


FOR AN ACT ENTITLED

1 "An Act relating to enhanced 911 emergency reporting systems; and providing for
2 an effective date."

3 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF ALASKA:

4 * Section 1. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE. (a) The legislature finds that

5 (1) the elderly, the young, and victims of crime are often at risk, unable to
6 assist themselves, and are frequently unable to explain directions to the location of an
7 emergency situation;

8 (2) the basic 911 telephone emergency number is currently available in some
9 communities in the state, but an enhanced 911 system is currently available to only a limited
10 number of Alaskans;

11 (3) an enhanced 911 telephone emergency system provides

12 (A) expansion of the benefits of the basic 911 emergency telephone
13 number;

14 (B) faster response time, which minimizes the loss of life and property;

- 1 (C) automatic routing to the appropriate emergency response unit;
2 (D) immediate visual display of the location and telephone number of
3 the caller; and
4 (E) curtailment of abuses of the emergency system by documenting
5 callers;

6 (4) more communities in the state could make efficient use of the enhanced
7 911 telephone emergency system if the communities had adequate funding available.

8 (b) It is the purpose of this legislation to

9 (1) establish broad protections for acquiring, establishing, operating, and
10 maintaining enhanced 911 systems;

11 (2) establish methods for the payment of costs associated with those activities;
12 and

13 (3) enable the development, installation, and operation of enhanced 911
14 emergency reporting systems to be operated under local governmental management and
15 control.

16 * Sec. 2. AS 09.65.070(d) is amended to read:

17 (d) No action for damages may be brought against a municipality or any of its
18 agents, officers, or employees if the claim

19 (1) is based on a failure of the municipality, or its agents, officers, or
20 employees, when the municipality is neither owner nor lessee of the property involved,

21 (A) to inspect property for a violation of any statute, regulation
22 or ordinance, or a hazard to health or safety;

23 (B) to discover a violation of any statute, regulation, or
24 ordinance, or a hazard to health or safety if an inspection of property is made;
25 or -

26 (C) to abate a violation of any statute, regulation or ordinance,
27 or a hazard to health or safety discovered on property inspected;

28 (2) is based upon the exercise or performance or the failure to exercise
29 or perform a discretionary function or duty by a municipality or its agents, officers,
30 or employees, whether or not the discretion involved is abused;

31 (3) is based upon the grant, issuance, refusal, suspension, delay or

1 denial of a license, permit, appeal, approval, exception, variance, or other entitlement,
2 or a rezoning;

3 (4) is based on the exercise or performance during the course of
4 gratuitous extension of municipal services on an extraterritorial basis; or

5 (5) is based upon the exercise or performance of a duty or function
6 upon the request of, or by the terms of an agreement or contract with, the state to meet
7 emergency public safety requirements;

8 (6) is based on the exercise or performance of a duty in connection
9 with an enhanced 911 emergency system and is not based on an intentional act
10 of misconduct or on an act of gross negligence.

11 * Sec. 3. AS 29.10.200 is amended by adding a new paragraph to read:

12 (51) AS 29.35.131 (enhanced 911 system).

13 * Sec. 4. AS 29.35 is amended by adding new sections to read:

14 Sec. 29.35.131. 911 SURCHARGE. (a) A municipality may, by resolution
15 or ordinance, elect to provide an enhanced 911 system at public safety answering
16 points, may purchase or lease the enhanced 911 equipment or service required to
17 establish or maintain an enhanced 911 system at public safety answering points from
18 a local exchange telephone company or other qualified vendor, and may impose a 911
19 surcharge, in an amount to be determined by the municipality, on all local exchange
20 access lines in the area to be served by the enhanced 911 system. For a municipality
21 with a population of 100,000 or more, the surcharge may not exceed 50 cents per
22 month per local exchange access line. For a municipality with fewer than 100,000
23 people, the surcharge may not exceed 75 cents per month per local exchange access
24 line. The area served by a system may be all of a city, all of a unified municipality,
25 or all or part of the area within a borough and may include the extraterritorial
26 jurisdiction of a municipality in accordance with AS 29.35.020. The governing body
27 of a municipality shall review the 911 surcharge annually to determine whether the
28 current level of the surcharge is adequate, excessive, or insufficient to meet anticipated
29 enhanced 911 system needs. The municipality may only use the surcharge for the
30 enhanced 911 system.

