9. Other psychological reactions to marijuana include loss of memory, impairment in thinking, reading comprehension, and verbal and arithmetic problem solving; impairment of perception of distance and time; and anxiety, panic, paranoia, psychosis, and psychological dependence.

Dr. Ronald C. Bloodworth, Clinical Director at the Psychiatric Institute of Atlanta, reported that "...Many heavy users suffer from distorted emotional responses, disordered thinking, and loss of memory and motivation." Dr. Bloodworth also reported that there is enough evidence to confirm that psychologic dependence is common among marijuana users and that physical dependence can also occur.²⁹

Other studies concur with Dr. Bloodworth's findings: "...cannabis intoxication...impairs judgments of distance and time, memory for recent events, ability to learn new information, and physical coordination,"³⁰ and, "...several studies have shown that marijuana intoxication impairs driving, flying and other complex skilled activities. Many elements of effective psychomotor performance are worsened by the drug because of decrements in recent memory, tracking performance, glare recovery, motor coordination, depth perception, time sense, and peripheral vision."³¹

"Under the influence of moderate doses of the drug, most investigators report that subjects consistently overestimate the amount of time that has elapsed. Thus, under the influence of marijuana, a given event is reported to last longer than it actually does last."³²

"Marijuana's popularity notwithstanding, a surprisingly high proportion of users report reactions that they regard as unpleasant or undesirable. For example, 33 percent of regular users reported that while intoxicated they occasionally experienced such symptoms as acute panic, paranoid reaction, hallucinations, and unpleasant distortions in body image."³³

Another study reported that "16 percent of regular users reported anxiety, fearfulness, confusion, dependency, or aggressive urges as a usual occurrence. Acute paranoid reactions under controlled conditions has also been reported."³⁴

"Cannabis psychosis refers to a chronic psychotic condition (out of contact with reality) reportedly seen in heavy marijuana users, but extending beyond the period of acute intoxication. Some authors have described a schizophrenia-like picture with delusions and hallucinations."³⁶

