This bill would include club licenses among those licenses that are subject to the population restrictions established by AS 04.11.400(a)(2) and (3). Except as provided in subsections (g), (h), (i), and (j), the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board could not issue a new license, and has authority to prohibit relocation of an existing license, unless the license met the population restrictions of (a) of the section.

Dear Representative Springer:

Your office called and requested that I comment on behalf of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board about HB 279 which deals with the population formula under AS 04.11.400 for determining the availability of club liquor licenses under AS 04.11.110.

The formula was amended by CSHB 34 (Fin.) am S which became effective June 6, 1985. The amendment doubled the population requirement for all liquor licenses, except restaurant or eating place licenses under AS 04.11.100. Club organizations interested in making application under the old formula within small communities are therefore eliminated from pursuing an application. Examples are:

The Alaska Moose Association is interested in getting two changes in the Alaska Statutes on alcoholic beverages.

The first change that we are interested in is to have A.S. 04.11.400 changed back so that club licenses could be issued for each 1500 population instead of 3000. As you know the club license is the mainstay of a fraternal organization. It will be impossible for our newly founded Lodge in the City of North Pole to obtain a club permit in that area when they have been in existence for two years because of the official population of 1700 and the existence of another club license in the area.

The second change we would like to propose is to A.S. 04.11.240 or a new section added which would permit our club licenses to hold full alcoholic beverage functions away from their premises and not have to get a beverage dispensary license to obtain a caterer's permit for a function. This has been a problem in the past, especially for our smaller Lodges when holding a convention or conference and they must use, for instance, the National Guard Armory for their banquets and dances, etc.

We are interested in the views of the ABC Board on these two issues as well as help with coming up with the proper or best means and wording, for all concerned, to accomplish our requests.

American Legion Post 2 was chartered in Valdez, October 1920. Over the past 67 years, many pioneers of Alaska have past through this Post. Many of them have been prominent business people, and served in various capacities of our State Government. One thing we all have in common, we served our country when our country needed us. We do not ask our country or state for any support. We do ask that we be allowed to operate as other American Legion Post's in Alaska, the other 49 states and several foreign countries.

The liquor permit is not the main part of the Post, but helps with its financial aspects. The Post supports a great deal of youth activities in their communities, and we all know this costs a good deal of funds. Little league, Little dribblers, Boys State, and scholarships are just some of the activities that the Post's support. Elks, Eagles and Moose lodges have permits, and the good things these lodges and veteran Posts do is well known by the people of Alaska and our country.

As the only gathering place for veterans in Valdez, it is rather hard to hold members that do come to the meeting to remain, therefore they depart to someother permit holders establishment.

The Post has been active for the past 3 years by gaining new members, but we are now losing many of them. Reason, they cannot step in and have a drink with other veterans, and so go elsewhere. We need this permit to keep this Post above water. It would be a shame to see it go under, as it is one of the oldest Posts in the Nation.

Again we are not asking that we have a permit to have just another bar, but a place where the veterans, families and guests can gather, socialize and generate funds to support our youth activities. Tourists are amazed that we can't have a permit and are only open for meetings.

Post 2 is sincere in its plans with the profits, plus we are covered by State laws for non-profit Veteran organizations. We do hope that the State Legislators will approve our request. You will be proud of us.

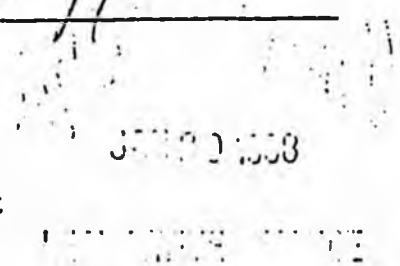

HB 279 changes three aspects of the law dealing with alcohol club licenses. Section 1 allows a new chapter of a club, fraternal organization, patriotic organization, or social organization to receive a club license if the club is chartered by a national organization that has maintained a chartered club or organization within the state for at least 20 years. The CS does not affect this section.

Current law does not allow alcohol purchased by a club to be used or consumed off premises. Section 2 of HB 279 removed that prohibition for events approved by the club board. The CS limits the off premises use to events of the club approved by the board and that are official activities of the club.

Section 3 of HB 279 changed the population figure per club license from 3,000 per club license to 1,500 per license. The CS would allow a municipality to pass an resolution requesting the ABC Board to use the 1,500 figure, but unless a municipality did so, the 3,000 figure would apply.

This bill has a zero fiscal note from the Departments of Revenue for the ABC Board. The Department of Public Safety and Community and Regional Affairs have not submitted fiscal notes but both have indicated the bill will have no financial impact upon them.

