Dear Senators Green and Wilken:

The following questions were raised at the Senate Finance Committee meeting for the Department of Health and Social Services on February 24, 2003.

- *What is paid for in Foster Care Base Rate, Foster Care Augmented and Foster Care Special Needs?*

The Foster Care Base Rate program reimburses foster parents for the basic ongoing costs of raising a child such as food, clothing, and shelter; daily supervision normally carried out by a parent; personal and grooming items; school supplies and regular school activities; age appropriate games, toys, books, and recreational equipment; general recreation such as picnics, community sports, and movies; usual transportation expense; allowance; babysitting and child care.

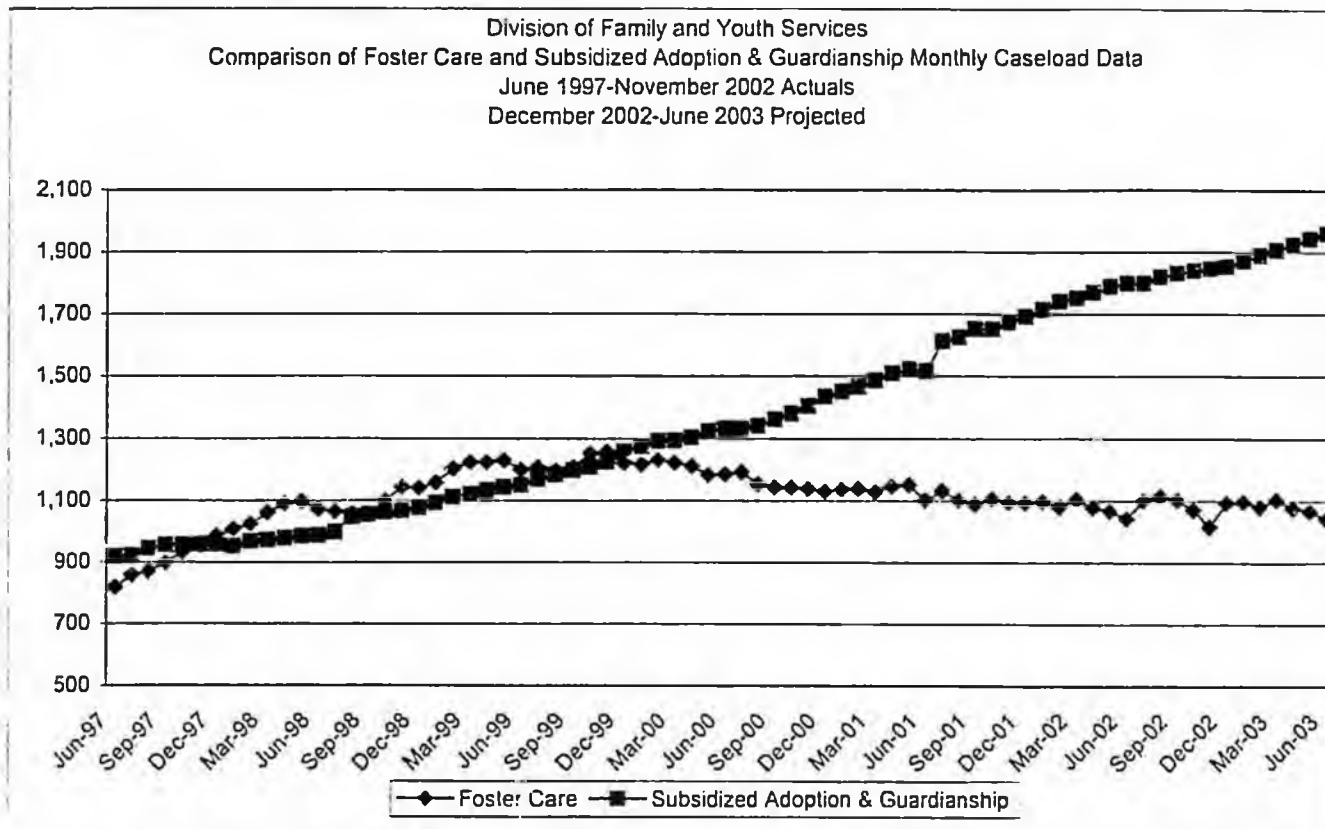
The Augmented Foster Care program reimburses foster care providers for necessary on-going costs that are not covered by the foster care base rate benefit. Examples of these costs include difficulty of care maintenance payments, teen parents, sibling groups of 3 or more children, and medically fragile children.

