The Local Government Symposium was highly successful and more than met our expectations and hopes. Thirty-eight individuals (see enclosed list) participated in the discussion for the two-day session even though the sun shone vividly during the entire weekend.

The *group* identified legislative approaches which can be considered in the development of local/regional government in Alaska. Several distinct avenues for dealing with local government problems were developed with priority given to the need for regional governmental units in the unorganized borough. A Report of the Symposium will be mailed to you prior to the public hearings with a specific outline of the concepts to be discussed at the hearings. (including creation of unorganized boroughs?)

ALASKA SCHOOL MAP

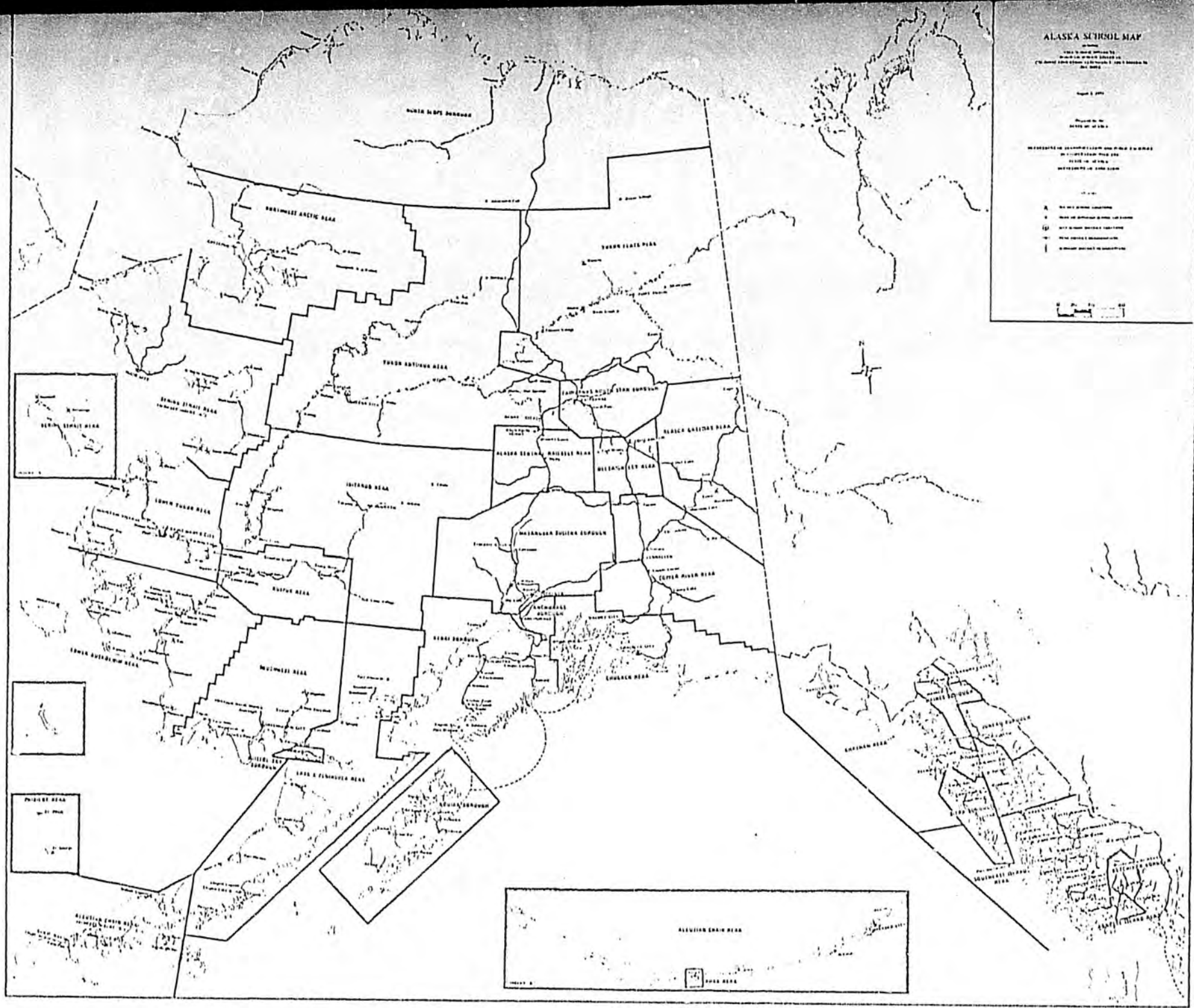
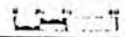

We have been trying unsuccessfully to reach you between trips and thought it might be helpful if we communicated some idea of the approach the Local Government Study is now taking so that you could clarify what you would see as your part in the effort.

As you will note from the chart (Exhibit C), the direction is now a solution-oriented one revolving around a series of meetings. The written material outlines the general plan of action.

We would like to talk with you as soon as possible so that we can begin planning the Regional Workshops and Local Hearings with your assistance. In regard to the Local Hearings, it has been mentioned that (a) one-day visits to the bush are not viewed favorably by the residents (b) that if hearings are held in the larger bush cities, and given our budgetary limitations that is probably what is possible, that there should be some thought given to bringing individuals from some of the more remote villages to the meetings.

