BEAVER SCHOOL

The school building at Beaver, Alaska, was built in 1930. The building, which is over fifty years old, at first glance appears to be in decent repair. This is due primarily to the efforts of the maintenance and teaching staff at the school.

The facts make it clear that a new facility is badly needed. Much money would have to be spent in order just to bring the building into compliance with state building, fire, and electric codes. Beaver would still be left with an old building.

Another consideration is the size of the facility. At present, the building is crowded with fourteen elementary students. In addition, the building provides teacher housing and kitchen facilities for the students' lunch program.

Another factor contributing to the need for a new facility is the expected return of high school students. At present several high school age youngsters from Beaver are going to school in Fairbanks, and other communities in Alaska. It is anticipated that after June 30, 1984, these students will wish to enroll in their home community. This will further burden an already-crowded situation.

The proposed building will consist of a building much the same as the school at Rampart. It will provide an elementary classroom, a secondary classroom, half size gymnasium.

The school Board members and interested parents met to discuss our village getting a new school. Our school was built during the 1930's which makes our school about 53 years old. It does not meet present ~~state-space-requirements, its-very-crowded, during-the-winter-months~~ the heating system freezes up, the well goes dry so we don't have no water for the bathrooms, kitchens and drinking water. Making it impossible to hold school during the regular school hours. Also we have problems with our generators not working even if we have a back up generator. The generators provide lights for the school, village safe-water, clinic, tribal building, telephone building and village store. The kitchen is usually the first place that freezes making it impossible to fix our children hot lunches. The space is also crowded.

We have been writing letters to different legislators for the past 5 years trying to get a new school-high school complex with a gym. At the present time we do not have a high school fo our children have to go to different villages, cities and even out of state to Chemawa. Which is inconvenient for the children and the parents.

We look forward to hearing from you soon with any help you can give us.