The Foster Care Special Needs program reimburses providers for pre-approved "one time" or "irregular" expenditures authorized that are not covered by foster care base rate benefits and that have been assessed on an as-needed basis. Examples of services include licensed childcare to enable foster care providers to work or to attend court hearings, case conferences, or training events; extraordinary clothing for medically fragile children as well as initial clothing for a new placement. The Foster Care Special Needs component also provides funding for contracted services such as drug testing, foster parent training, foster parent fingerprinting and criminal history record checks.

- *Senator Taylor asked DHSS to provide an analysis of Foster Care per capita for Alaska as compared to other states for the last 10 years. He is interested in understanding the philosophy of the program whether it is to remove children rather than promote Family Preservation.*

At this time the Division is unable to provide the per capita information and is exploring the possibility that the Child Welfare League of America may be able to provide per capita data for Alaska on children in out-of-home care. The Division will continue its attempts to gather this information.

- *Please provide an updated chart, showing a longer-term pattern on the comparison of Foster Care and Subsidized Adoption & Guardianship Monthly Caseloads.*



- *What is the average age for the two client groups in GRA?*

The average age of individuals for indigent burials is 61 and for applicants receiving emergency assistance 43.

- *Provide a comparison between what DJJ requested for the Kenai Youth Facility to what was funded (partial year) for Ketchikan and Mat-su was requested.*

The Kenai Supplemental request includes 1.5 months of PS costs for the Superintendent and the Unit Leader positions and one month's worth of PS costs for all other PCN's including youth counselor positions, maintenance position, administrative support staff. The division has some flexibility with this

supplemental request although will incur utility and associated maintenance costs for this fiscal year once the KPYF is constructed. Reduction in the supplemental will result in hiring delays for the lead positions and commensurate delays in hiring line staff and completion of necessary mandatory staff training in order to be able to accept juveniles into the program by the beginning of FY '04.

- *Is DJJ obligated to pay for what ever a youth in detention needs? Is there a medical review group that makes a decision on what DJJ will pay for? What is the policy on paying for medical items? Aren't most of the kids in Bethel covered under IHS (not Medicaid IHS, but regular IHS); why do we have to pay for the medical care?*

DJJ pursues other forms of payment for resident health care if/when possible, including checking with parents to determine if they have health insurance to pick up the cost. The division's facilities do not have a medical review team that makes a decision on what we will pay for and what we will not pay for. The system that each facility utilizes is to have the DJJ facility nurse examine the youth to determine if there is a medical problem. If the nurse determines that there is a serious medical concern that requires physician follow-up, the nurse refers the youth to the contracted medical doctor. Each DJJ youth facility adheres to a set of policies and procedures. Although there are slight variations in wording for the different facility policies, I have included the relevant medical policies from both the Bethel Youth Facility and the McLaughlin Youth Center's policies and procedures manual.

As for whether Alaska Native residents in secure youth facilities are covered by the Indian Health Service, we have verified that "IHS is payer of last resort under federal law (including Medicaid). The basic concept is that American Indians and Alaska Natives (AI/AN) are state residents in the manner as others living in a state and so if the state covers health care for other residents (state facilities - like API - corrections, juvenile justice, CAMA) that the AI/AN populations must be treated as others are treated and that IHS is not required to pay for health care." This information from Medical Assistance is consistent with DJJ's experience, which has been that Indian Health Service does not pay for resident care when they are in secure youth facilities.

- *Charts are provided for Bethel and Nome YF showing bed count information. These charts are to help clarify the over capacity these youth facilities are facing.*

Bethel's data is compelling in and of itself. Additionally, there has been a significant increase in the level of referrals in the Bethel/Y-K Delta region in FY '03. The number of unclassified felonies thus far in FY '03 is nearly three times the number received in FY '02. The residents in the detention unit at BYF are there for very serious offenses, including attempted murder, sexual assaults, weapons charges and other serious crimes against persons. The detention unit reached its all time high count a few weeks ago when it had 22 residents in an eight-bed unit. Today, the detention count on that same unit is 18, with four residents having been transferred to Fairbanks Youth Facility.

