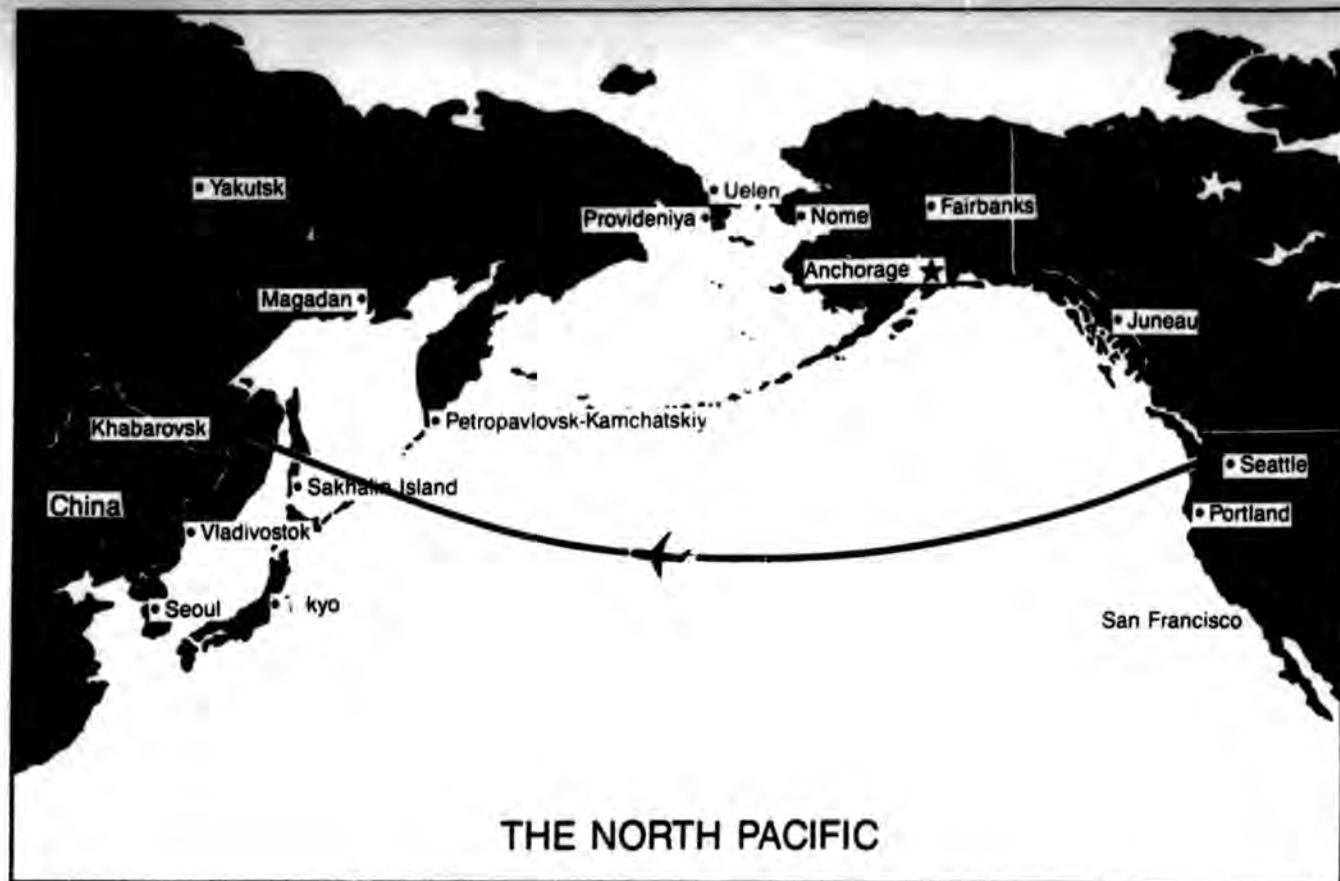

KHABAROVSK • VLADIVOSTOK • SAKHALIN

The Soviet Union is a "Pacific Rim" nation. The Soviet Far East is the region that extends west from the Pacific Ocean 1500 miles to Siberia and includes over 6,000 miles of coastline from Uelen in the north to the bustling port city of Vladivostok in the south. The region is an enormous storehouse of undeveloped natural resources including timber, fisheries, oil and natural gas, minerals and tourism in proximity to the exploring economies of Japan, Korea, Taiwan and China.

Khabarovsk, a city of 650,000 recently opened to the West, is the vital transportation and commercial hub of the Soviet Far East. This scenic city situated on the banks of the Amur River exhibits a fascinating mix of prerevolutionary architecture and modern Soviet structures. The people are friendly and hospitable and have openly expressed a desire to work with Americans on commercial and cultural projects.

Vladivostok is a major ice-free container shipping port city on the Sea of Japan, south of Khabarovsk. This is the heart of the Soviet fishing, shipping, and ship-building industries, terminus of the Trans-Siberian

Railroad, and headquarters of the USSR Academy of Sciences. Khabarovsk and Vladivostok, linked directly by air and rail are the commercial leaders of the Soviet Far East, and are rapidly connecting with nearby Japan, Korea, China, and Taiwan.

Vladivostok, population 750,000, is similar in climate, geography, and style to San Francisco, yet is still "closed" due to the presence of the Soviet fleet. In January, Vladivostok will be opened to the world. Our delegation has been given a rare opportunity to tour this historic city and meet its business and governmental leaders before the rest of the world discovers it.

Sakhalin - Island may be the next Hong Kong of the Pacific with beautiful climate, geography and a visionary government advocating business ties with the west.

This mission is sponsored by Eastern Soviet Trading Company (EASTCO), and the Khabarovsk-based Far Eastern Civil Aviation Administration of Aeroflot Soviet Airlines. EASTCO is dedicated to assisting Western companies in developing business and cultural relations in the Soviet Far East.

You are invited and encouraged to attend a meeting between Soviet and Alaskan legislators on Wednesday, November 14th from 3:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m. in the 5th Floor Conference Room of the Anchorage Legislative Office Building.

The purpose of this meeting is to provide the visiting Soviet legislators an opportunity to meet, ask questions and discuss concerns with their counterparts in Alaska.

The visiting Soviet legislators represent the territory of Khabarovsk, Alaska's sister state in the Soviet Far East. These 19 Soviet "deputies" are from the "Executive Committee," or the chief law and policy making body in the Soviet Far East territory of Khabarovsk.