31 (b) A local exchange telephone company providing service in a municipality

1 that has imposed a 911 surcharge shall bill and collect the surcharge from customers
2 in the designated 911 service area. A local exchange telephone customer may not be
3 subject to more than one 911 surcharge on a local exchange access line. A customer
4 that has more than 100 local exchange access lines from a local exchange telephone
5 company in the municipality is liable for the 911 surcharge only on 100 local exchange
6 access lines.

7 (c) A local exchange telephone company shall include the 911 surcharge,
8 stated separately and included in the total amount owed, in the bills delivered to its
9 customers. The Alaska Public Utilities Commission may not consider the 911
10 surcharge as revenue of the local exchange telephone company and has no jurisdiction
11 over an enhanced 911 system. A local exchange service customer is liable for
12 payment of the 911 surcharge in the amounts billed by the local exchange telephone
13 company until the amounts have been paid to the telephone company.

14 (d) A local exchange telephone company that has collected the 911 surcharge
15 shall remit the amounts collected to the municipality no later than 60 days after the
16 end of the month in which the amount was collected. From each remittance made in
17 a timely manner under this subsection, the local exchange telephone company is
18 entitled to deduct and retain the greater of one percent of the collected amount or \$150
19 as the cost of administration for collecting the 911 surcharge.

20 (e) A local exchange telephone company is not obligated to take legal action
21 to enforce collection of the 911 surcharge. However, if a local exchange telephone
22 company is attempting to collect an unpaid debt from a local exchange service
23 customer, the telephone company shall also attempt to collect any unpaid 911
24 surcharge that the customer owes. If a customer pays a portion of a bill that includes
25 a 911 surcharge, the amount paid shall be prorated between the telephone company and
26 the 911 surcharge. The company shall annually provide the municipality with a list
27 of the amounts due for the nonpayment of 911 emergency surcharges, together with
28 the names and addresses of those customers who carry a balance that can be
29 determined by the company to be for the nonpayment of the 911 emergency
30 surcharges. The local exchange telephone company is not liable for uncollected
31 amounts.

1 (f) The municipality may, at its own expense, require an annual audit of a
2 local exchange telephone company's books and records concerning the collection and
3 remittance of the 911 surcharge.

4 (g) A village, as defined in AS 09.65.070(e), or a public corporation
5 established by a municipality has the powers granted to a municipality under this
6 section.

7 (h) This section applies to home rule and general law municipalities.

8 Sec. 29.35.133. IMMUNITY. (a) The establishment, funding, use, operation,
9 or maintenance of enhanced 911 systems and all activities associated with those actions
10 are specifically found to be within the ambit of AS 09.50.250(1) and
11 AS 09.65.070(d)(6). Except for intentional acts of misconduct or gross negligence, a
12 service supplier, local exchange telephone company, or mobile telephone company,
13 including a cellular service company, and their employees and agents, are also immune
14 from liability that might otherwise be incurred in the course of installing, training,
15 maintaining, or providing enhanced 911 systems or transmitting or receiving calls on
16 the system.

17 (b) An individual, telephone company, or employee of a telephone company
18 who operates or maintains an emergency 911 service is not liable for civil damages
19 as a result of an act, omission, failure of service, or incorrect information done or
20 given in good faith.

21 (c) In this section, "service supplier" means a person that provides or offers
22 to provide telecommunications equipment or services necessary for the establishment,
23 maintenance, or operation of an enhanced 911 system.

24 Sec. 29.35.135. WAIVER OF PRIVACY BY LOCAL EXCHANGE
25 TELEPHONE COMPANY SUBSCRIBERS. Local exchange telephone company
26 subscribers waive the privacy afforded by unlisted or unpublished telephone numbers
27 to the extent that the name and address associated with the telephone number may be
28 furnished to the enhanced 911 system for call routing or for automatic retrieval of
29 location information in response to a call initiated to the system.