- *What does it take to have a safe facility and why was the decision made to add extra staff in Nome?*

As was stated in the original backup included with the supplemental request for Nome, the funding for staffing this facility when it re-opened is insufficient for a secure 24/7 youth facility. The facility's consistently high resident count this fiscal year, coupled with the level of seriousness of the offenses for youths on the unit has required the addition of one Youth Counselor on the graveyard shift. This is a minimum staffing level for a stand-alone detention unit that does not have access to backup staff from another unit within the facility.

- *Senator Stevens asked for more information on the Options List, what recipients pay, what the state pays and what the feds pay. A detailed explanation of Long-Term Care Noninstitutional Services and Personal Care Services in a Recipients Home was also requested.*

More information has been requested regarding the Medicaid options list under AS 47.07.035. We have provided below a corrected, final of the DRAFT list previously distributed. Please note the changes that have been made:

- expenditures reported under Personal Care Services was in error. The report cell included reference to Clinic Services inflating the amount by \$14 million;
- a typographical error adding an extra digit to the end of the recipient number for State Only Adopted Children has been deleted;
- under the subheading "Eligibility Groups" have been rolled up into the below 150% federal poverty level subtotal for clarity; and
- expenditures at the enhanced (Title XXI; Breast and Cervical Cancer) match rate have been shaded for distinction.

It is implicit that elimination of the services listed on the options list will not result in a cost savings equal to the amount provided on this chart. Each service cut will result in expenditure growth under mandatory services. A good example is adult dental services provided for severe pain and infection only. An adult who cannot call a dentist for relief because the services have been cut from the Medicaid plan will have no choice but to turn to hospital and physician services.

 - f) hospice services,
 - g) services provided to a Medicare recipient, and
 - h) services provided in an IHS facility

In addition, more detailed information was requested regarding Personal Care Services and Long-Term Care Non-Institutional Services:

Option #18 Personal Care Services (7 AAC Article 16)

Personal care services are provided for a beneficiary in the home or in an assisted living home that "enable an individual whose needs would otherwise require placement in an acute or long term care facility to remain safely in that individual's own home." 7AAC 43.750. In-home care typically costs significantly less than institutional care.

To qualify for personal care attendant services adults must meet the Medical Assistance Standards for marital status and family size, and must meet the treatment plan criteria under 7 AAC 43.765.

Coverage is provided to, for example, adults who develop muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, have spinal cord injuries, strokes or other debilitating conditions. These individuals require assistance with basic daily living activities and may or may not have further medical needs requiring professional medical attention. Enrollees who receive personal care services may or may not qualify for waivers. In other words, a Medicaid recipient may receive personal care services and waiver services.

A personal care attendant provides services that meet the beneficiary's basic needs i.e., personal hygiene, bladder and bowel requirements, self-administered medication, eating including meal preparation, light housekeeping essential to the client's health, accompaniment to medical clinic, assistance with transferring a client to and from bed or wheel chair, assistance with exercises and positioning, care of non-sterile dressings, assistance with shopping, assistance with the use of respiratory equipment, or general maintenance of a plaster cast.

Personal care services are provided by personal care attendants. There are 165 personal care attendants enrolled in Medicaid. They can be individual workers or work for an organization, the biggest of which are: Access Alaska, Inc., Job Ready, Inc., Center for Community, Consumer Direct Services, and Alaska Home Care.

Option #21 Long-Term Care Non-institutional Services (7 AAC Article 25)

Home and Community Based Services Waivers (HCB) are provided for Medicaid beneficiaries that need nursing home or intermediate care facility levels of care. The Older Alaskan's Waiver, Adults with Physical Disabilities Waiver, and the Mental Retardation and Developmentally Disabled Waivers meet the needs of the adult population under this option. Beneficiaries are physically, mentally, and/or developmentally disabled.

Care is provided to individuals who require specific medical care above and beyond daily living activities including monitoring, medicating, and evaluation. For example, an adult who has developed muscular dystrophy or multiple sclerosis; has spinal cord injuries; or has had a stroke.

Each individual's needs are complicated by long term medical conditions that require supervision by a Registered Nursing and/or Medical Doctor -- a person who has had a stroke leaving them with impairment, a person with difficult-to-manage diabetes who cannot inject insulin or perform testing, a person who is bed bound, or a person who need constant supervision because they can no longer discern what is or is not dangerous in their environment

Waivered services are provided by 833 providers the largest of which are Hope Community Resources, Inc., Frontier Community Services, ARC of Anchorage, Fairbanks Resource Agency, and Alaska Specialized Education and Training. Of the 833 providers enrolled, over half of the waiver expenditures fall within the scope of these five provider groups. It should be noted that waiver service cuts listed on the options list include only those provided to adults who do not qualify for SSI disability status or have not received disability status. All enrollees with disability status and children and elderly would receive the required services provided through waivers via the core Medicaid program.