Under Soviet reforms, the executive committees have reached greater levels of autonomy and regional control than previously allowed. In the future, it appears they will play a key role in the decision making, direction and development of one of Alaska's closest and most rapidly changing neighbors - the Soviet Union.

They are here to speak with Alaskan law and policy makers, businessmen and various others to better understand our system and potential working relationship. They are extremely interested in meeting and discussing issues with Alaskan legislators.

Age 38. After graduation from the Khabarovsk Pedagogical Institute with degrees in English and German, Ms. Trusevskaya worked as a teacher while heading the Club for Youth Movement. She has visited the USA, Japan, Egypt, Finland and Eastern Europe has wide experience in international tourism. Currently, she is a specialist in the Department of Foreign Economic Relations of the Khabarovsk Territorial Executive Committee.

35. Anatoly I. Filippov

Age 42. Specialist, Sakhalin Foreign Economic Association "Sakhaco". Mr. Filippov has a wide range of experience in both marketing and economic project development.

36. Valery G. Fintisov

Age 39. Educated as both an engineer and an economist, Mr. Fintisov has considerable experience in finance, organization and economic interaction. He lives and works in Vladivostok, Primorsky Territory.

37. Valery I. Chekhovich

Age 52. Mining Engineer. A graduate of the Polytechnical Institute in Irkutsk. Mr. Chekhovich has worked as a mine foreman, the chief of northern goldmining operations in the Far East and as Deputy Director of a goldmining amalgamation. He is currently the General Director of the goldmining amalgamation "Primorsoloto" in the Primorsky Territory.

38. Viktor G. Shumenko

Age 50. Mr. Shumenko is a technical school graduate and has worked at the Khabarovsk Shipbuilding Yard, as head of the Khabarovsk Young Workers' Organization and Youth Organization. Additionally, Mr. Shumenko is a specialist in social sciences and currently is both Finance and Office Manager for the Khabarovsk Territorial Executive Committee.

39. Aleksandr K. Scherbakov

Age 43. Physician. Dr. Scherbakov is a graduate of the Khabarovsk Medical Institute and is currently Vice Chairman of the Public Health Department of the Khabarovsk Territory.

Khabarovsk city has a population of 568 thousand and is located on the Amur River close to the Chinese border in the southern part of the territory, at the same latitude of Seattle. Khabarovsk is located about 3000 miles from Anchorage, approximately the same distance as Chicago or Dallas.

Khabarovsk is a major stop on the Trans-Siberian railroad. Khabarovsk Airport is also a major transportation hub for the Soviet Far East, serving 2 million passengers annually. It is currently the only international airport in the Soviet Far East, with regular flights to Nigata Airport in Japan. At present, in order to fly to the Soviet Far East from North America, travelers must travel via Japan, from which there are flights to Khabarovsk as well as ship connections from Yokahama to the port city of Nakhodka. Tourists have visited Khabarovsk for many years, and there is an attractive Intourist Hotel.

In the late 1960s, Alaska Airlines negotiated directly with Intourist to obtain permission for charter flights for tour groups between Anchorage and Khabarovsk. After traveling across the Soviet Union under the auspices of Intourist, groups were subsequently flown back from Leningrad to Anchorage by Alaska Airlines across the North Pole. After several dozen flights between 1970 and 1972, the flights were discontinued, partly because they were not very profitable and partly due to diplomatic difficulties.

Khabarovsk Territory

Khabarovsk Territory is approximately the size of California and is located at about the same latitudes as Washington and British Columbia. Khabarovsk Territory has a total population of approximately 1.6 million. It is the major industrial hub of the Soviet Far East. The territory has over 300 industrial establishments ranging from heavy machinery construction to power transformers and cables.

The territory has two oil refineries producing 10 million tons of oil annually, numerous fisheries projects that produce 131,500 tons of fish products annually; two mineral plants and a gold mine. The timber and lumber industry draws from 23% of the Far East forest resource and accounts for 40% of the entire USSR's lumber export. New developments in cellulose processing are underway.

Khabarovsk Territory has a river-rail transportation system. Both the Trans-Siberian Railroad and the Baikal-Amur Mainline (BAM) pass through the territory. Numerous ports along the Amur River network are equipped with passenger and freighter docks, express hydrofoils, and railheads that are remotely controlled from a central station.

KHABAROVSK (pop. 528,000).

The Pacific Ocean steadily draws nearer. This is where the Ussuri Territory begins. The city of Khabarovsk stretches over many kilometres along the bank of the Amur near its confluence with the river Ussuri. At its very foundation the city was intended as a link between the country's central areas and the Far East. During the 100-odd years of its history Khabarovsk has become one of the country's biggest industrial centres and transport junctions. A railway connects it with the European USSR and the coast of the Sea of Japan. The city has regular air service with dozens of Soviet and foreign cities.

Khabarovsk is called a city of engineering and metal-working. Its factories and plants, which number over one hundred, manufacture high-power Diesel engines for sea-going and river ships, turbines, cables, ferroconcrete elements.

Khabarovsk industries supply about a hundred goods items to the world market. Among them are the famous medicinal preparations of ginseng, the local magnolia vine, the eleutherococcus — species endemic to the Ussuri taiga.

The architectural aspect of the city is largely determined by its lay-out and the ground relief. From the high hills, which are occupied by the main streets, one can see a wide cityscape with tall buildings and neighbourhoods of five-storeyed houses buried in the greenery of parks. In the city squares, amidst public gardens and flower beds, there are works of monumental art: a monument to V. I. Lenin, the founder of the Soviet state, an obelisk to the fighters for Soviet government in the Far East, a monument to the Russian explorer Yerofei Khabarov...

