ready for trial in the courtrooms of those judges. If we do not have enough assistant public defenders to appear before these new judges, they will not be fully utilized and the cases will not be moved through the court system in a speedy manner. The Public Defender Agency is thus requesting an Attorney IV to appear in Superior Court in felony cases and an Attorney III to appear before the new District Court judges in misdemeanor cases, as well as a legal secretary I to provide clerical back-up for these positions. All of these positions would be funded for only nine months for FY 85, since there will be a commensurate delay for recruitment and selection of these new judges.

The addition of two superior court judges will not affect input but will increase the number of pre-investigation reports in a given time period. We can expect approximately a 15% increase in the number of presentence investigation requests and persons sentenced. It is also recognized that additional judges are needed because of the increasing number of persons arrested for felony offenses. Approximately 600 presentence investigations are currently completed each year in Southcentral Alaska. Therefore, it is estimated that 90 additional presentence investigations will be necessary. A full time presentence investigator/report writer (P.O. II) will publish 96 reports per year (8 per month). A full time caseload supervisor can successfully supervise 60 to 70 clients. Therefore, an additional Probation Officer II will be needed for this function. One additional Probation Officer II is needed to handle the presentence reports/case work for the additional offenders. The addition of seven (7) district court judges is expected to create, at a minimum, one full time case load for a Probation Officer II supervising misdemeanor offenders on probation. One clerical position is necessary to provide support for the four (4) probation officers.

Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 571 (Finance) would create two additional superior court judgeships and eight additional district court judgeships. The two superior court judges would be assigned to the third judicial district. The district court judgeships would be numerically realigned as well as adding eight new judges. The third judicial district would gain eight district court judges; the fourth district would gain two district court judges; and the first and second judicial districts would each lose one district court judge.

Overcrowding in the correctional system exists statewide, but is particularly severe at the Cook Inlet Pretrial Facility. Convicted felons spend an average of 118 days in that facility from date of arrest for the crime to date of sentencing after their trial. It is our considered opinion that the length of time from arrest to sentencing can be reduced with the addition of judges. While it will not reduce the total inmate population, it will permit the transfer of sentenced offenders to other facilities, as considered appropriate through the classification process. This enhancement of moving inmates out of the Cook Inlet Pretrial Facility will take some of the pressure off that facility.

The Department of Corrections supports the concept of this bill.



CS for House Bill No. 571 (Finance)

Committee Substitute for House Bill No. 571 (Finance) would create two additional superior court judgeships and four additional district court judgeships. The two superior court judges would be assigned to the third judicial district. The district court judgeships would be numerically realigned as well as adding four new judges in the third judicial district.

Overcrowding in the correctional system exists statewide, but is particularly severe at the Cook Inlet Pretrial Facility. Convicted felons spend an average of 118 days in that facility from date of arrest for the crime to date of sentencing after their trial. It is our considered opinion that the length of time from arrest to sentencing can be reduced with the addition of judges. While it will not reduce the total inmate population, it will permit the transfer of sentenced offenders to other facilities, as considered appropriate through the classification process. This enhancement of moving inmates out of the Cook Inlet Pretrial Facility will take some of the pressure off that facility.

The Department of Corrections supports the concept of this bill.



Fiscal Note Analysis

The increase of three judges around the state during 1983 resulted in a manpower and cost drain to the Judicial Services Section that was neither anticipated nor funded. The current ratio of officers available for servicing the Courts to the Anchorage area is approximately one officer per judge. This does not allow for transportation of prisoners as mandated by the Department of Corrections and the service of civil processes and other Court-required business which would further reduce this ratio.

The addition of four more judges proposed in this legislation in the Anchorage Court House will cause a need to increase the number of Judicial Services personnel. Four commissioned State Troopers will be needed to provide court security and prisoner movement both around the state and between the lower 48 states and Alaska. Additionally, these judges will increase the amount of civil and criminal process that must be served by these commissioned personnel. The required legal paperwork flow involved in processing subpoenas, warrants, transportation scheduling and other administrative requirements result in a need for a Clerk Typist III. The additional workload cannot be absorbed by the current staff in this unit. Without the additional positions requested in this fiscal note, passage of this bill would result in unacceptable delays in both Court services and prisoner movement for Corrections.

