FISCAL NOTE NARRATIVE

The fiscal impact of CSSB 131 (Judiciary) to the Division of Elections is based on broadcasting election notices on television for 5 days, twice a day. In FY 92 the division will conduct one statewide Regional Education Attendance Area election. In FY 93 the division will conduct one statewide REAA election and the primary and general election. This pattern continues every other year. This note does not include the costs of possible special elections.

The costs associated with FY 94-97 are based on a projected 8% average annual rate of increase for television advertising rates based on figures from a report published by Broadcast Investment Analysis, Inc.

4 * Section 1. AS 15.15.010 is amended to read:

5 Sec. 15.15.010. GENERAL ADMINISTRATIVE SUPERVISION BY DIRECTOR. The
 6 director shall provide general administrative supervision over the conduct of state elections, and
 7 may adopt regulations under the Administrative Procedure Act (AS 44.62) necessary for the
 8 administration of state elections. The director shall adopt regulations that establish for the
 9 broadcasting of notices under AS 15.15.070 the frequency of the broadcasts, appropriate
 10 broadcast times, and the locations for the broadcasts. The broadcasting regulations must
 11 be reasonably calculated to provide the widest possible exposure of the notices.

12 * Sec. 2. AS 15.15.070(d) is amended to read:

13 (d) The first [FIRST] publication, broadcast, or posting of the notice shall [IS TO] be
 14 made not less than 10 days before the election.

1 * Sec. 3. AS 15.15.070(f) is amended to read:

2 (f) Additional notice shall be given of all bond issues, initiatives, referendums, and
3 propositions by use of newspapers, television, radio, printed posters, maps, and similar means of
4 communication considered necessary. The director may not be required to post, broadcast, or

I request the earliest possible hearing for Senate Bill 131 by the Senate Finance Committee.

The objective of this measure is to allow the more extensive use of broadcast for the required public notice of state elections, regulation changes and public meetings.

Sections one through four of the measure relate to the public notice of elections. An additional requirement is made that notice of an election be broadcast. This proposed change mirrors the requirement for published public notice of an election. My measure calls for an abbreviated form of the notice requiring cross promotion with published notices.

The committee substitute approved by the Senate State Affairs Committee directs the Division of Elections and the Lieutenant Governor to enact regulations to assure the widest possible exposure of the notices by addressing the frequency, appropriate times and locations for broadcasts.

Section six provides for the use of broadcast for public notice of actions regarding regulations. Broadcast may be used to satisfy the public notice requirement or used in combination with published notice at the discretion of the public agency.

Section seven addresses public notice for meetings and also allows the use of broadcast or print or a combination to satisfy public notice requirements. Again, the form of public notice is left to the discretion of the agency.

The advantages of using broadcast for public notice are obvious. The use of broadcast will increase the likelihood that the public is notified of matters regarding regulations and public meetings. In many cases it may be more appropriate to use broadcast as the form of public notice for meetings, public hearings, emergency related announcements and other functions of state government. Some forms of public notice, such as invitations to bid and others requiring a high degree of complexity, do not make themselves entirely suitable to broadcast due to time limitations, although The use of broadcast would serve as an excellent tool for cross promotion of the detailed information published by the print media.

The Legislature approved a bill last year allowing the use of broadcast for public notice to supplement required print notice. Providing state agencies the flexibility to use broadcast for public notice more extensively, as proposed in this legislation, will help increase the possibilities of ensuring Alaskans are informed of these matters.

Your consideration of my request is appreciated.

SECTIONAL ANALYSIS
CSSB 131(State Affairs)

Section 1

Requires Director, Division of Elections to enact regulations governing the use of broadcast for public notice of elections.

Section 2

Adds broadcast to the 10 day minimum requirement for announcing a state election.

Section 3

A technical amendment adding the word "broadcast".

Section 4

A new section calling for an abbreviated form of the election notice to be broadcast on one or more radio or television stations in each of the four major election districts. This new section also outlines the minimum information which must be included in a broadcasted public notice.

Section 5

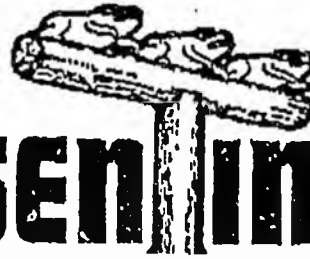
Requires the Lieutenant Governor to enact regulations governing the use of broadcast for public notice of public meetings and regulation changes.

Section 6

Except for publication in the Alaska Administrative Journal, which is still required, adds language giving a state agency flexibility to publish or broadcast, or to use a combination of print and broadcast, for required public notice relating to regulations.