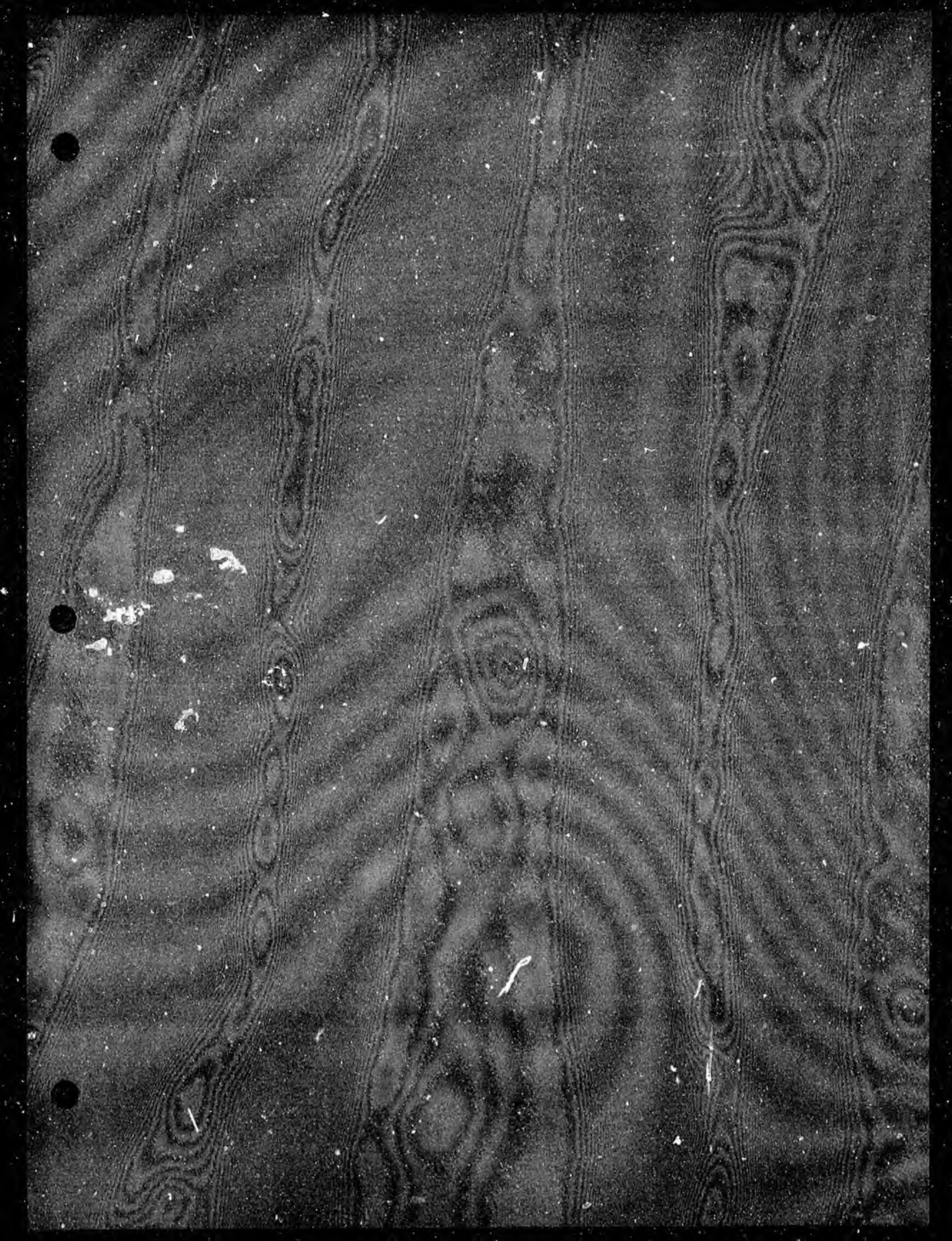
"Although infrequent..psychiatric problems can emerge. Acute anxiety and panic states from use of the drug are known, especially in persons who have never used marijuana before. Acute paranoid states will occur at times in experienced smokers who have previously used the drug without untoward reaction."³⁷

Subject: SB 33; VIOLATIONS OF TRUANCY LAWS

This bill has a zero fiscal note! Honest! It won't cost the State anything!.

SB 33 would rewrite the provision of current law that releases liability for truancy at the end of the school year. Currently, enforcement of this law is usually delayed until then and the case is automatically dropped.

The purpose of our truancy law is to insure that children under the age of 16 are getting an education. This is not the case as the law is currently written.

Last session, a similar bill (SB 226) passed the Senate and almost made it through the House. The opinions and lessons of that bill's history are incorporated in SB 33.

The new language in the H.Hess Committee Substitute alters the parents responsibility to maintain versus [INSURE] that their children are going to school. The penalty has been reduced from a class B misdemeanor to a simple violation. Each five days constitutes a new and separate violation. An archaic law dealing with truant officers is also repealed.

I would greatly appreciate the scheduling of this bill as soon as possible.

Dear Senator Fischer:

Kenai Peninsula Borough Schools maintain a firm, fair and compassionate disciplinary system for dealing with the problems students and their parents bring to us. It enjoys the support of parent advisory groups and local police departments. It works because we keep the student's behavior the focus of attention and recognize that students often learn more from their mistakes than anything else.

One problem with a few students each year is based not in student behavior but with their parents. Chronic truancy has increased in the past several years and we developed procedures to advise both student and parent about the student's regular attendance in school. We just can't teach them much when students are not in school.

Each year a few students and their parents do not respond to admonishments to come to school on a regular basis. In that event, I send a series of written announcements and, if there is no improvement, ask the school board for permission to refer the parent to the district attorney's office. Under procedures worked out with that office, every effort is made to inform the parents of their legal responsibility for the student without going to court.

Our difficulty is with the wording of the AC 14.30.020 which includes the following statement.

"In any event, at the expiration of the school year, the person shall be released and discharged from all penalties provided by this section."

