9 \* Section 1. AS 44.41 is amended by adding new sections to read:

10 ARTICLE 2. ALASKA STATE FIRE COMMISSION.

11 Sec. 44.41.100. FIRE COMMISSION. The Alaska State Fire Commis-  
12 sion is established in the Department of Public Safety.

13 Sec. 44.41.110. MEMBERSHIP. (a) The governor shall appoint the  
14 members of the commission without regard to political affiliation to  
15 serve for terms of four years. Members must have an understanding of  
16 basic fire protection principles. A member may serve no more than two  
17 consecutive full terms. Membership must include a

- 18 (1) member of the Alaska Fire Chief's Association;
- 19 (2) member of the Alaska State Firefighters Association;
- 20 (3) member of the Alaska Municipal League;
- 21 (4) representative of the field of education;
- 22 (5) representative of the Alaska Federation of Natives;
- 23 (6) representative of the insurance industry;
- 24 (7) representative of the construction industry;
- 25 (8) representative of the oil industry; and
- 26 (9) representative of the transportation industry.

27 (b) The attorney general and the commissioners of public safety,  
28 labor, community and regional affairs, and natural resources or their  
29 designated representatives are nonvoting members of the committee.

1 (c) A vacancy on the commission shall be filled from the appro-  
 2 priate source. The appointee shall serve for the unexpired portion of

SB-209 Alaska State Fire Commission

This commission was the recommendation of the Governor's Task Force on Fire Prevention and Control.

The CS changes or deletes the following: PROCEDURES: STAFF

1. Removes language (that commission shall determine location of each meeting in advance and shall publish notice of each meeting statewide at least 30 days before the meeting date. (original page 2, lines 9-12)
2. deletes "Roberts Rules of Order shall govern commission meetings." (original, page 2, line 13)
3. staff hiring: the CS changes the language so that the Commission may hire staff as necessary, rather than shall hire as necessary (orig. page 2, lin 20)
4. Changes term of office of chair and vice-chair to serve for terms of one year rather than four years. (origal, page 2, line 14-15)

POWERS AND DUTIES

1. removes phrase Commission shall "assist state and local fire prevention and control agencies in improving fir prevention and control in the state (orig. page 2, lines 25 and 26)
2. deletes on page 3 of original bill subsections as follows:
  - (4) develop and maintain a liason with all fire protection agencies in the state, both public and private
  - (5) recommend legislative and executive actions to enhance effective and efficient fire prevention and suppression
  - (7) develop and implement a standardized data collection system for all fire protection agencies in the state;
  - (8) serve as a resource and technical information source for local governments, state and federal agencies, the legislature and persons in the state
- (9) (submit an annual report to the Governor, legislature, and the fire service community on the activities, recommendations, and accomplishments of the commission during the preceding fiscal year .....this requirement was changed in CS to provide a report WHEN REQUESTED BY THE GOVERNOR OR THE LEGISLATURE (the budget process should provide ample opportunity to report on yearly activities, both to Gov. and Legislature.

The remainder of the CS follows the original bill except the sunset date is changed from 1989, to 1990, as the bill was first introduced in 1985.

The reason for eliminating much of the language in the original bill was because these were procedures and duties suggested in the Task Force findings produced last year. If the commission is established, it is assumed they would tend to these kinds of activities as implied by their existence.

Page 3, line 7-9, permits the Commission to accept gifts, bequests, devises, grants, matching funds, etc. for purposes of promoting the commissions work.....Legal services advises that in this type of instance this is often done, although gifts of funds would necessarily have to go through the General Fund, and then subsequently approved for appropriation by the legislature.

In drafting the CS it was thought that to shrink down all the procedures and requirements may tend to reduce the volume of "requirements" of the Commission which may help to keep a lid on subsequent year requests for funding.

In addition, stating the Commission may hire staff as opposed to shall hire was an attempt to soften the implication that staff must be hired.

The State Fire Chiefs Association insisted that the powers of regulations be included in the legislation, as well as establishing policy and operational guidelines for state agencies, found on page 2 lines 21-27, in the CS.

SECTIONAL ANALYSIS OF CS FOR SENATE BILL 209 ( Finance )

April 23, 1986

Introduction: This bill would establish a State Fire Commission which would be charged with developing a state master plan for fire prevention and control and a state fire education and training plan. Additional duties would include establishing policy guidelines for state agencies with fire protection responsibilities, and serving as the central state office for information, regulations and suggested programs relating to fire prevention and control.

The establishment of a Fire Commission is a result of recommendations from the Fire Commission Task Force. The Task Force was created and funded by the Legislature in 1984 to analyze Alaska's fire problem and propose corrective measures.

Section 1.

