



The changes proposed in this committee substitute do not change our original fiscal note of 1/17/97. The following comments, which were in the original note, still apply:

This legislator will move the payment of municipal assistance from 2/1 forward to 7/31 of each State fiscal year. Investment income will be lost by the State because of this earlier payment. The income lost will be at the rate earned by the CBRF. This is because the general fund borrows from and has a large outstanding liability to the CBRF. Any disbursement of general fund moneys delays repayments to the CBRF.

This rate used to calculate the lost earnings has increased from last year. This is because of the passage of SB 303 which resulted in the Department of Revenue's implementing a new asset allocation which will result in increased total return.

Our fiscal note above assumes the payment is made on 7/31. Attached is a schedule which reflects the effect of payout dates ranging from 7/31 to 12/31.

CSSB 34(FIN): DOT Maintenance Facility at Soldotna

Senate Bill 34 provides authorization to the State of Alaska to enter into and finance a lease-purchase agreement for the construction of a new maintenance facility in Soldotna.

The current facility, on about a 7 acre site, is over 30 years old and is located along the Kenai River. The facility, on the main thorough-fare in the center of Soldotna, is of concern to the entire community.

The new facility will be constructed on a site which is currently held by the Kenai Peninsula Borough (KPB). The KPB "owes" the State the acreage; thus there is no land acquisition cost to this project. The KPB will deed the land to whatever entity is needed to comply with the bonding requirements.

There is considerable public interest over the siting of the maintenance facility along the Kenai River. Heightened public awareness of habitat protection and water quality for the river has focused on this station.

This project has the support of the Department and appears to be the most viable option at this time.



Under 11 AAC 86.145, a mining operator may restrict public access to a site only with the approval of the Division of Mining and Water Management, and only "to protect public safety" or to "prevent unreasonable interference" with the miner's rights. The proposed law appears to invalidate the ability of the state to allow this restriction to public access. Thus, it could force the Usibelli Coal Mine to let the public drive through its active mining areas, even during blasting operations (a violation of federal law). It might require the operator of Fort Knox to allow snowmobiles, dog mushers, pedestrians, and cars to compete with its 150-ton haul trucks for use of the road. While companies could ask for public access restrictions, the restriction would require legislative approval.

Fiscal Note, continued: CSSB 35 (RES)

The bill has little effect on the operations of the Division, but it could have a significant but difficult to calculate cost to mining operators – and thus an affect to the Alaskans employment and income, and to state royalties and rents. The cost to mining operators could increase due to increased insurance costs, increased management costs, decreased efficiency. In addition, the inability to restrict public access to operating mines could decrease the current attractiveness of the state to new mining development.

Analysis assumes that the intent of Sec. 5 is to prevent any restriction or prohibition of access on state public domain land, including land offered for sale, surface lease, material sales, or rights-of-way. "Blanket" easements would be required instead of typical linear easements. Reduction of sale parcels' fair market value is estimated at 50% due to loss of exclusive use rights and perceived loss of privacy. Commercial/industrial lease bids and material sale prices are also projected to be reduced to account for higher insurance premiums charged for unsecured work sites. Projected revenue impact assumes no major new land sale offering to the general public; mostly preference-right sales, sales to current remote parcel lessees, homesiters, and homesteaders, material sales, and leases for commercial/industrial purposes. Sec. 5, added by the Resources Committee, would enact a new AS 38.95.300 forbidding DNR to adopt a regulation that would prohibit or restrict "traditional access" (undefined). As with ADF&G and the boards, a DNR finding of a "compelling reason" may be forwarded as proposed legislation. Because the restriction is in AS 38, it would apply to public domain land management, not just park management. Temporary parkland closures under AS 41.21.020(e), added by Sec. 7 of the bill, would be excepted.