Waiver services include care coordination, chore services, environmental modifications, meals, special equipment and supplies, transportation, adult day care, etc. In addition, persons receiving personal care services and waived services also receive other Medicaid services i.e., acute care, nursing home care, durable medical equipment and supplies, pharmaceuticals, rehabilitation services, and mental health services.

Services provided include ongoing care coordination including routine monitoring and support, plan of care revisions, chore services, adult day care services, transportation, residential supported living services, habilitation services, education, supported employment, intensive active treatment, respite care, and meals.


- *The question was also asked why the department had not done more cost containment rather than seek a supplemental. A great deal of work has been dedicated to cost containment above and beyond standard on-going cost containment measures, and the work has been absorbed within current departmental resources.*

Almost all cost containment options require regulation, state plan and/or statutory changes to be implemented. Therefore, a variety of timing issues conspire against successful and swift implementation. For example, the recent changes when adopted to the pharmacy program required a state plan amendment that took over 6 months for federal approval, many take up to a year or more. The recent Chronic and Acute Medical Assistance regulation changes took 6 months from the drafting process to the effective date. In addition, Medicaid payments are only as timely and accurate as provider billing practices. The average "lag time" from the date a service is provided to the date a service is paid is three months. Therefore, even after all necessary requirements for implementation are met, it will be at least another three to four months before any savings will be realized.

The cost containment regulations recently adopted and filed are, for the most part, sentinel in their effect and include eligibility verification factors, limited hospital stays, prior authorization requirements for certain drugs, a rate change for Residential Psychiatric Treatment Center transition days, changes to estate recovery guidelines, and new guidelines for intentional program violations or fraud. These regulations go into effect March 26, 2003. Any resulting relief will not be felt until FY04 and will be extremely difficult to measure because of the sentinel effect.

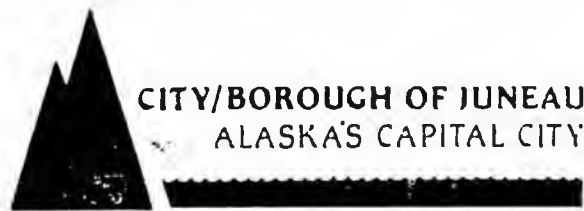

This letter is to request your support of SB76 (Section 12c.), which would expeditiously pass through to the City and Borough of Juneau, grant funds provided by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for the acquisition of 148 acres of land adjacent to Herbert River.

The property is a key inholding between Eagle Beach State Park and Amalga Meadows Park. In April 2002, the Juneau Assembly directed staff to apply for grants to help with the acquisition. Through the efforts of Southeast Alaska Land Trust and other supporting groups, a National Coastal Wetland Conservation Grant was obtained in the amount of \$553,000 from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. That grant has been directed to the State of Alaska to be passed through to the City and Borough of Juneau.

Juneau's Assembly is scheduled to accept the \$553,000 grant and appropriate matching funds at its meeting on Monday, March 10, 2003. We are eager to receive the grant funds from the state legislature so that we may complete the acquisition of this important inholding as soon as possible.

Today I am transmitting two supplemental appropriation bills for Fiscal Year 2003. This bill is sometimes referred to as the "fast track" supplemental bill because it includes items that have particularly tight time requirements that are not accommodated by the usual passage of supplemental appropriations later in the spring.


As you know, the Legislature's staff estimated the expected supplemental would total \$140 million. The two bills we are submitting total \$63.3 million. Our goal was to include general fund supported requests for circumstances that were not within management's control, such as disasters, caseload growth in formula-driven programs, and increased fuel costs.

We are also requesting Federal funds of \$19.8 million to begin three urgently needed highway projects sooner than waiting for the Fiscal Year 2004 capital budget. Two of the fast track supplemental requests are due to programs that were short-funded in last year's budget: subsidized adoptions and foster care special needs. The subsidized adoption program was funded \$2 million less than the department's projection. It now appears that a total of \$2.8 million more will be needed this year to meet state obligations to parents who have adopted children with special needs. The foster care special needs program was short-funded \$445,300, while now, due to additional caseload growth, a total of \$615,300 is required.