Probably some thought should be given to what kind of advance educational effort (if any) would be helpful prior to the Local Hearings although that may be difficult not knowing the outcome of the meetings.

The Local Government Symposium was held in Anchorage on August 4/5 with forty-four individuals in attendance. (See attached list of participants) The group was highly successful in identifying legislative approaches to be considered by the Joint Committee in the development of local/regional government in Alaska. Several distinct avenues for dealing with local government problems were discussed with priority given to the need for regional government units in the unorganized borough.

After the Symposium, the staff worked on developing a comprehensive Report of the Symposium which could be used as an educational tool at the public hearings. The Report (attached) includes the issues and problems identified by the Local Government Symposium participants; ideas and directions supported by Local Government participants; and the action program being considered by the Committee.

A public hearing schedule has been developed with staff work on the organizational details and planning for the hearings to be held in rural regional centers and in associated villages. The hearings have been designed with a two-fold goal: to discuss the concepts being considered by the Committee for legislative actions and to educate the urban members of the Committee on the realities of village life in rural Alaska. Therefore, the legislators will overnight in each community visited enabling them to spend a full day with the residents of each area. The staff has provided statistical and general informational information as background material for each community the Committee members will visit.

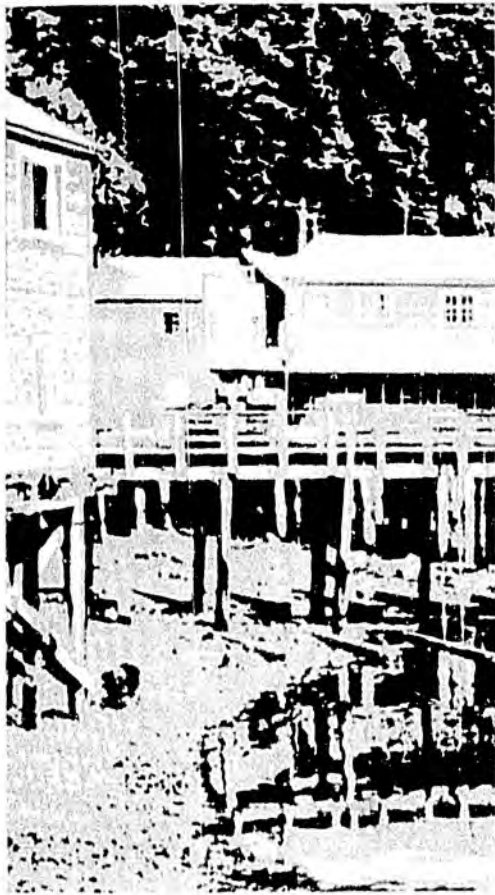
As you can see this is my rough draft copy but thought it would be best to do it this way so that we can finalize it the way you want it.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

We would like to thank the people who took the necessary time from their busy schedules to respond to our survey and thus provide the information contained in this report. These people are actively involved in the improvement of their communities, and for them there is no convenient time to fill out more forms. We thank them for doing so, and hope that they will receive assistance in planning and completing other projects in return for their effort.

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PROJECT DESCRIPTION

In 1978, the State of Alaska was allotted funds by the Economic Development Administration (EDA) to continue the economic development planning process begun in 1976. This joint State and federal program, commonly called the "302 program" after the section of the act which authorized it, affords the State the opportunity to contact local communities to identify their needs and priorities and coordinate these with State economic planning. An annual publication, entitled the **Community Projects Matrix**, was developed and distributed in 1977 and again in 1978. This third edition of the Matrix, for 1979, maintains the same intent of the two earlier issues: To inform the Governor's Office, State Legislature, and agencies at all government levels about economic needs and projects of many of the State's communities.

The 1979 Community Matrix is based on the needs of those communities throughout Alaska which prepared Overall Economic Development Plan (OEDP) documents in 1978. The Overall Economic Development Program is a community planning process designed to create employment opportunities, foster more stable and diversified local economies, improve local conditions, and provide a mechanism for guiding and coordinating the efforts of local individuals and organizations concerned with economic development in their areas. The OEDP document describes an area's overall economic development program and charts the course for development action. The document is necessary for meeting the statutory requirement that public works and business development projects funded by the Economic Development Administration be consistent with an approved overall program for economic development of an area.

The OEDP committee that prepares the OEDP document and development program is comprised of local citizens representing the diversity within the community. It is a public planning organization which assists the planning efforts within the local and State governments. A total of 32 cities, boroughs, and organizations responded to the Community Matrix survey. Several of the communities did not write new OEDP's this year, so their old plans were used. In all cases, the information reported in this survey was provided by the respondents. Because some of the OEDP's were written for entire boroughs or regions, the Community Matrix covers most of the State's geographic area.

The Planning Section (EDA 302 office) of the Division of Economic Enterprise, Department of Commerce and Economic Development, contacted communities for assistance in compiling this report. Those contacted included OEDP committees, economic development planners, city managers, city planners, administrators, and others. Communities were requested to complete two forms showing the current year's ten highest priority economic development projects as well as information regarding the current status of projects listed last year.

