The state will issue new licenses to lodges, so the fiscal impact of this legislation should be positive. The difficult question will be determining how many licenses will be issued. While there will be some additional cost to the Alcohol Beverage Control (ABC) Board (staff time, postage, criminal background checks, long distance telephone, printing of signs), these additional costs can be absorbed assuming the Legislature approves increments in the fiscal year (FY) 06 budget.  
  
For purposes of this fiscal note, I have conservatively estimated 15 new licenses issued in FY 06 and 10 new licenses in FY 07. When the 15 FY 06 licenses renew in FY 08 we will add another 5 licenses and additional 5 licenses will be added in FY 09 plus renewals.

### Sectional For Committee Substitute for House Bill 16

#### Section 1.

(a) Provides that a school district that was operating a secondary boarding school prior to January 1, 2004 could be reimbursed for the cost of operating the boarding school providing they have a suitable student dormitory and provide daily access to a public school offering the grades 9-12 classes.

(b) The district can be reimbursed for a per-pupil stipend determined by the Department of Education and for one round trip per student that travels from their community.

(c) Defines district as "a city or borough school district or a regional educational attendance area.

Also defines district secondary school boarding program as " a public school operated for a full school year by a district in which the domiciliary services are provided for students in grades nine through 12. The full school year was added to the language in the Special Committee on Education and this resulted in a reduction in the fiscal note of \$227,700.

#### Section 2.

Provides a hold harmless clause for school districts that have children move out of the district to attend a secondary boarding school. The students moving from the district would be counted in the average daily membership of the home district.

#### Section 3.

This is a sunset clause that repeals the substance of this bill on July 1, 2010.

#### Section 4.

Puts into place an effective date of July 1, 2005.

### SPONSOR STATEMENT

#### HB 16 SECONDARY BOARDING SCHOOLS

HB 16 puts into statute DOE's current practice. This legislation supports existing programs that are successful. Under this bill a student would not have to pass the current entrance standards. Currently, only students who don't have access to grades 9 through 12 qualify for a stipend in boarding schools.

The bill would give students a choice of going to a school that offers something different to offer than may be available in their hometown. This legislation by statute reimburses to full-school-year, secondary boarding schools, costs incurred by the district operating the program.

The legislation limits the program to schools already operating boarding schools on January 1, 2004.

There are three boarding schools that would qualify for reimbursement for a per-pupil stipend and one round-trip between the student's community of residence and the school during the school year if the district expends money for the trip. The stipends are used to pay for the students' monthly residential care, which includes meals and supervision twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

These schools will participate in a five-year pilot project that the Department of Education will evaluate for the legislature.

The hold harmless section of this bill allows a student's district of residence to count a student for the ADM count even though the student is attending a secondary boarding school. This avoids the possibility of paying the base allocation twice for the same student.

## **Nenana Student Living Center...**

### **Developing Alaska's Most Valuable Resource**

Sixty-six high school students from across the state of Alaska could be accepted to live in the state's most modern dormitory called Nenana Student Living Center (NSLC) and attend Nenana City School. In the past four years, over 250 students (with their parents support) have already made this choice. Of these students, about 80% have either returned this past year or have put in application to return next school year.

Why do students come to Nenana for an education? The reasons for coming are as diverse as the students living there. Students from larger areas seek more individualized attention; students from rural areas want more class offerings with certified teachers. A few students, coming from families currently experiencing some tough times, need the structure and stability dorm living offers. Most students come from stable families, but want to experience living more independently. In an application one parent spoke of the 'regression of funds for rural districts taking its toll'; many others expressed this same sentiment but in different words. Many parents of NSLC students feel that (for various reasons) their child's educational needs were not being met locally and thus they sought a quality education elsewhere. Why Nenana? What makes Nenana Student Living Center and Nenana City School unique?

In the state of Alaska there are three boarding schools: PERS in Galena, BABS in Bethel; and Mt. Edgecumbe in Sitka. They are just that—a school where students are also boarded; these schools are separate from the local public school at each site. The NSLC is unique in that it is a community wide project, planned and built to be used as a comfortable dormitory for students who want to attend the public school of Nenana. NSLC students attend school and freely interact with Nenana students. Another unique feature of NSLC is that four apartments were built within the facility enabling dorm parents to make the Living Center their home along with the students on a '24/7' basis, these dedicated dorm parents are able to provide nurturing support, guidance and consistency. There are many elements that make the NSLC a safe and secure environment: the security system with cameras that are in place, a night watchman hired throughout the week, as well as the dorm parents living on site.

NSLC is currently the only boarding home on the road system, only 50 miles from Fairbanks. This makes for easy access to medical facilities, college events, and cultural activities; many students also have extended families to visit there on weekends.

