Beginning on line 7, delete the word "and" and replace it with a comma.

On line 8, after the words "tuition students", add a comma and the words "and districts losing more than ten-percent of their foundation funding in a single year;".

On line 17, delete the words "This act takes effect immediately under AS 01.10.070(c)." and replace with the words "The sum of \$5,942,893 is appropriated from the general fund to the Department of Education for the purpose of holding harmless those school districts which would otherwise lose in excess of ten-percent of their foundation funding during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1987. ## MOTION

Because of flaws in the drafting of SB408, dealing with establishing the current foundation formula, there is no hold-harmless provision in effect this fiscal year for those school districts which are experiencing a reduction in state support greater than 10%. It was clearly the intention of the legislature to include this provision in last year's bill, but, because the section dealing with the hold-harmless item referenced the new statute rather than the existing law, the Department of Law has advised the Department of Education that hold-harmless payments are not operative for FY87.

In order to remedy this bill drafting oversight, I move that school districts which would have received hold-harmless funds, prior to Governor Sheffield's budget restrictions, be remunerated as if the hold-harmless provisions in FY86 were in effect in FY87. 

## I. INTRODUCTION

You have asked our opinion on the question of whether, if the Department of Education pays the full cost of special education services provided certain developmentally disabled and/or deaf children being served by the Anchorage School District, it must do the same for such children being served by other school districts. We believe that the department must devise a uniform set of standards for making such payments.

## II. BACKGROUND

As Tom Buckner of your department has described the situation, the Alaska Department of Health and Social Services licenses, contracts with, or provides grants to certain group homes for developmentally disabled and other handicapped persons under AS 47.80. The Anchorage School District (ASD) provides special education and related services, including transportation, in its program for the severely and multiply handicapped, for exceptional children, within the meaning of AS 14.30, residing in those homes. In the past, both those children and other children enrolled in the ASD program for the severely and multiply handicapped have not been counted in ASD's pupil count for foundation funding purposes. Rather, the Department of Education provided a grant to ASD to cover the total cost of operating that program. The grants were from an allocation for "contract schools" within the department's appropriation for K-12 support.

ASD also operates a program for deaf students. Students from other parts of the state may come to Anchorage, if suitable placements can be found in group homes and foster homes, to participate in that program. Again, the department's past practice has been to count neither those children nor Anchorage children in the program in ASD's pupil enrollment for foundation funding purposes, but to fully fund the operation of that program

under an allocation for "contract schools" in the department's appropriation for K-12 support.

For the 1986-87 school year, in order to contain the amount shown on its books as grants to "contract schools" or, as the allocation is now labelled, "schools for the handicapped," the department has instructed ASD to count the children in the severely and multiply handicapped and in the school for the deaf programs in its foundation enrollment, and to request as grants only the costs of those programs in excess of the foundation funding generated by the students therein. That procedure will still result in the state fully funding the costs of the two programs in Anchorage. The difference will be that now some costs will show up in the "foundation" allocation and the rest under "schools for the handicapped," rather than all showing up under "schools for the handicapped."

Certain other school districts also provide educational services to developmentally disabled children. Juneau, Fairbanks, and Kodiak, for instance, now have group homes under license, contract, or grant from the Department of Health and Social Services. Children residing in those homes, even if their parents reside in another district, must often be provided educational services by the district in which the homes are located. Those districts, however, have in the past received only the foundation funds generated by the students they serve and not additional grants for costs in excess of that amount. Those districts are now seeking to have their excess costs reimbursed, and some have even threatened an equal protection lawsuit if they are not treated the same as Anchorage School District.

### III. DISCUSSION

In Alaska equal protection analysis, in cases not involving fundamental rights or suspect classifications, the courts require as a minimum "that the legislation be based on a legitimate public purpose and that the classification 'be reasonable, not arbitrary, and . . . rest upon some ground of difference having a fair and substantial relation to the object of the legislation . . . ." Isakson v. Rickey, 550 P.2d at 362, quoting State v. Wylie, 516 P.2d 142, 145 (Alaska 1973)."  
Wickersham v. C.F.E.C., 680 P.2d 1135, 1141 (Alaska 1984), quoting State v. Ostrosky, 667 P.2d 1184, 1193 (Alaska 1983). The more important the individual right asserted, the greater the degree of relationship between the classification and the object or purpose of the legislation must be. Id.