30 Sec. 29.35.137. DEFINITIONS. In AS 29.35.131 - 29.35.137,

31 (1) "911 service area" or "enhanced 911 service area" means the area

1 within a municipality's jurisdiction that has been designated to receive enhanced 911
2 service; the designation of an area to receive an enhanced 911 system under
3 AS 42.30.420(a) does not designate the area as a "service area" for purposes of art. X,
4 sec. 5, Constitution of the State of Alaska;

5 (2) "enhanced 911 equipment" means the equipment dedicated to the
6 operation of, or use in, the establishment, operation, or maintenance of an enhanced
7 911 system, including customer premises equipment, automatic number identification
8 or automatic location identification controllers and display units, printers, cathode ray
9 tubes, recorders, software, and other essential communication equipment required by
10 the system;

11 (3) "enhanced 911 system" or "system" means a telephone system
12 consisting of network, database, and enhanced 911 equipment that uses the single three
13 digit number, 911, for reporting a police, fire, medical, or other emergency situation,
14 and that enables the users of a public telephone system to reach a public safety
15 answering point to report emergencies by dialing 911; an enhanced 911 system
16 includes the personnel required to acquire, install, operate, and maintain the system;

17 (4) "local exchange access line" means a telephone line that connects
18 a local exchange service customer to the local exchange telephone company switching
19 office and has the capability of reaching local public safety agencies, but does not
20 include a line used by a carrier to provide interexchange services;

21 (5) "local exchange service" means the transmission of two-way

Sponsor Statement for CS for Senate Bill 97 (Fin)

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee ... Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 97 (Fin) will enable emergency dispatchers to better assist people who call 911 when they find themselves in life threatening situations. Victims of crime, the young, and the elderly are often unable to give adequate directions when they dial 911. If enacted, SB-97 would create a mechanism to fund enhanced 911 emergency reporting systems. The bill is permissive.

Enhanced 911 emergency reporting systems provide an expansion of the benefits of the basic 911 emergency telephone number. Among the benefits are:

- 1) Immediate visual display of the location and telephone number of the caller.
- 2) Automatic routing to the appropriate emergency response unit.
- 3) Faster response time.
- 4) Curtailment of abuses of the emergency system by documenting callers.

This bill gives immunity from liability, except for intentional acts of misconduct or gross negligence, to municipalities and their suppliers of 911 services. The bill, for the purposes of a dispatcher furnishing name and address information to emergency response units, waives the telephone customer's privacy rights normally afforded by unlisted phone numbers.

SECTIONAL ANALYSIS OF CS SB 97 (FIN) ENHANCED 911 EMERGENCY SYSTEMS

Section 1:

Findings & Purpose.

Section 2:

Amends AS 09.65.070(d), SUITS AGAINST INCORPORATED UNITS OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT, to provide municipalities immunity from suit for the exercise of a duty in connection with an enhanced 911 system.

Section 3:

Amends AS 29.10.200, LIMITATION OF HOME RULE POWERS, to add AS 29.35.131, ENHANCED 911 SYSTEM, as a new paragraph. This provides that the Enhanced 911 System provisions apply to home rule municipalities as a prohibition on acting otherwise than as provided for in AS 29.35.131.

Section 4:

Amends AS 29.35, MUNICIPAL POWERS AND DUTIES, by adding 4 new sections:

- 29.35.131 - 911 Surcharge.
- 29.35.133 - Immunity.
- 29.35.135 - Waiver of Privacy By Local Exchange Telephone Company Subscribers.
- 29.35.137 - Definitions.

29.35.131: 911 Surcharge

Allows municipalities to elect to provide an enhanced 911 system and impose a surcharge, collectable through the local telephone exchange's billing system, to meet only the costs of the system. This surcharge is capped at 50 cents for municipalities with 100,000 or more people, and 75 cents for municipalities with fewer than 100,000 people.

In a municipality which has elected to provide this system, the local exchange telephone company shall bill and collect the surcharge, which shall be paid to the municipality no later than 60 days from the end of the month in which it is collected. The surcharge may not be considered revenue of the local exchange company. If a customer only pays a portion of his or her bill, the amount paid shall be prorated between the surcharge and telephone bill. From each remittance to the municipality, the local exchange company may deduct the greater of one percent of the collected amount or \$150 for the cost of collection.

