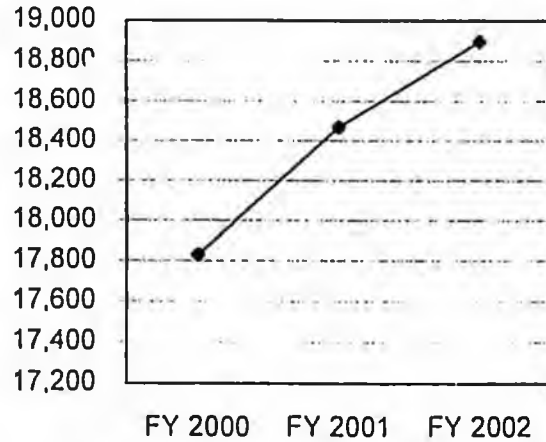

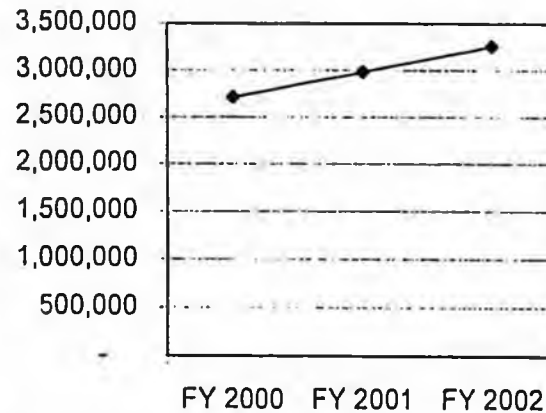
COMPARISON OF EFFECTS OF ASSESSED VALUATION ON STATE FUNDING

Mat-Su Borough School District

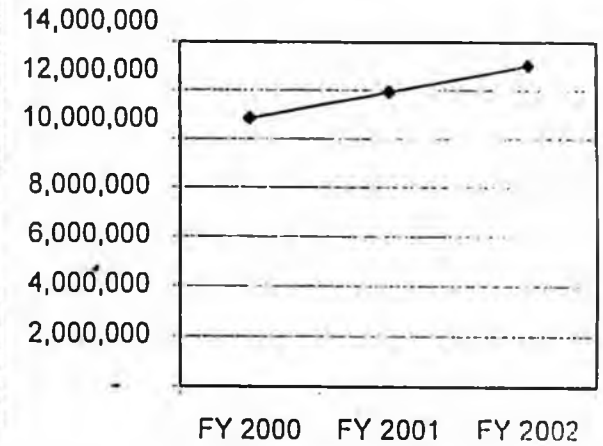
AVG DAILY MEMBERSHIP



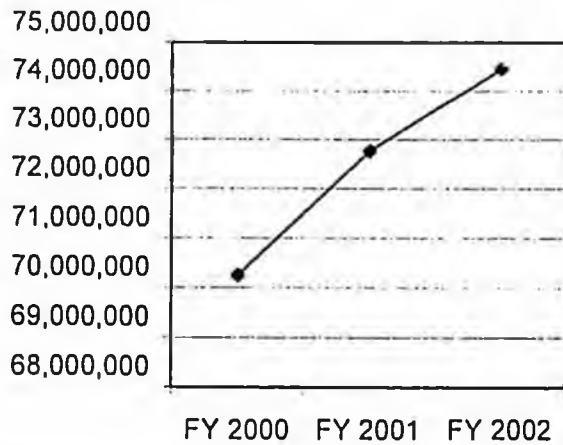
**ASSESSED VALUATION
(IN MILLIONS)**



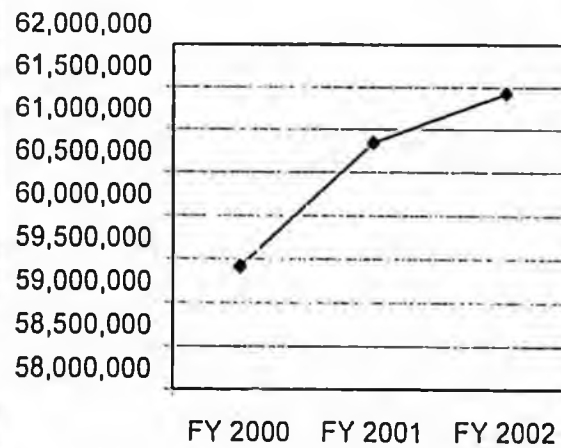
REQUIRED LOCAL CONTRIBUTION



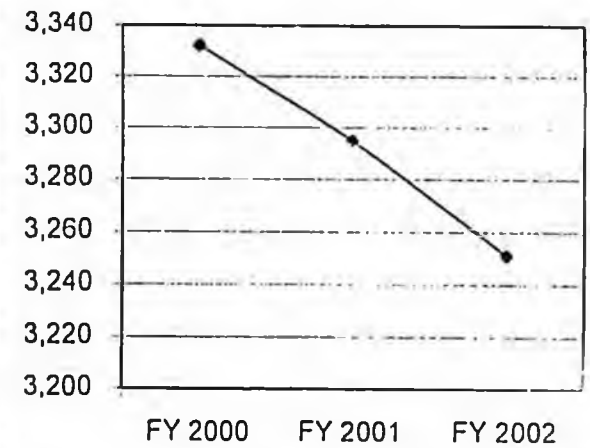

Dear Senator Donley:

As concerned citizen of the North Slope, I am writing in protest of Senate Bill (SB) 174. SB 174 directly targets the North Slope Borough School District (NSBSD) by making our school district the only one in the state that will not receive any state funding for our budget next year. Currently, our state funding is approximately \$9M. With our present staff, we are able to collect approximately two million dollars in grant awards. With this budget reduction, and the reduced staff that would likely result, our school district will struggle to maintain our current efforts to receive these additional grant funds.

