9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

10 \* Section 1. LEGISLATIVE FINDINGS. The legislature finds that the  
11 Bristol Bay Area Plan is an area plan that developed from a cooperative  
12 planning process involving state and federal agencies and local residents,  
13 and that while the Bristol Bay Area Plan sets out guidelines for the man-  
14 agement of the area's natural resources, it recommends further planning for  
15 the recreational uses of many of the rivers and land adjacent to the rivers  
16 in Bristol Bay. The legislature further recognizes that the recreational  
17 uses of the rivers are increasing and that a plan for the recreational  
18 management of the rivers is necessary.

19 \* Sec. 2. The commissioner of natural resources shall adopt a recrea-  
20 tion management plan for the Bristol Bay region. The plan shall address  
21 the management topics and options that are within the authority of the  
22 commissioner of natural resources. In the adoption of the management plan,  
23 the commissioner of natural resources shall consider the implications for  
24 federal or private land of action proposed to be taken on state land in the  
25 Bristol Bay region. The recreational management plan shall address the  
26 recreation management of the Nushagak-Mulchatna River drainage, the Naknek  
27 River drainage, and the Kvichak River-Lake Iliamna-Lake Clark drainage.  
28 The recreation management plan shall address the recreation management on  
29 other rivers in the Bristol Bay region to the extent that recreational uses

1 in the drainages described in this section affect recreational activities  
2 on other rivers.

3 \* Sec. 3. (a) The commissioner of natural resources shall prepare the  
4 recreation management plan with the advice and assistance of an advisory  
5 committee. The plan shall be based on the best available biological,  
6 geographical, cultural, social, and economic data and prepared after public  
7 hearings in communities located on the Nushagak, Mulchatna, Naknek,  
8 Kvichak, and Iliamna Rivers and in Dillingham and Anchorage.

9 (b) The advisory committee consists of

10 (1) the commissioner of natural resources;

11 (2) the commissioner of fish and game;

12 (3) a representative of the Bristol Bay Coastal Resource Service  
13 Area Board;

14 (4) a representative of the Bristol Bay Borough Coastal Dis-

16 (5) a representative of the Bristol Bay Regional Native Corpo-  
17 ration;

27 (d) A designee of an advisory committee member may serve in the

29 (e) The commissioner of natural resources shall prepare the plan

1 within two years after the effective date of this Act.

2 (f) The recreation management plan adopted by the commissioner of  
3 natural resources becomes a part of the Bristol Bay Area Plan.

4 (g) The recreation management plan prepared by the commissioner under  
5 (e) of this section shall be submitted to the legislature for review no

8 \* Sec. 4. To the maximum extent possible, the commissioner of natural  
9 resources shall implement the recommendations of the recreation plan in the

12 Act or until the recreation management plan has been adopted, whichever is  
13 earlier, the commissioner of natural resources shall defer the development  
14 of permanent recreation facilities and may not issue a lease for more than  
15 five years for commercial recreation purposes within the Bristol Bay Re-  
16 gion.

17 \* Sec. 5. This Act takes effect immediately in accordance with AS 01.-

SECTIONAL ANALYSIS FOR SCS CS HB 440 (RESOURCES)  
Recreation Management Plan for Bristol Bay

Section 1 - FINDINGS

Section 1 discusses the legislative findings and explains the need for the Bristol Bay Recreation Management Plan.

Section 2 - SCOPE OF THE PLAN

This section establishes that the plan shall address recreation management on a drainage by drainage basis. The recreation management plan applies to the state land and water within Bristol Bay. However, what happens on one river drainage can effect what happens on another river drainage. For this reason, although the state can not manage anything but state land and water, the plan can allow work with federal agencies and private landholders to address recreational activities.

Section 3 - ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Section 3 establishes an advisory committee comprised of representatives from a wide range of interest groups to work with the commissioner of natural resources in preparing the plan. A member of the advisory committee may designate someone to take that member's place in the event that the member can not attend an advisory committee meeting. Public hearings on the plan are to take place in communities throughout Bristol Bay and in Anchorage. The plan is to be completed within two years. The plan is to be submitted to the legislature for review.

Section 4 - IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PLAN

Until the plan is complete, or for two years - whichever is earlier - the commissioner can only issue short-term leases for commercial recreational purposes.

Section 5 - EFFECTIVE DATE

This Act takes effect immediately in accordance with AS 01.10.070(c).

SUBJECT: CSHB 440 (Finance)/Recreation Plan for Bristol Bay

Over the past few years the Bristol Bay Region has experienced a dramatic increase in the number of people using the region's resources for recreational purposes. This increased use has resulted in many conflicts between users in addition to serious impacts on the resource. As a result of these problems, I have introduced House Bill 440 which would initiate the planning process for recreational management in the Bristol Bay Region.

Many individuals and organizations are interested in developing the recreational potential of the area but there are many conflicting ideas about how this should occur. During a teleconference in the House Resources Committee all the concerned parties indicated strong support for the bill and for the plan which it would initiate.