A local exchange company is not legally obligated to take legal action to enforce collection of the surcharge, but if the company is attempting to collect an unpaid debt from a customer, it shall also attempt to collect any unpaid 911 surcharge.

29.35.133: Immunity

Except for intentional acts of misconduct or gross negligence, a service supplier, local exchange telephone company, and their employees and agents, are immune from liability.

29.35.135: Waiver of Privacy By Local Telephone Company
Subscribers

Local telephone subscribers waive the privacy afforded by unlisted or unpublished phone numbers to the extent that the name and address may be furnished to the enhanced 911 system for routing and response.

29.35.137: Definitions

LEGISLATIVE ISSUES

TITLE: Statewide 911 Legislation

The Municipality of Anchorage would support a bill that provided as a local government option a mechanism for local telephone companies to collect for 911 services areawide.

The cost of the 911 system in Anchorage is born by the taxpayers of the Anchorage Police Service Area (APSA), which currently does not include the Hillside/South Anchorage area. In the past, the Alaska State Troopers have relied upon the Anchorage Police Department's (APD) 911 system in order to provide emergency telephone service to these areas, and have been billed for the services proportionate to calls received for their agency. The Troopers recently notified the Municipality that it will no longer pay these costs and wished to withdraw from 911 participation.

This is an important issue to the MOA, because we do not have a source of revenue to fund the 911 system outside the APSA. Clearly, we cannot provide free emergency communications services to some residents of the Municipality while taxing other residents for the same service. In addition, the Municipality cannot provide 911 services free of charge to the State.

The Municipality also favors eliminating liability for information regarding unlisted phone numbers.

Subject: Senate Bill 97: The Kenai Peninsula Borough's Position on E-911 Billing Authority

This memorandum has been prepared to present the position of the Kenai Peninsula Borough regarding Senate Bill 97 which as of this date has passed the Senate and moved to the House for consideration. To summarize our position we can simply state that we fully support Senate Bill 97 as passed by the Senate and would hope to see no major changes made in the bill on the House side.

Our major interests concerning this bill are as follows:

1. The major purpose and benefit of this bill is that it allows municipalities to require local telephone utilities to collect user fees for 911 services. Municipalities are currently empowered to operate E-911 systems and could institute user fees -- however, without this legislation the telephone utilities would not be authorized to collect user fees by the Alaska Public Utilities Commission (APUC).

2. Section 4 of the bill, which enacts a new AS 29.35.131, establishes a maximum surcharge of 50 cents per month per access line for a municipality with a population of 100,000 or more, or 75 cents per month per line for less populated municipalities. The E-911 equipment necessary for the municipality of Anchorage is identical to that necessary for the less populated municipalities with the exception of the additional need for extended dedicated phone lines by the geographically larger, more rural boroughs. Thus the capital costs of an E-911 system are actually higher for the less populated municipalities which serve a greater geographic area than they are for the more densely populated municipality of Anchorage (which also has significantly more telephone lines upon which to distribute the charges.) These are the reasons for the different maximum rates.

It is therefore very important that the proposed 75-cent per line maximum be maintained for municipalities with fewer than 100,000 people.

3. Section 4 (proposed AS 29.35.131) also provides that the local exchange telephone company, while not obligated to take legal action to enforce collection of the 911 surcharge, will use its normal collection procedures (as utilized for collection of the telephone company portion of the bill) for collection efforts against the 911 surcharge amount. It further provides that if a customer pays a only a portion of the bill then the amount paid will be prorated between the 911 surcharge and the telephone company bill. These provisions are crucial as there is no practical mechanism which a borough could utilize to attempt collection of a 75-cent per month fee.

4. Summary. With the tremendous constraints on the Kenai Peninsula Borough's FY 93-94 budget arising from the conjunction of the mill rate cap with the declining assessed valuation of Borough properties and decreased municipal assistance funding, we are necessarily looking more and more to user fees for funding of specialized services. User fees for 911 services are very common throughout the rest of the United States. We urge you to support the passage of Senate Bill 97 through the House and conference committees in substantially the form as passed by the Senate on March 22, 1993. We thank you for your interest and support.