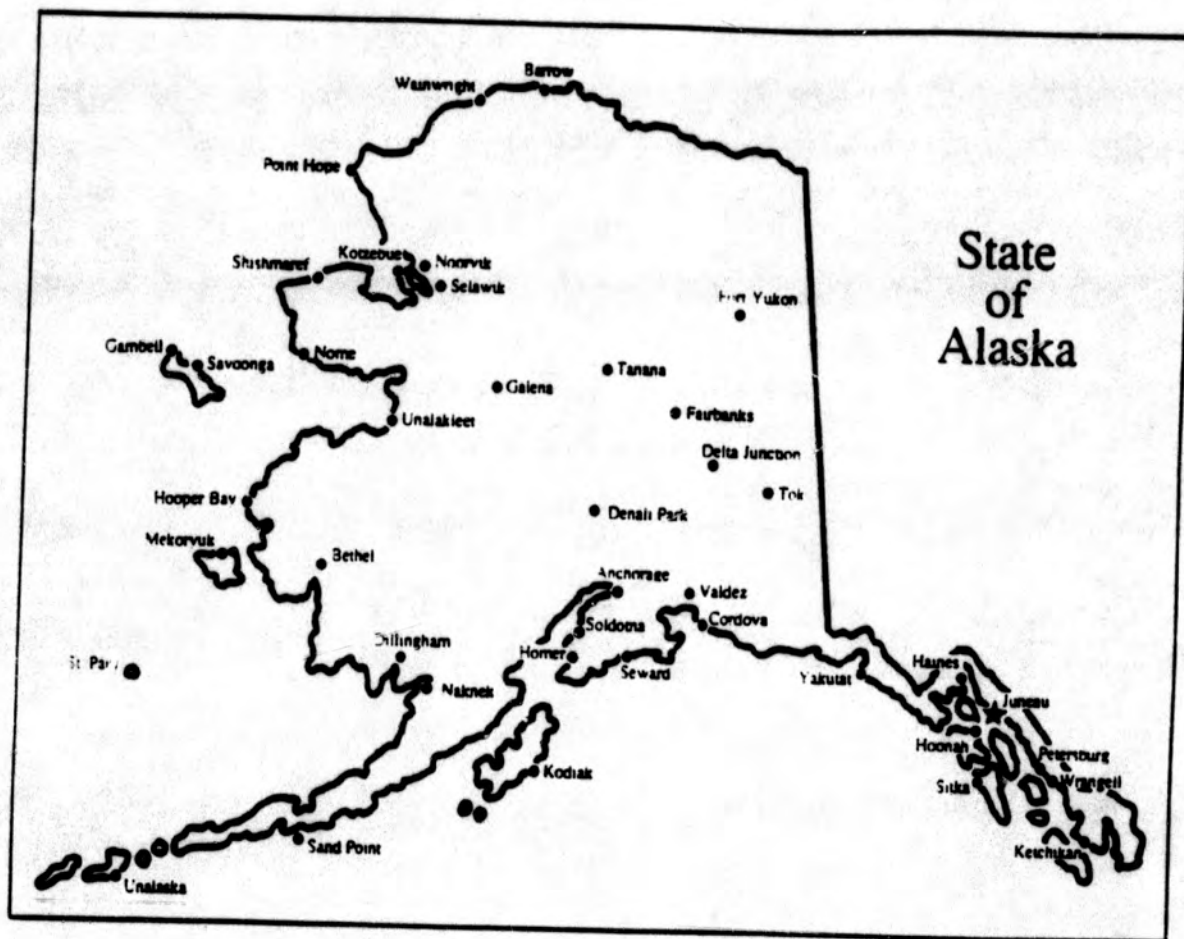
The city lives a busy cultural life. It has a few educational and research institutions, theatres, museums, an art gallery, a TV studio and a broadcasting station, professional associations of writers, artists, actors, composers.

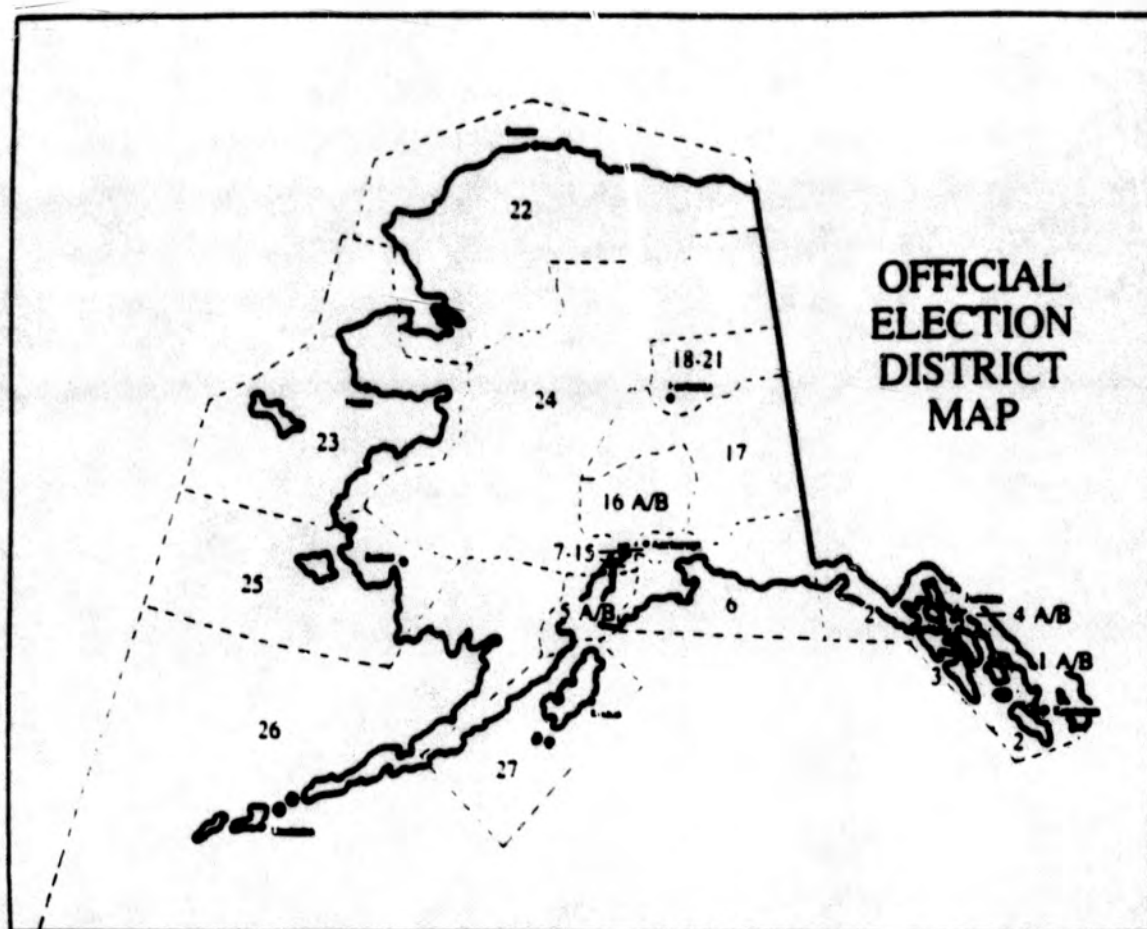
Khabarovsk has become known for frequent athletic contests held on the V. I. Lenin stadium, a sports