Sec. 5: Statutory intent is not clear. DNR does not adopt regulations prohibiting access to Title 38 land. It is in the business of facilitating access, not precluding it. However, since 1970 it has had regulations requiring a permit to use heavy equipment on state land, which might qualify as a "restriction" of undefined traditional access. Further, those regulations let DNR impose more stringent permit requirements on a site-specific basis. It did this for off-road vehicle use on the North Slope in 1970 (still in effect, and necessary to prevent resource damage on permafrost soils). Other designations since then that may affect "traditional uses" include two at the Poker Flats rocket impact zone to prevent public access during rocket launches; three allow public safety controls at ski area (Hatcher Pass, Thompson Pass, and Alyeska Resort), e.g. during avalanche blasting; another prohibits camping in the Nenana Gorge to control a problem with seasonal Denali Park workers' squatters' camps; another restricts access to a sea-lion rookery at Marmot Island to minimize the threat that the federal government would place the Stellar sea lion on the endangered species list (an action that would have caused great disruption to commercial fisheries). DNR closed road access altogether to two sites in Juneau (at Montana Creek and Eagle River) that were being used for illegal trash dumping, as it was not funded for maintenance and the cleanup costs were becoming overwhelming. And DNR has just been notified it must close access to about 1,000 acres near Gerstle River (Delta) because of the presence of hazardous nerve gas left over from military testing. The bill may intend to invalidate existing restrictions or prevent new ones in equally compelling circumstances.

Allowing DNR to request a legislative closure, months or years later, is no solution. The bill has no exceptions for closures needed to protect public safety or prevent resource damage, just as it has no exceptions for resource development and land disposal purposes. Every land disposal to a municipality or a private owner "restricts" previous public access, unless this bill intends DNR to reserve blanket easements allowing all previous uses to continue. (Even if DNR follows its traditional practice of reserving easements to protect existing trails, being confined to a trail is a "restriction.") On land subject to timber sales, material sales, mineral leases, and other less-than-fee disposals, DNR generally retains public access, but it must be able to allow necessary restrictions. For instance, DNR authorizes timber purchasers to close logging roads during breakup or heavy rain, when travel would damage the road surface, or at the logging site to prevent safety hazards and to protect equipment and cut timber against theft and damage. And it requires logging roads to be blocked and "put to bed" if there is no new operator to assume responsibility for road and culvert maintenance. Gravel pits and rock quarries are operated under similar rules to protect public safety and the gravel purchaser's property rights. Similarly, oil and gas leases are open to public uses that do not unreasonably interfere with the lessees' rights. Lessees are prohibited by their lease terms from blocking public access. However, exceptions are allowed within the immediate vicinity of drill sites and structures. On mining locations, the miner must apply for permission for any closure, and restrictions are authorized only to protect public safety or prevent unreasonable interference with the miner's rights. This bill could force the Usibelli coal mine to let the public drive through its active mining areas, even during blasting operations (a violation of federal law). And it could invalidate Alyeska Pipeline Service Company's authority to restrict public access to its right-of-way lease, forcing removal of the locked gates that keep vehicles off the work pad and pipeline. Who would pay for the liability of allowing the general public, including children, into the midst of industrial operations using heavy equipment? This section could slow or halt resource development on state land.

Restrictions as in the above examples are imposed not by "regulation" but by land use plans, land disposal decisions, forest land use plans for timber sales, oil and gas lease forms, wildfire management plans, etc. However, because "regulation" is so broadly defined in AS 44.62.640, a case can be made that all of these documents are in fact regulations (a suit now before the Supreme Court raises this question). That interpretation would open most of DNR's land management and disposal decisions to the charge that they will restrict "traditional access," giving disposal opponents new ammunition to use in court.

CSSB 35 (Fin) has evolved to the point that severely cripples State Parks' ability to protect the safety of its citizens and to provide recreational opportunities for all its users in a balanced manner. This bill takes away State Parks' administrative authority on these issues and places it in the hands of the legislature, which may have neither the time nor the inclination to examine the issues closely. More specifically, CSSB 35 would:

- remove State Parks' discretion to close areas for longer than 90 days for reasons of public safety or resource protection without the approval of the legislature. In addition, if an area is closed again the following year, it must be taken to the legislature for approval again. This creates a very confusing and lengthy process, and if no action is taken by the legislature, Parks is forced to keep areas open regardless of potential safety hazards.
- potentially cause the state to lose its discretionary function immunity and become open to opportunities for litigation.
- essentially prohibit State Parks from protecting the serenity and quiet enjoyment of any of the land it manages from the intrusion of motorized activities without the authorization of the legislature.

Since the creation of the Division of Alaska State Parks, qualified and experienced land managers have been hired to address the issue of access onto these lands, and they have performed this task in a safe and responsible manner. CSSB 35 would cause Parks to be needlessly micro-managed by the

legislature, adding unnecessary levels of confusion, paperwork and bureaucracy to the process. It would also prevent Parks from achieving a fair and equitable balance between land allocated for motorized and quiet, non-motorized uses. The decision for park closures, whether it be for public safety, resource protection, or to create a balance between different recreational users, is better left in the hands of the State Parks staff rather than put in the political arena of the legislature.

