House Special Committee on  
the Alaska Permanent Fund

PUBLIC HEARING

Fairbanks Borough Assembly Chambers  
February 3, 1978

The hearing was called to order by Chairman Gruening at  
10:00 AM.

Present were members of the Committee; Rep. Gardiner,  
Rep. Haugen, Rep. Hayes, and Rep. Schaeffer; Chairman of  
the Senate Permanent Fund Committee Senator Hohman and  
staff Rob Kocsis and Mike Doojan.

Chairman Gruening welcomed the public and invited testimony  
and comments on the bills before the Committee.

Mr. Robert Rogesh suggested the permanent fund might be  
used for loans for structures with high energy efficiency.  
These structures are more conducive to use of alternate  
energy sources for heating and loans are not readily available.

Ed Calhoun expressed his opinion that the Perm. Fund could  
be used as a tool to constrain state spending for now and  
later on as an instrument to replace other methods the  
state now uses to take in funds. The state should use  
every effort to maximize the amount going into the PF  
with a view to using those funds to run the economy in the  
future.

Ole Larsen suggested setting aside 10-20 million for support  
facilities for the farmer in the Tanana Valley to act at  
a catalyst to get farming started. Rep. Gardiner pointed  
out that HB 682 was directed at just such ventures.

Charlotte Dutcher requested that an Ombudsman be appointed  
for the state investment and Permanent revolving fund.

Earl Beistline suggested that including non-renewable resources  
with renewable resources in the Committee's bills would  
allow risk money for mining exploration purposes and would fill  
a need abandoned by US Dept of Minerals and Energy Management  
discontinued OM&E programs. He also cited the need for  
matching funds for the Coal Research Lab mandated by  
PL 95-87.

Monte Shay expressed that he was against the subsidizing of both non profit and profit motivated organizations directly or through low interest loans. It is an intrusion on the free enterprise system.

Clas Knasky testified that the Permanent Fund should be separate from politics, a certain proportion should be set aside for enrichment of renewable resources and it should not be used to subsidize hard rock industries.

Mr. Elson Lausen concurred with Mr. Rogesh on the need for loans for private energy efficient structures and with Mr. Knasky on the non funding of mineral resource projects. He complemented HB 682 for its establishment of a public corporation and particularly the grants section because the private sector is not able to step into these risky investments.

Former Senator Paul Haugland was recognized in the audience and made some comments about his experience in Alaska. He advised the Legislature to obtain the best financial consultants possible.

The Committee recessed for lunch and returned at 1:30 PM.

Alan Bloom recommended use of a percentage of interest returned from primary investment of the permanent fund specifically for welfare and social service delivery to allow cutting back appropriations from the General Fund thereby directly benefiting all taxpayers.

Tim Wallace, President of Doyon, Ltd., offered some amendments for HB 682: Page 1, line 24 and 27, change language to show a more optimistic financial outlook to outside investors; Page 3, line 23 change it so a board member is answerable to the Governor instead of two bodies. He also suggested the need for bond guarantees for small contractors.

Harold Gillam suggested permanent fund monies should be available for purchase of low interest rate bonds offered by municipalities.

There was no further testimony so the hearing adjourned at about 2:30 PM.