The terms of the CSHB 440 (Finance) would allow the plan to be a vehicle for bringing together all the different parties in order to hammer out their different ideas. This will result in recommendations the Commissioner of Natural Resources can use to guide the recreational development of Bristol Bay.

As described in Section 3, the bill establishes an Advisory Committee comprised of representatives from a wide range of concerned user groups and state officials. The Committee is charged with working to develop the terms of the plan and has a maximum of two years to formulate guidelines for the recreational management of the Bristol Bay Region. The planning process will be an opportunity for all the different concerned parties to address a full range of alternatives for the recreation management of the region. I am confident that, if passed, this legislation would provide the vehicle for these decisions to be made in a reasonable fashion by all the concerned parties before the problems escalate.

Your support in passing CSHB 440 (Finance) would be greatly appreciated.

## ANALYSIS

### Bristol Bay Recreation Study (#B 440)

The Bristol Bay region has long been known by sportsmen for its trophy fishing and big game hunting opportunities. A number of guiding operations use the Bristol Bay area, with most of the activity concentrated in the spring, summer, and fall months. Sport fishermen in 1980 harvested about 37,000 salmon, and fishing for trophy rainbow trout and grayling is very popular. Sport hunting for big game species such as brown bear, moose, and caribou occurs throughout much of the area. The Institute of Social and Economic Research estimates that the economic value of recreational hunting, fishing and non-consumptive uses of fish and wildlife resources in the region is between \$20 and \$40 million per year. The rivers described in Section 2 along with the two congressionally designated National Wild and Scenic Rivers in the region and other rivers in adjacent parks have become increasingly popular for river floating. The area contains many commercial lodges catering to hunters and fishermen; recreational cabins and campsites are also spread throughout. Maintained and unmaintained airstrips abound, and floatplanes make use of the lakes and larger rivers. Wood-Tikchik State Park is the largest of Alaska's state parks and provides high quality fishing and boating. Three national parks or monuments (Lake Clark, Katmai, and Aniakchak) and four national wildlife refuges (Togiak, Becharof, Alaska Peninsula and Alaska Maritime) adjoin the planning area. These parks, the several national wildlife refuges and recreational rivers and lakes all attract increasing numbers of recreationists from around the world.

As the Bristol Bay Area Plan was developed as part of a cooperative effort for 31 million acres of land, it was not able to make detailed recommendations regarding management of important rivers on state land. The area plan was signed in September 1984 by the Commissioners of Natural Resources, Fish and Game and Environmental Conservation. The area plan recommends that agencies undertake a regional recreation study for the area. The plan recommends that the study address the following:

1. recreation management of rivers and lakes with high recreation potential;
2. refinement of the primary recreation designations of the BBAP;
3. the numbers and location of future commercial recreation facilities;
4. the concept of setting aside a strip of State and ELM land on both sides of the Nushagak, Nuyukuk, Mulchatna, Kokwok, Koktuli, Swan, King Salmon (off the Nushagak), Chichitna, and Kvichak Rivers and shoreline of Iliamna Lake as special management corridors or public reserve lands that would be managed entirely and exclusively for traditional and public recreational uses;
5. acquisition and marking of public access sites, easements, and campsites and identification of and propose solutions to trespass problems;

6. the need for cooperative land management agreements to ensure maintenance of habitats of fish and wildlife resources used for subsistence and recreation;
7. what is the existing and potential growth in recreation demand and facilities;
8. how compatible is recreation with subsistence and other sectors of the region's economy;
9. how does Bristol Bay recreation contribute to the state's economy;
10. what effect will land disposals and other land uses have on recreation;
11. how do net economic benefits compare with other sectors of the economy; and
12. the disposal (including leasing) of state land for public and private recreation, particularly state land disposals around Iliamna Lake.

The recreation plan outlined in HB 440 would be prepared under the direction of an advisory committee. The local committee members would not receive compensation, but travel and per diem would be paid through this appropriation. The Division of Land and Water Management, Resource Allocation Section, would serve as project staff with assistance from the Division of Parks and Outdoor Recreation.

The plan would be started in the summer of 1986 and would be submitted to the Commissioner by spring of 1988. The final plan would be printed at the end of fiscal year 1988. The budget provides funding for a part-time local coordinator in Dillingham to be hired through the Coastal Resource Service Area Board (CRSA) or Bristol Bay Native Association.

The fiscal note does not identify funds necessary for implementation of the recreation plan.



## BRISTOL BAY COASTAL RESOURCE SERVICE AREA PROJECTS

### I. Nushagak River Basin Mapping Project

This project represents the largest-scale mapping effort done on a river system in Bristol Bay to date and includes:

- three (3) 1:500,000 index sheets showing the location of larger scale 1:63,360 maps; and
- thirty-four (34) maps at a scale of 1 inch to 1 mile showing various sections of the Nushagak River drainage basin's major river and lakes.