SPONSOR STATEMENT - CSSB35

Bill Protecting Traditional Rights of Access on State Lands

Senate Bill 35 ensures the effort made last session (SB230) to place the final decision to permanently restrict or prohibit access to State Parks or land managed as a state park in parcels now not covered by statute for activities including aviation, boating, mushing, skiing, snow shoeing and pack animal or all terrain vehicle use in the hands of elected officials, not the state bureaucracy. The Department may still temporarily close access for reasons of public safety.

Last year's version (SB230) passed by votes of 33-7 in the House and 17-3 in the Senate but was vetoed by Governor Knowles.

We feel it is good public policy to place more responsibility on legislators and rely more on public input through the legislative process than to grant closure decisions to the State when it comes to shutting down traditional access for recreation on many state lands.

More and more user groups and individual Alaskans are fearful about bureaucratic closures that permanently restrict recreational access. This bill will require the Department of Natural Resources to justify closures on public access before any closures become permanent."

Senate Bill 35 addressess park land that is not currently covered under Alaska State Statutes.

The Department of Natural Resources did not present testimony at the Senate Finance Committee hearing on SB 35. However, the department believes that information on this bill is important for the committee to consider as this bill approaches a floor session.

The sponsor of the bill is understandably concerned that her constituents are being denied full use of state parks by administrative actions which close park areas to certain activities which have traditionally been allowed. The action by the Division of Parks which initiated this bill was the 1995 release of draft regulations on Denali State Park. This draft proposal was not popular with the public due to the administrative inclusion of Blair Lake as an addition to Denali State Park and subsequent closure of aircraft landings on the lake. This draft proposal was withdrawn in response to public displeasure.

SB 35 would eliminate the Division of Parks discretion to close areas as described above without coming to the legislature for approval. However, it also removes the division's discretion to close any area for reasons of public safety or resource protection for over 90 days without the approval of the legislature. This approval must come in the form of a bill or resolution. Further, if the areas are reopened in the next year and then closed again, we need to take that second or subsequent closure to the legislature again for approval leading to a very confusing and convoluted process. There is every danger that a bill of this type would get held up in the process and fail to pass both bodies of the legislature. If that happened, the division would have to keep open areas that may be very dangerous to the public.

The department understands the sponsor's desire to curtail closures for aesthetic or social values. However, we do not understand nor think it wise to remove the department's discretion to close areas for longer than 90 days for reasons of public safety or resource protection.

In discussions with the Department of Law, it came to our attention that this method of dealing with closures for public safety reasons **potentially removes the state's discretionary function immunity and opens opportunities for litigation.**

The following are the types of closures over 90 days that the legislature will be required to either approve or disapprove each year. In addition, in the second year all closures of any type will need to come before the legislature for approval even if less than 90 days.

Danger due to wildlife

- ① Bishop Creek Campground (Captain Cook SRA) closed for the season-danger of bears
- ② Annual closure of Troublesome Creek trail in Denali State Park due to a high incidence of grizzly bears feeding on salmon in a heavily forested area.

Disasters-while the disastrous event is usually over with quickly (oil spills, floods, landslides), it frequently takes Parks longer than 90 days to repair. If the closure is not adopted by the legislature, and Parks was unable to post the area closed, the state could be held liable for not signing a dangerous site as closed. Examples:

- ③ Perseverance Trail washed out last fall and has been closed since. Trail work is planned for this summer. Closure is longer than 90 days. A local high school runner ignored the trail closure signs and fell to his death.
- ④ Indian Oil Spill in 1993 (37,000 gallons of jet fuel) caused Parks to close 14 acres for the duration of the clean-up and mediation process. This is on-going
- ⑤ Fall 1995 flooding caused extensive damage to the Eklutna Lakeside Trail, including culvert and bridge wash-outs. It took 18 months to repair this damage, during which the trail was closed.
- ⑥ Damage to Bing's Landing on the Kenai River caused closure of much of the river bank pending work that is scheduled for this summer.