As the completed and signed forms were received, the priorities of each community were plotted on the matrix found on the inside front cover of this report. Copies of the forms listing current projects are provided within the report for the reader's review. Forms displaying information on last year's projects are available for review in the 302 office. Some of the communities in Southeast Alaska had the assistance of the Tlingit and Haida Central Council in the preparation of their OEDP's. The OEDP committees worked with the Council in completing the matrix forms used in compiling the matrix. In the North Slope Borough, planners work closely with Borough villages in determining economic development priorities. Four priority projects are listed on the matrix which were derived from a 1978 list, but specific village projects are listed in the Appendix. The Kodiak Island Borough also works with villages in preparing development priorities, but the specific village priorities, submitted by the Kodiak Area Native Association, are also listed in the Appendix.

Throughout the Community Matrix the outline of matrix categories is based on the Standard Industrial Codes and the categories used for legislative budget appropriations, and is essentially the same outline used in the 1977 and 1978 publications. OEDP committees were encouraged to list, on a separate form, other needed projects in addition to the "top ten." Only the top ten projects are included on the matrix, but all additional projects are shown on the forms received from respondents.

There are ten major project categories represented on the matrix diagram. The **utilities** category includes projects such as those relating to water, sewer, or solid waste, as well as electricity and needs for telephone or satellite service. **Transportation** includes construction or improvement of roads, airports, docks, harbors, ferry terminals, and others. **Housing** normally relates to projects in communities with housing shortages, the replacement of dilapidated housing, and similar projects. **Natural resources** is a category referring to community projects aimed at the development of fisheries, forestry, agriculture, energy, or minerals--these may include a wide range of activities such as developing a bottomfishery, construction of a cold storage plant, canneries or others. **Community facilities** may include such projects as public health clinics, fire stations, recreation halls, police equipment and others. **Community and social services** refer to service-oriented projects, such as alcoholism programs, public health nurses, fire protection plans, a need for teachers or education programs. **Economic assessment and planning** may relate to needs for community plans, architectural and engineering services necessary to qualify for grants, economic development planning, and similar projects. The category of **trade and finance** includes such projects as establishing a bank in a community, an industrial development district or other enterprises. **Tourism** refers to projects generally aimed at developing a tourism sector in the local economy, and may include a totem park, better tourist accommodations, guided tours, and others. **Land** may relate to projects seeking to fulfill community needs for lands, including parks, community facilities, erosion control or other land needs.

There are several additional points about the matrix which should be considered by the user: Although the communities are represented graphically together on the matrix, they are, of course, not statistically equal. Each community is culturally, demographically, and geographically different. Also, not all projects displayed on the matrix and listed by communities were derived through rigorous economic analysis even though that is an element of the OEDP process. Some OEDP committees are more effective than others, and many have adequate professional support staff while some do not. And a few communities, in absence of adequate economic analysis, listed capital improvement projects or represented social needs in their choice of some projects. Yet it is still safe to say that the majority of projects represented here resulted from the OEDP process required by EDA to qualify for economic development funds from that federal agency. It is the only program which requires combined economic analysis, citizen participation, definition of goals and objectives and coordinated economic development projects. As such, the OEDP procedure affords insight to local level economic needs and funding problems not available elsewhere.