SPONSOR STATEMENT HOUSE BILL 101

An Act making a special appropriation for a grant to Arctic Power to promote the opening of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge for oil and gas development; and providing for an effective date.

House Bill 101 appropriates \$3 million in general funds to Arctic Power to use in its campaign to secure necessary support in the United States Senate to pass legislation opening ANWR to oil exploration. The Budget Reconciliation Bill will be considered early in this Congressional session and it is important that Arctic Power be active in its promotion of opening ANWR throughout the early part of 2003.

House Bill 101 also appropriates \$100,000 in general funds to the native village of Kaktovik for their community outreach effort to gain support for the opening of ANWR from Congressional members in Washington, D.C.

Our Congressional delegation believes that they may have the support to pass ANWR language this year. The educational efforts provided by Arctic Power could very well tip the scales in Alaska's favor whenever that vote reaches the Senate floor.

With the long-term decrease in state revenue from existing fields, it is imperative that Alaska develop additional new fields in the future. ANWR is an important part of our fiscal future.

This appropriation will assist in reaching that goal.

Sponsor Statement

The Alaska Regional Development Organizations (ARDOR) Program is the State's contribution to regional initiatives for developing Alaska's economy. In 1988, the Legislature recognized that a locally driven initiative, in partnership with the State, is the most effective approach to creating and sustaining a strong and healthy economy. The Legislature established the ARDOR Program to create a network of organizations to plan and support economic development at the regional level.

There are currently 14 ARDOR's. The ARDORs, like their counterparts nationwide:

- Enable local officials and businesses to pool their limited resources and work together on economic development issues,
- Develop partnerships among public, private and other organizations, and
- Provide needed technical assistance via direct links with local citizens.

It's not the State trying to determine what's best for the region; rather, it's the residents and those doing business in the region working together to create their economic future.

The ARDOR Program is providing a return for the State's investment. The State provides \$620,000 in grant funds for the ARDOR Program. The accomplishments of the ARDORs are impressive. Additionally, the ARDORs have used \$620,000 in State grant funds to leverage over \$3.6 million in other funds.

Board members participation reflects a local commitment to the ARDOR Program. The 14 ARDOR boards, each with 10-20 members, constitutes 150 plus local, civic-minded individuals who volunteer their time to achieve a stronger economic base in their region.

The original intent of the ARDOR Program was to create regional entities that could improve the local economy and eliminate region-wide economic development barriers. The ARDORs are meeting this legislative intent. The ARDORs work on a wide range of projects. Some, like Anchorage's "Military Hub Study" have regional or statewide impacts. Other projects, such as the Arctic Development Council's Revolving Loan Fund, assist individuals and businesses.

This legislation would extend the sunset date to July 1, 2008.



ARCTIC POWER ANWR CAMPAIGN 2003

The pages that follow represent the identified needs associated with a campaign to authorize oil and gas exploration and development of the Coastal Plain through the budget resolution and reconciliation process. The campaign will rely on the following:

- _ Hand-in-hand coordination with the delegation's internal efforts.
- _ Hand-in-hand coordination with the Administration.
- _ Hand-in-hand coordination with the activities of labor and other external groups.

The tasks and associated budget include the following assumptions:

- _ A campaign that began January 1, 2003 will likely peak during the March - May time frame and continue through the remainder of the first session of the 108th Congress.
- _ A campaign based on efforts within the Administration, the United States Senate and the House of Representatives.
- _ An understanding that media efforts will not include television advertising.
- _ The recognition that although this is a broad based effort being shouldered mainly by Alaskans, it will pale in comparison to that being spent by national environmental groups.
- _ Only expenses incurred during the 2003 campaign will be reimbursed to Arctic Power. All unexpended and unobligated grant funds will remain with the State of Alaska.

ANWR - PROGRAM DETAIL

1. Member Education:

Arctic Power will continue efforts to visit with Members of Congress to educate them on the issue and put materials in front of them. Visits will be coordinated with Alaskans, Alaska Natives, and labor as needed. Majority of cost will be for constituent travel. Where possible, donations will be sought.

2. External Groups:

Arctic Power will continue working with labor through Job Power to work on member visits, in-state activities, and phone banking and constituent mail. Continue the effort with Veteran's groups. Effort will include the broadening and maintenance of a broad-based coalition in support of ANWR. Will also include potential inside-the-beltway media efforts if needed.