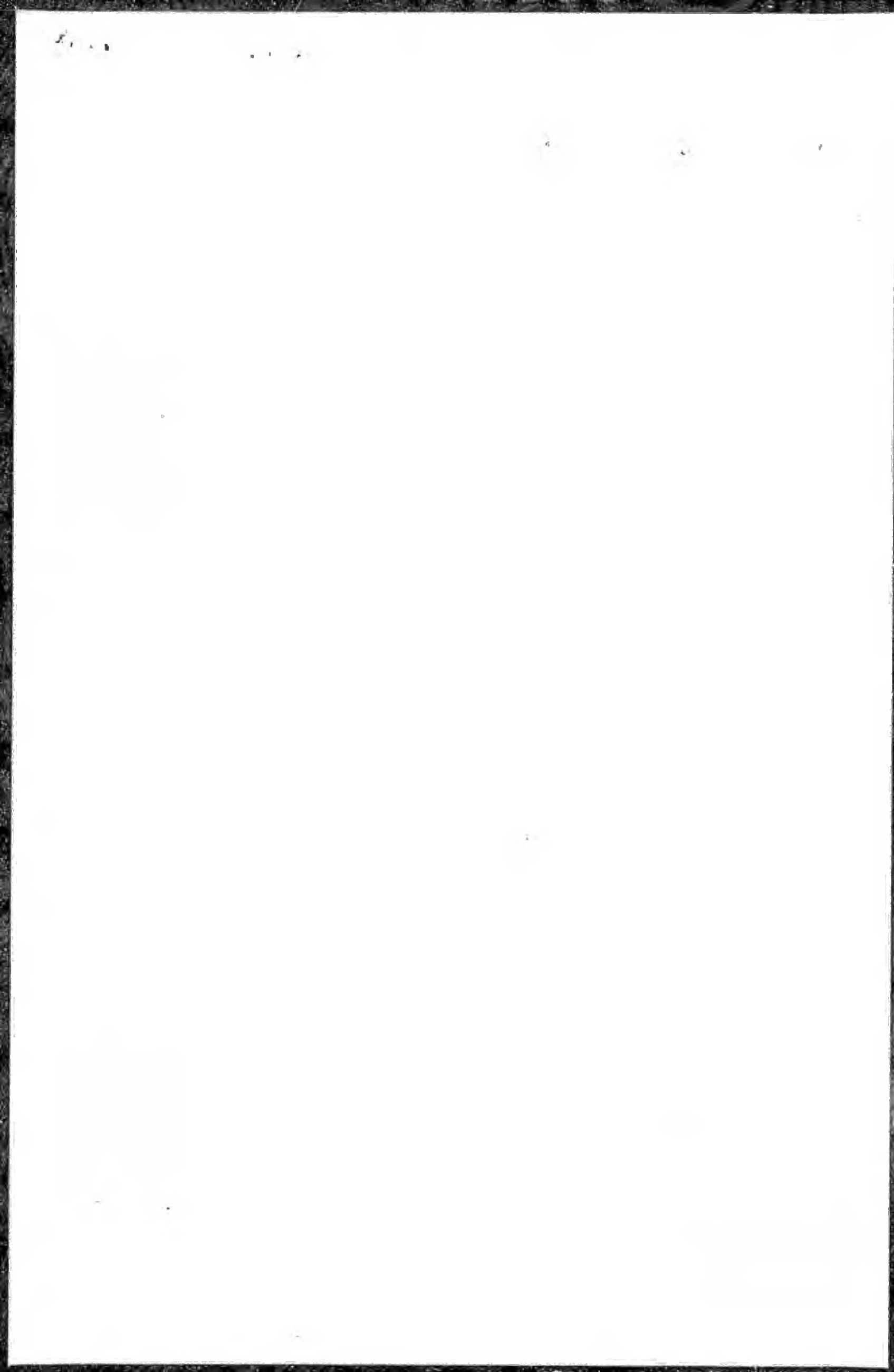



Improved versions of SB 385, which was introduced by the Rules Committee at the request of the Governor, have been passed by the Senate HESS and Judiciary Committees. The following sectional analysis explains the differences between SB 385 as introduced by the Governor and the Committee Substitute passed by the Judiciary Committee.

Section 1. Remains unchanged.

Section 2. The Judiciary Committee Substitute adds a person is participating in a foreign exchange student program recognized by the commission as being eligible for a student loan.

Section 3. Because there are still some specialty areas of graduate nursing which are not offered through the University of Alaska, students seeking this degree may still apply for assistance from the WICHE program.

Section 4. Remains unchanged.

Dear Senator Kerttula:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the Alaska Commission on Postsecondary Education.


Section 1 of the bill limits to a period of up to four years the deferral of the repayment of the principal of a student loan for members of the armed forces of the United States who are on active duty.

Section 2 clarifies the eligibility requirements for students applying for a scholarship loan, especially in regard to residency. Provisions are added to make clear that a person who has not properly repaid a previous student loan is not eligible for another loan, and to set out the circumstances under which a person may be absent from the state and still qualify for a student loan.

Section 3 continues the practice of ceasing to support students under the WICHE (Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education) program when a similar program of study becomes available in the State of Alaska. Graduate nursing and petroleum engineering are now available through the University of Alaska. This section, in conjunction with the delayed effective date in sec. 6 and the provisions in sec. 5, will provide for an equitable phasing out of those two WICHE programs.

Finally, sec. 4 will make it clear that a violation of the minimum standards for postsecondary educational institutions set out in AS 14.48.060(b) may subject an institution to a civil penalty.



SB 387 makes four changes to the Compensation and Allowances (AS 39.20) and State Personnel Act (AS 39.25). Section 1 relieves part-time officers and employees from the requirement to take five days of personal leave each year. Section 2 extends to all officers and employees covered by the statute the ability to donate accrued personal leave to another officer or employee for use for medical reasons. This ability is currently limited to employees of the legislature; however, most collective bargaining agreements contain such a provision. Section 3 provides for the payment of banked medical leave to the beneficiary upon an employee's death. Most employees are covered by this provision through collective bargaining agreements. Section 4 provides for publication in the Alaska Administrative Code of positions placed in the partially exempt service by the Personnel Board. There is no current means of notifying the public of such actions.

This bill was submitted by the Governor on the recommendation of this Department.



