ANALYSIS CONTINUATION

The Department acquired 980 parcels statewide during 1999 to 2001 (an average of 327 parcels per year). Sixty-seven (67) parcels (7%) out of the 980 parcels were acquired through condemnation action.

On average, 23 parcels per year are acquired through condemnation action.

Currently there is one (1) Authority and Necessity (A&N) Challenge per year. If SB 278 passes the likelihood of A&N challenges to acquisitions will substantially increase due to new legal requirements to prove "reasonableness and due diligence."

Authority and Necessity (A&N) Challenges cost an average of \$36,500 per challenge to defend (based on Department of Law figures).

With passage of SB 278, we predict that the number of condemnation parcels will increase (from 7% to 14%) as well as an increase in A&N Challenges (18 to 46 A&N Challenges per year) for an estimate of \$657,000 to \$1,350,500* in legal fees to only defend against the challenges.

* 327 parcels per year at 7% condemnation rate = 23 parcels
23 parcels X 80% A&N Challenge rate = 18 parcels
18 parcels X \$36,500 = \$657,000 increased cost to defend.

* 327 parcels per year at 14% condemnation rate = 46 parcels
46 parcels X 80% A&N Challenge rate = 37 parcels
37 parcels X \$36,500 = \$1,350,500 increased cost to defend.

Notes:

- The property owner does not prevail with the A&N Challenge they will be responsible for their legal fees.
- If the State loses the A&N Challenge, then the property owner's legal fees will be paid by the State.

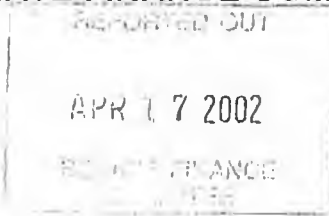

ANALYSIS CONTINUATION

AKDOT&PF acquires approximately 500 parcels a year. The department estimates that at least 50% of the property owners would contract for their own appraisals if AKDOT&PF was paying for them. The average cost per appraisal is \$2,500. 250 parcels X \$2,500 = \$625,000 per year. The increased cost of property acquisition will cause a reduction in the amount of capital funding available for design and construction of projects. The Department is unable to determine if federal project sponsors will participate in funding the increased right-of-way costs.

The Department would not have any control over the performance of the appraisal or the complexity of the assignment. This bill is also likely to result in the delay of projects.

ANALYSIS CONTINUATION

AKDOT&PF acquires approximately 500 parcels a year. The department estimates that at least 50% of the property owners would contract for their own appraisals if AKDOT&PF was paying for them. The average cost per appraisal is \$2,500. 250 parcels X \$2,500 = \$625,000 per year. The increased cost of property acquisition will cause a reduction in the amount of capital funding available for design and construction of projects. The Department is unable to determine if federal project sponsors will participate in funding the increased right-of-way costs.

The Department would not have any control over the performance of the appraisal or the complexity of the assignment. This bill is also likely to result in the delay of projects.

Sponsor Statement Senate Bill 278

Taking Property By Eminent Domain

The enactment of this bill will bring fairness and expediency to government and other condemning authorities that require the acquisition of private lands for public uses. This bill is not trying to remove the authority of the state to take land by eminent domain. It will simply add a provision to ensure there is a "reasonable and diligent effort" made by government agencies to negotiate with property owners before land is claimed under eminent domain.

It is reasonable to require a government entity to make a "reasonable and diligent effort" to negotiate with the landowner on a value and price prior to taking the property. Someone that does not have the financial ability or an understanding of the legal process could be overwhelmed with the bureaucracy and be at a disadvantage in trying to protect his or her property rights.

By requiring a "reasonable and diligent effort" to justify the state's authority of eminent domain, the landowner will have the benefit of full disclosure of information used by the state to determine the public purpose and legitimate value before property can be taken.

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Sectional Analysis of SB 278

Title 09.55.240-460 constitutes the statutory proceedings regarding the state's authority of eminent domain. Under present law, property owners whose land is to be condemned are faced with an unfairly steep barrier when trying to negotiate a fair settlement with the state. This bill will require that the state make a "reasonable and diligent effort" to negotiate equitably when trying to purchase land from private citizens through eminent domain.

Sec. 1: AS 09.55.270 lists the matters that any condemning authority must prove before it can condemn property through a judicial eminent domain complaint. The statute is amended by adding subsection (4) that requires the state to make a "reasonable and diligent effort" when trying to purchase land through eminent domain.

Sec. 2: AS 09.55.420-460 deals with "declarations of taking" which differ from eminent domain complaints in that once a declaration is filed, the property is taken immediately, rather than after judicial proceedings are completed. Before 1976, the state could take land under a declaration of taking without proving the necessity for the taking. In 1976, however, the legislature added subsection (7), which required the declaration to contain a statement explaining how the taking was necessary. Section 2 further amends the statute to add a subsection (8) to include a statement verifying that, where possible, the condemning authority has made a "reasonable and diligent effort" to purchase the land.