A representative from the Departments of Revenue will be at the meeting. Public Safety has indicated they will not be able to be at the meeting.

It is my understanding that you are considering offering a committee substitute on HB 279 which would keep the population requirement at the existing 3,000 person level as opposed to my language which reduces the population requirement to 1,500.

As you know, the bill has three points of emphasis as reflected on my information sheet included in the bill file that was transferred into your committee. Point three, which decreases the population figure to 1,500 has important significance to me.

My interest in decreasing the population figure involves a community in my district, the City of Valdez. With their present population, Valdez is allowed two club licenses. One is presently held by the Elks Club and the other by the Eagles Club. The American Legion Post #2 has now applied.

The American Legion Post #2 was chartered in Valdez, October of 1920, and has been supporting many community projects involving youth such as the Little League, Little Dribblers, Boys State and scholarships. The club license will help fund these worthwhile projects.

The American Legion is now losing members and there is fear that they may have to close down. It is their hope that the population requirements will be changed to the original figures and that they will be able to gather with their fellow veterans, families and guests to generate funds to support the youth activities.

Senator Sturgulewski, please remember that these club licenses are for members only. These licenses are very restrictive, and having a cocktail at the American Legion Hall, with friends, as opposed to a public bar, will help insure these veterans with a safe trip home because fellow members will take that responsibility. This doesn't mean, of course, that a safe trip home could not be





Your office called and requested that I comment on behalf of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Board about HB 279 which deals with the population formula under AS 04.11.400 for determining the availability of club liquor licenses under AS 04.11.110.

The formula was amended by CSHB 34 (Fin.) am S which became effective June 6, 1985. The amendment doubled the population requirement for all liquor licenses, except restaurant or eating place licenses under AS 04.11.100. Club organizations interested in making application under the old formula within small communities are therefore eliminated from pursuing an application. Examples are:

The Alaska Moose Association is interested in getting two changes in the Alaska Statutes on alcoholic beverages.

The first change that we are interested in is to have A.S. 04.11.400 changed back so that club licenses could be issued for each 1500 population instead of 3000. As you know the club license is the mainstay of a fraternal organization. It will be impossible for our newly founded Lodge in the City of North Pole to obtain a club permit in that area when they have been in existence for two years because of the official population of 1700 and the existence of another club license in the area.

The second change we would like to propose is to A.S. 04.11.240 or a new section added which would permit our club licenses to hold full alcoholic beverage functions away from their premises and not have to get a beverage dispensary license to obtain a caterer's permit for a function. This has been a problem in the past, especially for our smaller Lodges when holding a convention or conference and they must use, for instance, the National Guard Armory for their banquets and dances, etc.

We are interested in the views of the ABC Board on these two issues as well as help with coming up with the proper or best means and wording, for all concerned, to accomplish our requests.



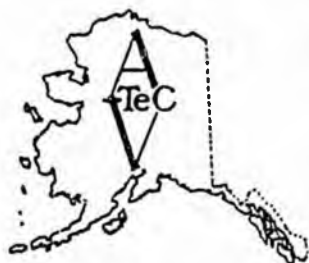

The Honorable Betty Cato:

Representative Cato, we are proposing that AVTEC be able to hire students to perform work tasks for the Center. In the past we were able to do this through the Student Intern program. This was not a satisfactory situation. The costs were exceptionally high. Students hired through APEA were paid at a range 5. In Seward we were paying \$7 to \$8 an hour for student trainees. We had worked out an agreement with Local 71, however, the same problem existed. If we hired a student to perform Local 71 work, the classification was dependent upon what tasks the student was performing. For example, if the student was changing the oil in a car he/she would be classified as an automobile mechanic and would receive 75% of Local 71's starting wage for automotive mechanics. Usually this meant that the student would be receiving a higher hourly wage as compared to permanent Local 71 employees in lower paid classifications. The paper-work associated with running these positions through the State personnel system was horrendous.

If we establish work experience positions, and if these positions are exempt positions, we establish the pay rates, and the amount of State personnel paper-work is reduced significantly. Students in work experience positions would be paid the prevailing wage rate for student work at other educational institutions in Alaska.

In order to meet the FY87 budgetary reductions AVTEC deleted many student services. This enabled us to keep the instructional staff intact. However, we are now discovering that many of the services are sorely missed. Many of the services being provided by the positions that were deleted did not require a high skill level.

These services could be provided by student workers at approximately 40% of the cost of the same service being provided by a State employee. In these extraordinary times we believe that in order to continue to provide a full range of student services a viable student work program is essential. A statute which allows AVTEC to hire student workers as exempt employees would allow the Center to provide each training area with a work experience component in their curriculum. This would be a major benefit for students attending the Center.