The U.S. Supreme Court has held that the right to education is not "fundamental" under the U.S. Constitution, San Antonio Independent School District v. Rodriguez, 411 U.S. 1, 93 S.Ct. 1278 (1973), in the sense that statutory classifications impinging on such rights must be subjected to strict judicial scrutiny under federal equal protection analysis. Some state courts in other states have held, however, that the interest of children in education is sufficiently "fundamental," when impinged upon by a classification based upon wealth, that strict scrutiny is required. Serrano v. Priest, 557 P.2d 929 (Cal. 1976).

The right allegedly being impinged in this case is not the child's right to education. Probably all would agree that handicapped children have a right under both state and federal law to a free appropriate education in Alaska. The right of the school district to be fully reimbursed if the costs of providing educational services to those children exceeds the foundation funding they generate is what is at stake. Because the child's right to education itself is not at stake, and because the basis for classification does not seem to be constitutionally suspect, such as race or even wealth, we do not believe the state would be required to demonstrate a compelling interest to justify the classification. Nevertheless, under the "sliding scale" equal protection analysis adopted by the Alaska court in State v. Erickson, 574 P.2d 1, 11-12 (Alaska 1978), if education funding is considered an important right, the courts may require that the government bear a greater burden of showing that the classification has a fair and substantial relation to a legitimate government objective.

It is not immediately obvious to us what governmental objective, other than cutting state expenses, might be served by fully reimbursing one district, but not other districts, for the costs of educating children with severe handicaps. Even if there are other legitimate governmental interests at stake, such as encouraging and preserving some of the excellent programs developed by ASD, the closeness of the fit between the means, denying full reimbursement to other districts, and the end, preserving the programs in Anchorage, will be subjected to greater scrutiny as the importance of the right impinged increases. Based upon our admittedly sketchy knowledge of the overall situation, we cannot predict with confidence that the courts would uphold the denial of full reimbursement to other districts for educating developmentally disabled children in group homes when full reimbursement is made to ASD.

You may wish to supply us with any additional information regarding the interests at stake which might support a different opinion. Otherwise, we suggest that your department develop and adopt regulations providing for distribution of the "Schools for the Handicapped" allocation within the "K-12 Support" appropriation on some equitable basis. This is not to say the money must necessarily be prorated among districts based upon their excess costs. Some criteria which measure the need for specific programs or services might well be appropriate. In developing such criteria the department should clearly identify the interests it seeks to protect, should ensure that they are legitimate government interests, and should make sure the basis for funding decisions has a fair and substantial relation to those interests.

Our office will be happy to assist you in drafting such regulations. Please contact me if you have further questions on this matter.

Dear Commissioner Lind:

We would appreciate the opportunity to sit down with you and your staff to discuss the development of a contract to serve multi handicapped students within the Juneau School District. As you are well aware, the Anchorage School District receives approximately \$2,300,000 from the state for what is referred to as the contract schools. Those schools being Providence Heights (API), the State Deaf Program, and the Anchorage Multi Handicapped Program. In addition to the \$2,300,000 the Anchorage School District also generates foundation support based on the one to eleven ratio.

The multi handicapped program is set up to provide programs for students from Anchorage and for those who are moved to Anchorage by agencies such as the Department of Health and Social Services or the Developmental Disabilities Program.

As Juneau has grown over the years the community has developed two group homes and is in the process of developing a site for the chronically mentally ill.

Since Juneau is a recipient of students from throughout the state who are placed here by Health and Social Services and/or Developmental Disabilities, without financial support, and since the Juneau School District is providing these students an educational program appropriate to their needs, our proposal is that the Juneau School District receive a grant which is similar in nature to that of the Anchorage School District.

Your review of this request and a meeting would be greatly appreciated. Please let us know a time that would be convenient for you to meet.

As per our conversation on November 14, 1986 regarding a contract with the Department of Education for the education of Southeast Alaska's multi-handicapped students, you will find enclosed a detailed description of the students we would be applying for, and their handicapping condition. In addition, we have also included a suggested budget for your review.