Sec. 3: AS 09.55.460 authorizes the court to divest the authority of its new title if it is ultimately shown that the taking was not necessary. Section 3 would amend AS 09.55.460(b) by authorizing the court to also divest the condemnor of title when it was ultimately shown that a "reasonable and diligent effort" to purchase the property had not been made. Without Section 3, Section 2 of the bill would be meaningless, since the state would be obliged to make a statement that the "reasonable and diligent effort" requirement had been met but the landowner would have no remedy in any case where the statement proved untrue.

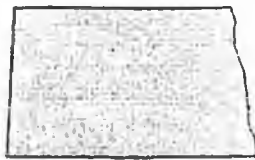



Dear Senator Wilken:

The State of Alaska Department of Transportation recently took a portion of my property to use for a road construction project. I would like to make you aware of my experience with them.

1. Prior to condemnation being filed, the person representing the State was courteous but misleading in attempting to convince me to accept a settlement that was completely unfair.
2. Prior to condemnation being filed, the State appraiser provided no meaningful information. She was quite insistent about her authority to be on my property and utilize space in a business located in the mall for her office. She was deceptively courteous and misleading in her attempt to promote an unfair evaluation of the property.
3. The State did not provide me a copy of their completed appraisal report and Market Data Book.
4. I was unable to settle with the State based on that appraisal because the compensation was totally inadequate and unfair.
5. The appraisal did not fairly set forth the value of the Taking and the consequences to the Remainder Property.
6. In the appraisal of my property, the "Before the Taking Value" was based on the current use of the property rather than the "Highest and Best Use" of the property.
7. The following items were not fairly considered when analyzing the effects of the Right-of-Way Taking on my property:
 - a. Loss of parking
 - b. Change in Highest and Best Use
 - c. Decline in Market Appeal
 - d. Change in the Business Use of the property
 - e. Decline in Market Value
8. When it became apparent the State was misleading and unfair in their attempts to reach settlement, I hired an attorney and an appraiser to provide me accurate and fair counsel.
9. The State appraiser concluded that just compensation for the property taken and damages was \$80,229. The appraiser for North Gate Square and Philip Evans concluded that just compensation for property taken and damages was \$676,000. As a consequence, we proceeded to hearing.
10. Frank King, an appraiser, was appointed by the State to preside over the Master's Hearing. At the conclusion of the Hearing, Mr. King rendered a decision awarding \$324,000, for property taken and damages. Although this was approximately half of the amount sought, I decided rather than continue with litigation I would settle. The State subsequently appealed.

- (7) "direct supervision" means that the licensed supervisor is physically present at the same site as the apprentice while dispensing optician tasks are being performed by the apprentice under the supervision of the supervisor;
- (8) "division" means the division of occupational licensing;
- (9) "eyeglasses" has the same meaning given the term "spectacles" in this section;
- (10) "jurisdiction" means a licensing board or administrative agency of this state, another state, territory or possession of the United States, responsible for issuing licenses and maintaining records for dispensing opticians;
- (11) "licensed supervisor" or "supervisor" means a licensed dispensing optician, optometrist, or ophthalmologist that provides direct supervision to an apprentice;
- (12) "spectacles" means an external prosthetic appliance for the correction or relief of an optical or visual defect;
- (13) "supervision" has the same meaning as in AS 08.71.240.

SPONSOR STATEMENT

Senate Bill 279 Sport Fishing Licenses for 9/11 Responders

On September 11th, the United States experienced terrorist attacks within its borders. These attacks were not only on the United States, but on the entire civilized world; citizens of more than 80 countries perished.

Senate Bill 279 authorizes the Commissioner of Fish and Game to issue up to 250 complimentary sport fishing licenses and salmon tags, as appropriate, per year to firemen, police, and EMTs who responded to the events on September 11th, 2001 at the World Trade Center in New York and the Pentagon in Washington D.C. and their spouses. This section would sunset on December 31st, 2003.

This bill would be a small gift that the State of Alaska could make to those brave men and women who served so admirably in the shadow of these horrible events.

(5) intentionally or negligently engaged in or permitted the performance of patient care by persons under the licensee's supervision which does not conform to minimum professional standards regardless of whether actual injury to the patient occurred;

(6) continued to practice after becoming unfit due to

(A) professional incompetence;

(B) addiction or severe dependency on alcohol or other drugs which impairs the licensee's ability to practice safely;

(C) physical or mental disability;

(7) engaged in lewd or immoral conduct in connection with the delivery of professional service to patients;

(8) participated in the division, assignment, rebate or refund of fees to a physician or optometrist in consideration of patient referrals;

(9) advertised the services of any other segment of the healing arts.