Sponsor Statement for CS for Senate Bill 97

Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee ... the Work Draft for Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 97 will enable emergency dispatchers to better assist people who call 911 when they find themselves in life threatening situations. Victims of crime, the young, and the elderly are often unable to give adequate directions when they dial 911. If enacted, SB-97 would create a mechanism to fund enhanced 911 emergency reporting systems. The bill is permissive.

Enhanced 911 emergency reporting systems provide an expansion of the benefits of the basic 911 emergency telephone number. Among the benefits are:

- 1) Immediate visual display of the location and telephone number of the caller.
- 2) Automatic routing to the appropriate emergency response unit.
- 3) Faster response time.
- 4) Curtailment of abuses of the emergency system by documenting callers.

This bill gives immunity from liability, except for intentional acts of misconduct or gross negligence, to municipalities and their suppliers of 911 services. The bill, for the purposes of a dispatcher furnishing name and address information to emergency response units, waives the telephone customer's privacy rights normally afforded by unlisted phone numbers.

The difference between this work draft and the L&C Committee Substitute is simple. I have removed section two and renumbered the remaining sections accordingly. Section two exempted from public record transcriptions and recordings kept of 911 phone calls. Currently, 911 systems work well without this extra protection and I see no reason to change the status quo. The section was originally requested by the Anchorage Telephone Utility, but ATU has since decided the section is unnecessary.

SECTIONAL ANALYSIS OF THE WORK DRAFT CS SB 97 (L&C): ENHANCED 911 EMERGENCY SYSTEM

Section 1: Findings & Purpose.

Section 2:

Amends AS 09.25.120, PUBLIC RECORDS; EXCEPTIONS; CERTIFIED COPIES, so that records or information provided in the course of an enhanced 911 call, including the recording of the call, are protected from release to the public. This section also makes some technical changes making the section easier to read.

Section 3:

Amends AS 09.65.070(d), SUITS AGAINST INCORPORATED UNITS OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT, to provide municipalities immunity from suit for the exercise of a duty in connection with an enhanced 911 system.

Section 4:

Amends AS 29.10.200, LIMITATION OF HOME RULE POWERS, to add AS 29.35.131, ENHANCED 911 SYSTEM, as a new paragraph. This provides that the Enhanced 911 System provisions apply to home rule municipalities as a prohibition on acting otherwise than as provided for in AS 29.35.131.

Section 5:

Amends AS 29.35, MUNICIPAL POWERS AND DUTIES, by adding 5 new sections:

- 29.35.131 - 911 Surcharge;
- 29.35.133 - Immunity;
- 29.35.135 - Waiver of Privacy By Local Exchange Telephone Company Subscribers;
- 29.35.137 - Definitions.

29.35.131: 911 Surcharge

Allows municipalities to elect to provide an enhanced 911 system and impose a surcharge, collectable through the local telephone exchange's billing system, to meet only the costs of the system. This surcharge is capped at 50 cents for municipalities with 100,000 or more people, and 75 cents for municipalities with fewer than 100,000 people.

In a municipality which has elected to provide this system, the local exchange telephone company shall bill and collect the surcharge, which shall be paid to the municipality no later than 60 days from the end of the month in which it is collected. The surcharge may not be considered revenue of the local exchange company. If a customer only pays a portion of his or her bill, the amount paid shall be prorated between the surcharge and telephone bill. From each remittance to the municipality, the local exchange company may deduct the greater of one percent of the collected amount or \$150 for the cost of collection.

A local exchange company is not legally obligated to take legal action to enforce collection of the surcharge, but if the company is attempting to collect an unpaid debt from a customer, it shall also attempt to collect any unpaid 911 surcharge.

29.35.133: Immunity

Except for intentional acts of misconduct or gross negligence, a service supplier, local exchange telephone company, and their employees and agents, are immune from liability.

29.35.135: Waiver of Privacy By Local Telephone Company Subscribers

Local telephone subscribers waive the privacy afforded by unlisted or unpublished phone numbers to the extent that the name and address may be furnished to the enhanced 911 system for routing and response.

29.35.137: Definitions

Section 6: Effective Date.