3. Faces of ANWR Campaign:

Arctic Power will continue to seek out organizations to participate in the "Faces of ANWR" effort. They will produce educational and promotional materials to put in front of Members of Congress and media. Campaign will include efforts with veterans, labor, seniors, etc.

4. Rapid Response Team:

Arctic Power will establish a rapid response team to monitor and respond to all editorials, letters to the editors, media reports, etc. Responses will come from Alaskans, labor, Natives, etc. as deemed appropriate. Most likely dedicate one or two individuals to this task alone.

5. Media Outreach:

Arctic Power will work to organize editorials and editorial board visits by National Leaders. Will prepare educational materials as needed. Additionally, Arctic Power, through Roger Herrera, will participate in radio debates. Majority of the cost in this section is for printed materials. Second cost reflects potential of contracting need out.

6. Studies / Reports:

Develop and request new studies as required to put new information before the media and decisions makers. Such reports average \$25,000 - \$50,000. Where appropriate, opportunities for in-kind donations will be sought including participation from State agencies. The following are in the works:

- New Jobs Study in conjunction with Job Power
- Native White paper on "our lands."
- Matt Cronin study on Caribou and oil development
- Environmental Standards and Safety on the slope
- Spill response measures (to be requested)

7. North Slope Travel:

Arctic Power has always acted as a facilitator for North Slope trips for elected officials and other national opinion makers. Numerous officials have already inquired about opportunities.

8. Website:

Arctic Power maintains a valuable website loaded with useful information that is easy to access, but must be continually updated to remain current.

9. Contract Personnel:

Arctic Power staff in the Washington D.C. office consists of contract employees who coordinate the DC campaign, set-up and coordinate hill visits, interact with the media, handle external groups and Alaskans, deliver direct mail to decision makers, etc. Employees are paid on a monthly basis and cost is directly impacted by length of campaign.

10. D.C. Office:

Arctic Power maintains an office in Washington to house personnel. Costs include utilities, furniture, phone/fax, supplies and misc. expenses.

11. Target Members Campaign:

Once identified, the target members campaign will include in-district and in-state activities designed to provide positive support to a member for voting in favor of the issue. In state campaigns will vary in substance, intensity, and cost depending on the given circumstances. It is expected that in-state work will be required in several states and House districts. Some of this work will be done with the unions and Job Power, and, where possible, the State of Alaska. Cost is directly associated with the actual number of targets. Actions associated with this include:

- Print & radio advertising
- Rally's and demonstrations
- Phone-banking
- Letter-writing campaigns

- Polling (questionnaire construction, analysis, message testing, etc)
- Editorial board visits by appropriate officials
- Coalition building

RE: USGS report on estimates of oil and gas potential for the Coastal Plain (1002 Area) of ANWR

Background

In May 1998, the USGS released the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, 1002 Area, Petroleum Assessment, 1998 containing estimates of oil and gas resources on Federal, State of Alaska and private Native lands within the boundaries of the ANWR Coastal Plain (1002) area of the United States. Government assessments of the region previously had been conducted in 1987 by the USGS, the Bureau of Land Management (BLM), and the Minerals Management Service (MMS), in 1991 by BLM, and in 1995 by USGS.

The current USGS assessment shows an overall increase in estimated in-place oil resource when compared to all previous government estimates. The recent report re-affirms the 1002 Area's potential as the single most promising prospect in the United States, containing almost 7 billion barrels of oil more than previously estimated by USGS in 1987.

The total quantity of technically recoverable oil within the entire assessment area is estimated to be between 5.7 and 16.0 billion barrels (95-percent and 5-percent probability range) with a mean value of 10.3 billion barrels. The mean estimate of 10.3 billion barrels is roughly equivalent to the amount produced to date from North America's largest field, Prudhoe Bay, since production began 21 years ago.

The USGS report is the result of nearly three years of field and in-house work by a group of 40 USGS scientists. Since the original USGS 1987 assessment, several developments have influenced the geologic understanding of the oil potential of the area, including; re-processing of 2-D seismic data collected in 1984-85, several new exploratory wells drilled just west of the 1002 Area resulting in the discovery of new oil fields and new geologic data, and cost cutting and advances in Arctic technology.

Re: Hearing on the U.S. Geological Survey's Estimates in the 1002 Area of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR).

On Thursday, July 23, 1998, at 9:30 a.m., the Energy and Natural Resources Committee will hold an oversight hearing in Room SD-366 to review the process and results of the United States Geological Survey's (USGS) 1998 estimates for the 1002 Area of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR). A witness list is attached.