I would like to emphasize that the Juneau School District is looking towards the issue of equity and we hope the Department of Education address this concern now and in its future budget plans.

The Juneau School District would like the Department to review the proposed budget with the understanding that precise equity may not be possible since the FY 87 budget did not include this item. We do, however, want the Department to keep in mind that equity for FY 88 is an absolute necessity. The district considers a fair reimbursement for FY 87 to be in the 50% to 25% range considering the financial issues the Department is facing.



On July 25 AASB sent a survey out to school districts asking what measures districts were considering or implementing in order to achieve budget cuts necessitated by the 10% cut in state funding to schools.

A report of the 25 initial responses was issued to districts on August 19. The report attached here is an update as of September 29, showing responses from 31 school districts. The new responses included here don't significantly change the pattern of cuts that districts reported earlier. Personnel cuts are mostly occurring through attrition - vacant positions are being eliminated or left unfilled. Other frequently mentioned cuts are in the area of travel, supplies and equipment and in-service costs.

Recent discussions with a number of school superintendents reveal that there is a hidden problem complicating assessment of the real budgetary problems facing school districts; that problem being that a lot of districts simply are not balancing their budgets through definitive action. Rather, they are living from day to day, adjusting the spending pattern as opportunities arise. As employment positions become vacant they are eliminated. As an opportunity to defer expenditures for equipment, supplies or maintenance appears, cuts are made.

In a discussion with D.O.E. personnel, this problem will not be revealed in reports being sent to that office. Districts are submitting balanced budget documents but will admit that they don't know how they will get down to that level of spending.

It is my opinion that many, if not most, of the larger districts and quite a few of the smaller ones are operating on unbalanced budgets. In essence, the future will reveal that we have a bigger problem than we are willing to admit at the present time.

AASB is going to try to determine how many districts are in this situation and to what extent budgets are out of balance. We'll be happy to provide you with this information when it is gathered.

BUDGET CUTTING ACTIONS - TAKEN OR UNDER CONSIDERATION

ALASKA GATEWAY

The District plans to cut back classified employee hours. Other areas being considered for cuts are travel, RSVP, eliminate the reserve fund, with closer attention to energy conservation and telephone costs.

ALEUTIAN REGION

Number of teachers was cut prior to the school year. Attrition accounted for the cuts, with the non-retention of non-tenured teachers last spring and resignations of other teachers. Classified staff has already been cut and equipment purchases have been cut to zero. Nearly all other categories have been cut to some extent to balance the budget.

ANCHORAGE

The Board has directed administration to find the money without layoffs. We have frozen all hiring, eliminated 75 vacant positions, increased the pupil/teacher ratio, eliminated contractual services, reduced supplies, materials and equipment accounts to the bare minimum, halted all facility renovation except for life safety, and eliminated extra and temporary help.

A detailed process has been developed for determining cuts.

ANNETTE ISLAND

The district non-retained 9 FTE teachers in Spring, 1986.

A comprehensive listing of potential reductions was generated by Administration, Board of Education, employees and community members, then ranked from easiest to most difficult to implement. Generally, instructional program was preserved and support functions reduced.

Program changes allowed several classified and teaching positions to be eliminated. Travel expenses were reduced, a non-refundable band fee per student was established, lunch prices increased and swimming pool closed after school hours. Staff was directed to carry out fund raising to support some school activities. Inter-scholastic competition was eliminated for:

District contribution to Community Ed was reduced by 50%, purchase of teaching supplies and equipment was reduced by 20%.

Expenditures will be scrutinized to determine those that will have the least effect on the education of Craig's children.

DELTA GREELY

Budget Reduction Committee has been formed to begin meeting in August. May cut Central Office classified positions and re-classify some positions at lower pay rate. May request all staff members to return to the district the 3% pay increase granted for this year.

SITKA

The School Board consulted with a committee of community members, district employees and administrators, to develop a priority list of budget cuts. The final list approved by the Board included reducing budget carryover to equal 3% of the maintenance & operation budget, eliminating all capital improvements, cutting classified positions, reducing substitutes' wages and reducing funds for a number of other areas such as summer school, extracurricular activities, and foreign language development.