Lack of maintenance budgets

- ⑦ Parks has permanently closed park units for management reasons, usually a combination of declining budget and increasing expenses due to vandalism or location. In the past few years Moose Creek SRS, Tolsona Creek SRS, Centennial Lake SRS, and Anchor River SRS have been closed for these reasons. Each of these closures would need to come before the legislature in addition to any of the Parks that would be closed for budgetary reasons during FY 98. These closures for budgetary reasons will be very controversial and would require legislative approval or disapproval.

Parties and vandalism--Teenagers and vandalism have caused numerous parks near urban centers to be closed either in the evenings or for the season. These are beyond 90 days and would need legislative approval.

12

Upper Huffman Trailhead--open only in the winter for snowmobile use. Closed in the summer because of partying.

13

McHugh Creek closed at 10 PM in the summer and closed all winter to deter partying and vandalism.

14

Potter Creek Trailhead closed during the winter to prevent vandalism.

15

Bird Creek Valley closed one-half mile of access road to displace teen partying site.

16

All Sitka parks are closed at 11 PM in cooperation with local law authorities.

Over-use--areas that receive so much use that the resource is damaged and needs immediate response.

Streambank closures on fishing streams to protect salmon rearing habitat on the Kenai River and at Deep Creek.

17

Glenn Alps Trailhead in Chugach State Park due to erosion and vegetation damage.

Vegetation damage--in the spring when the snow cover shrinks snowmobiling is closed.

Winter Closures

75 campgrounds closed for the winter are longer than 90 days and would require annual legislative approval.

Day use areas in Chugach, Mat-Su, Kenai and Kodiak areas are similarly closed each season.

Conflicts between boating and swimmers causes us to close or restrict boating within swimming areas. Typically Parks defines a speed limit through creation of a no-wake zone. Examples are big Lake North and South, Nancy Lake, and Captain Cook.

Construction closures due to refurbishment of facilities, Parks will close a facility for longer than 90 days for public safety reasons to keep the public out of a construction zone.



The original SB35 had simply a restriction on administratively expanding park units without legislative approval (in response to Blair Lake) and an annual report of those areas where traditional recreational access was restricted and the reasons for closure. The overwhelming majority of such closures are for public safety and resource protection. The report would allow the legislature the opportunity to annually review the closures and take action against those they feel are inappropriate. This process would take far less of the legislatures time than taking affirmative action on routine public safety and resource protection closures.

Returning to the original intent of the bill would allow public safety or natural resource closures to remain active and would avoid any liability questions. We urge a return to the original intent of the bill.

Reference: **STATEMENT OF PURPOSE for Mat-Su Borough Planners and Assembly**

Following is D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. application and documentation for a Conditional Use Permit in the Mat-Su Borough's, Denali State Park Special Land Use District. Our proposal is to establish a horse and wagon ride seasonal (May - September) operations facility at Mile 132 of the Parks Highway, just east of the Mt. McKinley Princess Lodge. The site is well situated for horse rides and wagon tours by visitors to Denali State Park and the Mat-Su Borough. The proposed site incorporates zoning requirements set forth by Borough Ordinance, Chapter 17.17.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. Plans conform to the requirement stated in Article 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS, Section 17.17.020, PURPOSE. - The area within the boundaries of this special land use district is zoned for recreational uses.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. planned operations are of a recreational nature and for the support of like activities. Guided horse riding and wagon ride operations will include sightseeing and trail riding in remote locations of Denali State Park. The guests will be transported from Mt. McKinley Princess Lodge to the horseback riding trail head.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. permit application fulfills the requirement of; ARTICLE 11, Section 17.17.060 CONDITIONAL USES, A. 5, commercial uses; and all requirements of ARTICLE 11, SECTION 17.17.080 through SECTION 17.17.130, (see below), as well as meeting the requirements of ARTICLE 11 GENERAL STANDARDS, SECTION 17.17.180, A.2, the conditional use fulfills all other requirements of this chapter pertaining to the conditional use in question; as follows:

SECTION 17.17.080 COMPLIANCE. - No building, structure, land or water area located within this special land use district shall hereafter be used or occupied, and no building, structure or part thereof shall hereafter be erected, constructed, reconstructed, moved, repaired, or structurally altered except in conformity with regulations in this chapter and D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. Plans conform with regulations in this chapter and D & S

Alaska Trail Rides Inc. does not propose any use stated in ARTICLE 11 SECTION 17.17.070, PROHIBITED USES.

SECTION 17.17.080 COMPLIANCE- D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. Plan is to haul five hundred gallons of water per day from Mt. McKinley Princess Lodge water system, for the use of watering the horses.