Sectional Analysis

- Section 1: Exempts part-time officers and employees from taking the mandatory five days of personal leave a year. Personal leave allows full time employees with a rest period so they can then return to work refreshed. Part-time employees do not need to take leave as often as full time employees and this section allows them to save up time to take when they need it.
- Section 2: Extends to all employees under A.S. 39.20 the ability to donate accrued personal leave to another employee for medical reasons. Currently the law applies only to legislative employees, and state employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement are allowed to donate leave. This section would allow all employees to donate leave.
- Section 3: Provides for the payment of banked medical leave to the beneficiary upon an employee's death for employee's not covered under collective bargaining. Currently, unused, banked sick leave is cancelled upon the separation from service of a state worker, regardless of the cause. Currently, state employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement are provided this benefit.

Section 4: Requires that positions placed by the personnel board in partially exempt service be published in the Alaska Administrative Code. No official, comprehensive list is currently published to inform the public of these positions.

Fiscal Information

The original fiscal note of 5.3 has been replaced with a zero fiscal note. Costs are borne by existing budgets.

State Affairs Committee Action

State Affairs Committee passed the bill out of committee on 2/9/84 with a zero fiscal note. Senators V. Fischer, Kelly, Sturgulewski, Rodey and Ray all signed "do pass."

A department or agency head may require a doctor's certificate showing the condition if the absence exceeds three consecutive working days.

(4) Pregnancy and childbirth is a medical reason for a female officer or employee to take personal leave. A female officer or employee, otherwise qualified for a leave of absence, is entitled to take a maximum of nine weeks leave immediately preceding and following childbirth. If the officer's or employee's accrued personal leave is insufficient for this purpose, she is entitled to take leave without pay for the balance of the nine-week period.

(5) Death of a member of an officer's or employee's immediate family is a medical reason for taking personal leave. No more than five days of personal leave may be taken for this purpose.

(c) Each officer and employee shall, during each 12-month period, take at least five days of personal leave. If the officer or employee does not take at least five days of personal leave during a 12-month period, the difference between five days and the amount of personal leave he did take shall be cancelled without pay unless his department or agency head certifies in writing that he was denied the opportunity to take five days of personal leave during the 12-month period. Dear Senator Kerttula:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to state employment. The bill would also amend the state's leave statutes in three respects, affecting state officers and employees who are not covered by a collective bargaining agreement (see the current AS 39.20.310(9) which is not being amended by this bill).


Section 1 of the bill addresses the requirement that nearly all state officers and employees take at least five days of personal leave per year. See AS 39.20.225(c). The amendment would exempt part-time employees from that requirement.

Section 2 amends state law concerning the donation of sick leave by one state worker for use by another. Currently, the law speaks only to legislative employees. See AS 39.-20.245(b). The amendment would allow the same charitable act to be accomplished by executive and judicial branch workers. State employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement are already allowed to donate sick leave in this same manner.

Section 3 allows the beneficiary of a state worker who dies to collect the monetary equivalent of the decedent's unused, banked sick leave. Currently, unused, banked sick leave is cancelled upon the separation from service of a state worker, regardless of the cause. See AS 39.20.-256(f). Currently, state employees covered by a collective bargaining agreement are provided this benefit.

Section 4 requires the commissioner of administration to submit to the lieutenant governor for publication in the Alaska Administrative Code a list of all positions to which the partially exempt service has been extended by the personnel board under AS 39.25.130. No official, comprehensive list is currently published to inform the public of which positions are included in the partially exempt service.

The Kenai River/Funny River Bridge project is one that has been identified by local and state authorities for over 20 years. It has been documented by community need and economic factors in attached pages from the Kenai River Transportation Study, published by DOT/PF and jointly prepared by DOT/PF, Kenai Peninsula Borough and the Cities of Soldotna, Kenai, Homer, Seward, Seldovia, etc.

Salient features are as follow:

1. Provides access to a large area on the southeast side of the Kenai River. Borough tax records show approximately 200 families with 576 persons in the area. Access is currently on the 17-mile Funny River Road following the Kenai River from Soldotna.