ЗАКОНОДАТЕЛЬНЫЕ ОРГАНЫ ШТАТА:

ПАЛАТА ПРЕДСТАВИТЕЛЕЙ СЕНАТ

Законодательная палата утверждает законы штата Аляски и выделение средств необходимых для управления штата. Законодательные органы штата состоят из двух палат: палаты представителей и сената. Палата представителей состоит из 40 заседателей выбранных из 27 выборных участков на 2-х летний срок. Сенат состоит из 20 заседателей выбранных из 14 районов на срок 4 года: половина заседателей сената переизбирается каждые 2 года.

Выборные участки Палаты Представителей и Сената определяются числом населения. По конституции Аляски избирательные участки могут быть изменены каждые десять лет, после очередного отчета о населении, составляемого федеральным правительством. Утверждение избирательных участков производится губернатором Аляски с помощью специально назначенного совета.

В последний раз участки были распределены таким образом в 1981 году. Следующее распределение будет производиться в 1991 году.

КТО МОЖЕТ СТАТЬ ЧЛЕНОМ ПАЛАТЫ.

Чтобы стать членом законодательных органов штата, человек должен быть избирателем в штате и проживать не менее трех лет. Также необходимым условием является проживание в том участке, от которого он/она баллотируется, не менее одного года. Сенатор должен быть не моложе 25-ти лет, а представитель - не моложе 21 года. Каждая палата решает достаточен ли опыт и квалификация новоизбираемого члена, и полномочна исключить любого члена при наличии двух третей голосов палаты.

СЕССИИ ЗАКОНОДАТЕЛЬНЫХ ПАЛАТ.

Заседания законодательных палат происходят в две сессии, продолжительность каждой из них - 120 дней. Сессия может быть продлена на десять дней двумя третьими голосов каждой палаты.

Специальные сессии могут быть созваны губернатором штата или же самими законодательными палатами. Такие сессии лимитированы продолжительностью до 30 дней. В годы, когда выборы губернатора предшествуют сессии, законодательная палата собирается в третий понедельник января; в другие годы - во второй понедельник января.

Проекты законов предложенные на рассмотрение законодательной палаты в первой сессии заседаний, могут быть рассмотрены или утверждены - во второй.

КОДЕКС ОБЩИХ ПРАВИЛ

Конституция Аляски требует от законодательных органов штата, чтобы они руководствовались так называемыми Общими Правилами проведения заседаний. Каждая новоизбранная законодательная палата устанавливает также свои правила проведения на основе этих Общих Правил.

ОРГАНИЗАЦИЯ.

Каждая палата в процессе первой сессии избирает свое руководство и нанимает служащих в соответствии с требованиями Общих Правил.

Во главе руководства Сената находится президент Сената, а во главе палаты представителей стоит спикер. Каждая палата выбирает главного административного секретаря, который в Сенате называется секретарем, а в палате представителей — главным клерком.

В неофициальном порядке, члены каждой из основных политических партий выбирают своих представителей и лидеров внутри палаты.

КОМИТЕТЫ.

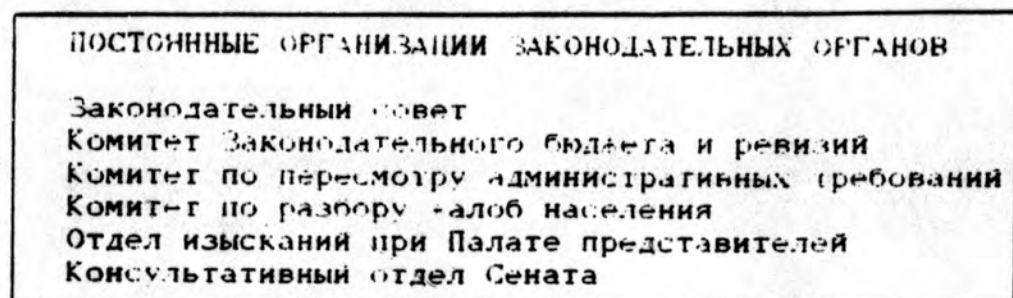
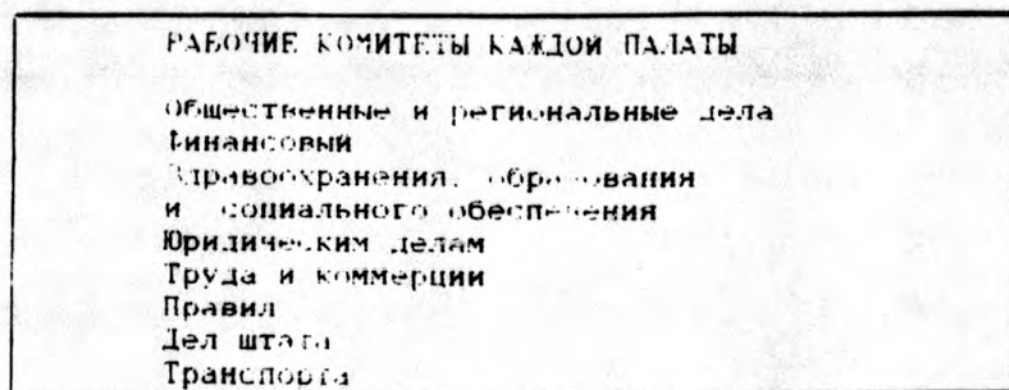
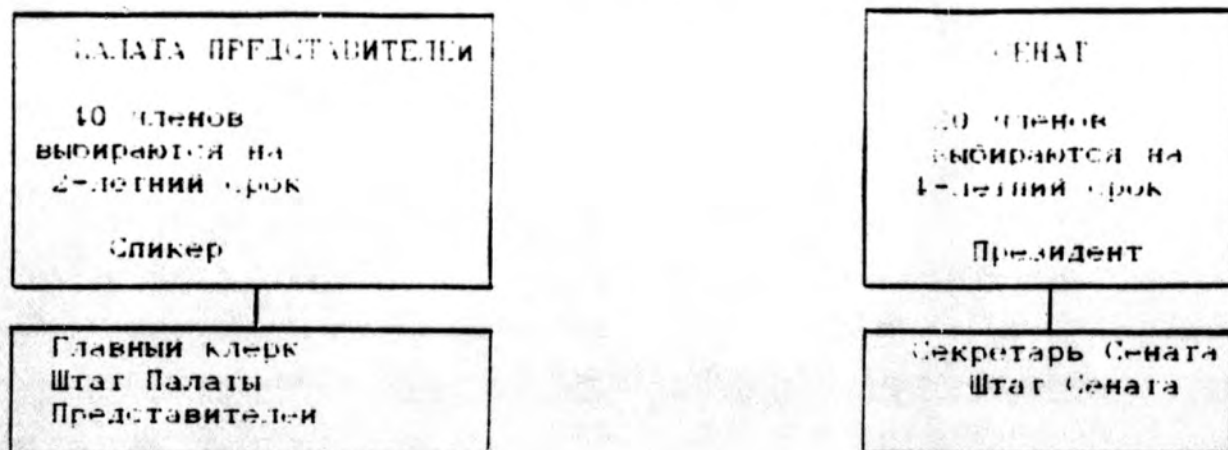
В основном работа законодательных органов осуществляется в процессе работы различных комитетов. В начале работы каждой палаты, глава палаты назначает Комитет по организации комитетов. Такой организационный комитет создает рабочие комитеты регулируясь Общими Правилами. Каждая палата имеет девять рабочих комитетов, в числе которых — Комитет по региональным и общественным делам, комитеты по финансам, по здоровью, образованию и социальному обеспечению, юридическим делам, труду и коммерции, ресурсам, Правилам, делам штата и по транспорту. Комитет Правил утверждает правила рассмотрения и утверждения различных законопроектов.