44.41.100. Establishes the Alaska State Fire Commission in the Department of Public Safety.

44.41.110. The Commission would coordinate a largely diverse group of agencies with fire service programs and responsibilities at different levels of government and industry. This section establishes membership criteria and length of terms for the members.

The Attorney General and the commissioners of Public Safety, Labor, Community and Regional Affairs, and Natural Resources would serve as ex officio members.

44.41.120. Prescribes operating procedures to establish the Commission's organization and meetings. This section further allows the commission to hire staff which will be in the partially exempt service.

44.41.130. Establishes the duties of the Commission to develop a state master plan for fire prevention and control and a state fire education and training plan, design operational guidelines for state agencies with fire protection responsibilities, adopt regulations, and make recommendations to fire related programs.

Section 2. Places the employees of the Commission in the partially exempt service.

Section 3. The Commission will sunset on June 30, 1990.

Section 4. Sets the original membership on the Commission to staggered terms.

Section 5. Provides for an effective date upon enactment.

SB 209

CHANGES TO CSSB 209 (SA)

An Act Creating the Alaska State Fire Commission and Providing for an effective date.

Section 1. 44.41.100 FIRE COMMISSION

Established the Commission in the Department of Public Safety rather than the Office of the Governor. This is consistent with the governors' wish that commissions operate under the department affected.

44.41.110 MEMBERSHIP

(8) Changed from Petrochemical Industry to "oil Industry". This is the only change in this section and was requested by the fire service. They wanted a representative from the oil industry exclusively and not the "Petrochemical" industry in general.

44.41.120 STAFF

(c) Changed terms an officer may serve. Changed, at the suggestion of the Revisor of Statutes and agreed to by all parties. Original language provided for 4 year terms for officers.

(e) Provides that the Commission shall hire staff as necessary and provides that the employees are in the partially exempt service.

The original provided for an executive director and other staff. It was felt that an administrative officer would be sufficient and by putting the employees in the partially exempt service, the positions will be flexible.

Section 2. Places the employees of the Commission in the Partially exempt service.

Section 3. Changed the expiration date from 1989 to 1990 since the bill did not pass last year.





Although the bill would allow refinancing an AHFC loan to obtain a lower interest rate, the borrower would still have to be able to qualify for the lower loan payments, and there would be a certain amount of cash required for closing costs.

ANALYSIS FOR SENATE BILL 212

An Act relating to refinancing of Alaska Housing Finance Corporation loans in cases of extreme hardship

As introduced this bill amended the AHFC statutes relating to the Corporation's general powers. Essentially, AHFC would have been authorized to permit a borrower to refinance a loan because of extreme hardship. That was defined as the death or serious illness of the borrower or the borrower's spouse.

At the request of the sponsor, there is a Finance Committee Substitute, because the opinion of AHFC was that the original bill did not correct the problem which prompted Senator Ray to introduce this bill.

In the Finance CS, the special mortgage loan purchase program is amended by allowing AHFC to refinance loans so that the borrower (suffering an extreme hardship) may obtain a lower interest rate. AHFC defines cases of extreme hardship as death, divorce or sever disability. It would apply to persons currently holding higher interest rate AHFC loans as well as persons holding conventional or other types of mortgages.

If the balance of the Undistributed Income Account (UIA) of the Permanent Fund (PF) funded the PSFA annually on July 1, the UIA balance would be quickly depleted, and would only be capable of partially funding the PSFA in the second and subsequent years as shown in Table 2.

Since the PSFA decreases the UIA balance, the result will be less interest earned by the UIA which will then provide less distributable income and subsequently less for the dividend fund. The total net change the UIA balance will annually experience is shown in Table 3.

Finally, initial losses to the Permanent Fund principal result from lower net earnings being insufficient to provide full inflation proofing. This will lower the Permanent Fund principal balance beginning in FY 89. The depletion of the UIA accumulations eliminates the source of funds to compensate for shortfalls in inflation proofing from current earnings. \$298.46 million was expected to be withdrawn from the UIA between 1991--1995 to make up for shortfalls.

Fiscal Note estimates were based on the January 1985 revenue projections (30% case).

At times, the Department of Revenue and the Alaska Permanent Fund Corporation may differ as to the estimated fiscal impacts of legislation. Differences arise because each employs a different set of investment assumptions. Consequently, projections depicting net income, inflation proofing amounts and dividend transfers may likely vary.

Furthermore, while the Department of Revenue is strictly concerned with accurately forecasting total revenues, the Permanent Fund Corporation, with its trust fund management responsibilities, has established its assumptions to measure investment returns in accordance with standards developed for fiduciaries. Therefore, the Permanent Fund Corporation's assumptions will frequently and appropriately yield more conservative investment results.
