In reference to the attached forms detailing presently assigned and open cases we feel that it is necessary to explain some of the categories listed. The blocks labeled "Inter-family and Exter-family" are self explanatory. The block marked "Multiple Victims" indicates any case where there is more than one known victim and could include numerous known victims. If the blocks entitled "Drug Violations, Pornography, or Commercial Prostitution" are checked it indicates that violations of this nature are involved in the case and are being worked as a part of the case. The block entitled "Sexual Assault" refers to cases where the victim (adult or juvenile) was assaulted forceably and is likened to the "stranger rape" situation. The block marked "Sexual Abuse" indicates cases in which a minor was sexually abused, either consentually or forceably. The block marked "Sexual Exploitation" refers to those cases involving sexual abuse in which there are known or suspected multiple victims and there appears to be a pattern of ongoing behavior on the part of the perpetrator in continuing the sexual abuse of known victims and seeking out new victims; in short cases involving a fixated pedophile.

Attached also is a copy of a recent "job description" submitted by Inv. Feichtinger in reference to his duties in this area that had been prepared for an APD classification study now in progress. This attachment is provided for your information and probably accurately describes the job duties, at present, if an investigator in this unit.

For your information, during the month of December, 1984, (the first month this unit was in existence) approximately 44 new cases were taken in. During the month of January, 1985, approximately 58 new cases were taken in. So far this month the unit has taken in approximately 23 new cases. This does not include information that has been received from various sources indicating sexually abusive/exploitive situations where no victims have yet come forward.

RE: UNIT DEFINITION AND CLARIFICATION

Dear Bill:

Amongst the many items we request your expertise on, most matters are left to your decision as to prioritizing. Outside of the requested communications with Trooper VonClasen, this matter should be given a high priority.

Enclosed you will find a Letter of Agreement signed during the current agreement negotiations period. As you may recall, the Association argued:

1. The State was moving classifications from our unit without notification; and,
2. The State was creating new classifications without notifying us for placement considerations; and,
3. The State was using the Article 2 language "Regularly Commissioned Public Safety Officers Unit" as a guideline (or rather, a tool) for placement.

We did not pursue the matter to the SLRB at that time because we hoped to resolve the issue in interest arbitration, which occurred in August of 1984. The issue wasn't resolved in interest arbitration because we agreed to a Classification Study. The preliminary results of the Study indicate this matter is compounded, rather than resolved.

Reference #1 above, we find that Security Specialist II, P.S., Deputy Fire Marshal II and Demolition Specialists have been removed from our unit. We grasped this from conversations during negotiations, not through official notification from the State with contestation rights.

Reference #2 and #3 above, we find that the classifications of Fish & Wildlife Protection Aide, Transportation Field Agent I, and Transportation Field Agent II have been created and placed in another unit even though their position community of interest is well within our unit.

On the matter of the Fish & Wildlife Protection Aide, the sole purpose of this classification is economics (the State premises our unit salaries are too high, rather than negotiate new salaries), fragmentizing our unit. The Aides perform duties overwhelmingly similar to Fish & Wildlife Protection Officers, prior to their re-classification to Trooper, and work along side Troopers even rotating the stand-by duties. Recently we were informed the Director of Fish & Wildlife plans on re-classifying all vacant trooper PCN's reserved for his division to Fish & Wildlife Aides simply for economic reasons.

Also, the Village Public Safety Officers (VPSO) are excluded from bargaining units because they are employees of the State through a contractual basis. I believe VPSO's belong in our unit.

SPONSOR SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE BILL NO. 220

For an Act entitled: "An Act Abolishing the Department of Environmental Conservation, transferring functions to other departments and repealing the Environmental Procedures Coordination Act; and Providing for an Effective Date."

This Bill abolishes the Department of Environmental Conservation and reassigns its functions to other departments of government.

As stated in the original position paper, the Department of Health and Social Services does not support Senate Bill No. 220. However, should the legislature decide to enact this Bill, a change in the sponsor substitute version is requested. Section 33 of the sponsor substitute transfers a number of inspection and enforcement functions to the Department of Natural Resources. Included in these are AS 17.05 (Standards of Sale for Food or Drink), AS 17.20 (Alaska Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act) and AS 18.35 (Public Accommodations and Facilities).

These statutes are designed to protect public health through setting of standards, inspections to monitor compliance with standards, surveillance for disease occurrence and institution of control measures should an outbreak of disease due to food, drink, drugs or cosmetics occur. Close cooperation between the field staff responsible for inspections, public education and monitoring and the epidemiology staff in this department is required since the epidemiology staff is involved in determining the existence of a health problem, in designing appropriate investigative techniques, analysis of the results of field investigation and selection of control measures where necessary. For this reason, if this Bill is enacted, the responsibility for inspection and enforcement in AS 17.05, AS 17.20 and AS 18.35 should be assigned to the Department of Health and Social Services and the resources devoted to these duties within the Department of Environmental Conservation should be returned to the Department.



Dear Senator Bennett:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill to provide salary adjustments for state officers and employees not covered by a collective bargaining agreement. This bill provides a salary increase in three steps: a lump sum, three and one-half percent "compensatory payment," payable after August 1, 1985, covering the period from December 16, 1984 through June 15, 1985; a five percent increase for the period from July 16, 1985 through July 15, 1986; and an additional four percent increase for the period July 16, 1986 through July 15, 1987. Following past practice for a number of years, these increases parallel those provided for in the current collective bargaining agreement for the general government unit.
