After receiving general and financial information on state boards and commissions, you requested more specific information on personal services expenditures. This memorandum categorizes boards and commissions according to function and provides budgetary information on their administrators and staff.

For the purposes of this memorandum, boards and commissions are defined as groups whose members are residents appointed by the governor and which are authorized to perform certain functions. Information for this memorandum was obtained through the Governor's Boards and Commissions office, Office of Management and Budget, and appropriate state departments, boards, and commissions.

Type of Board or Commission

I have categorized boards and commissions according to the function performed: administrative, advisory, advocacy, or regulatory. Classifications of several multi-function boards and commissions are subject to interpretation.

- Administrative boards and commissions function as quasi-departments. These boards and commissions perform designated administrative tasks.
- Advisory boards and commissions offer opinions to a state department or division.

- Advocacy boards and commissions speak in favor of special populations or needs by recommending changes in legislation or policy. These boards and commissions primarily represent either social or industry groups.
- Regulatory boards and commissions control and direct professional licensing.

Administrators

Administrative and advocacy boards and commissions generally have quasi-division level employees with executive directors, executive secretaries, project assistants, or similar administrators that report to the board or commission. Advisory boards and commissions usually have no employees reporting to them; they interact with department employees. Four regulatory boards (Nursing Board, Medical Board, Real Estate Board, and the Professional Teaching Practices Commission) have their own employees. All other regulatory boards rely upon Department of Commerce and Economic Development, Division of Occupational Licensing employees.

Personal Services Expenditures

For each board or commission, Table 1 provides the administrator's compensation, number of staff over and below range 21, and the administrator's salary as a percentage of total personal service costs. Not all boards and commissions retain permanent staff. Instead, they utilize department staff, who also have other duties, to perform numerous administrative tasks. These department employees are included in the table and indicated as such. Administrators and staff may not be full-time employees.

Summary

Government by board or commission has become a popular method to 1) oversee functions and advise government agencies, and 2) address short term and/or critical problems. This choice of management enhances citizens' opportunities to participate in state government. The disadvantages to this choice of management include 1) the cost of staff salaries as well as the cost of travel, 2) the lack of management direction, or the unresponsiveness to policy direction from the governor or legislature (because of the creation of a quasi-administrative level of government), and 3) the tendency for temporary boards and commissions to "take on a life of their own" and become permanent, separate state agencies.

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When faced with a perceived need to reduce government costs and/or increase the responsiveness to the governor or legislature's policy direction, other states have taken the following action:

- Maintain required advisory boards and commissions;¹
- Avoid creation of new permanent administrative boards or commissions;
- Change or eliminate administrative boards or commissions by transferring responsibilities to state departments already providing similar functions;²
- Change the function of administrative boards and commissions to an appeal function in order to reduce costs and expedite work, while protecting applicants;
- Eliminate advocacy boards and commissions if other lobbying or representative efforts exist or where private interests could perform the functions (e.g. industry-advocacy type boards and commissions);
- Maintain regulatory boards and commissions but implement a fee structure that supports all expenditures.

¹Some advisory boards meet federal requirements for financial aid, e.g., Juvenile Justice and Family Services Advisory Committee, Block Grant Advisory Committee, Private Industry Council, Job Training Coordinating Council.

²For example, the Medicaid Rate Commission's functions were transferred to the Department of Health and Social Services, and the commission changed from an administrative to an advisory commission. Quasi-departmental boards or commissions are often unresponsive to policy direction from the executive branch or the legislature because they generally lack the clearly defined administrative authority and accountability of a state department providing similar functions.

You requested information on per diem for board and commission members in Alaska and other states.¹ In addition to the rates paid, you asked for the criteria used to determine the rates and the policy for paying benefits.

In summary, there is a great deal of inter and intra state variation in compensation to board and commission members. Actual costs are not necessarily reflected in the rates of compensation for lodging and meals. Staff in states with set expense rates indicated that the rates were not adequate to cover actual expenses. Per diem rates were set by the legislature in almost all instances; I was unable to determine the criteria by which the legislatures set the rates. Only one of the states surveyed (Washington) has criteria which apply to all boards and commissions. In all states surveyed, public transportation is reimbursed or paid at cost. This memorandum presents information gathered from staff members in Alaska, California, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington.

¹Ambiguity exists in the use of the term per diem. In this memorandum, "per diem" refers to a daily rate paid to members of boards and commissions when they attend meetings either locally or requiring travel. If members are entitled to additional payment or reimbursement to cover lodging and meal expenses, the amounts will be designated as "expenses."

Alaska. Alaska has 18 boards and commissions whose members are entitled by statute to compensation other than the standard state travel and per diem paid to members of the remaining boards and commissions (Attachment A). All board and commission members who are not state employees are entitled to receive per diem even when meeting in their town of residence (AS 39.20.180). The rate of per diem, set by the commissioner of Administration, is \$80 per day for Anchorage and Juneau and \$90 per day for Fairbanks. These rates have not been changed since January 1982. Increases, based on surveys of hotel rates, were recommended to the commissioner in 1984 and 1986. According to Department of Administration staff, there is no written record relating to the denied increases; however, the Sheffield Hotels instituted a special state employee rate after the 1984 recommendation. Department of Administration staff conducted a survey of hotel and meal costs again in the summer of 1987--a recommendation on per diem rates has not yet been prepared.