TITLE: Statewide 911 Legislation

The Municipality of Anchorage would support a bill that provided as a local government option a mechanism for local telephone companies to collect for 911 services areawide.

The cost of the 911 system in Anchorage is born by the taxpayers of the Anchorage Police Service Area (APSA), which currently does not include the Hillside/South Anchorage area. In the past, the Alaska State Troopers have relied upon the Anchorage Police Department's (APD) 911 system in order to provide emergency telephone service to these areas, and have been billed for the services proportionate to calls received for their agency. The Troopers recently notified the Municipality that it will no longer pay these costs and wished to withdraw from 911 participation.

This is an important issue to the MOA, because we do not have a source of revenue to fund the 911 system outside the APSA. Clearly, we cannot provide free emergency communications services to some residents of the Municipality while taxing other residents for the same service. In addition, the Municipality cannot provide 911 services free of charge to the State.

The Municipality also favors eliminating liability for information regarding unlisted phone numbers.





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This is a technical amendment to reflect the current computer technology in use. The Department of Public Safety uses a relational database in the Alaska Public Safety Information Network (APSIN). With this type of database there is no separate file or database that could be called "the vehicle register". The creation of such a list for sale to user has historically been done for more than 20 years and this amendment clarifies this sale as an electronic service. This protects over \$100,000 in revenue from those vendors who argue that this list should be provided at no charge. There is no fiscal since this amendment clarifies the current situation.

This section would place Alaska in compliance with uniform federal regulatory guidelines for the issuance of handicap plates. These standards limit the plates and the use of special parking places to those persons with mobility handicaps. Current Alaska law allows those with other than mobility handicaps to obtain the plates. Revenue estimates are based on the assumption that 15% or 480 of the 3200 persons with these plates would not qualify and would have to pay regular fees.

Revenue - 480 registrations @ \$35 \$16,800

This amendment closes a loop hole in the current law that allows dealers to misuse the dealer plate and prevents further loss of revenue. Since only one dealer was known to have misused the plates the additional revenue will be negligible.

This amendment takes away the authority to issue vehicle titles to mobile homes. In almost all cases the mobile homes are permanently mounted in trailer parks and should be classed as real property. A title is usually only required when the mobile home is financed because the banks feel getting a vehicle title is easier than filing a UCC lien or a real property lien. Since the title is optional the division usually cannot guarantee ownership since there is no clear chain of documents normally associated vehicle ownership. There would be a small loss of revenue from the approximately 150 titles issued each year.

Revenue - 150 title and lien fees @ \$10 (\$1,500)

This amendment improves efficiency by removing ambiguity associated with senior citizen exemptions and eliminating associated problems. Many senior citizens buy and sell several vehicles during the year and try to claim exemptions on each one. The statute only allows one exemption per year. There is no fiscal impact.

Historically only 25-30% of vehicle owners use the mail to renew vehicle registrations. The remainder, over 300,000, come in person to a DMV office adding to the long lines when there is no need to do so. This section charges an additional \$10 for those who do not use the mail service. This approach was taken over giving a discount to those who use the mail because it is a revenue generator rather than a revenue loss. It places the cost directly on those who are creating the efficiency loss. Even with this incentive it is estimated that 200,000 owners will still come in person to renew their vehicles.

Many businesses are registering their vehicles in the non-commercial categories claiming they are not used for business but are used for such things as personal transportation. This eliminates this loop hole and requires them to pay commercial fees. The biggest category affected will be passenger cars and rental vehicles which have been rented for non-commercial transportation. The average difference in registration fees will be \$16 for approximately 25,000 vehicles.

This Section changes the Municipal Vehicle Registration Tax amounts to 10% for FY 94.

Additional work must be performed to change the computer programs to reflect the new rates and in training the employees on the new rate structure. This work alone is not enough to justify a full-time position, but absorbing it will adversely affect other administrative functions.

Approximately 480,000 vehicles, or 81% of the total number of registered vehicles, are in areas subject to the tax. Any increase in fees increases the workload in public service offices of the Division, since DMV employees collecting the tax will receive public complaints, which take time and result in increased delays for the others in line. The public sees this as a state tax and not a local municipal property tax. Frequent changes to the fee increase processing time, because employees will not be as familiar with the fees. There are only 17 different registration fees, but there are 89 different categories for the registration tax.