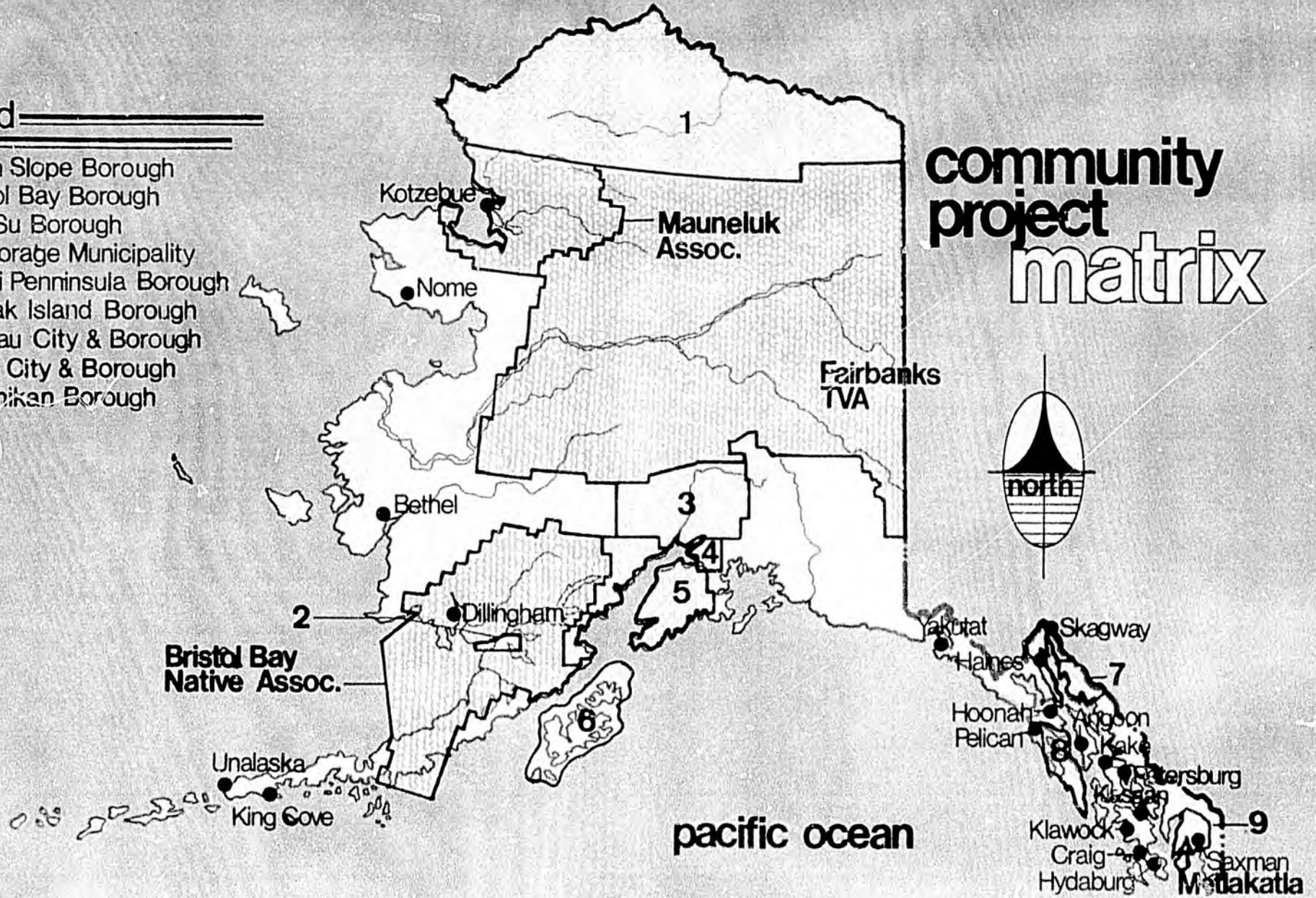

1979 MATRIX REVIEW

The Community Matrix is designed to look at economic development needs in a broad but specified set of villages, cities, boroughs and organizations in the State. One technique for discussing a summary of results is to review the kinds of projects that received the most number-one priority "votes" by respondents. (See Matrix of first priority projects on the preceding page.) Viewed in this way, economic assessment/planning and utilities were tied for highest category with transportation running a close second. Another method of review is by the total number of projects within general categories. By this method, community facilities, transportation, utilities, and economic assessment/planning were the four highest categories, in that order. The following paragraphs present more specific summaries from this year's matrix.

Across the State, community facilities received high priority consideration by responding communities. This appeared to hold true for organized boroughs as well as communities in the unorganized borough. A total of 66 community facility projects appeared in this year's community matrix. Three respondents, Bethel, Klawock and Metlakatla, listed their number one projects in this category. The community facilities most needed appeared to be safety projects, especially fire, police, and emergency medical care, and facilities for health care, such as health clinics and hospitals. Many miscellaneous projects were listed this year, covering such facilities as washeterias, cemeteries, a seawall, correctional facilities, warm storage buildings, equipment, and others. Of particular importance here is Bethel's first ranked project for constructing a seawall and the Mauneluk Association's second ranked project for a Sno-go repair shop in Deering. In general, the pattern of need for community facilities showed up in most areas of the State, but it was especially pronounced in the unorganized borough.

Transportation was a general category in which many high priority projects occurred consistently. A total of 64 projects was listed in this category, with seven communities placing number-one priorities here: Bristol Bay Borough, Kasaan, Kotzebue, Skagway, Unalaska, Valdez, and Fairbanks T.V.A. Water transportation especially received attention, with 35 projects of this type listed and five of those assigned a first priority status. Typical projects in the water transportation category included public dock construction, a barge and ferry pier project, boat harbor expansion, and other similar needs. Land transportation, essentially the need for roads and bridges, also received much attention in this year's survey. A total of 21 projects in land transportation were listed, and eight projects listed in air transportation. Transportation project needs seemed distributed rather evenly across the State.

The utilities general category ranked very high, with 47 utilities projects, none of which was a number one priority. Among these, water and sewer projects were most numerous, with 23 projects listed, such as first priority water projects in the Kenai Peninsula Borough (Seldovia) and in Saxman. If the subcategories of energy and electricity are viewed together, there was a total of 13 projects with four communities having first ranked projects there. These included Sitka's Green Lake hydroelectric project, King Cove's electrical distribution system, Petersburg Tyee Lake hydro project, and Wrangell's hydroelectric plant and transmission lines. An additional utilities need that was pronounced in the survey results was for solid waste projects. Three of these were first ranked needs, including facilities for Craig, Dillingham, and Pelican. In general, utilities needs occurred throughout the State and were somewhat more pronounced in the unorganized borough.