SOUTHEAST ISLAND

The district has recently completed successful negotiations for a reduction in teacher salary and benefits.

SOUTHWEST REGION

Vacant positions are left unfilled. Reduce planned expenditures for supplies and oil, postponing to 1987-88 budget the impact of funding reduction.

TANANA

Plan to cut back an administrative position to teaching position, and reduce travel. Will do force account on a fire/safety code upgrade and use savings to pay salaries.

UNALASKA

Balance out support and certificated cuts as much as possible. Look at program cuts rather than seniority. Cut all support staff as we can possibly afford. Other considerations:

1. Cut school lunch program entirely

23. The Contractor shall secure and maintain such Workman's Compensation Insurance as required by Alaska State Statute.

24. The Contractor agrees to provide warm storage for all aircraft used in fulfilling this contract.

25. The Contractor will provide safety instruction to students prior to beginning school flights each school year. The scope of these safety instructions will be determined in a conference between the Superintendent and the Contractor.

## Senate Committee on Health, Education and Social Services

### HESS COMMITTEE LETTER OF INTENT (SB 116)

The Committee on Health, Education and Social Services, to which was referred for consideration SB 116, reports SB 116 with a "do pass" recommendation.

The Committee received testimony in which concern was expressed that the Industries program of the Department of Corrections, by continuation and expansion, could compete with the private sector and cause thereby a loss of employment opportunities in the workplace. Concern was also voiced that the industries program could cause a loss of employment in the public sector also.

In recommending passage of SB 116, the Committee recognizes the importance of work experience as part of the goal of inmate rehabilitation set forth in the Constitution of the State of Alaska. However, the Committee expects the Department to remain sensitive to the concerns of private entrepreneurs and workers in the private and public sectors. Thus, the Industries program should concentrate on activities which, but for the program, would not occur at all in Alaska, or which benefit the State government itself and could be performed otherwise only at prohibitive cost to the State.

The Committee understands, for example, that the Mount McKinley Meat and Sausage Plant is to be operated by the Industries program in contemplation of ultimate operation and management by a private entrepreneur. By operating and maintaining the facility in the meantime, the Industries program affords work experience for inmates, reduces the cost of food for the corrections system, and allows time for the development of a viable, privately operated, facility which would otherwise not exist.

Similarly, the Committee understands that but for the furniture assembly program at Kenai, the State would probably be dealing with furniture manufacturers out-of-state.

The Committee understands that the Department; before expanding the Industries program to include activities or projects not currently performed, will, on a case-by-case basis, involve the public, afford an opportunity for public notice and comment, inform the legislature, and adhere to the criteria set forth above.


Dear Senator Faiks:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill continuing the correctional industries program created by ch. 53, SLA 1982. (The correctional industries program was enacted as AS 33.30.400 -- 33.30.490, but was renumbered in 1982 as AS 33.32.010 -- 33.32.090 by the revisor of statutes.)

The correctional industries program has been successful in expanding and showing a profit despite reduced funding. The program, which presently provides jobs for approximately 80 inmates, has reduced inmate idleness, provided meaningful jobs and marketable skills to inmates, and has provided inmates with earnings to help meet their obligations. The program showed a 10 percent profit in FY 86, returning money to the state general fund and thereby reducing the cost of incarceration in state institutions. Last year's enactment of AS 33.32.017 to provide for "free-venture" cooperative industries will provide for expanded markets and flexibility in developing new jobs for inmates and private-sector companies.

The bill repeals the section of ch. 53, SLA 1982, which would terminate the program on July 1, 1987. In light of the program's overall success, I urge your continued support and your prompt and favorable action on this measure.