California. Board and commission members are generally paid \$100 per diem for actual meeting days plus necessary hotel, meal and travel expenses. Some boards and commissions pay only necessary expenses. Per diem rates are set by statute and "necessary" is a discretionary amount.

Massachusetts. Due to the size of Massachusetts, overnight stays for board and commission members are seldom required. Some board and commission members (e.g., treasurers) receive \$4,000-5,000 per year. Most receive either \$50 per diem or necessary expenses. All compensation is set by statute.

Minnesota. Generally, board and commission members receive \$35 per day plus necessary expenses. Advisory task force members are reimbursed only for expenses. Rates are set by statute. Expenses for state employees are an item of negotiation with unions during contract preparation.

Nevada. Every board or commission is established by a separate statute. Per diem ranges from nothing to \$100, most receive \$60. Approximately 60 percent of board and commission members receive expenses at the statutorily set state employee rate of \$47.50 (\$21 for meals and \$26.50 for hotel). The remainder of members receive actual unrestricted food and lodging expenses. A recent administrative restructuring has occurred and recommendations to standardize compensation for expenses will be presented to the legislature.

Oregon. Per diem for board and commission members is set by statute--generally positions are volunteer although some pay \$30 per day. All members receive executive travel rates (reimbursement of actual and reasonable travel expenses).

Utah. Per diem and mileage is set by statute for some boards and commissions. Where it is not set, the director of finance sets the rates. Members receive \$50 per diem for meetings lasting less than four hours and \$75 for those lasting longer.

Washington. Per diem for board and commission members is established by a schedule based on duties, amount of substantive matter addressed and time spent (Attachment B--RCW 43.03.220-260). Advisory committees receive no per diem. Other committees receive \$35, \$50 or \$100 per diem. All are entitled to expenses set by the director of financial management.

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a bill expanding the Public Employees Retirement Board and the Teachers' Retirement Board to include two physician members when the boards are hearing disability appeals, and dissolving the Public Employees' and Teachers' Disability Review Board (DRB).

The bill repeals AS 39.36 (sec. 4 of the bill), which was enacted in 1982 to establish the DRB as an advisory board to the Public Employees Retirement Board (PERB), the Teachers' Retirement Board (TRB), and the administrator of the state retirement systems on disability claims and other medically related matters. The DRB's functions have proven to be very expensive, both to the retirement systems and to claimants. Justification for the expense is questionable, since the PERB rulings are contrary to the DRB's advice in a high percentage of appeals. Disability decisions will be made more expeditiously and less expensively, and the purpose of the legislature in establishing the DRB will be effectuated, if physicians are instead included as members of the PERB and TRB.

Sections 1 and 3 of the bill provide for appointment by the governor of physician members to serve on the boards only for the purpose of hearing appeals involving medical issues concerning entitlement to disability benefits. Two physicians will be appointed from at least two of the state's judicial districts. The two physician members from the judicial district in which a disability appeal hearing is conducted will serve on the board during the appeal unless unable to do so or unless there are no physician members from that judicial district, in which case physician members from other judicial districts will serve


on a rotating basis under regulations adopted by the boards.

As with the DRB, physician members will be compensated for their service, at a rate determined by the commissioner of administration, commensurate with the physicians' normal hourly earnings. (Sections 2 and 3 of the bill.)

Transition provisions in sec. 5 of the bill allow current physician members of the DRB to serve as physician members of PERB and TRB until the governor appoints physician members.

I urge your prompt and favorable action on this measure.

SUNSET

Under sunset statutes the board expires on June 30, 1990. Unless the board is extended during the 1990 legislative session, this budget reflects estimated costs for the board's operations to terminate its affairs by June 30, 1991.

Under the 21st amendment to the federal constitution all 50 states have chosen to regulate alcoholic beverages at the state, and not the local level. The purpose of state regulation/control is to provide a system for enforcing laws which authorize approved responsible persons to sell and distribute alcohol to the public. Alcohol, if reasonably consumed, is not dangerous. Responsible distribution is an essential step in helping to insure responsible consumption by the public.

Alaska at one time granted issuance of liquor licenses to local governments. This delegation led to an overabundance of licenses in a number of Alaskan communities. If local governments were to establish local controls by ordinance, laws would vary from city to city and confuse the public. Local governments, under current statute, have an ability to impose controls consistent with state law and provide valuable input to the board on licensing matters. However, with few exceptions, cities and boroughs have chosen to develop controls that only assure collection of revenues.

If Alaska abandoned its current system of state level control in favor of local level control, it is inevitable that distribution of alcohol in some locations would be taken over by powerful interests who, unfortunately, have been known to exert undue control over the local governing body. It is essential, therefore, that control be retained at the state level where the administrators are less susceptible to undue and improper local political pressures.