In this year's survey, the category of economic assessment and planning development received a high percentage of project listings—a total of 40 projects from 18 respondents. Nine first priority projects were listed in this category. A sampling of these could include Anchorage's Economic Development Study strategy, Haines' preparation of an economic readjustment strategy, Ketchikan in the areas of winter ferry maintenance, fisheries and mining, Angoon's economic base study on fisheries, and the Mauneluk Association planning activities related to gravel sources for Kotzebue and Noorvik. Ketchikan named five projects in this category and four were listed for King Cove.

Natural resources received a significant number of listings, with economic development projects in fisheries taking a strong lead. The combined subcategories of fisheries in extraction and development, and fisheries in manufacturing and processing, show that 13 communities listed a total of 14 projects in fisheries. Juneau, Ketchikan, Kake and Yakutat all listed fisheries projects as their first priorities. They included Juneau's Twin Lakes hatchery, Ketchikan's fisheries task force, Kake's cold storage facility, and Yakutat's project to rebuild a cold storage facility and extend a dock. Other natural resource projects were listed in forestry, agriculture, energy, and miscellaneous subcategories.

Considering all ten general categories, it may be worthwhile to note the total number of projects in each: Utilities - 47 projects, nine of which were first priority; transportation - 64 projects, seven first priority; housing - 13 projects, none first priority; natural resources - 19 projects, two first priority; community and social services - seven projects, none first priority; economic assessment and planning - 40 projects, nine first priority; trade and finance - four projects, none first priority; tourism - five projects, none first priority; land - three projects, none first priority.

In a broad way, it may be useful to review this year's results in comparison to the first two years the Community Matrix was published. The following table displays this comparison.

PROJECT STATUS

One of the purposes of the Community Matrix is to build a history of funding for development projects at the local level in Alaska. The reader is urged to refer to the "Respondents' Forms" section on page 15 of this document for the detailed information upon which this summary is based.

A comparison of survey results from the past two years shows that 27 of the 30 communities responding in 1977 responded again in 1978. The 27 communities in 1977 listed a total of 309 development projects. Some projects were listed with two or more sources, while 144 were left blank or indicated that sources were unknown. In 1978 these same 27 communities listed 284 projects. Only 68 listings were unknown or left blank. Though the listing of a source does not necessarily mean that funds will be received, there is an indication that an improvement was made in the ability of respondents to find sources to which to apply for funds.

In the survey, respondents were requested to indicate sources of funding. Many projects listed two or more possible sources of funding so the number of potential sources exceeds the number of projects. The following were indicated in the two years:

In 1977, 26 of the 81 projects listing federal sources named EDA as a funding source. Another 26 were divided among these 10 agencies: PHS (8), HUD (6), Corps of Engineers (3), BIA (2), EPA (2), USDA, CETA, LPW, FmHA, and National Parks. The remaining 29 simply listed "federal" indicating an uncertainty as to which federal agency to contact for assistance (see agency titles, page 13).

Of 88 projects in 1977 listing State sources, 73 named "State" as the funding source. Only 15 projects listed a specific State agency to which application would be made. These 15 were divided among these six agencies: C&RA (6), DOT/PF (3), DEC (3), H&SS (2) and National Guard.

In 1978, 133 projects listed federal sources. Forty-four of these were apparently uncertain as to which agency to apply and simply listed "federal." Eighty-nine named specific federal agencies as follows: EDA (38), HUD (18), BIA (11), PHS (8), Corps of Engineers (4), USDA (3), Labor (3), FmHA (2), CETA (2), EPA (2), FAA (2), Criminal Justice, FHWA and DOE.

Among 137 projects listing State as a funding source, 89 were unspecific and merely named "State." The other 48 projects indicated these State sources for funds: DOT/PF (12), C&RA (11), State bonds (5), DEC (4), Education (3), Tourism (2), H&SS (2), Legislative funding (2), Historical (2), APA (2), DNR (2), Energy, Agriculture, University of Alaska and revenue sharing.

Communities showed some improvement in identifying State funding sources in the most recent survey period.

ANCHORAGE

Two of the five projects Anchorage listed in 1977 have been completed. Street improvements to an industrial area were completed with the help of a \$150,000 EDA grant. Sewer trunk and drainage to a commercial area being developed was completed with \$220,000 State funds matching municipal funds. Earthquake Park improvements started with \$26,730 from municipal bond funds. Anchorage's number-one priority, a civic center-convention facility, was curbed when the local bond issue failed to pass.

This year Anchorage is seeking EDA assistance for all four of its projects.

JUNEAU

Juneau's proposed salmon hatchery is in line to receive \$15,000 EDA-TA funds. Other projects on the 1977 listing are still in the planning stages.

Small boat harbor construction, first listed in 1978, will receive \$1,750,000 from the passage of bond Proposition Number 1.

BRISTOL BAY BOROUGH

From 1977 two projects got underway, both using EDA as a federal funding source. There were seven other projects competing for EDA funds.

Bristol Bay's 1978 form listed three projects seeking EDA funds. The rest were expecting State or local funds. Six of ten were transportation related projects. Four of these have been on their projects list since 1976. Of these, three are simply looking for State funds. The other may stand a better chance as it is seeking EDA and local funds as well as State funds.