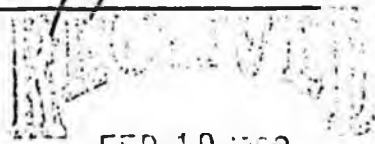

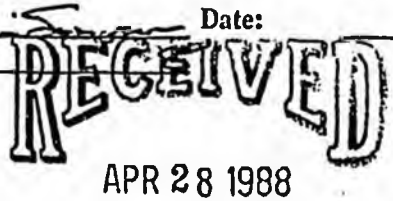

LETTER OF INTENT

SENATE BILL NO. 117

Under this bill, as requested by the governor, the Division of Child Support Enforcement in the Department of Revenue is allowed to bill for the services provided in collecting child support payments. Attorney time will be billed at the full rate for attorney services. The committee estimates that there would be major cost savings for those seeking child support payments due them if attorneys from the Department of Law were not assigned on a case-by-case basis but rather were assigned full-time to the division. That way they could build expertise in the field of child support enforcement and be able to deal with the cases expeditiously, thus saving money for the clients. Savings for the clients would be in the best interests of the children for whom the money is collected. It is therefore the intent of the Senate Judiciary Committee that the Department of Law assign one or two staff attorneys full-time to the Division of Child Support Enforcement.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill relating to the duties and authority of the child support enforcement division of the Department of Revenue. This bill amends statutory provisions concerning the collection of child support. The amendments will enhance the expeditious handling of child support enforcement matters and will permit the division to charge fees for the services that it provides.

Section 1 of the bill, which amends AS 47.23.020(a)(7), makes clear that child support orders from other jurisdictions may be enforced administratively as well as through the judicial process.

Section 2 of the bill, which amends AS 47.23.020(b), requires the division to credit the obligor with payments made directly to the obligee only if the payments are made before the obligor is ordered to make payments through the child support enforcement division. Currently the division must credit all direct payments, regardless of when they were made. This requirement causes an extra cost to the state in two ways: (1) the division may not, under federal law, report these direct payments to the federal authorities as income, and therefore the state does not receive federal incentive payments for these direct payments; and (2) the division's computer is not programmed to make adjustments for direct payments made after the division is involved, requiring manual audits to be performed. These manual audits are time-consuming and take time away from other enforcement activities. Because of the cost of reprogramming the computer, that alternative is not cost-effective, especially after taking into consideration the fact that manual input would still be required.

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Section 3 of the bill, which amends AS 47.23.100, gives the division authority to impose a fee for services provided under AS 47.23.010 -- 47.23.280. Currently, the division is prohibited from charging a fee other than an application fee that is mandated by federal law. The authority to charge fees would allow the division to pursue cost recovery, including attorney time and court costs incurred in the establishment (of support orders) and enforcement activities.

Section 4 of the bill, which amends AS 47.23.105, allows the division to process an obligor's request for an audit within 30 days rather than the currently mandated 10 days. The division does not have sufficient staff to process audit requests within the 10-day time frame without neglecting other areas of concern, particularly audits needed for court enforcement actions.

Section 5 of the bill, which amends AS 47.23.226, provides that the division may seek a judgment without the necessity of filing a motion before the court to do so. The action would be brought before the court on the basis of an affidavit, supplied by either the child's custodian or the division, and notice to the obligor that the action had been commenced. If a motion is not required, the division would not have to use attorney time for this function. The division currently obtains income withholding orders from the court using an affidavit rather than a motion.

Section 6 of the bill amends AS 47.23.250(e) to correspond with federal law and AS 47.23.062(e), which mandate that an obligor's employer begin withholding money from the obligor's wages 14 days after the mailing date on the notice regarding the withholding, or on the first day of the next pay period if that is earlier. Currently, because of the inconsistent time periods, the division does not receive payments on administrative withholding orders for a period of 30 days.

Section 7 amends AS 47.23.250(i) to correspond to the provisions of AS 47.23.062(g). AS 47.23.062(g) gives priority to court-ordered child support garnishments over all other attachments against the same money, unless ordered otherwise by the court. The amendment would require that administrative orders be treated in the same fashion.

Section 8 of the bill, which repeals AS 47.23.180(c), clarifies the procedure for appeal from administrative

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

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decisions. An administrative decision may be appealed to the court under AS 47.23.210. Currently, AS 47.23.180(c) makes it appear that while the administrative process is going on, the obligor can go into court and seek another forum for relief. Often the court will not be informed that the obligor is currently involved in an administrative procedure. Although the court should be available to the obligor as an alternative forum for an appeal, it should not be used to avoid or subvert the administrative procedure.

The amendments in this bill would allow the child support enforcement division to meet its responsibility to collect support in an expeditious and cost-effective manner.
