In response to your letter of April 3, 1991 the following revised responses to the three areas of questions and issues are submitted.

Questions and Issues

Fiduciary Conduct

Q What is your understanding of fiduciary responsibility, duty of prudence, duty of loyalty, personal liability, co-fiduciary liability, and best interests of beneficiaries?

A A fiduciary's duties extend beyond mere fairness and honesty; they require scrupulous good faith and oblige him to act to further the beneficiaries best interest. As a rule fiduciaries are required to employ the skill and prudence which an ordinary careful and capable person would use in the conduct of his own business. The Commissioner of Revenue is held, by statute, to a higher standard:

in exercising investment, custodial, or depository powers or duties...the commissioner shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing that an institutional investor of ordinary professional prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercises in managing large investments...AS 37.10.071.

A fiduciary's duty of loyalty requires that he administer the funds entrusted to him solely in the interest of the intended beneficiaries and to the absolute exclusion from consideration of his own advantages or the advantages to other persons.

In an effort to promote the best interest of beneficiaries a fiduciary must discharge his duties in the interest of the participants and beneficiaries for the exclusive purposes of providing benefits to them. And he must comply with the care, skill, prudence, and diligence under the circumstances then prevailing of the traditional "prudent man".

A fiduciary is personally liable in damages for losses attributable to a breach of trust. Any liability of co-fiduciaries is joint and several.

Q Give an example of actions you took in your role as a managing partner of a CPA firm to force adherence to fiduciary responsibility by an audit client.

A The attest function (rendering an independent opinion on financial statements) requires absolute independence from the management decisions of the client being audited. Thus, if a CPA (firm) retained to perform audit services were to "force adherence to fiduciary responsibility" there would be a clear violation of the independence rule. Rather than becoming involved in any such management role of an audit client, an independent CPA (firm) must not only refrain from any such action, but must take great care to not even give the appearance of such action.

Any CPA guilty of the action described in this question would stand to lose their license to practice and could become liable to users of the related financial statements, should such users be damaged by the CPA's lack of independence.

In quite the reverse of the role described, my experience has included rendering an adverse opinion where the results of the audit warranted and in two instances in my career, I withdrew from the audit engagement because I could no longer rely on the representations of management. Both withdrawal situations resulted in the loss of substantial fees.

Q What role does the governor play in the exercise of your fiduciary responsibilities?

A Governor Hickel has chosen a highly experienced cabinet with proven track records in their particular fields. It will therefore be unnecessary for him to play any role in the exercise of our (my) fiduciary responsibilities. The governor can be expected to set policy, channel the direction of resources (people and funds) to accomplish goals within the boundaries of statutes and regulations and to monitor our progress. I view this as the role of a leader and unrelated to involving himself in the exercise of fiduciary responsibility.

This question could be interpreted to imply that the governor could or would control my exercise of fiduciary responsibility. I assure you, neither he or any other person has ever exercised any such power over me, and never will. I'm sure you wouldn't want any person serving as Commissioner of Revenue with any less strict personal standards in fiduciary matters.

Q What does the fiduciary role obligate the commissioner to provide to beneficiaries and trustors as disclosure and reporting?

A Generally, a fiduciary is obliged to disclose all facts which might affect the interest of entrusting parties. This obligation would at a minimum require from the Commissioner of Revenue the following:

1. Disclosure of personal conflicts of interest, if any.
2. Explanation of general investment policy including standards, principles or procedures to be used in managing the investments.
3. A description of the nature of each fund along with the goals and objectives sought to be furthered by the investments.
4. Regularly scheduled reports on the investments and management of all fiduciary funds, including a review of investment guidelines and asset allocation.
5. Annual audit reports and external performance review prepared by independent certified public accountants and performance evaluators.

Debt Management

Q As a member of the State Bond Committee, what State debt policies will you promote?

A I will ask my designee as a member of the State Bond Committee (SBC) to promote policies that commit Alaska to retiring its debt and building a broader, value added economy. This is the same premise upon which Governor Hickel introduced Debt Retirement Fund legislation. As stewards of Alaska's resource wealth we must consider investing rather than spending surplus revenue. Alaska's infrastructures must be broadened to support the economic foundations on which the future of Alaska depends. In this connection, there may be times when the state should consider issuing debt as an economic catalyst. Debt may be necessary in the future to provide needed facilities. Debt is currently being issued for lease financing by the University of Alaska, by political subdivisions and by State authorities and corporations.

To affect control over debt issuance the state needs a debt policy statement. The SBC is in the process of adopting such a policy. Developing a policy statement is an important undertaking because the policy could have a significant impact on state finances and economic

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development. The objective will be to adopt a policy which enhances the state's credit rating while providing for prudent debt issuances and appropriate debt issuance procedures.