KENAI PENINSULA BOROUGH

Kenai's top three projects received EDA backing in 1978. Their Seldovia water project had been the number-one project since 1976. It received top priority from EDA for grants in Alaska in 1978. From their 1977 list, two projects got underway with EDA funding in addition to the three construction projects carried into 1978. Five of six projects listed in 1977 received grants.

KETCHIKAN GATEWAY BOROUGH

Last year's number-one priority was completed with \$680,000 of federal funds. The King Salmon Hatchery made use of a HUD grant. Their small boat harbor development plan is on line to receive \$1,250,000 from bond Proposition Number 1. A third project was completed using local funds.

A winter maintenance program for the Alaska Marine Highway was the first priority in 1978. The Division of Marine Highways has scheduled this project for winter and spring of 1979. Ketchikan's next four projects have been listed since 1976. Their convention and tourism project has gotten underway with EDA and private backing. Their fisheries diversification has received local, private, and Department of Commerce and Economic Development support. The waterfront development plan has received local funding, but is also seeking support from private foundations and federal grants. The airport development project has received FAA support. Thus, Ketchikan's top five projects have met with some success.

KODIAK ISLAND BOROUGH

Three out of five of Kodiak's 1977 projects were carried over to their 1978 listing. These three were also listed in 1976. There was no indication of completion of the other two.

One of Kodiak's three new projects for 1978 had funding approval through the passage of bond Proposition Number 1 last November. The two other projects will be major federal expenditures.

MAT-SU BOROUGH

None of their 1977 projects listed showed any advancement. No possible funding sources were listed.

Of the ten projects included this year, only two are new. One application has been made to FmHA but the rest have no funding sources.

SITKA

Most of their 1977 projects were counting on municipal or private funds. The two that requested State assistance will be receiving funds through a loan and through passage of bond Proposition Number 1.

Nine out of ten of 1978's projects are repeats from last year. Indications are that six of these are underway.

ANGOON

Five of Angoon's fifteen projects from the 1977 Matrix show some degree of completion. Two others indicated a possible funding source.

This year Angoon shows very few funding sources (4 of 19 projects). They estimate that eight projects will be completed in 1979, but only three of these have funding sources.

BETHEL

Bethel's ten priorities were all construction projects. EDA assisted one; the Corps of Engineers funded two. Passage of bond Proposition Number 1 set aside \$500,000 for a port facility project. A fire hall project has State funds available. Bond Proposition Number 6 earmarked \$3.1 million of \$5.2 million estimated for their criminal justice center. Four projects had no funding sources. In 1978, three new projects were listed.

CRAIG

This year's project list is the same as 1977. Lack of funding sources continues to impede progress.

DILLINGHAM

In 1977, Dillingham listed ten projects. Only three of these had funding sources at that time. Various obstacles delayed most projects from getting started but a HUD grant got water and sewer improvements going. Their number-one priority (construction of a solid waste site) met two snags—a veto of relocation funding, and failure of DEC to approve the chosen site. This project was their number-one priority in 1976 and remained their top priority in 1978.

Dillingham's 1978 project listing may fare better, as seven out of ten had possible funding sources. Their number-two project, a dock and warehouse, was included in bond Proposition Number 1 which passed last November. This project had been listed since 1976.

HAINES

Three of nine projects got underway from Haines' 1977 listing, one of which received EDA funds. A fourth will receive funding through the passage of bond Proposition Number 1.

Twelve projects were listed in 1978 including five continued from 1977. EDA awarded funds on their number-one project, the preparation of an economic readjustment strategy. Another EDA funded project from 1977 and 1978 was expected to be completed by early 1979.

HOONAH

Of nineteen projects listed in 1977, six were seeking funds from various federal agencies. Hoonah's top priority both years has been a boat harbor and breakwater. Funding for this project looks good with the passage of bond Proposition Number 1 and designation of \$2.8 million from the Corps of Engineers. Their city hall building will get underway with a grant from EDA.

KAKE

Ten of nineteen projects from 1977 are underway or completed. Federal funds contributed to four of these; HUD helped fund two projects, Office of Environmental Health, and EDA the other two. In 1978, Kake's top two priorities remained the same. Kake's number-one priority, construction of a cold storage, is being financed with a private source. Also indicated was a 50% completion of their community building, the number-two project, with help of EDA funds. To complete this project in 1978, application was made to HUD.

KASAAN

Six of nine projects listed in 1977 showed some degree of completion. Funding sources were identified on four of these. Tlingit-Haida funded two projects; two others expect PHS assistance. Kasaan's number-one project since 1976, feasibility studies on their dock and breakwater to improve their harbor, remained the top priority in 1978. They indicate that they will seek EDA-TA funds or assistance from the BIA. State and private funding is being sought also. Planning for a solid waste disposal facility has been a priority since 1976, but now has several funding sources. The Corps of Engineers, Public Health Service, and DEC are listed as sources for this project.

KING COVE

King Cove's number-one priority from 1977 was completed with RDA and local funds. Their next three priorities got underway with federal assistance from HUD, BIA, and EDA. The rest of their projects were local planning efforts. King Cove has kept its priorities the same for 1978 except for the completed harbormaster house which was deleted from their listing.