Background

Assessments of the 1002 Area previously had been conducted in 1987 by the USGS, in 1991 by the Bureau of Land Management (BLM) and the Minerals Management Service (MMS), and in 1995 by the USGS. In May 1998, the USGS released the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge, 1002 Area, Petroleum Assessment, 1998 containing estimates of oil and gas resources for onshore areas of Federal lands, in State of Alaska waters and on private Native lands within the boundaries of the ANWR 1002 Area.

The current USGS assessment shows an overall increase in estimated in-place oil resource when compared to all previous government estimates. The recent report reaffirms the 1002 Area's potential as the single most promising prospect in the United States, containing almost 7 billion barrels of oil more than previously estimated by USGS in 1987.

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The USGS report is the result of nearly three years of field and in-house work by a group of 40 USGS scientists. Since the USGS 1987 assessment, several developments have influenced the geologic understanding of the oil potential of the area, including: reprocessing of 2-D seismic data collected in 1984-85, several new exploratory wells drilled just west of the 1002 Area resulting in the discovery of new oil fields and new geologic data, and cost cutting and advances in Arctic technology.

Issues

Issues to be addressed during the hearing include:

1. How does the new estimate compare to the USGS resource assessment in 1987 which took 7 years to complete and to the 1995 National Assessment which took less than 30 days.
2. Why did USGS increase the minimum commercially developable field size in the 1002 Area from earlier estimates to 512 million barrels when several stand-alone fields of less than 200 million barrels are currently being developed on the North Slope today?
3. For the past ten years the industry standard for geophysical exploration work in the Arctic has been 3-D seismic. Would new data collected with advanced technology enhance our understanding of the 1002 Area?
4. If oil development were allowed in the 1002 Area today, first oil to market could not be expected for about a decade. What changes can be expected in technology, production practices and economics in the Arctic during the next decade?