Alaska currently has an AA- credit rating by Standard & Poors and an Aa rating by Moody's. While the state has not issued regular general obligation (G.O.) debt for several years, the state's credit rating remains important, since it is an underlying component to most public debt in the state. Therefore, we must promote a debt policy that will enhance the state's credit rating and promote debt issuance where necessary for critical projects and facilities. We should also promote debt issuance procedures that will result in the least cost and the most benefit to the state and its related authorities and corporations.

Q What impact do you think this administration's large-scale development projects would have on the State's credit if they require State equity, subsidy or credit support?

A Large scale development projects may or may not have a significant impact on the state's credit. The Red Dog and Bradley Lake projects are two examples that had little impact on the state credit rating. These projects are designed to be self-supporting. AHFC and AIDEA financing activities are revenue supported and have little impact.

The state's G.O. credit rating is premised on maintaining G.O. debt service within 5% of unrestricted revenues. This percentage relationship should be viewed as somewhat flexible depending on the essential nature of any proposed financing. If the State, through the voters, were to provide G.O. credit support to a large scale project, there may or may not be an adverse impact depending on future revenue forecasts and the essential nature of the project.

Q What will be the process for making decisions on debt management?

A The process for making decisions on debt management will be through open meeting deliberations of the SBC in consultation with legal and financial advisors. Once the SBC adopts a debt policy, we will continually review the policy for appropriateness and monitor debt issuances for adherence to policy. The SBC will also perform its statutory duties in connection with the sale of any G.O. bonds.

Boards and Commissions

Q As a member of (the Board of Directors of) AHFC, AIDEA, the Bond Bank, and the Student Loan Corporation, what policies will you promote?

A Predecessor commissioners have uniformly delegated responsibility for service on these Boards and Commissions to Deputy and Assistant Commissioners and senior staff. Enclosed is the delegation I have made for all such bodies.

I have read the last published report of each of these entities. I don't remember noting anything in existing policies that I would change or oppose. My instructions to the designees are to keep me fully informed and to seek my advice on any issue which they feel should require my input. The exception from policy of prior years is that I will serve on the AHFC board. Due to the serious nature of litigation pending against AHFC and the MGIC litigation in which we are plaintiffs plus turnover of top management, I chose to serve on this Board along with Commissioners Olds and Usera rather than to delegate. In this instance I have gone on record in support of:

- 1) a planned and responsible dividend policy.
- 2) a program that will provide low-income, disadvantaged, rural and urban housing. Such a plan to include, where possible, sweat equity and owner involvement in construction.

Q What attitude do you have towards the State reappropriating State funds given to these corporations or receiving dividends from them?

A I have no opinion on this question as it pertains to the Bond Bank or the Student Loan Fund. At some time in the future it may be appropriate to form such an opinion, particularly with respect to the Student Loan Fund. As to AHFC, I independently authored a letter to CEO Tom Behan on March 20, 1991 suggesting a 40% annual dividend, in lieu of corporate taxes. I received in return a plan authored by AHFC's CFO which appears to me to be a viable solution. I will continue to urge passage of this dividend plan. If the State (Legislature) were to reappropriate these funds (instead of allowing the Board to declare dividends) I am advised that the bond markets would react negatively to such action, causing interest rates to increase. The end result would be higher housing costs for Alaskans, a situation none of us wish to be responsible for.

I believe this dividend policy is a required action of the Board. I will be taking a strong leadership role in its passage, with the first dividend to be paid in fiscal 1992.

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AIDEA's current board is re-evaluating its policies, procedures and personnel. Included in their deliberations is the subject of dividends. When this plan is closer to completion I will be able to form an opinion.

Q What is your attitude toward dedicated funds?

A Section 7 of Article IX of the Constitution states that "The proceeds of any state tax or license shall not be dedicated to any special purpose, except as provided in Section 15 (Alaska Permanent Fund) of this article or when required by the federal government for state participation in federal programs."

I have sworn in my oath of office to support and defend this constitution. If this support and defense can be categorized as "attitude", then it is my publicly announced (sworn) attitude that I will perform my duties pertaining to "dedicated funds" in accordance with the constitution.

Q What programs should the State subsidize?

A Federal and state subsidies have been the genesis of honest disputes for generations. In fact they date back to the early years of our nation. I guess the best answer I can give is quite simple. It depends on the particular facts of each program.

I believe our Student Loan program and forgiveness (subsidy) feature had merit. On the other hand, we probably should have had a stronger record keeping program and collection policy associated with the Student Loan Fund, from the beginning. Among the many underlying thoughts to subsidizing state programs which I would consider:

- 1) Is this program available in an existing program? (A question of duplication of effort and costs).
- 2) Does it have a reasonable chance of success?
- 3) Should we consider a sunset feature?
- 4) Can we draw on the experience of other states to evaluate our potential for success?
- 5) What state agency should control this program?