Sec. 08.71.180. Practicing without a license. A person may not practice as a dispensing optician without a license issued under this chapter or while the person's license is suspended or revoked. A person who violates this section is guilty of a class B misdemeanor.

ARTICLE 4. MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

200. Contact lenses

Sec. 08.71.200. Contact lenses. Contact lenses shall be fitted in conjunction with and under the supervision of a licensed physician or an optometrist and with a written contact-lens prescription showing that the prescription may be filled for contact lenses and requiring that the patient return to see the prescribing physician or optometrist. In no case may contact lenses be prepared by neutralizing a person's eyeglasses or spectacles.

ARTICLE 5. GENERAL PROVISIONS.

(1) limit or restrict a licensed physician or optometrist from the practices enumerated in this chapter, and each licensed physician and optometrist has all the rights and privileges which may accrue under this chapter to dispensing opticians licensed under it;

(2) prohibit an unlicensed person from performing mechanical work upon inert matter in any optical office, laboratory or shop;

(3) prohibit an unlicensed person from engaging in the sale of eyeglasses, spectacles, magnifying glasses, goggles, sunglasses, telescopes, binoculars, or any like articles which are completely preassembled and sold only as merchandise;

(4) authorize or permit a licensee under this chapter to hold out as being able to, or to offer to, or to attempt by any means, to refract or exercise eyes, diagnose, treat, correct, relieve, operate or prescribe for any human ailment, deficiency, deformity, disease or injury.

Sec. 08.71.240. Definitions. In this chapter

(1) "board" means the Board of Dispensing Opticians;

(2) "department" means the Department of Community and Economic Development;

(3) "dispensing optician" means a person who, on written prescription from a licensed physician or optometrist, prepares and dispenses to the intended wearer or person who writes the prescription, original or duplicate lenses, eyeglasses, contact lenses, and appurtenances to them, and interprets, measures, adapts, fits, and adjusts lenses, eyeglasses, contact lenses, and appurtenances to them in accordance with the written prescription, to the face for the aid or correction of visual or ocular anomalies of the human eye;

(4) "supervision" means the provision of any needed direction, control, consultation, instruction, evaluation, and personal inspection of work being performed.

NEW YORK—Love came to New York City in boxes of grapefruit, heaps of homemade quilts and 17 tons of macaroni and cheese.

Supporters have donated hundreds of millions of dollars since the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. But when a check didn't quite express the right sentiment, they sent, well, just about everything else.

The city has received three firetrucks, including the 29-foot, 42,000-pound pumper sent from Louisiana last week to replace some of the 35 trucks lost in the attacks.

Many gave practical items, like the Kansas elementary school students who brought work socks and lip balm for rescue workers this week. A group of Iowans sent 1,500 quilts. Florida schoolchildren collected mittens.

High school students from North Dakota brought 229,320 servings of macaroni and cheese.

"We were going to send money, but then we thought North Dakota is famous for its pasta, so why don't we send something that really shows what we do and where we're from," said Morgan Greaves, 15.

She and eight other students delivered the 17 tons of macaroni to City Harvest, a New York organization that feeds the needy and provides meals to workers at the World Trade Center site.

Eleven citrus growers in Texas sent 26,000 grapefruits last week. The 30,000 pounds of fruit were unloaded in a parking lot at Yankee Stadium.

"We're known down here for growing the Texas red grapefruit," said Lucy Garcia, a spokeswoman for TexaSweat Citrus Marketing. "More than money, we wanted to give them a taste of Texas."