The cost for the Troopers is based upon their entering the January 1985 Academy. Costs after FY85 are estimated with a 6% inflation and with no equipment costs.

C.S. for HB 571, adopted by the Judiciary Committee on March 29, 1984, increases the number of judges in the Third Judicial District by two superior court judges and four district court judges, at Anchorage. An increase in the number of judges has been requested by the court system because of substantial increases in both felony and misdemeanor criminal cases and because of a growing backlog of both criminal and civil cases.

During the last 15 months, the Anchorage area has grown by approximately 30,000 residents. This increase in itself exceeds the total population served by the criminal justice system in Juneau, which is made up of 2 superior court judges, 1 district court judge and a District Attorney's Office consisting of three attorneys, one paralegal assistant and three legal secretaries. By comparison, no additional judicial or prosecution positions have been authorized to handle the increased caseload in Anchorage during this period.

Included in this population growth is a disproportionate number of young, highly transient males who tend to account for a considerable portion of the increase in serious criminal cases in the Anchorage area. Although many of the presently backlogged criminal cases consist of minor offenses, there has also been a disturbing increase in the number of sexual assault

cases involving children and in the number of complex homicide cases. Both types of cases require substantial additional judicial and prosecution resources in order to ensure that they are properly handled.

Historically, there has been a direct correlation between the number of judges in a particular district and the number of prosecutors required to handle court calendars. This correlation has in the past and ideally should continue to equal one prosecutor for each full-time judge. This balance is required in order to ensure that cases are effectively and efficiently processed. Over the past few years the balance between judges and prosecutors in the Third Judicial District has tipped towards the judicial side of the scales. There are currently 14 authorized superior court judges and 8 district court judges in the Third Judicial District. In addition, there are 4 full-time magistrates in the district who also have authority to serve as district judges, thus bringing the number of full-time judges to 26, as opposed to 23 prosecuting attorneys.

The number of prosecutors has not kept pace with the number of judges due to legislative authorized increases in the number of judicial positions in the last five to six years. The

authorized increases have not consistently included additional prosecuting attorney resources. To an extent, the Department of Law has been able to handle most case settings as a result of economies of scale realized over the past several years. However, we are rapidly falling behind in our ability to adequately cover present court calendars, particularly in the rural areas which are directly serviced or supplemented by personnel from the Anchorage District Attorney's Office. This problem will become particularly severe if the additional judicial positions contained in CSHB 571 (Jud) are added without an increase in prosecuting attorney positions.

The Criminal Division of the department will not be able to continue to handle all of the cases and court calendars, particularly with the addition of these new judges, without additional prosecution resources. This imbalance between judges and prosecutors will be particularly severe at the district court level because of the higher volume of cases, although there will also be an impact at the superior court level because of the need to assign criminal cases to the new superior court judges in Anchorage.

In his State of the Judiciary message to the Legislature on February 28, 1984, Chief Justice Burke anticipated

that the new superior court judge which he had requested would be assigned to the criminal division. See Senate and House Joint Journal Supplement No. 20 at pages 7-8. The administrative office of the Court System has indicated, however, that any new superior court judge will be expected to devote half of his time to criminal cases and half to civil cases. Regardless of the actual breakdown of the duties assigned to the new judges, in order to meet the speedy trial requirements of Criminal Rule 45 in the face of the increased number and complexity of felony criminal trials, it is certain that civil division judges will continue to handle a substantial percentage of the criminal case load.

Recognizing that the six new judges authorized in CSHB 571 (Jud) will devote some proportion of their time to civil cases, we are requesting that the District Attorney's Office at Anchorage be increased by three (rather than six) attorneys, one paralegal assistant and two legal secretaries. <sup>1/</sup> One attorney

1/ It should be noted that the court system's estimate of fiscal impact for CSHB 571 (Jud) is more than double the estimate submitted for the original version of the bill. In contrast, the Department of Law's estimate shows only a 50% increase over the estimate submitted for the original version of the bill.

will be assigned to the superior court to handle major felony prosecutions with emphasis on sexual assault and homicide cases. The other two attorneys will be assigned to district court cases and will handle misdemeanor cases exclusively. The Criminal Division believes that it can, for the present, adequately cover the caseload through the addition of three attorneys, rather than six, through the use of the additional paralegal assistant (at substantially less cost) to assist in case preparation and the coordination of witnesses. The two legal secretary positions will be needed to provide support services in the processing of these cases and to handle the work that will be generated by the attorneys and the paralegal. The total costs associated with these positions is \$440,000.