Based on DMV's experience, increases of this nature will impact workloads 3-5%. As a result, DMV will increase the field office staffing by 3% or 3 PFT positions. Under the proposed bill, DMV's retention of funds to cover collection costs would be increased from 5% to 8%, subject to appropriation by the legislature. The increase is adequate to cover the increased cost of administering the program in FY 94 and FY 95.



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Fiscal Note Analysis for:

Financial Administration of State Government

The Department of Labor is affected by four sections of this bill. Separate fiscal notes have been prepared for each section. Sections 45 through 47 of this bill concern fees and certification time periods for departmental programs. Section 49 would increase an existing fee set by statute and change to a biennial licensing requirement.

In anticipation of new fees and fee increases, a fund source change from general funds to program receipts was included in the department's FY 94 budget submittal. Because the \$93.5 in fee income is reflected in the department's operating budget, it is excluded from this fiscal note.

The net fiscal impact of the sections of this bill (and associated regulations) relevant to this department is the general fund gains \$94.6, and the department gains \$26.8 expenditure authorization to cover the costs of services provided.

Section 47:

This section would establish fees for an application/examination and for duplicate certificates of fitness for electricians and plumbers. Section 47 would also increase fees for certificates of fitness and for renewals of certificates.

No application/examination fee is currently charged; a \$50 application/examination fee would generate approximately \$23.8 annually in program receipts. This fee reflects the cost of providing these services.

No fee is currently charged for duplicate certificates; a \$25 fee for duplicate certificates of fitness would generate approximately \$3.0 annually in program receipts. The \$25 fee reflects the cost of providing the duplicate certificate.

Currently, \$40 is charged for a one year certificate and \$75 is charged for a three year certificate. A \$160, two-year certificate of fitness fee--with an \$80, one-year certificate of fitness issued for a three year period until the current three-year certificates are phased out--is proposed. These fee changes are expected to generate \$93.5 annually. The revenue associated with this change is included in the department's operating budget submittal as program receipts. Two points are relevant: 1) the general fund gains \$93.5 and 2) the fiscal note does not reflect the receipt of the revenue because it is in the operating budget.

For purposes of calculating fiscal impact, an effective date of July 1, 1993 is assumed.





Financial Administration of State Government

The Department of Labor is affected by four sections of this bill. Separate fiscal notes have been prepared for each section. Sections 45 through 47 of this bill concern fees and certification time periods for departmental programs. Section 49 would increase an existing fee set by statute and change to a biennial licensing requirement.

In anticipation of new fees and fee increases, a fund source change from general funds to program receipts was included in the department's FY 94 budget submittal. Because the \$93.5 in fee income is reflected in the department's operating budget, it is excluded from this fiscal note.

The net fiscal impact of the sections of this bill (and associated regulations) relevant to this department is the general fund gains \$94.6, and the department gains \$26.8 expenditure authorization to cover the costs of services provided.

Section 49:

Section 49 of this bill raises the fee for an employment agency license from \$10 to \$100 and establishes the license as a biennial license. This fee has not been increased since 1953. This increase reflects the costs of review performed by the department for these operating permits.

The eight licensed employment agencies operating in the state will pay a total of an additional \$0.7 biennially for licensing. The department will continue to absorb the cost of reviewing and issuing these permits and the \$0.7 additional revenue collected will be deposited into the general fund.

For purposes of calculating fiscal impact, an effective date of July 1, 1993 is assumed.

Section 45:

This section would allow the department to adopt regulations establishing fees for administering special inspector examinations and processing applications for special boiler and pressure vessel inspector commissions. The department currently performs these functions without charge.

Regulations establishing a \$25 application and examination fee are anticipated. This would generate approximately \$0.4 annually in receipts to the general fund.

For purposes of calculating fiscal impact, an effective date of July 1, 1993 is assumed.





Section 46:

Section 46 would change time periods for certificates of fitness for plumbers and electricians from a one- or three-year certificate to two-year certificates. The department would have the authority to phase in the two-year certificates over an expected three year period.

This bill would have no fiscal impact other than stabilizing revenues to the department.