A large portion of Funny River Road passes through federal land of the Kenai Wildlife Refuge (formerly the Kenai National Moose Range). The road was constructed many years ago to minimum access standards and poses grave safety problems due to its narrow width and current high traffic levels. Accidents are frequent (see attached Peninsula Clarion article). School buses have a treacherous time in the severe weather conditions during winter and break up. Routing keeps children on the buses far longer than necessary.

2. The bridge project is far more cost effective and removes much of the need for upgrade and realignment of Funny River Road. The project cost is under \$6 million while DOT/PF's cost estimates of reconstructing for the 17 miles of the road run as high as \$1 million per mile.

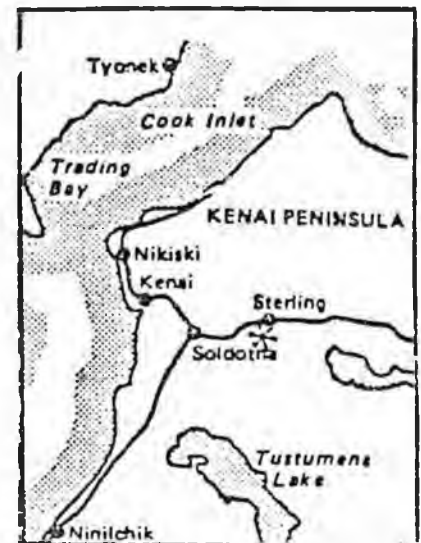
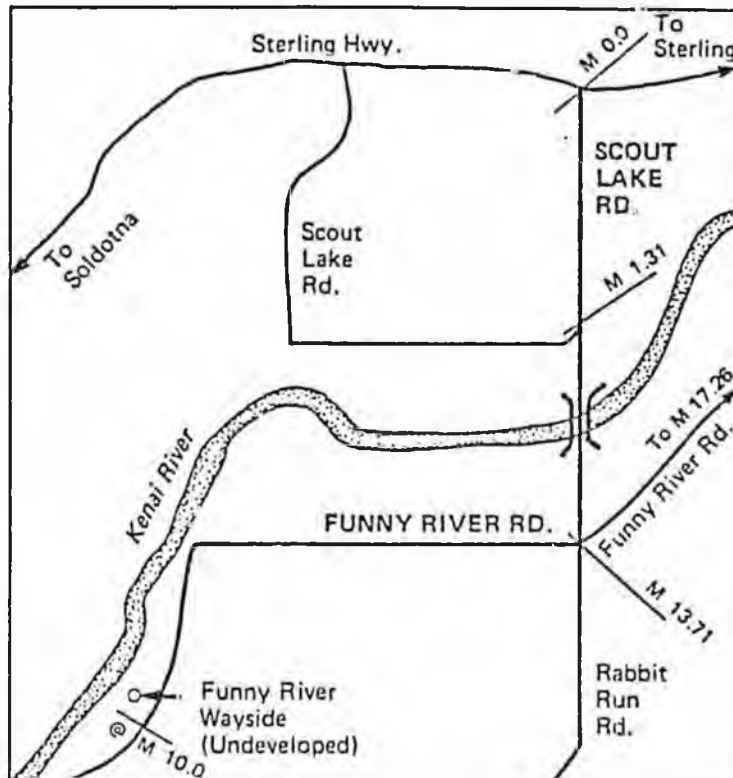

3. Provides faster and improved ambulance, fire and public safety access to families on the south side of Kenai River by allowing emergency vehicles to use the paved Sterling Highway and cross the Kenai River toward the end of Funny River Road. Residential fires are frequently terminal since heavy fire equipment makes very slow progress over the 17 miles of narrow, icy and potholed road.
4. Provides access for residents of the southern side of Kenai River to:
 - Sterling Elementary School, grades K - 6.
 - Business area of Sterling.
 - Access to paved Sterling Highway for faster, safer travel either toward Anchorage or Soldotna.
5. Provides general public access to unutilized state park lands on the southeast side of Kenai River, helping to solve access problem to the river and to disperse the immense fishing crowds over a wide variety of sites.