Attached is a summary sheet which breaks this cost down by each position and relevant budgetary object code.

Sec. 22.10.030. Where actions are to be brought. (a) All actions in ejectment or for the recovery of the possession of, quieting title to, for the partition of, or the enforcement of liens upon, real property shall be commenced in the superior court in the judicial district in which the real property, or any part of it affected by the action, is situated.

(b) If, in a civil action other than one specified in (a) of this section, a defendant can be personally served within a judicial district of the state, the action against that defendant shall be commenced in that judicial district or in the judicial district in which the claim arose.

(c) All prosecutions for crimes and offenses shall be commenced in the judicial district in which the crime or offense was committed.

(d) Subject to AS 22.10.040, a trial and any precedent or antecedent hearings in an action shall be conducted in a senate district within the judicial district at a location which would best serve the convenience of the parties and witnesses. However, if there is any part of more than one senate district within the boundaries of a borough, the trial and related hearings shall be conducted within the borough's boundaries at a location which would best serve the convenience of the parties and witnesses. If the presiding judge of the district determines that there are no facilities, reasonably suited to the purpose, available for the trial or related hearings in the senate district specified in this subsection, the presiding judge may direct the proceedings to be held in the nearest senate district with reasonably suitable facilities.

(e) Actions in cases not covered by this section may be commenced in any judicial district of the state.

(f) Failure to make timely objection to improper venue waives the requirements of this section.

(g) An exception to any of the above requirements exists if, consistent with constitutional requirements, the Chief Justice of the supreme court determines that transportation facilities reasonably require venue in an urban center in an adjoining judicial or senate election district.

SUBJECT: Proposed Amendment  
to Alaska Statute  
22.10.030

Alaska Statute 22.10.030(c) provides that all prosecutions for crimes shall be commenced in the judicial district in which the crime or offense was committed. (underline added). Subsection (d) provides that the trial hearings may take place at a senate district within the judicial district which would best serve the convenience of the parties and witnesses. No specific provision is made for bringing criminal cases outside the judicial district in which the crime occurred.

The reason for criminal venue occurring in the judicial district of the criminal act is unclear. The judicial district lines now existing are almost the same as those lines were in pre-statehood days. They essentially followed the transportation patterns available at that time. Thus, steamships going up the Kuskokwim or Yukon would create the transportation service patterns for the flow of commerce and judicial services.

In today's bush Alaska, the transportation patterns are set by air travel. Commerce and judicial services can be efficiently administered only if they follow the already existing air transportation routes. Offering services outside those routes means that charter plans must be hired at greatly increased cost to the agencies using them.

The present problem is that the old judicial districting lines do not follow the present path of available air transportation. Thus, approximately 14 villages and a large number of unincorporated living areas are served by the Bethel air transportation and commercial network and yet are directed by the above statute to seek judicial services from Nome. This is totally impractical because the people oftentimes must travel through Bethel (and pass a superior court) on their way to Anchorage and then back to Nome to appear in court. Obviously, what should be happening is that these people should be served by the Bethel superior court.

Most of these villages are in Senate District L. They include Hooper Bay, Chevak, Sheldon Point, Emmonak, Alakanuk, Kotlik, Scammon Bay, and Stebbins. The Senate District M

villages include: St. Marys, Mt. Village, Russian Mission, Pilot Station, and Marshal. There are unincorporated communities in both Senate Districts that are affected.