Section 7

Except for publication in the Alaska Administrative Journal, which is still required, adds language giving a state agency flexibility to publish or broadcast, or to use a combination of print and broadcast, for required public notice relating to public hearings and meetings.

We oppose the language for Sec. 6 AS 44.62.190(a)(1), which would insert the word "satisfied" in place of the word "supplemented." We also oppose removal of the words "supplemented by" in Sec. 7 AS 44.62.310(e). In both cases, the effect would be to remove public notice requirements from newspapers. We believe this is bad public policy.

Allowing notices of elections, agency meetings and regulation changes to be accomplished merely by radio and-or television announcements does not ensure the public is informed. Would a notice of an election 11 days before that election, broadcast at 3 a.m. suffice to inform the public of their rights? Certainly not. But this legislation would appear to allow it.


The newspapers of the state of Alaska can provide audited circulation figures, confirmed by annual reviews by the U.S. Postal Service. We must demonstrate to the Postal Service that our newspapers have bona fide paid circulations and are, in fact, distributed to those subscribers. Even the copies of our newspapers that are not mailed through the Postal Service are audited by that agency.

In addition, the state of Alaska receives affidavits from publishers, attesting to the fact that legal notices are published and distributed as required under state law.

We feel the services provided by newspapers better protect the public's rights than a vaguely worded requirement for broadcast notification. We certainly do not oppose language to supplement newspaper publication of such notices through additional broadcast notices, but the public is not well served by broadcast notices alone.

FISCAL NOTE - CSHB 131 (FIN)

ANALYSIS:

Section 7 of the bill mandates the use of print and broadcast media when announcing all open meetings. The division currently holds approximately 75 open meetings each year. While some public service announcements are free, others may charge for this service, especially when the announcements are routinely mandated by statutes. This fiscal note is based on running four announcements each day during the best times available on both AM and FM radio at a cost of \$88.00 (75 x \$88.00 = \$6,600.00).

I would appreciate your scheduling the above referenced bill for a hearing before the House Health, Education and Social Services Committee at your earliest possible convenience.

As a you are aware, last session this identical bill passed both bodies of the legislature; however, it was ultimately vetoed by the Governor Cowper. Senate Bill 132 is a companion to House Bill 133, which was passed out of your committee on April 8.

Certain children in the state presently receive less than the standard 180 days of instruction that is mandated by law. Some of these absences are attributed to subsistence lifestyles of parents during hunting and fishing periods, as well as commercial fishing openings. In turn, children lose valuable educational opportunities and schools just indicate the children as being absent. This legislation simply gives a local school board the discretion to adjust the school day to accomodate the different lifestyle needs as well as allow for other situations that might cause a closure of a school.

Current law presently allows for adjustments of the school term for correction of asbestos problems. Other conditions that may arise to force a closure would be frozen pipes, flooding, or volcanic eruptions as experienced on the Kenai peninsula just last year.

Under the authority of art. II, sec. 15, of the Alaska Constitution, I have vetoed the following bill:

HOUSE COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE
FOR SENATE BILL NO. 171 (HESS)
(Relating to the school term.)

This bill would have amended AS 14.03.030 (Length of School Term). Under the language of the bill, the Commissioner of Education has the authority to approve a school term of "not less than 160 days" for any reason, if requested by a local board. The original language of AS 14.03.030 allows a shorter term only when student health or safety is threatened.


I understand that the legislation was directed at meeting the unique needs of a very small number of schools. In attempting to accommodate the needs of these few students, the legislation grants unusually broad powers to the commissioner in an area which should be of concern to state policy makers.

We know that a significant reason for lower school achievement in this country is the relatively short school term compared with other industrialized nations. In addition, Alaska's statute is already more liberal than many other states in allowing in-service training days to be counted as part of the 180-day school year. Many states insist that the mandatory school term be made up of instructional days, with in-service days added to the total. It is possible that under the new language some districts will pressure for shorter terms to accommodate particular life styles. While sensitivity to community needs is necessary, a shorter school term merely exacerbates the problem of relatively poor student

achievement in many areas of our state, as evidenced by the recent statewide assessment results.

The current statute allows for a shorter school term under emergency situations. To allow a shorter school term for any other, less compelling reason would penalize our students. I am therefore vetoing HCS SB 171.