Actions on this Bridge/Road project are as follows:

1. 1980 - Appropriation for reconnaissance.
2. 1981 - Appropriation for design.
3. 1982 - Included in bond package which was vetoed by Governor.
4. Included in Sheffield 1983 Administrative Budget (DOT/PF) which was submitted to legislature.

The Bridge was identified as #14 on the Kenai Peninsula Transportation Plan. Since the development of the plan, 10 of the 14 projects have been completed, are under contract or adopted as municipal projects, moving this project up to number 4 on the priority list.

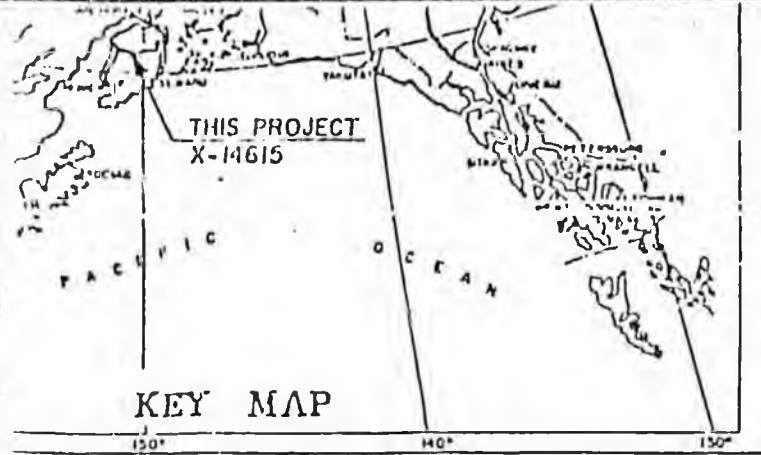

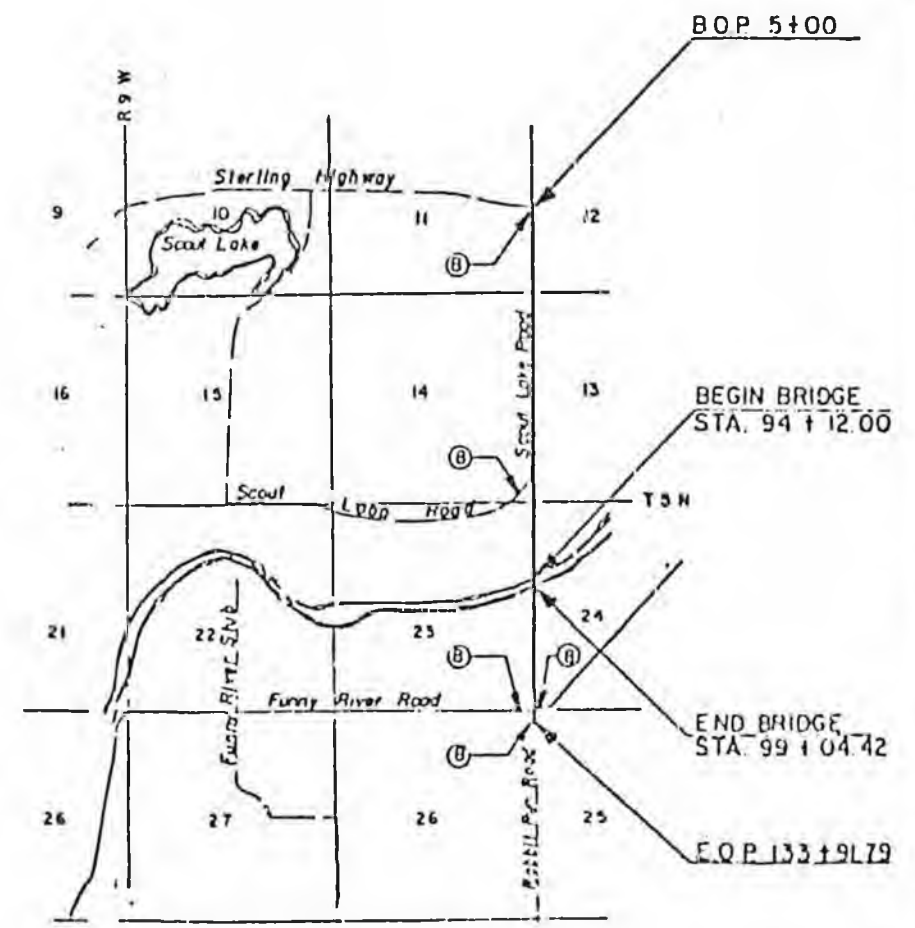
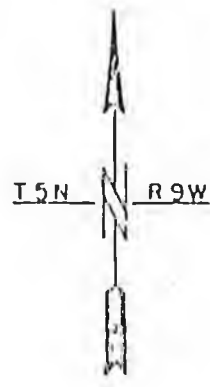