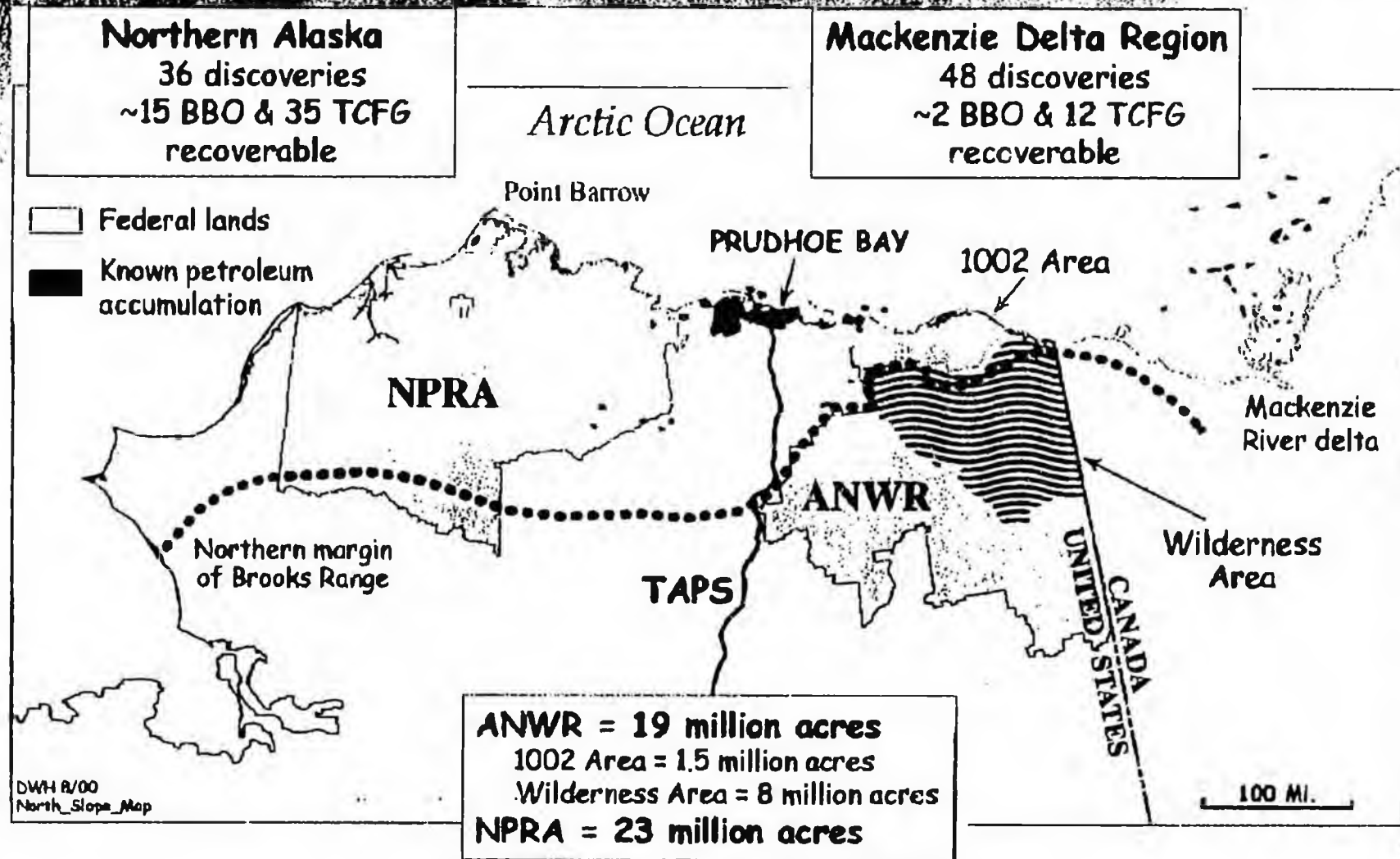

RE: HB 101, a bill that would grant Arctic Power \$3.1 million for its campaign to open the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to oil drilling.

Dear House Finance members:

I am opposed to the State of Alaska funding Arctic Power, a nonprofit lobbying organization whose sole mission is to open the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge to oil drilling. Over the years the state legislature has granted Arctic Power more than \$7 million dollars of public money that have been wasted in their failed efforts to open America's greatest wildlife refuge to oil drilling.

BP is no longer contributing to Arctic Power, so why should the State of Alaska? BP recently announced that their company would rather develop existing fields around Prudhoe Bay than explore for oil in frontier areas. I find it puzzling that the State of Alaska continues to push for oil drilling in the Arctic Refuge, when one of our largest producers has made it clear that this is not on their agenda. Philips Petroleum has also indicated they plan to invest in recently discovered fields near the Alpine oil field and in the National Petroleum Reserve-Alaska. In fact, there are millions of acres of state lands and federal lands within NPR-A, that are already opened for increased development and new exploration.

The State of Alaska would better serve its own economic interests by supporting development on state lands that surround Prudhoe Bay where infrastructure already exists:

- 1) Alaska would generate greater revenues through state lease sales and oil royalties, as there would be no split with the federal government;
- 2) Governor Murkowski has already indicated that he wants to see increased development of the giant West Sak field and other known existing fields on state land.

You are already faced with a budget crunch. Since the oil industry is the state's number one private-sector employer, with billions of investment dollars at their disposal, why shouldn't private industry pay for their own lobbying expenses? Is there any other nonprofit lobbying organization that the state directly funds?

It is poor public policy to grant funds to a special interest lobbying group, particularly since this group's sole mission is to open the Arctic Refuge to oil drilling, an issue that deeply divides the state and our nation. Many Alaskans, as many as 40% in some polls, are opposed to oil drilling in the Arctic Refuge. The Gwich'in people of Alaska and Canada are united in their opposition to oil development, and there is a growing minority of Inupiat residents who are opposed to the drilling of their homeland. Why should the state promote and fund oil development of a land that it doesn't own, when so many Americans and Alaskans are opposed to drilling there? Again, this is poor public policy.


I urge you to not fund Arctic Power, and consider using the funds for other much needed programs:

1) The Tourism industry, our second largest private sector employer, is in need of increased state funding for promoting tourism in our extraordinary state. People come from all over the world to see Alaska's beauty, its wilderness and its wildlife. Other states and countries may have oil development, but there are few places remaining on the planet that are as beautiful and wild as Alaska. This is our greatest resource for the future. We need to protect our unique natural values, particularly our national refuges, parks and forests, for the visitors of tomorrow.

2) Consider using that \$3.1 million dollars for education, and other much needed programs that benefit all Alaskans, instead of supporting the lobbying arm of the oil industry.

If the state legislature grants another \$3.1 million to Arctic Power it will be a shameful expenditure. Please consider using these funds for other much needed purposes, and leave our greatest wildlife refuge alone.