As well as adding diversity to the school, the addition of NSLC students has spurred implementation of many unique innovations (largely as a

result of Federal grants to education). These students perform better in our system than those of the schools that sent them. Why is that? We think it is due to innovations implemented in several key areas:

#### Academic

Transitional classes strengthen Math and English skills, meeting under-prepared students where they are and accelerating them to grade level. A study skills class further helps struggling students achieve academic standards. A computer based (Carnegie) math class is making a huge difference in students who have been unable to achieve "math success" in the past. Sunday through Thursday nights, students attend a mandatory study hall, operated by four skilled tutors. Those students who have completed all assignments have free choice of study activities, while those students who have been referred by teachers get additional tutoring to improve academic performance.

#### Cultural

Nenana students have many opportunities to learn from cultural instructors. They are offered training in how to mush a dog team and set up a winter camp using traditional and modern winter survival skills. Other projects include snow shoe and canoe building, beaver trapping and skinning, skin sewing, creating articles such as gloves, skin boots, beading dream-catchers, practicing Native singing and language, and putting on a potlatch. Our Inter-Tribal Dance Group has performed around the state and is in great demand.

#### Personal Development

Leadership such as Close Up, summer camps, student orientation leadership training and an active NSLC student government help students mature and gain real life skills. Vocational training in career pathways including culinary arts, entrepreneurship, computer skills, business education, and more pathways are being developed. Art classes teach seeing and painting the world we live in, building and painting rustic furniture, painting Native and wildlife subjects, and marketing art.

#### Personal Support

Grandparent mentors work in the schools and Living Center with students, providing a caring presence and guidance in traditional values and skills. Three counselors assist with personal, academic and vocational development. There is a full time drug and alcohol prevention counselor for all grade levels utilizing Project Success curriculum. A vocational counselor teaches school to work and grant support offers students opportunities to explore careers and work as interns. A personal counselor meets individually with students to prepare for college or vocational schools at every step from awareness to scholarship and admission applications. A College Prep. class for juniors and seniors further assists students realize their dreams. Our proximity to

University of Alaska Fairbanks affords students a well-used resource for job fairs, career and college exposure and enrichment.

Finally, students maintain strong ties to home while living here. Communication is encouraged and supported through newsletters and by grant-funded parent visits to the Living Center, encouraging parents to remain involved in the education of their young people.

As a regional educational center, the Nenana Living Center is proving both innovative and successful.

#### Choice Alaska Greetings!

I want to express to you, and your colleagues in the Alaska Legislature, the sincere appreciation of the students, parents and staff of the Nenana Student Living Center for your past financial support. We received last year's monies with the understanding that we would return this year with an alternate method of future funding.

HB 425 has received bipartisan support in the House, passing by a vote of 38-0. Last Friday it made its way through the Senate HESS Committee. Your committee (Senate Finance) is currently considering HB 425 - I would ask that you consider the following:

**Personal Testimony:** Before coming to Nenana, I was the principal/administrator at Matanuska Christian School (K-12, Palmer, AK). During the HESS Committee meeting I heard the term "cash cow" used in reference to the fiscal note attached to this Bill. While I realize that there is a substantial fiscal note accompanying this legislation - this measure purposes to continue providing rural kids and their parents a choice... for what they believe is a better, expanded educational opportunity. I am hopeful you will consider this measure an investment, not an expense.

In my twelve-year tenure at MCS, I helped to provide choices to thousands of students and their families in the Mat-Su Valley. In doing so, we were able to save the state tens of millions of dollars in ADM monies. I did not comment on the learning environment at the local schools - it was the students and parents that decided that their needs were not being met and needed a placement option.

That is what the Nenana Student Living Center has been able to provide for the last three years – a viable option for hundreds of students and families whose needs are not being met at their local schools.

The First Alaskans Institute recently hosted a symposium on *"Thirty Years Later: A look back on the Molly Hootch case and forward to the future of rural schooling in Alaska"*. Their conclusion was noteworthy. In part it read, *"First and most important, students and their parents need to make the choice about where Native and rural children attend school, whether it's a local community school, a boarding school, or another option... to move forward on creating the best possible system for all students, Native and non-Native in rural Alaska..."*

With the ongoing demands of *No Child Left Behind*, options for students and their families will become increasingly more important. Failure to provide the option that the NSLC has been able to successfully provide would be tragic.

**Assessment:** I was fortunate to be able to participate in the School Board Fly-In last week. On the way to Juneau, I rode with a group of NSLC kids participating in NYO and others wanting to visit UAA. I am very pleased to report that I was able to register eight seniors for the fall of 2004. These soon-to-be graduates have their class schedule in hand and money set aside to begin their post-secondary education.