SUBCOMMITTEE REPORT ON SB 171

The House Finance Subcommittee on SB 171 met on February 13, 1990 at 1 p.m., to consider SB 171 and the question that the Finance Committee had directed it to answer: whether the Commissioner of Education currently has the ability to authorize an extension of the length of the school day to satisfy school term requirements. Two of three members were present, Rep. Koponen, chair and Rep. Schultz. Rep. Ulmer was excused due to illness. According to Steve Hole, Department of Education (memo attached), the Commissioner currently has the authority to approve emergency closure days (AS 14.03.030), but the Commissioner does not presently have the authority to authorize districts to make up missed days by extending the number of hours in the school days. The Department of Education and the subcommittee supports this legislation which would add such a provision into law.


Dear Representative Koponen:

For the record, and as I have testified before other legislative committees on House CS SB-171 (HESS), our interpretation of the bill is that under its provisions, a school board can provide for a school term of less than 180 days, but with extended days in session, and meet the requirement of "... the approximate educational equivalent of a 180 day term..."

The above interpretation is subject to the approval of the commissioner of the plan required by lines 24-26 of this bill, which is also existing law.

The Department supports the bill, and while it would be our intention to implement its provisions in a manner which affords districts flexibility to adjust to exigencies, it also would be our intent to assure that the level of instruction provided under a plan is both academically and age appropriate.

Dear President Eliason:

Under the authority of art. III, sec. 18, of the Alaska Constitution, I am transmitting a capital appropriations bill for fiscal year 1991.

The legislation reflects the Administration's first step in addressing the serious backlog of deferred maintenance in state facilities throughout the state. It also includes requests from state agencies for facility improvements and equipment acquisition which will enable them to continue providing valued services to Alaskans as well as construction funding for priority schools as identified by the Department of Education.

During my first weeks in office, I also received many requests for capital project funding from local communities throughout the state. I know these requests are just as important as the agency projects included in my supplemental capital budget, but I also realized neither my staff nor I could pick and chose among the communities' varied and worthwhile projects. Instead, I will be introducing separate legislation which will put in place a new approach to meeting local needs in which the state will become a partner in each community's project.

My staff will be furnishing additional information on the projects included in the capital budget to the Senate Finance Committee.

In tomorrow morning's presentation of the capital budget, I would appreciate it if you would address the following:

1. SB 133 has an immediate effective date, which means it will be supplemental to the FY 91 budget. Is the purpose of spending in FY 91 simply to take advantage of the state's revenue "surplus", or is there a critical need for this project money in FY 91?
2. Does the Governor also intend to introduce a FY 92 capital budget, and if so, when?
3. SB 133 would appropriate \$195 million in general funds (including general fund match, program receipts, and mental health trust funds). How much will be appropriated in the FY 92 budget? How do these totals compare to the funding levels contained in the summary sheet OMB presented to the Senate Finance Committee (\$250 million in FY 91, \$10.7 million in FY 92)?
4. Major components of the Governor's capital proposal, discussed with various interest groups and in the press, are not included in SB 133 -- for example, the \$60 million per capita allocation and money for the Alaska Investment Fund. Will these be part of the FY 92 proposal?

5. Some of the traditional components of the state capital budget are not included in SB 133 -- for example, the general fund match for Federal Highway and Aviation Funds and funding for Alaska Energy Authority projects. Will these be part of the FY 92 proposal?

6. Project titles in SB 133 indicate that these funds are primarily for deferred maintenance and equipment replacement. What guidelines did OMB use in determining whether or not a project qualified as deferred maintenance? Assuming that not all maintenance requests were funded, how did OMB prioritize among requests?

7. Many of the equipment requests relate to computers -- for example, replacement of the mainframe computer at DOA and purchase of "peripheral" computer equipment at DOA. Were the computer projects approved by the Telecommunications Information Council?

8. Some items traditionally funded in the state's operating budget appear in SB 133 -- for example, \$216,000 for the Nature Conservancy, \$5.1 million for Fisheries Enhancement Loans, and \$1.2 million for DNR land surveys. What was the basis for this decision?

9. Some of the "lump sum" appropriations in SB 133 have traditionally been allocated to specific projects in the state's capital budget -- for example, the \$15.45 million in DEC sewer and water projects and the \$3 million for state park renovations. Will project lists be forthcoming?

10. Only partial funding for Priority I schools is proposed (\$25 million of the \$51.6 million Priority I request). On what was this decision based?

11. SB 133 contains over \$15 million for Dalton Highway repairs. Is it the Governor's intent to have industry share in these costs?

12. The funding source section of SB 133 indicates expenditure of revenue bonds (\$410,000), PERS funds (\$36,100), and TRS funds (\$26,200). For which projects are these appropriated?

I am certain that committee members will have additional questions at the table, and appreciate your cooperation in assisting our understanding of the Governor's proposal.
