**Protected activities.** — Two-part test used to determine whether activity is within the legitimate legislature sphere and thus within the protection of this section requires the activity to (1) be an integral part of the deliberative and communicative process by which members participate in committee and house proceedings and (2) address proposed legislation or some other subject within the legislature's constitutional jurisdiction. *Schultz v. Sundberg, 759 F.2d 714 (9th Cir. 1985).*

Political activities of legislators, which include attempts on behalf of constituents to influence the executive branch in carrying out administrative responsibilities, i.e., prosecuting criminals, are not privileged; but legislative activities which are performed in order to directly influence the enactment of specific legislation are privileged. *State v. Dankworth, Ct. App. Op. No. 308 (File No. 7543), 672 P.2d 148 (1983).*

State senate president who ordered the attendance of absent legislators to achieve a quorum so that the governor's appointment could be considered for confirmation was entitled to absolute legislative immunity because his action took place on the floor of the senate, the business was clearly legislative, and an action to compel attendance of other legislators at a legislative session is an integral legislative function. *Schultz v. Sundberg, 759 F.2d 714 (9th Cir. 1985).*

Actions of senate finance chairman in acquiring property while promoting its sale to the state at a purchase price which would result in his receiving substantial profits and in using his influence as a

legislator to secure an appropriation for the purchase by the state in the governor's proposed budget were clearly legislative and therefore within the immunity granted in this section. *State v. Dankworth, Ct. App. Op. No. 308 (File No. 7543), 672 P.2d 148 (1983).*

**Immunity for nonparty legislators.** — Alaska's immunity clause applies to legislators not parties in an underlying action. The president of the senate, the presiding officer at joint sessions of the legislature with the duty to call a joint session to order once convened by the governor and to preside over it, has a general duty to vote on the governor's appointees during a joint session and specific duties to perform as senate president; and any conversations between the senate president and the governor may be seen as acts in preparation for performance of these duties and as such are privileged. *Kerttula v. Abood, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 2858 (File No. S-257), 686 P.2d 1197 (1984).*

**Termination of legislative researcher is administrative act.** — Termination of a legislative researcher for the legislative affairs agency for expressing her economic and political views in an interview in violation of a "public neutrality requirement," an unwritten and informal understanding, for which she declined a reprimand, and for refusing to abide by the director's interpretation of the public neutrality requirement in the future was an administrative rather than a legislative act and was not within the scope of legislative immunity. *State v. Huley, Sup. Ct. Op. No. 2560 (File Nos. 6604, 6608, 6609, 6610), 687 P.2d 305 (1984).*

**Section 8. Regular Sessions.** The legislature shall convene in regular session each year on the fourth Monday in January, but the month and day may be changed by law. The legislature shall adjourn from regular session no later than one hundred twenty consecutive calendar days from the date it convenes except that a regular session may be extended once for up to ten consecutive calendar days. An extension of the regular session requires the affirmative vote of at least two-thirds of the membership of each house of the legislature. The legislature shall adopt as part of the uniform rules of procedure deadlines for scheduling session work not inconsistent with provisions controlling the length of the session.

The Department of Administration requests your consideration of a "late-breaking" CIP request on behalf of the planned Anchorage Office Complex. After the original appraisals covering the land to be used for the site of the AOC, we transferred by Reimbursable Services Agreement (RSA) the appraisal amount of \$7,457,500.00, to the Department of Transportation and Public Facilities (DOT/PF), to secure the land. The Attorney General (AG) has now advised us that inflation and settlements will probably run the land price up to \$10,000,000.00. This leaves us a deficit as detailed below.



You have asked whether the rules prohibiting a change in title of a bill by the second house after the bill is passed by the house of origin apply to concurrent resolutions. Uniform Rule 24(c), 35, 41, and 42 all address the title change prohibition and all apply specifically to bills and do not mention resolutions. Rule 49(a)(3) sets out the method for adopting a concurrent resolution and does not require the formalities used in adopting a bill.

A concurrent resolution is similar to the simple resolution but reflects the will, wish, view or decision of both houses speaking concurrently. It is used particularly to handle the internal business of the legislature, e.g., adjournment of the legislature, suspension and amendment of the Uniform Rules, requesting action of executive agencies and internal committees, and fixing the time and place for joint assemblies. This resolution is also used for establishing joint committees. This resolution does not require committee referral, three readings, or anything other than approval of a majority vote of the full membership of each house unless otherwise required by the rules. (Emphasis added.)

Because the rules dealing with title changes specifically apply only to bills and because a concurrent resolution is not treated like a bill under the Uniform Rules, it is my conclusion that the rules dealing with title changes do not apply to concurrent resolutions. A joint resolution, however, is ". . . treated in all respects as a bill. . ." under Uniform Rule 49(5) so the rules dealing with title changes do apply to joint resolution.

Re: SCR 10 - Alaska History and Government

SCR 10 asks the Board of Education to request local school boards to require the study of Alaska history and government as a condition for high school graduation.

Currently, local school boards are required to teach "social studies", which includes Alaska history and government. However, it also includes American history, world history, geography, anthropology, cultural studies, political science and other issues. In many cases, students leave high school without ever studying these subjects in their Alaska context.

SCR 10 originally asked that the Board require local school districts to teach Alaska history and government. The Board, based on a long standing committment of allowing local school boards to set their own criteria, declined to support the resolution. The HESS committee substitute changed require to request, leaving the ultimate decision to local boards.

In the last five years, the Board of Education has sponsored the developemnt of text and film materials in the area of Alaska history and government. The learning aids are available, the teachers want to teach the subject, but young Alaskans are still graduating from high school without even a minimal knowledge of our state's history or government.

If we are going to promote good citizenship and have Alaskans who are knowledgeable in the affairs of our state, we need to encourage the Board of Education to pursue this requirement. I believe SCR 10 will help accomplish that without improperly invading the Board's prerogatives.

SCR 10 is supported by the NEA, the FREE Committee, and the Alaska Native Education Program. It passed the Senate unanimously and received five do passes in the House HESS Committee. It has a zero fiscal note.