The "proof of the pudding is in the taste." The NSLC graduated two students (both college bound) in 2002, our initial year of operation. Six students (five college bound, one voc-tech) graduated at the end of our second year, 2003. This year we are pleased to be graduating 17 confident, optimistic young individuals excited about learning.

Agnes David, of Kongiginak, testified before the HESS Committee last week about her daughter Lucy and her friends that are now excited about learning and are eager to attend college this next fall. Lucy will be serving as a Della Keats intern this summer. Lucy is one of nine of this year's graduates that are already enrolled at UAA, three at UAF, two in the Job Corps, one at the Career Academy and one brave young lady (who was also the Prom Queen) in the United States Marine Corps. Each of these students had the assistance and encouragement of NCPS and NSLC staff.

Assessments are used to determine the value and significance of an event or process. Our student's successes are demonstrated with higher test scores, self reliance and a determined outlook on their future; these are the best forms of assessment that we have available.

The NSLC will continue to perform self-assessments in College and post-secondary placements. We also conduct attitudes and at-risk behavior surveys in the fall of each year. We will continue to comply with assessments administered by the state - AYP, benchmark scores and exit exams.

**Financial:** Through charts, we have tried to graphically show ADM savings to the state that would help to off-set some of the costs associated with this Bill. I have attached two separate analyses on the savings. Exhibit A uses the same data that we use to determine how much total money Nenana City Public Schools receive from the state, per student. We use that per-student-funding amount to determine our budget for the year. A different type of analysis, with different figures, was used in Exhibit B. This reflects the total dollars taken out the State's general fund.

Depending on the data used - you will get different results. I believe both to be accurate. However, it doesn't matter which numbers you use -- the fact remains that there is a tremendous cost savings (over \$300,000.00) when rural students choose to attend the NSLC.

House Bill 425 will generate approximately \$4,748.00 per student (\$455,808.00 divided by 96 students). This extra funding, plus Nenana's local ADM funding dollars will still total less money than what a majority of our students would generate if they stayed home. However, our students have chosen not to stay home. They are willing to leave their home and families to gain daily access to the expanded educational opportunities available in Nenana. These monies will only partially cover the cost of room, board, travel and supervision.

**Challenge:** Among others, Governor Murkowski and Senator Stevens have asked for changes in providing a better quality of education for our rural students. One option that has been presented by both is the idea of regional learning centers. Nenana has shown this initiative in answering this need.

While we don't claim to have all the answers... we are working hard at providing improved, innovative, fiscally responsible options. I am concerned that if individual cities and school districts do not gain some support in their efforts to provide educational choices - the educational challenges that exist in rural Alaska will remain unchanged, or possibly escalate.

Nenana has built a \$450,000.00 residential facility - the nicest in the state. No direct financial assistance for room, board, transportation and

supervision was available the first two years of operation. This was accomplished at a tremendous cost of both financial and human resources to the City of Nenana. Now we ask for your assistance in continuing to provide an environment of success and future hope.

Thank you for your consideration of House Bill 425. We ask for your help in our efforts to develop Alaska's most valuable resources.

*Supporting Boarding Schools In Alaska And Calling For a Plan of Action*

Resolution 01-2005

**Whereas**, the State Board of Education & Early Development is on record as supporting quality schooling options for Alaska's students; and

**Whereas**, boarding schools can and do provide many students a wider variety of options to programs than those offered by small schools; and

**Whereas**, boarding school program options can include a rigorous academic program, a vocational education program, and other programs tailored to meet individual student needs; and

**Whereas**, 16 schools statewide have been forced to close since 1999 because they fell below the threshold enrollment of 10 students, leaving many students without a school in their home communities; and

**Whereas**, the State Board has been the governing body of Mt. Edgecumbe High School for twenty years, and as such, fully understands the complicated aspects of operating a boarding school as well as the academic and personal rewards for students; and

**Whereas**, the State Board recognizes the value of full-time boarding schools operating in the Galena, Lower Kuskokwim and Nenana school districts, and understands the difficult funding challenges facing these schools; and

**Whereas**, boarding schools, in particular Mt. Edgecumbe High School, has for many years not had enough space to serve all students who apply for enrollment, so

**Therefore**, the State Board of Education & Early Development supports a pilot program to fund boarding schools currently operating in Galena, Lower Kuskokwim and Nenana that will also give the State of Alaska an opportunity to explore the educational effectiveness of the programs; and

**Furthermore**, the State Board calls on the Alaska Legislature, Governor Murkowski and the education community to work with the State Board to develop a plan to design and fund a system of statewide boarding schools that meets the needs of Alaska's students and that enriches the choices and options available to parents and their children.