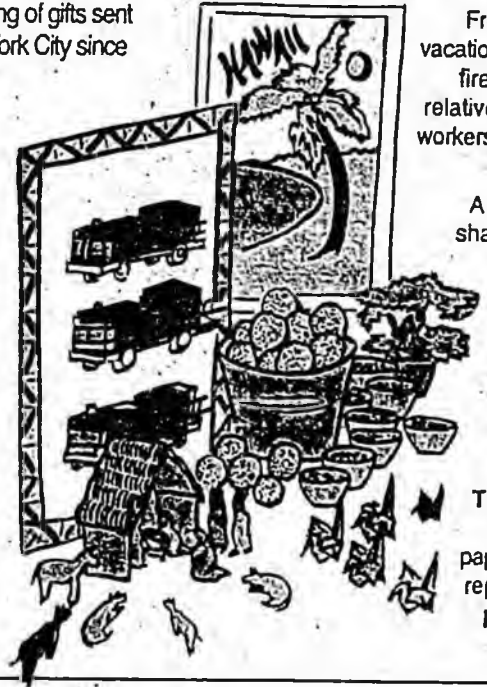

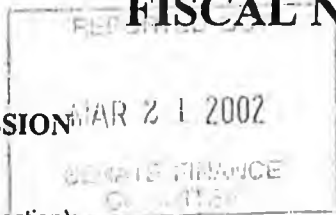

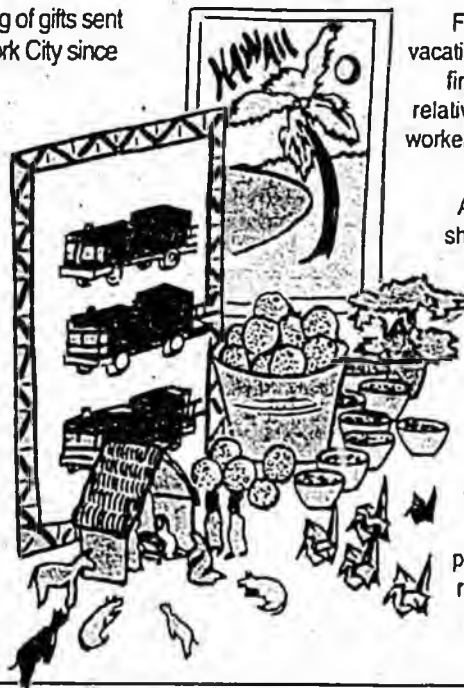

CS SB 280(RES) "An Act permitting grants to certain regulated public utilities for water quality enhancement projects and water supply and wastewater systems."

Sponsor: Senator Gene Therriault

Sponsor Statement

Under current law, privately owned public water and wastewater utilities are not eligible to participate in grants made under AS 46.03.030(b), "water quality enhancement, water supply, sewage and solid waste facilities grants." This places the ratepayers of privately owned utilities at a disadvantage when compared to the ratepayers of municipally owned utilities.

CS SB 280(RES) provides for the inclusion of privately owned water and wastewater utilities in the State's water and wastewater grant program if its rates are regulated by the Regulatory Commission of Alaska. The Senate Resources Committee version removes criteria inserted in the Senate Labor & Commerce Committee that the utility serve "as the primary utility for a municipality."

Regulation by the RCA insures that all of the economic benefits of the grants are passed on to the ratepayers. The Legislature passed a similar measure in 2000, HB 304, which provided for participation by regulated, privately owned water and wastewater utilities in the State's low interest revolving loan fund.

As is currently the case with municipally owned utilities, the bill would allow privately owned utilities to make utility infrastructure improvements without forcing ratepayers to pay the full burden through increased rates. Additionally, the bill would increase the ability of the utility to expand into areas that are on the peripheral of existing systems, thereby providing water and wastewater services to families that are currently on wells and septic systems.

CS SB 280 (RES) makes grants available to public water and sewer utilities for water and wastewater projects only. Grants for solid waste processing, disposal or resource recovery systems would remain available only to municipalities.

CS SB 280(RES), "An Act permitting grants to certain regulated public utilities for water quality enhancement projects and water supply and wastewater systems."

Sectional Analysis

Section 1

AS 46.03.030(b)

Allows a public utility as defined in section (i) of the bill, in addition to municipalities, to receive water quality enhancement, water supply and sewage facilities grants through the Department of Environmental Conservation. Grants can be used for water quality enhancement projects; a public water supply, treatment or discharge system; or a wastewater collection, treatment or discharge system.

Section 2

AS 46.03.030(e)

Maintains the current match ratio of:

- 85% of eligible costs for a municipality with a population of 1,000 persons or less;
- 70% of eligible costs for a municipality with a population of 1,001 to 5,000 ;
- 50% of eligible costs for a municipality with a population greater than 5,000

Section 3

AS 46.03.030(i)

Defines a utility that is eligible for a grant under 46.03.030(b)(1)-(3) as a public water and sewer utility whose rates are regulated by the Regulatory Commission of Alaska under 42.05. Removes the criteria inserted in CSSB 280 (L&C) that the utility serve "as the primary utility for a municipality."

Attached is a copy of Senate Bill 280, which I introduced February 6, 2002. The bill will allow privately owned public utilities that are regulated by the Regulatory Commission of Alaska to apply for grants under AS 46.03.030(b).

It is my understanding from discussions with the owners of privately owned utilities in Fairbanks that the stipulation requiring utilities be regulated by the Regulatory Commission of Alaska in order to be eligible for a grant, will ensure that the benefits of the grant are passed on to ratepayers. I would like to request an opinion from your office as to whether that statement is correct. Stated another way, would regulated utilities get any depreciation or rate of return on grant funds expended under this bill?

SB 280 is scheduled for its first hearing Tuesday, February 19, 2002. If at all possible, I would appreciate a response prior to that time so that I can provide the committee with the information.