KLAWOCK

Half of Klawock's twelve projects listed in 1977 show some degree of completion. Construction of a sewage treatment plant, their number two project, received assistance from PHS, while an EDA grant provided funds for construction of their municipal office building. Tlingit-Haida REA helped two improvement projects. The number-one project since 1976, improvement in fire protection, was deleted from the State budget. A Senate bill introduced in January will appropriate funds for fire fighting equipment. Klawock's number one project in 1978 is the construction of a fire station. Likely funding sources are said to be Department of Labor or HUD.

Eleven of 17 projects in 1978 were requesting a portion of funding from federal sources. Six were HUD projects, four were BIA.

KOTZEBUE

Kotzebue was looking for other than local sources of funding on only three of ten projects in 1977. They were seeking help from the State on two projects and from EDA on one. The EDA project, a recreation facility, was completed. One State project was indicated to be three-fourths completed. The number-one project from 1977 remained the top priority in 1978. Street improvement and erosion control was a locally funded project. They have indicated that the project is half completed. Three projects which had no funding sources in 1977 are being kept on the 1978 list, still without sources.

METLAKATLA

Only three of 18 projects listed in 1977 show any degree of completion. One was the number-two project, a development plan for the old Coast Guard area, which received EDA assistance.

The number-one project for two years has been to construct a community facility and recreation center. Funding sources for this project have not been found. Specific funding sources for all other projects are not indicated. Recently, however, the Corps of Engineers said it was going to put \$3.7 million into improvement of deepwater dock and barge ramp facilities. Also, small boat harbor construction should be implemented with \$750,000 from the passage of bond Proposition Number 1. Progress on other projects is uncertain.

PELICAN

Pelican listed seven projects in 1977. Their top two priorities were both improvement projects and were indicated to be completed. They noted funding sources as Department of Highways (DOT/PF) and RCFP (Rural Community Fire Protection - C&RA). The others indicate no progress although C&RA, the Corps of Engineers and EPA were sought as sources of aid. Sanitary landfill was the number-one project for 1978, but their funding sources were not specific.

PETERSBURG

Petersburg's number-one priority from 1977 was a pilot program to expand the bottomfish industry. It received funding from the State Department of Commerce and Economic Development. Their second project, high school expansion, will require the marketing of bonds

before it starts. Funding for port facilities, the third priority, completed its first two phases through bond issues. Phase III of this project was included in last November's bond Proposition Number 1, passed in the general election. Another project, housing for elderly, made some progress, although funding sources were not indicated. Other projects showed no progress.

Petersburg's number one project in 1978 is the development of hydroelectric power, but funding sources have not yet been sought.

SAXMAN

Priorities remained pretty much the same from 1977 to 1978 in Saxman. Number-one has been a water project, possibly leading to a new dam. Funding sources were said to be an RDA grant, PHS and State DEC.

Ketchikan Northern Terminal, included in Gateway Borough's list, has been listed by Saxman since 1976. BIA is said to be a source of funds for this planning project. Other projects show no funding sources.

SKAGWAY

Skagway's number-one priority was a barge facility in 1977 and 1978. This project received an EDA grant as well as State support. Only five of their remaining 17 projects showed any degree of completion. Eight of these were seeking federal funds, but were not specific as to what agency.

UNALASKA

The number-one priority from 1977, construction of port facilities, will receive \$1,000,000 in State funding with the passage of bond Proposition Number 1 last November.

Unalaska's six projects for 1978 were all carried over from 1977 and 1976. A State bridge project was noted as funded while other projects had yet to apply to sources for funds. From 1977 to 1978, the sources became somewhat clearer. The electric utility planning project showed no source in 1977, but indicated an application was made to RDA for \$40,000 in 1978.

YAKUTAT

Nine of ten of Yakutat's 1977 projects were carried into 1978. Seven of these were listed in 1976. Only the renovation of a community hall, which had received an EDA grant, and the purchase of a larger fire truck, which had been seeking HUD funds, showed any degree of completion.

F.T.V.A.

Their number-two and number-six projects from 1977 received EDA and State support. Another improvement project had also received an EDA grant. Other projects' funding sources had not yet been determined.

In 1978 F.T.V.A. listed nine capital improvement projects. Five of these had funding sources. EDA was involved in three projects, RDA received an application for another, and the State Division of Agriculture administered funds approved for a grain elevator at Delta Junction.

F.T.V.A. also listed six planning projects. Three of these had funding sources that included State funds. The others were undetermined.

SUMMARY

The data from three years of producing the Community Matrix has shown that local planners and managers still require assistance in identifying and contacting funding sources, in completing application to these sources, and in obtaining funding. Many projects are planned without any funding sources in mind. A longer range view is needed for such project planning so that funding will coincide with the completion of local planning.

It is also apparent that a number of worthwhile projects are going unfilled due to lack of funds. In FY 1980, the Matrix will contain a more in-depth review of community project funding. This will include an analysis of those projects that received funding and why, an analysis of unsuccessful attempts at funding where a source or sources exist, and a discussion of those classes of projects for which no sources of funds presently exist.