I look forward to the early completion of my confirmation process and to four years of successful, progressive joint effort with the Legislature.



I fully support the constitutional process of confirmation carried on in a dignified atmosphere where both parties use and display respect. The process becomes something else when personal dislikes and political difference of opinion overshadow the single purpose of the process. Is the nominee qualified to hold the office?

I hope that the continuation of my confirmation hearing can be limited to addressing this sole issue, with respect.



Dear Commissioner Fisher:

Your letter of March 18, 1991 was received in my office on Thursday, March 28. I appreciate your candor, but frankly, I am disappointed and perplexed by the tone of your reply. You were obviously offended by the hearing, and by the follow-up questions that I sent you. Though I don't understand your reaction, please accept my sincere apology.

We may disagree about whether or not "political rhetoric" dominated the session, but I want to assure you that the Committee is still quite interested in gaining more knowledge about your background and qualifications. Questions seeking your thoughts on matters not strictly germane to those qualifications were posed by committee members trying only to gain a better understanding of you, and were not part of another political agenda. As I'm sure you're aware, the recommendation of the Finance Committee serves as an endorsement to the entire House of Representatives. Your response (or lack thereof) to the written questions submitted is unsatisfactory. Refusing to allow the Committee an opportunity to understand how you view your role as Revenue Commissioner is counterproductive, and I respectfully request that you review your answers.

I too am a firm advocate of the separation of powers between the three branches of government. The legislature has the constitutional and statutory burden of reviewing and confirming the Cabinet, and we are trying to uphold that responsibility. Moreover, the legislature writes the statutes that the departments are charged with carrying out. It only makes good sense to have an understanding of each other if the legislature and the administrative branch are to work together in a cooperative manner for the good of Alaska.

I'm looking forward to your reply.

Your letter of March 11, 1991 was faxed to me last Thursday. I will try to make this written response as candid as my oral remarks.

If, as you state, the House Finance Committee is "very much interested in my appointment" then may I suggest that future questions address my background and qualifications rather than a continuation of the political rhetoric that dominated last Monday's session.

Attempts to direct the Department of Revenue toward de-emphasis of material tax issues in favor of miniscule mining tax matters and queries about my role in the Education Department's budget are not germane to my qualifications as Governor Hickel's choice for Commissioner of Revenue.

As to your written questions and issues, the entire "fiduciary conduct" section can be succinctly answered. My conduct has met, without challenge, the code of ethics of the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants as an employee and employer for 39 years. Further, I performed the duties of managing partner for the "Big 8" international firm Coopers & Lybrand for fifteen years which required even higher standards than the AICPA.

The second query in this section displays a clear lack of understanding of the role of a CPA and the attest function of an auditor. A response is unwarranted.

The third query might better be addressed to Governor Hickel. From my standpoint it is insulting to even suggest that the Governor (or anyone else) exercises control over my fiduciary responsibilities.



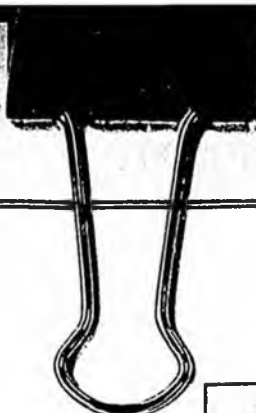

CSHB 2 increases excise taxes on cigarettes and tobacco products. This bill increases the additional cigarette tax under AS 43.50.190 from 12 to 18 mills per cigarette, and increases the percentage of tax on tobacco products from 25% to 35% of the wholesale price.

Cigarettes

When added with the base cigarette tax of 2.5 mills under AS 43.50.090, the total cigarette tax under this bill would be 20.5 mills per cigarette (41 cents per pack), versus the current 14.5 mills (29 cents per pack). This would mean a 41% increase from the current cigarette tax rate.

Assuming that the increased tax rate will cause a decrease in the number of cigarettes sold by 10%, cigarette taxes will still increase in FY 93 by \$4.3 million as outlined below:

Our fiscal note assumes that the number of cigarette sold in FY 93 will remain the same through FY 98.

Tobacco Products

This bill increases the percentage of excise tax on tobacco products from 25% to 35% of the wholesale price of the product. Tobacco products under AS 43.50 includes all forms of tobacco except for cigarettes.

Based on the total wholesale price of tobacco products reported to the Department of Revenue during FY 91 of \$3.7 million, this bill would increase revenues by \$370,000 per year assuming the rate of tobacco usage remains the same as FY 91.

Summary

The total increase in revenues for both cigarettes (\$4.3 million) and tobacco products (\$370,000) as a result of this bill is estimated to be \$4,670,000.