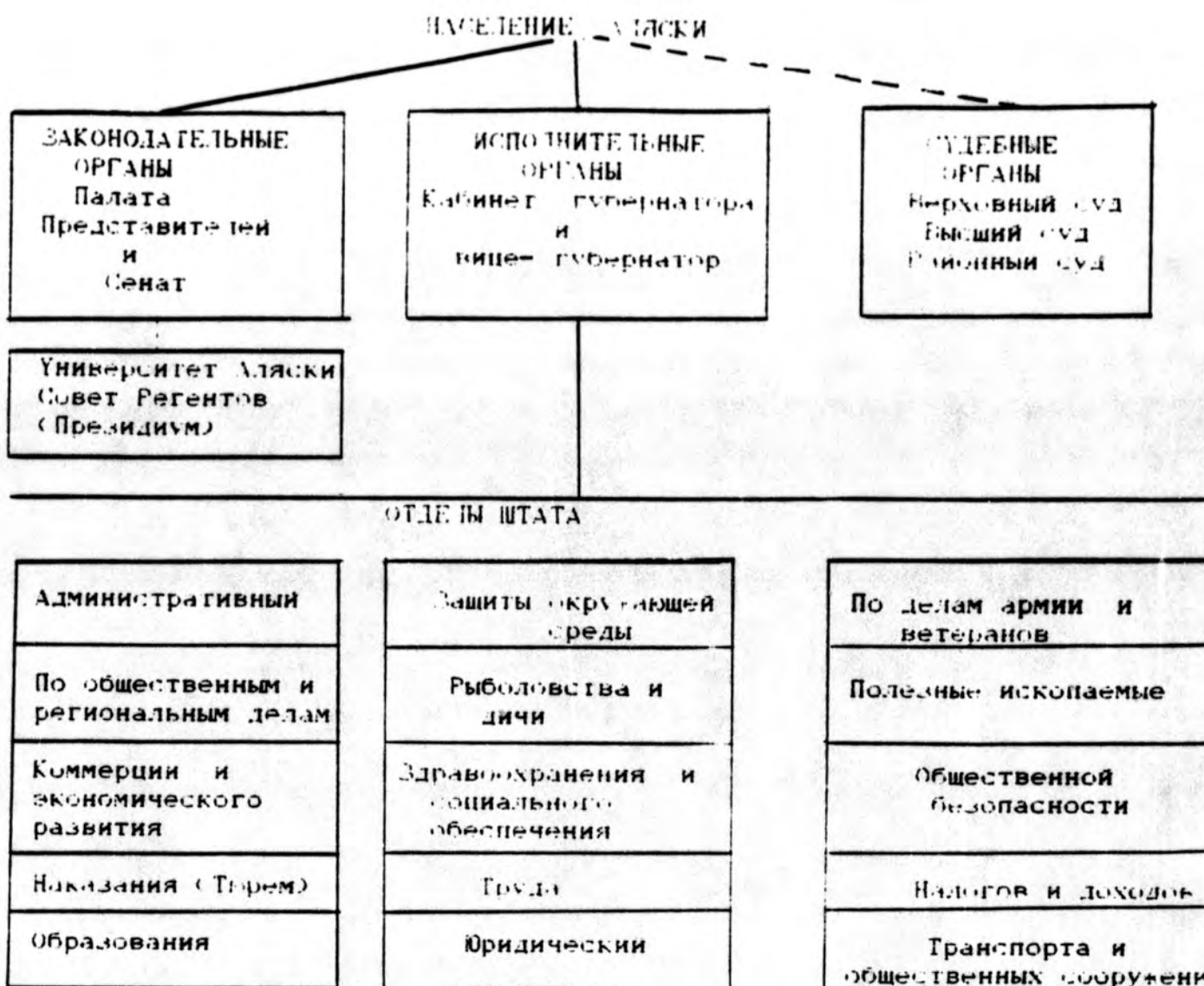

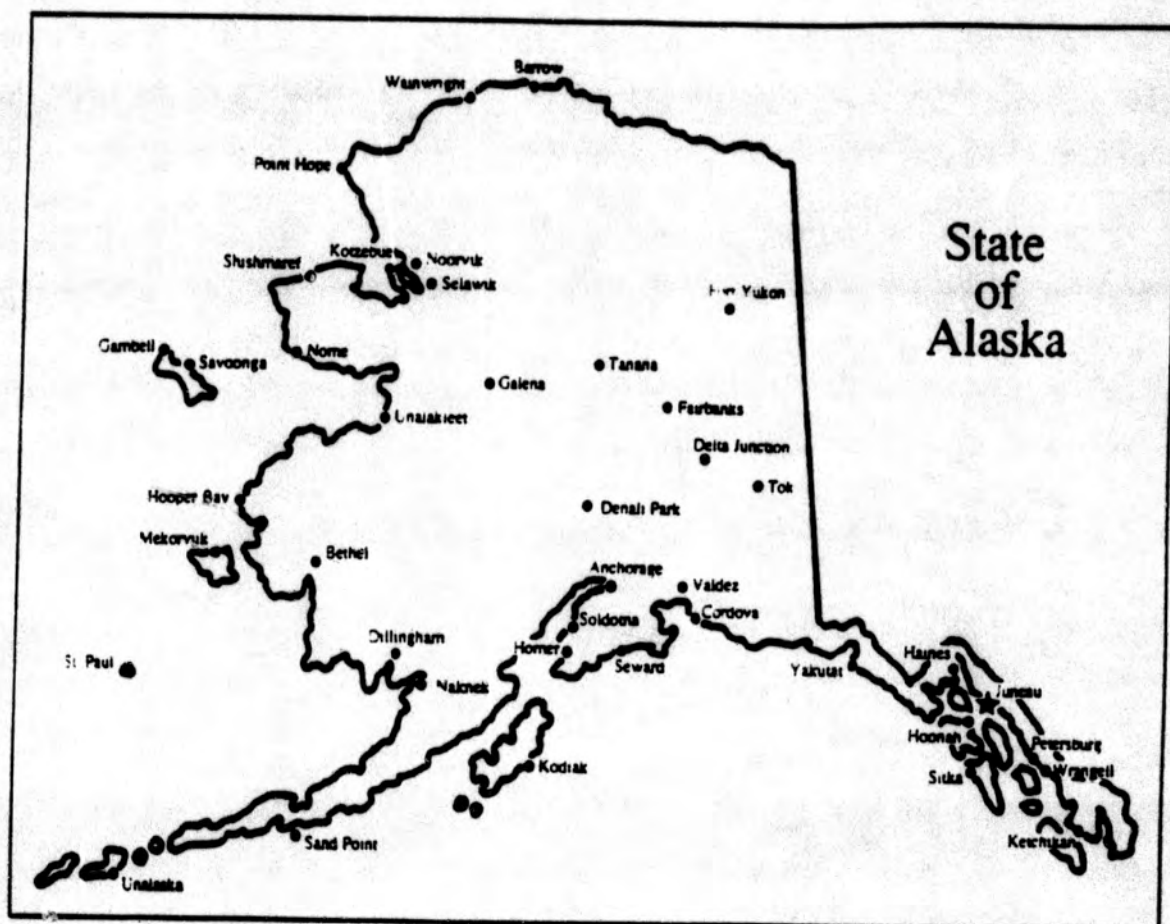


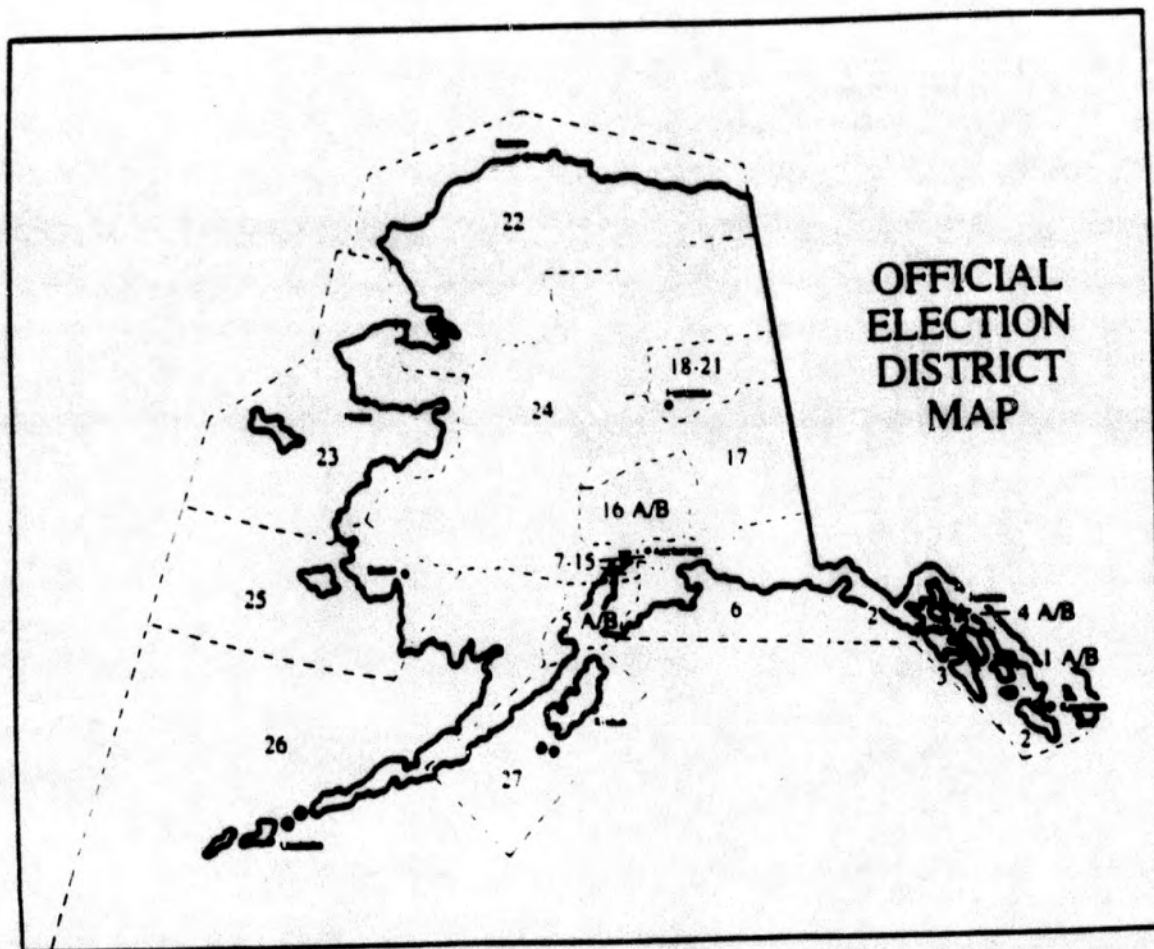

The legislative branch is responsible for enacting the laws of the State of Alaska and appropriating the money necessary to operate the government. Alaska has a bicameral legislature composed of a House of Representatives and a Senate. The House of Representatives is composed of 40 members elected from 27 election districts for two-year terms. The Senate has 20 members elected from 14 Senate districts for four-year terms, with one-half of the membership standing for election every two years. House and Senate election districts are determined on the basis of population. Under the Alaska Constitution, redistricting is accomplished every ten years, after the reporting of the decennial federal census. The work is carried out by the governor with the assistance of an advisory apportionment board. The House and Senate were last redistricted in 1981. The next reapportionment is due in 1991 after the results of the federal census of 1990 are known.