North Slope Borough

The North Slope Borough works closely with Borough villages in determining economic development priorities. The flexibility in this process may change priorities. The following four priority projects were derived from a 1978 list, which was subject to a subsequent update. Contact North Slope Borough Planning Office for updated information.

List of Priority Projects

1. Feasibility - Nuiqsut Commercial Fishing Study

Timing -- June 1978 to November 1979
Cost -- up to \$70,000, including about \$30,000 for equipment

This study would help determine the feasibility of a commercial fishing operation in Nuiqsut. It would study whitefish (char, arctic cod) and deep water bottom fish (halibut, crab, shrimp, etc.). It would focus on an area offshore in the Beaufort Sea, out to a distance of five or ten miles.

2. Construction Project - Point Hope Airport Terminal

Timing -- April 1978 to December 1978
Cost -- \$125,000

(Note, this amount has been approved for funding out of the North Slope Borough CIP, but the project proposal is recommended for continuation as an expanded revenue or job-producing facility, or the concept and the budget for a new terminal should be applied to another community such as Wainwright or Anaktuvuk Pass.)

3. Planning Project - Borough-Wide Comprehensive Economic Development Planning

Timing -- October 1, 1978 to September 30, 1979
Cost -- \$70,000, of which \$52,500 is requested from EDA.

This planning grant will allow the borough to work directly with the communities on various economic development plans and projects, and will include a new planning staff position -- assistant planner for economic development. This person will be a local resident and will work with and will be given training and supervision by the economic and planning consultant and by other borough staff and consultants.

4. Other Priority Projects (see separate list)

EDA field staff should work directly with each village to help process and fund one or more of the projects listed on the following pages. * Without any kind of EDA planning funds, it is presently impossible for the borough and the villages to prepare all the cost and time estimates for potential EDA projects.







PRIORITY VILLAGE PROJECTS
FOR EDA AND OTHER FUNDING

North Slope Borough Planning Department
March 6, 1978 (Revised March 13, 1978)

Projects are generally listed in order of priority and are based on consideration of available federal, State, borough and local funding.

Nuiqsut

1. Construct airstrip not subject to closure because of flooding.
2. Construct road from village to the dump.
3. Investigate feasibility of a permanent road link to Prudhoe Bay.
4. Obtain natural gas from Prudhoe Bay to provide a dependable and reasonably priced source of fuel for the community.
5. Community freezer.
6. Determining feasibility of a fisheries industry.
7. Research and develop a village power source using solar energy.

Kaktovik

1. Transportation
 - A. Improved routing direct to Fairbanks with scheduled frequency.
 - B. Investigate possibility of scheduled routing to Barrow.
(Note: As of March 1, 1978, the only scheduled air service to Kaktovik was through Prudhoe Bay with Twin Otter service on Monday and Friday.)
2. Prepare a village comprehensive plan considering offshore oil exploration and development.
3. Research and develop a village power source to reduce the cost of electricity. Emphasis should be on wind power with consideration also being given to fuel cells and solar energy.
4. Investigate possibility of drilling for natural gas for a heat and power source for the village.
5. The village requires three new buildings:
 - A. Community building.
 - B. Garage for working on snow machines and outboard motors.
 - C. Health Clinic.
6. Construct a boat dock in the lagoon for village use.
7. Obtain fuel storage tanks.

Barrow

1. Browerville fire station and municipal offices.
2. Barrow outdoor recreation area.
3. Development of a Barrow community center complex.
4. Development of a museum/library complex.
5. Protection and restoration of the Barrow Cemetery.
6. Development of Tract A and Tract B expansion areas with roads, utilities, etc.

Point Hope (not necessarily in order of priority.)

1. Airport terminal and transportation between airport and village.
2. Investigate air transportation service improvement.
3. Senior citizens' center.
4. Snow drifting control facilities.
5. Community freezer.
6. Building to repair and maintain ski-doo's and boats.
7. Community building and arts and crafts center.
8. Implement village historic preservation plan.
9. Research and develop a village power source using windmills.

Wainwright

1. Public safety building.
2. Airport expansion and warm-up shack.
3. Kapugvik Tank Farm Road.
4. Airport road.
5. Snow fence.

The following village projects were compiled as best estimates by the borough staff and are still awaiting confirmation by the villages.

Anaktuvuk Pass

1. Investigate transportation cost savings by linking with Prudhoe Bay air and ground transportation service.
2. Sewage lagoon and village laundry.
3. Community building.
4. Research and develop village power source, using fuel cells.
5. Research and develop a hydroponics facility.

Aktasook (confirmed and revised, March 28, 1978)

1. Construct airstrip.
2. Transportation from airstrip.
3. Post Office.
4. Sewage truck pickup system.
5. Community freezer.
6. Develop a local energy source for village use.

Point Lay

1. Investigate air transportation service improvement.
2. Post Office.
3. Research and develop a village power source, using windmills.

General Suggestions from OEDP Committee, March 6, 1978:

1. Adequate airport lights and facilities for all village airports to accommodate emergency medical services.
2. Adequate communications to and from all villages, in part to also assist in emergency medical care.