SECTION 17.17.090 BUILDING HEIGHT LIMITS. - The maximum building height shall be 35 feet above finished grade.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. plans a maximum height of 25 feet in our currently proposed buildings. The pole barn will be open sided with a roof, 20x64 with 1,280 square feet. Our storage vans and camp trailers are on wheels so they are moveable.

SECTION 17.17.100 LOT AREA. - The minimum lot area for any use shall be ten acres. The lot length to width ratio shall be a maximum of 1:3 and a minimum of 1:1.

The site proposed by D & S Alaska Trail rides Inc. is approximately 10 acres in size with length and width measurements nearly equal.

SECTION 17.17.110 SETBACK REQUIREMENTS; - Except for signs, no structure shall be erected within 75 feet of the right-of-way of the George Parks Highway. Proposed site plans locate our ten acres two and half miles from the George Parks Highway.

SECTION 17.17.120 VEGETATION BUFFER; - A natural vegetation buffer shall be maintained for a minimum of 50 feet from the right-of-way of the George Parks Highway.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. proposed facility will be located on ten acres SE1/4 SE1/4 SE1/4 S33 T28N, R5W,5M corner of Sam Turner and Sunny Kragness 160 acres, to the east of Mt. McKinley Princess Lodge. This area has natural buffer vegetation which will remain to an acceptable extent. D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. plans to keep the natural buffer vegetation.

SECTION 17.17.130 SIGNS, - no signs: on top of building, flashing, rotating, animated, or intermittent lighted. Signs also cannot exceed 32 square feet in area and are regulated by CFR's.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. proposes two sign possibilities. Our first proposal is to seek placement within the Parks Highway right of way to place a sign near the Mile 132 and Mile 130, within view of highway motorists. D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. understands that an airspace lease must be secured through the Alaska State Department of Transportation.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. planned operations meets all of the requirements stated in Article 11 Section 17.17.180 GENERAL STANDARDS,A;- the conditional use will not detract from the value, character, or integrity of Denali State Park:

Our proposed activities will add to the value, character, and integrity of Denali State Park (DSP) by creating a low impact means of access to acres of the park otherwise inaccessible. We anticipate using ten horses offering Denali State Park and Mat-Su Borough visitors sightseeing tours by guided horseback. Horses are an environmentally sound means of access to remote areas of the park. When compared to other means of access, long term impacts are negligible. Without the noise from a helicopter operations and other aircraft that would have flight paths over the remote reaches of Denali State Park and Denali National Park.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. proposal meets the requirement of ARTICLE 11 GENERAL STANDARDS, SECTION 17.17.180, A. 3, - granting the conditional use permit will not be harmful to the public health, safety, convenience and welfare; D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. proposed facility will enhance public health, safety, convenience, and welfare in several ways.

We would provide additional protection of sealed storage van to store our horse grain, making a safe place to store grain in without traction of bears.

We have the experience of fulfilling various needs for emergency response to the Denali State Park and Denali National Park. The addition of our horses based in this region of the would provide for an additional level of emergency response for residents as well as visitors to the northern reaches of the Mat-Su Borough. When weather prohibits helicopters and aircraft from flying.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. planned operations will provide several job opportunities for local residents. D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. prefers to hire locally if qualified applicants are available.

Local revenues will be realized by businesses in the area. D & S Alaska Trail Rides will seek local suppliers in the area for construction and operational requirements. Trickle down effects of revenue and wage earnings from D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. planned operations will provide economic benefits to the area indirectly.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. proposal meets all requirements of ARTICLE 11 SECTION 17.71.180, A.4; - sufficient access, setbacks, lot area, parking spaces, buffers, and other safeguards are being provided to meet the conditions; as follows:

Sufficient parking will be provided at Mt. McKinley Princess Lodge also and sufficient turnaround space will be provided at D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. ten acres trail head site.

Lot Area, Setbacks, and buffers are identified in previous descriptions above.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. proposal will meet the commissions requirements of ARTICLE 111, SECTION 17.17.180, A.5; - if the permit is for public use or structure,


the commission must find that the proposed use or structure is located in a manner which will maximize public benefits; D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. will maximize public benefit increasing the tourism infrastructure in the area.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. proposed location benefits the public immensely through close proximity to overnight lodging at the Mt. McKinley Princess Lodge and Mary's McKinley View Lodge. D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. would like to exercise our right of appeal under 11AAC02 to conduct horse back trail rides in Denali State Park on Curry Ridge. In your Denali State Park Master Plan it states in chapter 2 under goals & objectives.