These blue-line maps are intended to be used as working maps by the Bristol Bay CRSA Board, various state agencies and village corporations for land and water resource inventory work. These maps were produced at the level of detail necessary for preparing a management plan. The Bristol Bay CRSA Board also has the contact mylars and the negatives for each map sheet and is able to reproduce any portion of the mapping project for the cost of reproduction (blue-line paper).

### II. Commercial Recreation Study

Because of the rapidly accelerating use of the Nushagak River drainage by recreation and virtual lack of information on the intensity and location of this use, the CRSA Board received a \$30,000 special appropriation to do a study on commercial recreation use of the Nushagak/Mulchatna River drainages. Due to funding limitations, the study focused on the Nushagak/Mulchatna area (study area) and does not reflect the substantial amount of recreation use in the Iliamna subregion or other areas experiencing significant use.

Phase I of the study has been completed and resulted in a directory of commercial service providers - lodges, guides and air taxis - that operate in the study area. A total of 128 lodges, guides and air taxis were found to operate full-time or part-time in the Nushagak/Mulchatna area alone, representing a significant indication of the amount of recreational use this river system currently receives. The value of the directory was both to define the number of operators using the area, and to establish a current population base from which to administer a detailed survey.

Phase II of the study involved developing and administering three separate survey questionnaires for the three broad categories of commercial service providers. The survey questionnaires were designed to collect specific information on the location, timing and other use characteristics in the study area for sport fishing, hunting and recreational rafters, as well as information on the types and costs of services provided by lodges, guides and air taxis. Commercial service providers were also asked to map regularly used areas for these activities, locations of permanent and non-permanent facilities (lodges, campsites, tents, cabins) and commonly used access points.

A total of 71 surveys have been completed representing 55% of the recreation businesses that operate in the study area. 52 of the 71 surveys were done by personal interview (averaging two hours per interview). Mail out questionnaires were sent to those operators not available for interview and a total of 19 questionnaires have been received. The information from these surveys is presently being analyzed, and a final report on the study summarizing the results of the survey will be published by the end of April 1986.

State and Federal Bristol Bay Plans Call for Further Recreation Planning

The Bristol Bay Plan emerged from the Bristol Bay Cooperative Management Plan which was a joint effort of state and federal agencies to plan for the region. Before the cooperative plan was adopted, a decision was made that the plans be adopted by the federal and state governments separately. The state plan was adopted as the Bristol Bay Area Plan and the federal plan was adopted as Bristol Bay Regional Management Plan. Both plans as adopted recognize the need for additional planning for the recreational management of the region.

Excerpt from the State Bristol Bay Area Plan  
Guidelines

1. Future Management Plans Should Address Recreation

State agencies should develop management plans that maintain public recreation, scenic areas, wilderness, unique geological features, and fragile or unique ecosystems in areas with significant recreation values.

2. Recreation Facility Siting

Recreation facilities will be sited in a manner to minimize the adverse impact on existing wildlife populations and traditional uses while at the same time providing the recreation facilities needed by the public.

Excerpt from the Federal Bristol Bay Regional Management Plan

Recreation Study: ADNR, ADF&G, BLM, and USFWS should develop a recreation management plan for the study area. The study should specifically address the various issues and concerns missed in the public review of the Draft BBCMP as well as the following:

1. recreation management of rivers and lakes with high recreation potential;
2. refinement of the primary recreation use recommendations of the BBRMP;
3. the location of future commercial recreation facilities;

Re: Comparison of Legislative Retirement Benefits

In response to our phone conversation of September 25, I am enclosing a comparison chart which outlines the differences between the Alaska Public Employees' (PERS), Teachers' (TRS), and Elected Public Officers (EPORS) retirement systems. Also enclosed is a comparison chart showing the differences between legislative retirement systems in California, Michigan, New York and Pennsylvania.


Of the 60 active legislators in Alaska, 42 have elected coverage under the PERS, three are covered under the TRS, 10 are covered under the EPORS, and five have waived participation in the PERS and, therefore, have no coverage.

The PERS was established effective January 1, 1961, and the TRS July 1, 1955. These systems were created to encourage qualified individuals to enter and remain in employment in Alaska. The PERS provides retirement coverage to public employees of the State and participating political subdivisions. The TRS provides coverage to teachers in public schools in Alaska.

The EPORS was established effective January 1, 1976, but was repealed by voter referendum on October 14, 1976. However, the Supreme Court later ruled that the repeal should not affect those elected officials who were at that time participating in the EPORS. Covered under this system are the governor, lieutenant governor, and legislators who were participating prior to the October 14, 1976 repeal.

I hope this information is helpful. If I can be of further assistance, please let me know.

You have asked for information concerning the development of the statutes concerning legislative salaries, allowances, per diem, and travel expenses. I have provided Linda Firestone of your staff with copies of the chapters that adopted or amended the appropriate statutes. The following table sets out the development of each of the relevant statutes.

AS 24.15.010. Legislative per diem.

Ch. 1 SLA 1959

Section 1. Legislative Per Diem. The rate of per diem in lieu of subsistence and other expenses for each member of the Legislature while in session shall be \$40.00 per day.  
Effective: February 11, 1959.