Qualification and Election

In order to qualify for membership in the Legislature, a person must be a qualified voter who has been residing in Alaska for no fewer than three years, and a resident of the district from which elected for one year immediately preceding filing for office. A senator must be at least 25 years of age and a representative 21 years of age at the time the oath of office is taken. Each house is the final judge of the qualifications and election of its members and may expel a member with the concurrence of two-thirds of the membership of the house.

Restrictions and Immunities

Members of the Legislature come under the general disqualification provisions of the state constitution for officers of the state (Article XII, section 4), and in addition are subject to specific provisions of Article II, section 5 that restrict members of the Legislature from "holding any other office or position of profit under the United States or the state." Legislators are further restricted while serving, or for one year thereafter, from being "nominated, elected or appointed to any other office or position of profit which has been created . . . while he was a member."

Legislative membership also brings some immunities under the state constitution (Article II, section 6), which have been implemented by law (AS 24.40.010). The immunities protect legislators during the exercise of their legislative duties. Specifically, a legislator may not be held to answer before any other tribunal for any statement made in the exercise of legislative duties. In addition, a member attending, going to, or returning from legislative sessions or interim meetings is not subject to civil process and is privileged from arrest except for a felony or breach of the peace.

Compensation

The state constitution requires that legislators be paid an annual salary and provides that they may be paid per diem and other allowances. They receive an annual allowance for secretarial services, stationery, and postage. Each member is entitled to moving expenses. Legislators' salaries are determined by legislation.

Sessions

A legislature consists of two regular sessions, each of which is limited to 120 days with one extension not to exceed ten calendar days if the extension is approved by at least two-thirds of the membership of each house. Special sessions may be called by the governor or the Legislature and are limited to 30 days. In the years following a gubernatorial election, the Legislature convenes on the third Monday in January. In other years, the Legislature convenes on the second Monday in January. Bills introduced in the first legislative session may be acted upon in the second. No bills may be passed in the interim between sessions unless a special session is called.

Uniform Rules

The Alaska Constitution requires that the Legislature operate under uniform rules of procedure. When a new legislature convenes for the first of two regular sessions, the houses jointly adopt their own permanent rules. The rules of the previous legislature serve as temporary rules until the permanent rules are adopted. The Uniform Rules are implemented and interpreted by the use of *Mason's Manual of Legislative Procedure*.

Organizations

The "life" of a legislature is two years. When each house convenes for the first of the two regular sessions, it elects officers and selects employees in accordance with the provisions of the Uniform Rules. The presiding officer of the Senate is called the President, and the presiding officer of the House of Representatives is called the Speaker. Each house elects a chief administrative clerk, called the Secretary in the Senate and the Chief Clerk in the House. As part of the informal organization of each house, the major political parties elect their floor and caucus leaders in party caucus.

Committees

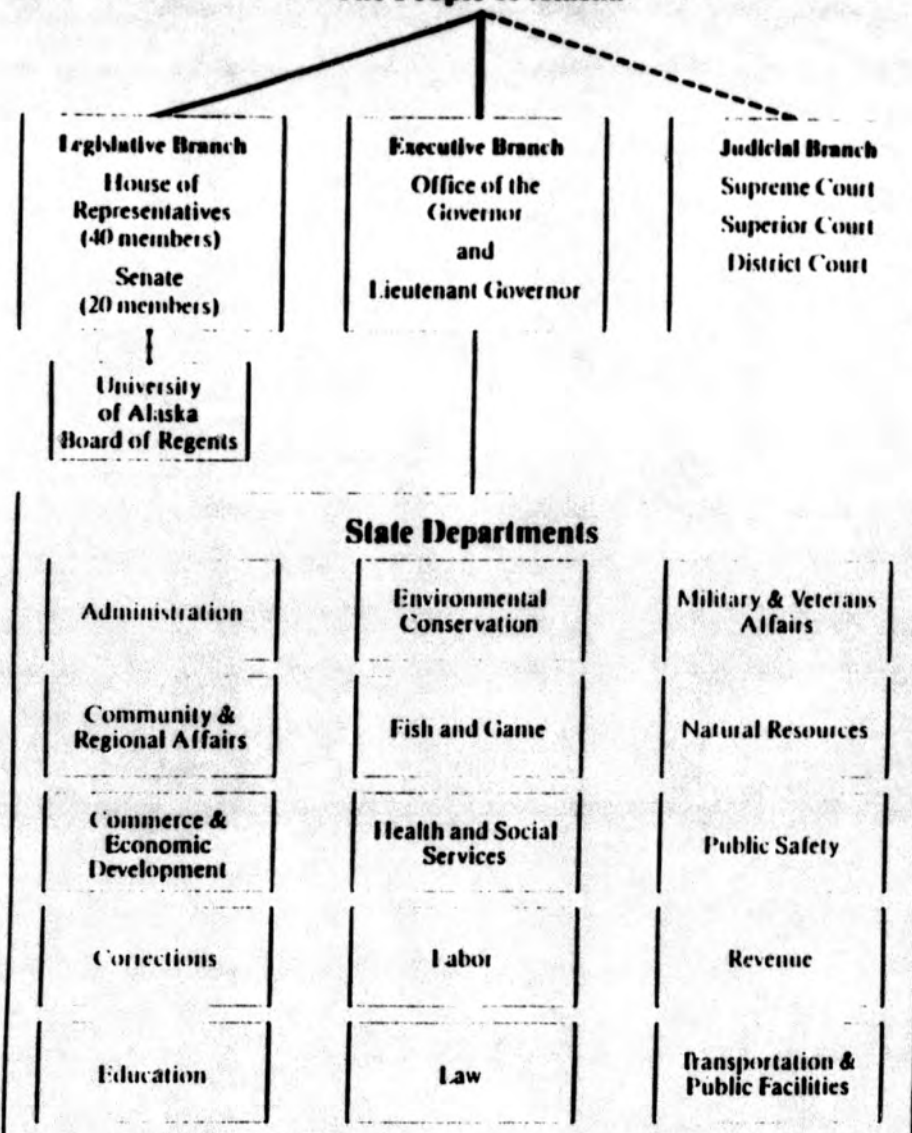
The bulk of the work of the Legislature is accomplished through the use of committees. When each house organizes, the presiding officer appoints a Committee on Committees to meet and report its nominations for assignments to standing committees in conformity with the Uniform Rules. The rules provide for nine standing committees in each house. The current standing committees are Community and Regional Affairs; Finance; Health, Education and Social Services; Judiciary; Labor and Commerce; Resources; Rules; State Affairs; and Transportation. The membership on each committee must total an odd number and there must be at least one minority member on each committee. The nominating report of the Committee on Committees is placed before the house for adoption, and the adoption of the report constitutes the "election" of committee members and committee chairmen.