HIGH PRIORITY PROJECTS

The high priority project list consists of 1) ongoing, 2) current needs and 3) the higher ranked future projects. This list is shown in Table III-4, and detailed descriptions of each of these projects are included at the end of this chapter. In addition, the general location of each High Priority project is shown in Figure III-3.

The higher ranked projects were the subject of both quantitative and qualitative evaluations. While these evaluations provided valuable information on each project, the evaluations were not the sole criterion for placing or keeping a project on the high priority list. In fact, the Technical Advisory and Steering Committees made the final decisions on placements in the high priority group.

High Priority Project Descriptions

The following descriptions are intended to provide the information and data needed for DOT/PF's capital improvement programming (CIP) decisions. Thus, they represent a "resource" from which DOT/PF can select projects for its annual CIP submission to the Governor.

Each of the following projects are numbered to coincide with those shown earlier in Table III-4. Also the project names are those from the DOT/PF Coordinated Data System (CDS) log--when the popular name differs from the CDS designation, it is added to the CDS name and number.

Most of these roads have been recognized and scheduled for improvement by DOT/PF, by the Borough or by the cities. Thus, the traffic capacity/use analyses in the Phase II report served mainly to confirm their overloaded condition. Table II-3 identifies facilities below the minimal level of service for this project.

FUTURE NEEDS

Community Development Goals

During Phase II of the KRTS study, a large list of projects was proposed by the general public and elected and appointed officials during the initial round of public meetings. Many of these facilities are on-going or below minimal level of service facility projects which are included in Tables II-1 and II-2 above. The remaining projects included both regional and local projects on the state-maintained system. See Table II-4 for these community preferred projects which were presented in the Phase II report and repeated here. Note that Table II-4 still includes projects previously included in the On-going (Tables II-1 and II-2) and Facility Projects not meeting a minimal level of service (Table II-3).

Economic Development Requirements

Projects were identified for this category through the Phase II evaluation of regional economic development potentials. The primary criteria for inclusion on this list was a demonstrable potential for development that would warrant DOT/PF's attention at this time. See Table II-5 which was taken from the Phase II report and still includes projects listed in the On-going (Tables II-1 and II-2) and Facility Projects not meeting a minimal level of service (Table II-3).

Former chief Wisecarver dies in crash

Frank Wisecarver, the first fire chief for the city of Kenai, died Wednesday afternoon in a head-on collision on Funny River Road.

The collision also seriously injured a 19-year-old Soldotna man.

Wisecarver, 59, was the chief of the city's volunteer fire department in the mid-1960s and served as the first chief when the department converted to a paid force. He left the department in 1977.

The accident occurred at Mile 11 Funny River Road at about 1 p.m.

According to an Alaska State Troopers report, Elmer (Roy) Bird of Soldotna was driving his car toward Soldotna on Funny River Road when his car apparently crossed the center line as it was coming around a curve. It struck Wisecarver's truck head-on.

Wisecarver was pronounced dead on arrival at Central Peninsula General Hospital. An Emergency Services medic said Bird suffered rib cage injuries, broken bones and possible internal injuries. He was taken to the hospital, where he is recovering in intensive care.

Kenai Fire Department Capt. Don Morgan remembered Wisecarver as "probably the best thing to happen to the Kenai Fire Department. He was highly respected by the guys he worked with, and was a personal friend, too."