In addition to the financial burden that this will create for the NSBSD, SB 174 directly violates the Alaska State Constitution. Specifically, Article VII, Section 1, provides that the legislature shall by general law establish and maintain a system of public schools open to all children of the State. This measure effectively deprives North Slope students of their constitutional rights.

Living in a rural school district, our students are not able to avail themselves of the advantages presented to students residing in Anchorage or Fairbanks. Students in Anchorage and Fairbanks enjoy cultural opportunities, such as the opportunity to visit a number of different museums and libraries. For our students, these opportunities are limited.

Residents of Anchorage and Fairbanks frequently speak about the "wealth, advantage and privilege" that is rumored to exist on the North Slope. For example, many are under the impression that our students enjoy an "Olympic-sized" swimming pool and their own aircraft. The half sized Pool was built as part of schools fire suppression system. The assertion of their own aircraft is simply not true and demonstrates the misconceptions that urban Alaska has about the North Slope School District.

SB 174 discriminates against the North Slope community. The majority of whom are Inupiat Eskimos. Let's give our children a chance. Education is important for all children in the State of Alaska, not a just select few. I feel we on the North Slope deserve the same consideration for funding as those in urban areas. Education of our next generation is one of our greatest responsibilities as Alaskans.

We must not forget that Alaska's children need to pass the current exit exam. . With reduced funding, the NSBSD will have increased difficulty in recruiting and retaining teachers and other staff members. Without the personal and professional advantages offered in typical urban communities, the North Slope School District already has a difficult time in filling our jobs with qualified, dedicated professionals. Simply living in a bush community presents challenges of its own. Residents of Anchorage and Fairbanks, and proponents of this legislation, take these facts for granted

I invite each and every one of the proponents of SB 174 to come to the North Slope in order to gather accurate information about our day-to-day life in this community. Many residents of Anchorage and Fairbanks refuse to travel to bush Alaska, even for a brief visit, because of the "harsh" life style and "lack of opportunity." Yet, they have no problem in pushing for legislation that will effectively take North Slope funds away from North Slope children and place them in the hands of the advantaged students in urban

Alaska. Again, our constitution requires our citizens to act responsibly and for the benefit of all of the children, and future leaders, of Alaska. I thank you for your time.

Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 180

“An act implementing pay differentials based on geographic areas for certain employees and for members of the Alaska State Defense Force....”

Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 180 adopts the most recent study to determine geographic differential payments for cost-of-living differences paid to state employees **who are not union members**. This legislation adopts the most current geographic differential report. The current statutory formula has not been updated since June 1976 and unfairly discriminates against some state employees while unfairly benefiting others. All union state employees are already under the new formula based on the most recent 1995 study. A similar change in law was passed by the legislature in 2000. That legislation contained other changes effecting public employees and was vetoed by the governor. This bill does not contain the provisions the governor cited as the reason for his veto of the 2000 bill.

The geographic differential calculation utilizes a percentage above a specific measurement baseline. In Alaska, Anchorage is the only federal measurement of the cost-of-living. Therefore, Anchorage is used as the baseline measurement for determining the cost-of-living in the various Alaska election districts and “out of state” locations. This legislation will affect employees in the executive branch of government in partially exempt service or not covered by union contract, and members of the Alaska State Defense Force whenever they are called to active service.

Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 180 effects employees hired on or after the effective date. Current employees will remain under AS 39.27.020, even if they leave and return to state employment after AS 39.27.021 goes into effect.

Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 180 purposely holds harmless other programs that use these statutory sections for calculation of revenue sharing cost-of-living adjustments. It also makes no change to the current differential applicable to state employees who work in another state.

Committee Substitute for Senate Bill 180 will ensure all new state employees receive fair pay adjustments based on a new fairer cost-of-living analysis.

Fiscal Notes indicate that immediate savings in FY 03 will be approximately \$55,000, increasing to \$370,000 by FY 08.

You have requested a sectional summary of the above-described bill. As a preliminary matter, note that a sectional summary of a bill should not be considered an authoritative interpretation of the bill and the bill itself is the best statement of its contents.

Sec. 1 amends AS 26.05.260(i) to provide that pay for members of the Alaska State Defense Force when on active state service will include the applicable geographic differential. The reference includes both the "old" (AS 39.27.020) and the "new" (AS 39.27.021) schedule.

Secs. 2 and 3 provide that state aid to municipalities will be figured using the "old" geographic pay differential schedule in AS 39.27.020.

Sec. 4 adds a new subsection to AS 39.27.020 to provide that the "old" schedule continues to apply to past or current state employees, even if they return to state employment at some time after AS 39.27.021 goes into effect. The "new" schedule only applies to a person who first begins to work for the state on or after July 1, 2002.

Sec. 5 enacts a new section setting out a "new" schedule of geographic pay differentials. Instead of providing that the pay differentials will be based on pay steps on the salary schedule (as the current AS 39.27.020 does), the new statute provides for percentage increases, except in the case of employees based outside the state. Positions in other states are to be paid at minus six pay steps. Pay differentials for positions in foreign countries are to be established by the director of personnel.

Sec. 6 contains technical amendments, reflecting the enactment of AS 39.27.021 (the new pay differential schedule) and deleting a reference to another statute for a definition of "election district."