3. **Provide Recreation Opportunities and Facilities** for present and future Alaska residents. Denali State Park is a major component of the state park system, which exists primarily to serve Alaska residents. Non-resident and tourist recreation can be provided in Denali State Park to the extent that it complements but does not significantly place recreation by residents.

*Provide those recreation facilities and uses that are most in demand given the regional status of the park and the existing recreation facilities in the area, including: campgrounds, campsites, and trail (hiking and cross-country skiing).

*Provide those recreation facilities and uses that take advantage of the special natural qualities of the park, such as views of Mt. McKinley, glaciers, wildlife, river corridors, lakes, and the Curry-Kesugi Ridge Landscape.

4. **Support the State's Tourism Industry**, which depends on both resident and non-resident visitors.

◦ Provide a diversity of recreation opportunities that fit with various tourist groups

* Provide a diversity of recreation facilities and opportunities that will encourage people to stay in the region longer, such as:
opportunities for self-guided activities, such as hour, half-day and day hikes.

Park Operations and Staffing Requirements


Funding Shortfalls. Recent budget cuts have severely limited the Division's ability to maintain and adequate management presence in the park. Present funding levels force rangers to confine their patrols primarily to the road corridor, limiting their ability to perform research, monitor back country used, and identify potential management problems. Facility maintenance has also been reduced in recent years. There is concern that new programs and facilities proposed in this plan will add major new responsibilities to and already stressed operational budget.

D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. has proposed guided horse back and wagon ride operation in Denali State Park. In your Denali State Park Master Plan it states the support of the tourism industry and trails for hikers. It does not specifically address a horse trail nor does not say a horse trail can not be installed in Denali State Park. Mr. Dale K. Bingham has denied D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. a commercial use permit to develop horse trails and to conduct horse back trail rides in Denali State Park. The State of Alaska Department of Natural Resources should support this activity in the Denali State Park. D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. will seek local suppliers in the area for construction and operational requirements, and will provide economic benefits to the area indirectly. The fees D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. will pay the State of Alaska for the use of the Denali State Park will help recent budget cuts, which has severely limited the division's ability to maintain and adequate management presence in the park.


SECTION or MSB 11.10.010 through 11.10.110 - D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. a guided horse riding and wagon ride operations will include sightseeing and trail riding in remote locations of Denali State Park. (see attach map)

SECTION or MSB 11.10.010 through 11.10.110 - 1.- f. Trails and campsites shall be kept clean. All garbage and foreign debris shall be eliminated by removal and complete burning unless otherwise authorized. D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. trash policy, that is all trash will be pack out and deposited in trash bin at the trail head base site.

SECTION or MSB 11.10.010 through 11.10.110 -6.1-C. 4.- Any proposed use which will be potentially damaging to the environment or hazardous to the health, safety or welfare of the public must be carefully reviewed. Discretion should be used when coordination with other agencies which, by law or other authority, share jurisdiction over the use. Examples of these types of activities include storage of flammable or explosive materials, activities which may significantly affect anadromous fish habitat. D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. policy for horse manure, the horse corral and stalls will be clean on a daily base's and horse manure will be hauled to Van Troba's Tree Farm where it will be mixed with other organic material and made into organic compost.

SECTION or MSB 11.10.010 through 11.10.110-1.-b. Existing roads and trails shall be used wherever possible. Existing trail widths shall be kept to the minimum necessary. Trail surface may be cleared of down and dead timber, stumps, and snags. Due care shall be used to avoid excessive scarring or removal of ground vegetation cover. D & S Alaska Trail Rides Inc. proposal meets all requirements of SECTION or MSB 11.10.010 through 11.10.110, 1. b. - the horse path shall be no wider than 18" path surface, the horse path will go around all standing trees no tree will be cut down or removed, limbs under ten feet above the ground surface and two half feet on each side of the path will be cut back so that the rider will not be hit. The use of existing moose trails will be used, all wet ground will be avoided to protect ground vegetation cover, a bridge or board path will be build where ever the ground condition requires it. Dead timber laying across the horse path will not be removed unless the timber is too high that a horse is unable to step over it, we are trying to preserve the paths as natural as possible.