The cost of offering criminal justice service to this group of villages out of the Nome area as opposed to the Bethel area is staggering. John Cain, Director of the Northern Region for the Probation Office, estimates travel costs alone will go up 500% if these villages must be served by Nome instead of Bethel. These cost increases are primarily due to the increase in charter flight costs over what it costs to use regular existing transportation routes. Of course, additional costs would accrue in moving personnel and materials from Bethel to Nome in order to service a larger caseload from Nome. These costs can be repeated for the office of the prosecutor, the public defender, corrections, and for additional state trooper service.

As far as I can determine a broad interpretation of the present Alaska Statute 22.10.030(d) has been used to allocate the present criminal justice service to those villages from the Bethel area. In fact, the prior amendment to this section contains an editor's note which recognizes that the amendment was implemented to provide greater administrative flexibility in determining appropriate venue.

In my view, the possible contradiction between subsection (c) and (d) should be statutorily resolved. An easy way to remedy the situation would be to add a single sentence subsection (g) which recognized the judicial authority necessary to preserve administrative flexibility. It is my suggestion that Alaska Statute 22.10.030 be amended by the addition of the following subsection:

(g) An exception to any of the above requirements exists if consistent with constitutional requirements the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court determines that transportation facilities reasonably require venue in an urban center in an adjoining judicial or senate election district.

The major reason for this proposed change is to provide the public with judicial access it can afford to get to. Additionally, the State of Alaska would save large sums in providing its criminal justice service over the already existing transportation patterns instead of attempting to charter new ones. The section itself recognizes authority should be placed in the Chief Justice to determine the exceptional circumstances when judicial district line venue

should be crossed in order to practically follow existing transportation lines. This authority would not do away with any present existing protections that venue requirements are intended to create for litigants. Neither the holding of Alvarado v. State, 486 P.2d 891 (Alaska 1971) nor the general statutory intent of the rest of Alaska Statute 22.10.030 is affected by providing the Chief Justice with authority to recognize the practical effect of existing transportation patterns.

Dear Chairman Bussell:

I regret that I am unable to personally attend and testify at the hearing regarding the pending legislation seeking authorization for additional District Court and Superior Court judges (House Bill 571). With this letter, I wish to summarize the comments and testimony I would have provided at the hearing in Anchorage on March 17, 1984.

By way of background, I have been serving as a Superior Court Judge in Anchorage for over three years. I am, and have been, assigned to the Civil Division of the Court during all of this time.

I earnestly support the Alaska Court System's application for at least one additional Superior Court position -- and ideally more than one -- for the Anchorage Superior Court Bench.

Since coming to the Bench three years ago, I have seen my civil case load (meaning non-domestic, non-criminal cases) increase from approximately 600 cases in April of 1981 to approximately 1100 cases at the present time.

In addition to an absolute increase in the number of cases, it is also my impression that there is an increase in the complexity, length, and expense of the civil

The increase in cases and trials also impacts adversely on the Court's time and resources available for non-trial matters which require judicial attention. Thus, for example, during a typical day, a civil judge would hold trial from 8:30 a.m. through 1:30 p.m. During the "luncheon" break (1:30 - 2:30), the judge will typically meet with his or her law clerk and review emergency matters which must be considered that day. Then, for the remainder of the afternoon, the judge typically would have scheduled settlement conferences, trial setting conferences, oral argument hearings on motions, oral argument hearings on agency appeals, evidentiary hearings on injunctions, hearings on domestic violence petitions, and other emergency matters. In view of the foregoing hearings, it is not uncommon for a judge to run well into the early evening before completing the day's activities.

In addition to trial matters, hearings and conferences scheduled during the typical day, the judge must also deal with numerous matters submitted to the Court on motions or briefs, without requests for oral argument or hearing. A rough estimate of a typical day in my chambers is that we receive, and are required to give attention to, as many as 2-3 dozen matters per day. These matters would include motions on the briefs (including discovery motions, dispositive motions, motions for sanctions, motions to amend pleadings, and the like), stipulations, emergency motions, and appeals on the briefs from administrative agencies or entities. The Court must also deal with, as a matter of priority, domestic violence petitions. Such petitions are typically being handled through hearing time in the Courtroom, although the judges are on call 24 hours a day.

