

Grants can be made for up to \$5000. I have asked the Council to forward information to you. The federal Dept. of Energy funds an "appropriate technology small grants program" which could provide amounts up to \$50,000. Information about that program can be obtained from Steve Baden, Alaska Division of Energy and Power Development, 338 Denali St, Anchorage 99501 (276-0508).

I would like to request that the following standards be followed on all reports submitted by consultants, contractors and legislative committees:

- use 8 1/2" x 11" white paper for all pages (if you desire colored paper for any pages in your report, these can be requested through our print shop; please do not give us originals on colored paper since they do not reproduce well)
- leave at least one inch margins on top, bottom and sides
- number pages consecutively (please number all pages)
- use carbon ribbon if at all possible and submit only clean, original typed material (one original copy is sufficient - we will reproduce it)

If these standards are followed by everyone, we can be assured of consistently professional appearance in our publications which will reflect well on the Legislature and the Agency.

Tentative Budget and Outline -- Susitna Alternatives Study

+ (at least 20,000 from APA)

40,000. Demand Update--ISER.

The Institute would develop updated economic activity and population projections, which would then be used to develop projected electric demand to the year 2010. The initial report would be completed by January 1980. The final report will incorporate a set of results from the conservation and renewable energy sources study, below.

60,000. Conservation and Renewable Energy Resources--Center for Policy Studies
(with a number of subcontracts)

This section will address the potential energy savings available from conservation and the use of renewable energy sources such as solar space heating, etc. After determining the potential for savings, a plan for achieving those savings in the Railbelt area will be developed, and a set of varying possibilities for energy ~~savings~~ efficiencies will be worked out for use in the second half of the demand study.

10,000. Downstream Environmental and Social Effects--AEIDC

The Center will produce a short paper describing particular environmental and social impacts that the dam might have, and suggesting that these impacts be included in the studies leading to dam construction.

10,000. Vulnerability to System Failure--engineer to be determined

This section would discuss the possibility of the transmission intertie being wiped out.

5,000. Critiques of Demand Projections--Brad Tuck, Energy Probe (?)

Short papers pointing out problems with the preliminary demand projections. Tuck's work would focus on the economic activity projections, while Energy Probe would address end use scenarios.

20,000. Criteria for evaluation of the Supply Alternatives

Two or three economists would provide papers reviewing existing material and describing what questions and problems an adequate study of the supply alternatives should cover.

20,000. Preliminary Study of Natural Gas as a Supply Alternative--G. Erickson (?)

Would review the Cook Inlet situation, and discuss the possible use of gas from the North Slope.

10,000. Preliminary Study of Coal as an Alternative Source of Supply

Would review existing studies, summarize potential for Beluga and Healy fields.

5,000. Misc. Consultants

Includes geotechnical review, possible seismic work.

15,000.--Coordinator (A.A.)

Would operate under the ^{direction} ~~advice~~ of the project co-directors, keeping ^{Chairman} ~~in~~ touch on the various sections of the study, coordinating the efforts of the various consultants, ensuring that all studies are covering material ~~from~~ with common assumptions, etc.

5,000.--Misc. Expenses and Travel

This plan of study represents a policy determination to work with the APA Susitna study and attempt to provide guidance and questions for their consultants to address, as opposed to producing a separate, independent analysis of the same material. Such an analysis could be undertaken in late 1980 based on the APA work, with a greater degree of efficiency, if necessary.

The study will be coordinated with ongoing legislative work in related areas, particularly the Special Committee on Renewable Energy, the Gas Line Committee, & the House Resources Committee work on coal.

A draft report will be presented to the legislature in April 1980.