Special committees are appointed by the presiding officers for the duration of a session or a shorter period, and their appointment does not require approval of the membership of the house. Joint committees consist of two standing or special committees meeting jointly to hear witnesses and discuss the topic at hand before making their independent decisions.

The Rules Committee of each house schedules the order in which bills and resolutions will be placed on the calendar for second and third readings, publishes the daily calendar, considers parliamentary questions referred to it, and is responsible for the immediate supervision of the staff of the house.

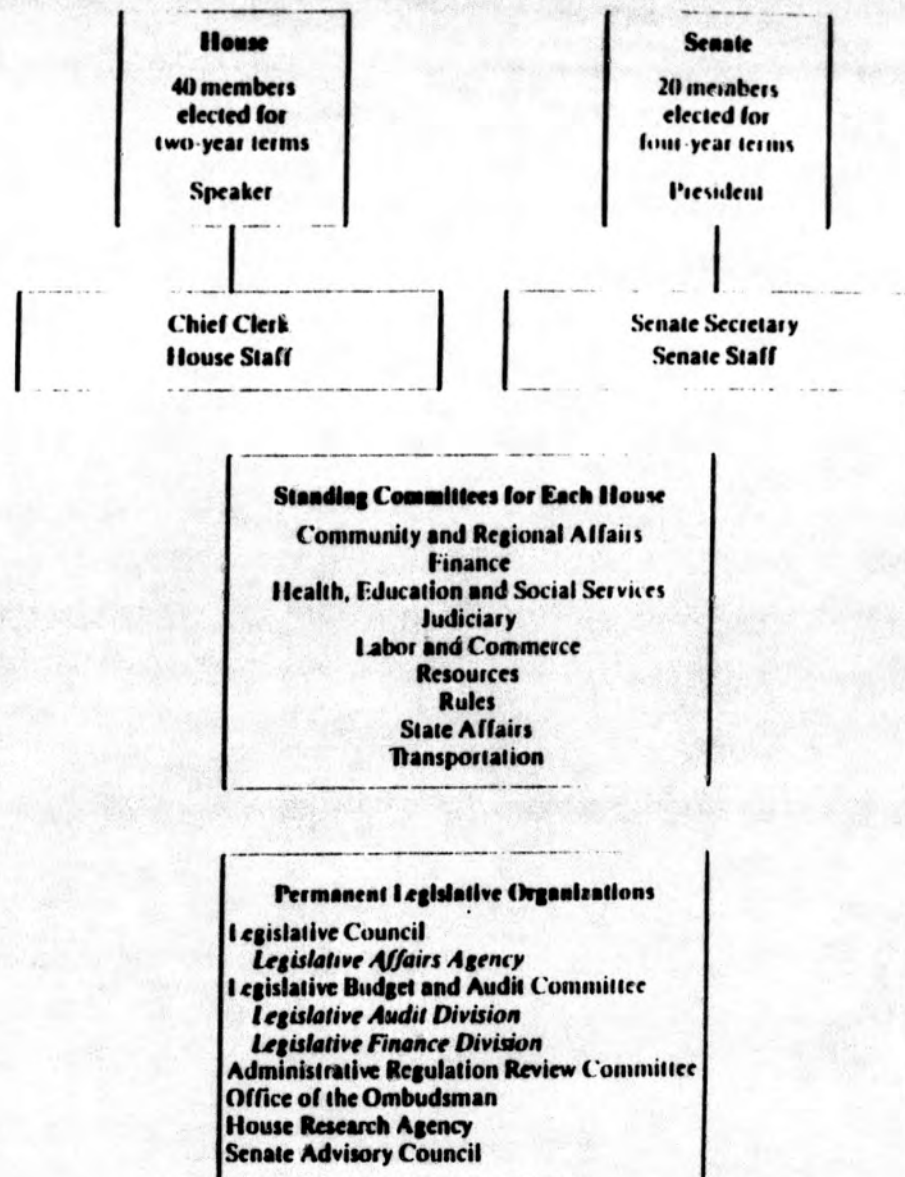

Джанис О. Фейкс была избрана в Сенат штата Аляска в 1982 году и в настоящее время председательствует в Судебной Комиссии Сената. До этого она была президентом Сената, а так же председателем в комиссиях Устава Сената и Финансов. Джан председательствует в комиссии по Энергетике, при Национальной Конференции Законодательных Властей Штат.

В 1988 году Сенатор Фейкс была названа Национальной Республиканской Ассоциацией Законодательной Власти как "Выдающийся законодатель Америки," и в 1981 она получила премию "Первой леди за добровольческую деятельность."

В 1975 Фейкс, бывшая учительница математики, получила звание "Выдающегося педагога системы среднего образования Америки."

Как деловая женщина она основала бизнес по аренде живых комнатных растений "Грин Коннекшен," который был продан в 1979 году. Джан автор двух публикаций. Одним из её увлечений является разведение лам.

В Сенате Жаров служит в комиссиях Ресурсов, Финансов, Труда и Коммерции, а также в комиссии Общественных и Региональных Дел. Он служил в разнообразных организациях, занимающихся федеральной и международной рыбной политикой и