This statement forces us to bring truancy cases to the district attorney prior to December 15 each year or forget about them. Attorney's can (and have) delayed these cases beyond "the expiration of the school year", rendering them moot. The District Attorney's Office is unwilling to waste their time on cases they have no chance of winning. And the school district is forced to begin again next school year as if the truancy had never occurred.

Our recommendation is to delete the sentence above from the current statute. No other change is necessary and the revised statute would permit schools to deal with truancy without clogging up the court system. This recommendation was presented in the last legislative session and almost made it into law. I request your support when it comes before you in committee or on the floor this year.

On May 24, 1984, we received your letter regarding the above students and a complaint alleging failure to educate a child was filed June 26, 1984. Because of difficulty in serving a summons, Mrs. Hanson was not arraigned until November 28, 1984. Her trial was set for February 11, 1985.

The public defender has indicated they would seek to have the case dismissed because of the wording of the statute which seems to relieve the parent of responsibility at the end of each school year. I have dismissed the case because I do not believe we could convince the court of any other interpretation of that statute.

Hopefully, we can begin these cases earlier in the school year so that we could get to trial (or whatever disposition is appropriate) before the statute creates a problem. Perhaps the statute should be changed.

FISCAL NOTE EXPLANATION FOR CSSB 37 (JUD)
Revised 1/12/88

Handling juvenile fingerprints via the Alaska Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AAFIS) involves roughly the following procedures:

1. Assignment of a file or locator number.
2. Actual entry of the fingerprint card data into AAFIS, including input of minutia, demographic information, and searching against the existing data base to ensure that the fingerprints are not already on file with another identity; and
3. Searching the new fingerprints against the unsolved latent data base. In addition to the normal provisions of adding fingerprints to the AAFIS data base, CSSB 37 (JUD) would require that after input of fingerprints for juveniles 14 or 15 years of age, they would have to be purged, which would involve the AAFIS operator calling up the relevant control number and purging each data set independently.

For fingerprints of juveniles 16 or 17, it will be okay to leave those in the AAFIS data base, but once a juvenile reaches 18, the records have to be destroyed under provisions of this bill. Since AAFIS doesn't flag the fingerprint file by date of birth or age, programming would be needed to develop a matching system to keep track of chronological age and produce reports prompting the AAFIS operator to purge fingerprints of those juveniles turning 18. \$4.5 is estimated for this purpose.

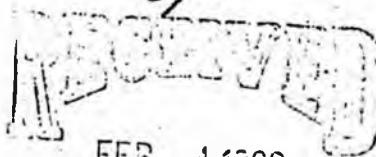



SB 37

This bill would allow the fingerprinting of minors aged 14 and older without a court order. The procedure is allowed only where the minor has been arrested for a felony or upon institutionalization after adjudication for delinquency.


New fingerprint technology currently available in Alaska allows a computerized review of thousands of fingerprints for comparison to crime scene latents. This technology could greatly enhance the efficiency of law enforcement authorities in identifying perpetrators, particularly for property crimes where no witnesses are available. The majority of burglaries are committed by juveniles and thus the fingerprinting of such persons could allow authorities to efficiently apprehend suspects and resolve a greater number of cases.

The Office of Public Advocacy and Alaska Public Defender Agency support this legislation because it will enhance the ability of law enforcement agencies to arrest perpetrators and provide the criminal justice system with strong, and often conclusive, evidence in the adjudication process.



The Division of Alaska State Troopers supports passage of this legislation.

Many felony crimes, particularly residential burglaries, are perpetrated by minors. Because of their juvenile status, they are protected under several statutes, one of which precludes their being fingerprinted. This provision, while intended to prevent a one-time juvenile offender from obtaining a police record and inordinately affecting his life, has actually resulted in covering repeat offenses by juveniles entering criminal careers. This bill removes this protection for arrested minors who are 14 years of age or older.