Given the increase in cases, and increase in complex cases, the number of matters submitted to the Court on the briefs has also dramatically increased. And, consistently, the delays in issuing rulings on such matters have likewise increased. For example, it may take months to issue rulings on summary judgment motions or agency appeals that have been submitted to the Court on the briefs, without oral argument.

In order to perform all of the foregoing tasks, the Court has an extremely limited staff, consisting of one full-time law clerk, one secretary, and the judge. In my view, substantially additional assistance is, and will be, absolutely necessary in order to process the increased work load in a prompt and professional manner. At a minimum, it seems to me that additional Superior Court judges are immediately required. Ideally, additional support staff,

I regret that I am unable to personally attend and testify at the hearing regarding the pending legislation seeking authorization for additional District Court and Superior Court judges (House Bill 571). With this letter, I wish to summarize the comments and testimony I would have provided at the hearing in Anchorage on March 17, 1984.

By way of background, I have been serving as a Superior Court Judge in Anchorage for over three years. I am, and have been, assigned to the Civil Division of the Court during all of this time.

I earnestly support the Alaska Court System's application for at least one additional Superior Court position -- and ideally more than one -- for the Anchorage Superior Court Bench.

Since coming to the Bench three years ago, I have seen my civil case load (meaning non-domestic, non-criminal cases) increase from approximately 600 cases in April of 1981 to approximately 1100 cases at the present time.

In addition to an absolute increase in the number of cases, it is also my impression that there is an increase in the complexity, length, and expense of the civil

cases that are now being litigated. Thus, for example, I have spent the last four months trying two cases: a prisoners' class action case that lasted 7 weeks, and a securities litigation case that lasted 11-12 weeks. In the latter case alone, the parties filed 50-60 volumes of pleadings (exclusive of certain discovery documents), presented in excess of 3,000 documentary exhibits at trial, filed innumerable motions before and during trial, and took at least 15 petitions for review (interlocutory appellate review attempts) to the Alaska Supreme Court. Although this latter case may be an extreme example, it is my impression that in the last year or so, the Court System has experienced a relative increase in complex civil litigation.

Besides, the cases mentioned above, during the last year I have also tried a class action civil rights case that lasted 5-6 weeks and a wrongful death action that lasted 4-5 weeks. During the next 12-14 months, I have currently scheduled for trial 4 cases which are expected to last one month or more in duration, including a condemnation action of approximately 4 weeks; a personal injury action of approximately 4-5 weeks; a wrongful death action of approximately 5 weeks; and a commercial insurance litigation case of approximately 8 weeks.

The impact of larger case loads, as well as lengthier and more complex civil litigation on the trial calendar is obvious. The four months of trial time I spent on the two cases mentioned above consumed nearly 40% of the total available trial time on this year's calendar, thereby making it impossible for other cases to be tried during that period. Further, delays in obtaining trial setting conferences, and trial dates, are increasing at a substantial rate. Currently, a trial which would require more than 2 weeks could not be set on my trial calendar until mid-April, 1985 -- a 12-14 month delay. I am informed that most of the other civil judges' calendars are in approximately the same circumstance.

Additionally, it is my impression that more cases, including the complex cases, are proceeding to trial, rather than settling, or being disposed of by some other means. This means that the judges will tend to "overset" fewer cases per week. Several years ago, when fewer cases were proceeding to trial, I was oversetting 3-4 cases per week. Now that more cases appear to be going through trial, I am oversetting only 1-2 cases a week -- and in some instances, not oversetting at all. This, of course, means still further delays between the commencement of an action and the trial date in the action.

At a minimum, it seems to me that additional Superior Court judges are immediately required. Ideally, additional support staff,


including further law clerk positions and/or externship positions would be extremely useful.

In the absence of additional judicial manpower, it seems to me quite realistic to expect that the already substantial delays in processing cases through trial will become even greater. Ultimately, I suppose, it becomes a policy question of how much delay is too much delay? I respectfully submit that for Alaska's population, and particularly for the population of the Southcentral area embodied in the Third Judicial District, delays of 1½ to 2 years to get cases to and through trials are unacceptable. Longer delays are, obviously, more unacceptable.

Accordingly, the thoughtful attention of you and your Committee to the pressing need for additional judicial manpower will be greatly appreciated.