This statute and rule change allows the law enforcement community to utilize fingerprints as a greater tool in fighting juvenile crime. In 1982, the Legislature provided funding for the Alaska Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AAFIS) which has developed into a major useful tool for the law enforcement agencies around the state because of its ability to rapidly check thousands of fingerprint cards that would be cost prohibitive if done manually. The success of this system has been inhibited by the inability of the law enforcement community to fingerprint juveniles and input their prints into AAFIS. This has particularly hindered burglary investigations.

Passage of this legislation would be of great assistance to the law enforcement community.

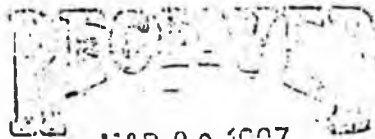

POSITION PAPER

SENATE BILL NO. 37

For an Act entitled: "An Act relating to fingerprinting of minors; and amending Alaska Rule of Children's Procedure 24."

This bill would require fingerprinting of all youth fourteen years of age or older upon arrest. It would continue present practice requiring prior court approval before fingerprinting of arrested youths under age fourteen. The bill would also make fingerprint records of minors confidential and not subject to disclosure without the court's permission.

Analysis

Law Enforcement agencies desire access to and use of fingerprint records of arrested youth for investigative purposes. These agencies believe that additional crimes would be solved by matching the fingerprints of arrested youth with latent fingerprints taken at crime scenes.

Present law and Rules of Children's Procedure allow fingerprinting of minors with court permission. Permission of the court may be obtained by demonstrating a need for the fingerprint records and specifically indicates that "...cause exists where a child is in custody for a serious offense against persons or property...". Law enforcement agencies find the requirement that court permission be obtained objectionable and cumbersome and request authority to fingerprint juvenile offenders only infrequently.

SB 37 would require fingerprinting of all arrested youth age 14 or older. No distinction would be made based on the reason for arrest, whether there was a need for the fingerprints for investigative purposes, or whether evidence supported the charges alleged. Fingerprint records would be retained permanently by police regardless of whether the youth were found innocent of the charges but would be confidential and could not be disclosed without court permission.

Department Position

The Department opposes the broad fingerprinting requirements of this bill since it would subject the majority of arrested juveniles to the fingerprinting process with little likelihood of useful result. In 75% of arrested juveniles are 14 years of age or older. However, most juveniles (82%) are arrested for misdemeanor offenses, primarily alcohol consumption and misdemeanor thefts (50% of all juvenile arrests). Only 18% are arrested for felony crimes and most of these (13% of all juveniles arrests) are for property crimes.

The Department suggests that the purpose of this bill would be satisfactorily achieved by narrowing the focus of the bill and providing certain limitations on the use and retention of fingerprint records of minors.


The Department recommends that fingerprinting of minors 14 years of age or older be allowed without court permission upon arrest for felony offenses only, or upon adjudication of delinquency regardless of the offense. This approach would facilitate fingerprinting of older juveniles arrested for serious offenses and those who are chronic delinquents. Though fingerprints can be obtained in these cases presently, this approach would eliminate the process of obtaining court permission. It would also make fingerprinting of these youth discretionary rather than mandatory as presently proposed in this bill. This would allow police agencies to exercise judgement in determining the need for fingerprints in individual cases based on the likelihood of a positive result.

The Department also recommends that fingerprint records of youth 14 and 15 years of age be retained only temporarily to allow matching in the Alaska Automated Fingerprint Identification System (AAFIS). Statutes should require that these records be destroyed and purged from the AAFIS if no positive identification or "hit" were obtained and the records were not required for court proceedings. The Department has been advised that there are certain characteristics of fingerprint records of persons under age 16 which limit their long term usefulness as identifiers due to size and changes which occur in the growth process.

Fingerprint records of youth arrested and adjudicated after reaching age 16 should be retained in the AAFIS until the youth reaches age 18. Statutes should require the fingerprint cards be destroyed and records purged from the AAFIS. This would allow law enforcement agencies access to those fingerprint records which have potential usefulness in solving crimes but would not be detrimental to a youth entering adulthood following completion of rehabilitative treatment as a delinquent.

With amendments which embodied these recommendations the Department would support SB 37.






